## Former Amity Resident Hurt in Merkel Accident

O. J. Reynolds, who moved to Merkel this year from the Amity community, was injured in an accident there last Saturday, October 17, at 12 o'clock. He has been working at the Kimbell elevator for some time and was helping move some empty box cars into place beside the elevator with a tractor. He was riding the tractor when the car gained speed and the tow chain slipped over the tractor wheel and turned it over. Mr. Reynolds hit the gravel, head first on his left side, was pinned under the tractor but no weight was on him.

A deep gash was cut in his head which required several stitches. The side of his head and his shoulder were badly skinned and bruised. His eye is swollen shut and bruised, but no damage done to the sight, doctors believe. He was given glucose Saturday and oxygen until Sunday morning.

## Bank Deposits Gain \$186,000 Over Year Ago

Deposits in the First State Bank of Rising Star remained above the two and a half million dollar mark on the date of the last call for condition, October 6, a gain of \$136,000 over the total of deposits for the same period in 1958, according to the statement released by the bank.

The deposits include very little, if any of the money, for the current peanut crop which was just beginning to come in at the time of the call.

## Peanuts Start Rolling Here After Rains

With a week and more of fair, dry weather since the heavy rains earlier in the month, the peanut crop was beginning to roll to market here Monday and Tuesday with prospects that—fair weather continuing—the local market would be "covered up" later in the week.

Most of the peanuts brought in during the first two days of the week were those dug prior to the rains and the first loads graded very poorly, market reports said. However, the grade was beginning to improve as later loads arrived and it was not believed that the damage done by the rains would be as great as first feared.

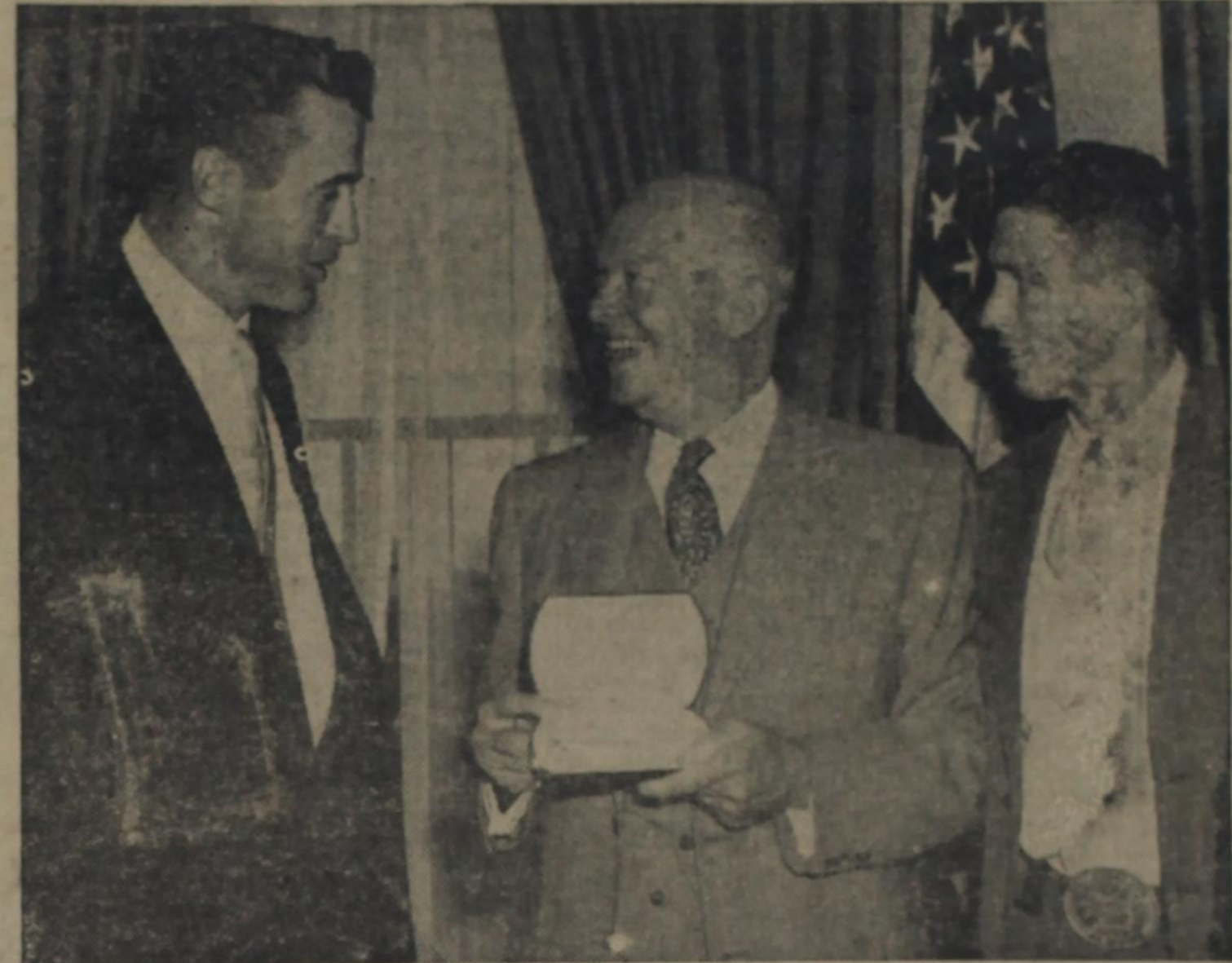

All base work on the 7.7 miles of Farm-to-Market Road No. 1027 from Rising Star to Okra has been completed and topping rock for hte pavement is now being made. R. L. Vaughn, superintendent for the Harry Campbell Construction Co. of Fort Worth, contractor, said.

Pavement is being widened to 20 feet from the original 18 and surfacing will be of the penetration type used before, and consisting of crushed stone and hot asphalt.

Pouring will depend upon the weather, Mr. Vaughn said, but the contractor hopes to have the road completed within 30 days.

The grades have been greatly improved, banked and widened and the new road will be a much safer and better route.

The contractor also holds contracts for widening and rebuilding sections of Farm-to-Market Road No. 587 between Rising Star and De Leon and 14 miles of Highway 36 from Rising Star toward Comanche.

Like the Okra road, a section of FM 587 between Duster and Sipe Springs is being reworked and widened. A section from the Eastland-Comanche County line to the intersection with Highway 36 four miles east of Rising Star is also being widened and retopped. Dirt work has been completed on the Duster-Sipe Springs section and base rock was being dumped there.

The Highway 36 project calls for widening the slab from Rising Star to a point 14 miles southeast where the highway was widened in an earlier project. Work of widening the bridges on this section has about been completed, Mr. Vaughn said. Completion of this project will not be done until some time next year.

Meanwhile final details of right-of-way acquisition were being done preparatory to receiving bids on the rebuilding and widening of Highway 36 from Rising Star west to Pioneer next month.

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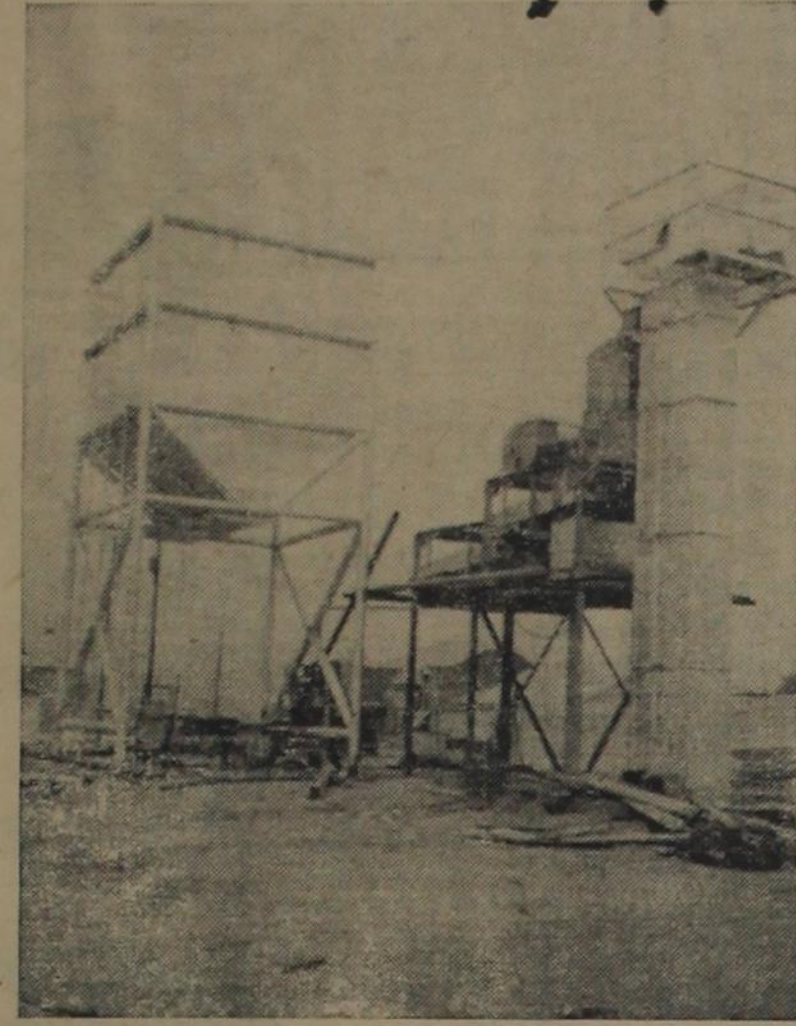
**ABOUT YOUR HEALTH**

Does your body profile look like the bent part of a Capital "D"? Would you like to acquire a bright new outlook on life? Then get rid of that pretzel posture. Good posture is the starting point of good health and appearance. Luckily, it is fairly easy to attain. Here's how:  
 Hold your head high and pull your chin in until your eye level is parallel to the ground. Pull your shoulders back and make the shoulder blades form as near a flat surface as possible.  
 Raise your chest up and push it forward until the buttons strain. Draw your abdomen up and in, and when you breathe make sure its your chest that rises and falls and not your abdomen.  
 Flatten the lower part of your back, tucking the buttocks as close under the hips as possible. Tip your hips down in the back. Hold your knees straight but not stiff. Put your feet parallel, with the weight evenly balanced.  
 Be careful not to revert to the old slouch when you sit down. Be conscious of good posture at all times, and the first thing you know it will be second nature. You'll begin to feel uncomfortable in a bad posture.  
 The old saying that "there is a place for everything" is doubly true for the human body. Each organ has a specific place in which to function, and functions best in that space. Vital organs—heart, lungs, abdomen etc.—tend to be cramped when the body is slumped or slouched over.  
 Cramped lungs cannot deliver a full supply of oxygen. Circulation is slowed down when the heart is cramped. And a cramped stomach impairs digestion.  
 The advantages of good posture go far beyond the purely physiological. Standing straight and tall, relaxed and comfortable, will give you a brand new outlook on the world. You'll get a "lift" far out of proportion to the little bit of conscious effort it takes to assume a correct stance and make it a permanent habit.  
 Try it the next time you walk by a plate glass window. Glance at your reflection — chin in, chest out, shoulders back and stomach flat, stretched to your full height. What a fine figure you cut!

**Watch for Prussic Acid in Johnson Grass After Frost**

COLLEGE STATION.—Johnson grass or sorghum after a frost is sometimes extremely high in prussic acid content and is very dangerous to livestock, warns Dr. C. M. Patterson, extension veterinarian.  
 Certain chemical changes sometimes occur in the plant and it develops a content of prussic acid, or hydrocyanic acid when wilted by frost or drouth, he explains. The poison acts quickly and can kill an animal within a short time after the damaged plant is eaten.  
 An appearance of nervousness, difficult breathing, and difficulty in standing are symptoms of the poisoning. Whether a poisoned animal can be saved depends upon how quickly a veterinarian can get to it. Treatment involves injecting antidotes directly into the blood stream.  
 Young plants will develop more prussic acid after frost or drouth than those approaching maturity, points out the veterinarian. Their leaves will contain from 3 to 25 times more acid than leaves of plants in the boot stage. Also, upper, younger leaves will contain more acid than lower leaves.  
 Dr. Patterson cautions against grazing frosted Johnson grass or sorghum before it is completely dry. If Johnson grass or sorghum is ready to cut for hay before a frost, it may be cut the first day after the frost, if care is taken to see that it is completely cured before baling.  
 It may also be used for silage, he adds. Generally, enough prussic acid is lost in gaseous form during the ensiling process and as the silage is removed and fed to make it safe for livestock. However, animals should not be allowed to self-feed from a silo filled with frosted sorghum or sorghum. If the silage is questionable it should be chemically tested by a local veterinarian or by letting one or two inferior animals eat it.

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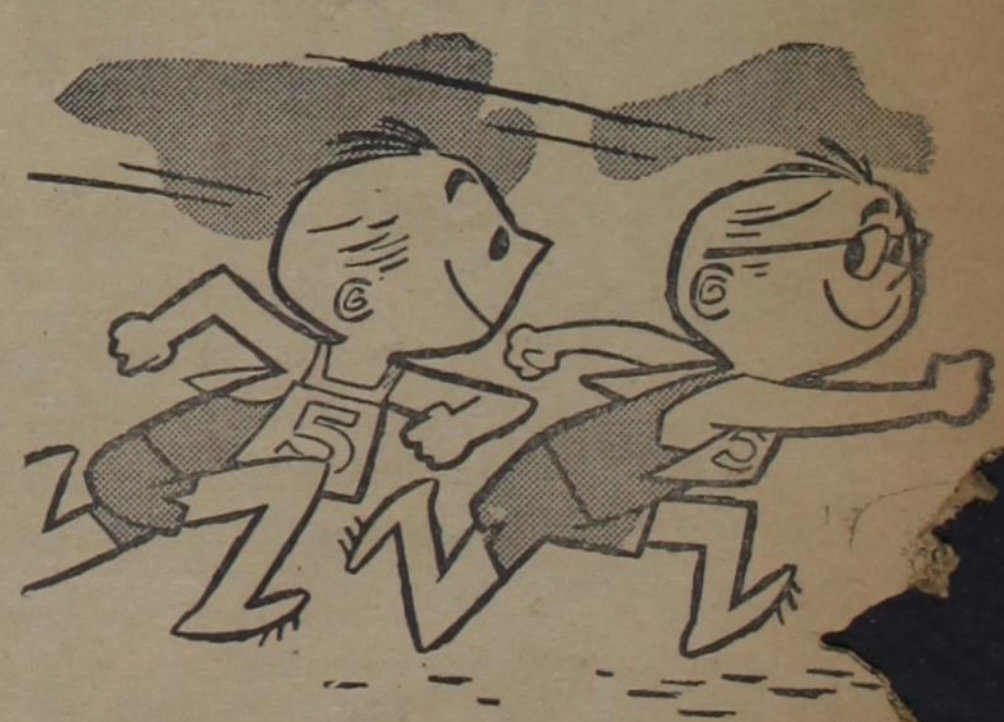

### Survey Shows Increase in Texas Irrigation

A survey just completed by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service shows a continued increase in irrigated acreage in Texas. The irrigated area in June 1959 was 7,140,443 acres. Similar surveys in 1957 and 1955 showed an irrigated area of 6,962,234 and 6,208,022 acres, respectively. The data in each survey was compiled from information furnished by county agents from each Texas county, according to Wayne Keese, extension agricultural engineer-irrigation.

Reports from the counties show that some irrigation is practiced in 239 of the state's 254 counties. An estimated 6,445,155 acres are irrigated by surface methods and 695,288 by sprinkler systems. Irrigation is used on 48,110 farms, and ground water supplies obtained from 60,708 wells are used on 5,914,753 acres, noted Keese.

Cotton is the leading irrigated crop with 2.2 million acres, and grain sorghum is second with just over two million acres. Wheat ranks third with 637,000. Other important irrigated crops are rice, 436,000 acres; vegetables, 375,000; and pastures, 200,000. Corn, forage sorghum, alfalfa, oats and many other crops are produced on irrigated farms.

Irrigation did not expand as rapidly the last two years as in the previous two year period, probably because of more favorable rainfall, explained the specialist. The increase during a period of more favorable rainfall indicates an acceptance of irrigation by farmers as a sound management practice instead of simply an emergency practice to maintain production in drought periods.

Keese added that the growth of irrigation not only indicates the farmer's continuing effort to increase his production efficiency, but also demands continued emphasis on conservation and efficient use of one of our greatest natural resources—water.

### "I GIVE YOU TEXAS"

Reminiscences of an old time sports writer.

Many years ago, I went to a West Texas town to cover a high school football game for a big city daily and the man on the gate refused to honor my pass because it was signed by only one school. The cost of a ticket was 75 cents and so I paid 38 cents as the non signing team's share of the gate receipts. (That item was included in my expense account but it wasn't listed by itself!)

Then there was the time that LeRoy Menzing drove 125 miles for the annual Cisco—Abilene classic. He was sports writer for the Fort Worth Star—Telegram and I was editor of an Oil Belt paper. A band was seated in front of the press box and the brass horn was squarely in front of Menzing, completely blocking his view, so I "broadcast" the game to him, telling him who carried the ball, who made the tackle and how many yards were gained or lost on each play.

They took their football seriously in the old Oil Belt. A visiting sports writer, in a parade before the game, was pelted with clods and another sports writer was seized by the neck by a fan who was desirous of pulling him out of the press box. Also there was the occasion that a visiting team sprang an upset and numerous individuals — (I have always suspected they were fans of the losing team)—threw gravel thru the open windows of our special train as we were pulling out.

There is the recollection, too, of a fan, indignant at something I wrote, who sent the word that he was going to give me a whipping when he came to Eastland for his team's game. Since he did not know me, several citizens persuaded the county highway officer to put on street clothes and pose as me. Not long before, this officer had arrested three "drunks" and, when they became belligerent, he subdued all three of them with his fists. So I felt that this was going to be one fight that "House" would win. The other fellow, however, failed to show up.

The Oil Belt in those days (1921—30) was probably the "hottest" district in the State. It abounded in historic rivalries. When Ranger and Cisco met, or when Breckenridge and Ranger met, or when Eastland and Cisco met, or when Abilene and anybody met, you could look for a ding dong battle. The four cities were in a space of 50 miles, connected by excellent roads, and the attendance often was greater than the population of the town where the game was being played.

At various times, I was editor (and therefore sports writer) in Cisco, Eastland and Ranger. One season, I would be advocating the cause of the Lobos, the next year the Mavericks, and the following season he Bulldogs. A fellow had to remember at all times where he was!

As a matter of fact, though, my last three seasons, I wrote up the Ranger—Eastland game for both papers—and it was the same writeup, too. (I've always felt that I would make a good trouble-shooter for the United Nations.)

A sports writer wasn't looked upon as much of a success unless he had at least two feuds going with other sports writers. My favorite targets were Blondy Cross of San Angelo and Prexy Anderson of Abilene but occasionally I would go entirely out of my class and try to take on Jinx Tucker of Waco. Actually, we were all very fond of each other but these feuds added zest to living and also made it easier to fill up our daily "column."

Maybe most of us scribes didn't make a lot of money but we enjoyed life — and we got into the football games free. (Except that time I had to pay for half a ticket.)
