## C.B. Hill--Former Employee Of Owl Barber Shop

ARTIST C.B. Hill The drive up to C.B. Hill's Route 4 residence ends at a comfortable tree-shaded house, guarded by numerous dogs, cats and chickens. The cacophony created by the assortment of animals at the sight of a strange car brings Hill himself out to see what is going on.

Hill's face is lined and friendly. A spry 70-year-old that worked for years as an automobile paint and body man, he is a far cry from the stereotyped, berated image of an artist. But, he is an artist, nevertheless.

Hill has turned the tool of his trade into an art medium. He paints with a spray gun, once used to do touch-up work on auto paint jobs, to create wondrous, geometric paintings that have a three-dimensional effect even close up. "There's no limit to

the designs I can make with that thing," the artist smiles. "I cut me out a pattern and I don't know what it will look like until I run it off." Hill favors large circular paintings that have eccentric wheels of patterns within still more wheels. The overall effect is a geometric, almost 3-D, work of art that appears to move if you stare at it for more than a minute.

While he has been doing this type of painting for a few years, he has been writing with the industrial tool for about 25 years. Hill creates huge Christmas cards and birthday greetings with the awkward spray gun for his friends with a hand so steady it amazes even him. "I can write better with that gun than I can with a pen," he admits. "I guess it's because I have done it

While most of his "signs" go to friends and relatives for special occasions like weddings, anniversaries, or birthdays, he also enjoys sending the unique greeting cards out to celebrities. He is most proud of the correspondence with Alabama's late Gov. Lurlene Wallace, that started up after he sent her daughter a gigantic, handmade birthday card.

Hill's work received national attention when Art Linkletter showed his audience a Merry Christmas sign a while back and about five days after Christmas, he was talking about the Christmas cards he got. "I was just getting ready to turn the set off when he brought out my sign and said,

"This is the biggest one I ever got, and naturally, it is from Texas. A man named C.B. Hill from San Angelo, Texas sent me this."

Hill says he was "real tickled" about the mention and especially, the plug—"that was the best publicity I ever got," he chuckles, "and all it cost me was 64 cents and an envelope." Samples of his art have also been shown on the Red Skeleton and Jimmy Dean shows.

Hill says he has had no art training at all, and considers the painting "just a hobby." He attributes the three-dimensional quality his work has "to the shadows I put in it, the shading. Everybody that sees them says

## Pioneer News

Mrs. A.C. Halsell

To continue my story of the Possum Kingdom Area, Palo Pinto Co., could take one of many directions. There is the Costello saga, four brothers and a sister who had lived all their lives on ranches extending for miles along the banks of the Brazos River; how they were forced to sell land and houses and make their exodus as best they could. There was the social, religious and educational change, the story of the filling of the lake in twenty-four hours, when officially it should require ten years; the protests, and lawsuits vrs the government, made by landowners of the area; and the story of two killings in the little town of Pickwick, these and many others, about incidents which happened before the dam was built.

One E.P. Costello, whose ranch and ranch home was across the river from his brother's ranches. His ranch home was built atop a mountain, where he had lived with his wife and three daughters for many years. His persistence in holding his home reached the point where they became residents of a small island, when the lake water surrounded the mountain. The island was reverted to the district, but it was agreed that Costello could live there on the island until the condemnation suit was settled. Court procedure started in 1940, in Palo Pinto District Court. Costello was awarded thirty-five dollars per acre, in the suit. The case was sent to the Court of Civil Appeals in Eastland, then to the Supreme Court in Austin. The Supreme Court affirmed the verdict of the lower courts.

Living on the island was inconvenient in many ways. The Costellos were unable to have a telephone as a line could not be strung across the lake. Twice he was taken across the lake, at night, due to illness. From the island to the Pickwick store, where he kept his car stored, was two and one half miles. He kept two motors to use on his boat or his barge to be sure to have one in condition at all times.

After Mr. Costello received his money from the Brazos River Conservation District, he purchased 700 acres from Mr. A. Dalton, who owned ranch lands in the area but not included in the lake district. He was more fortunate than many other people, who had to move. Moving into a modern ranch home not far from the ranch country, where he had lived since a boy, and only eight miles west of Grafard, their nearest shopping center, all contributed to healing the inconveniences they had known, in leaving along time family home.

Ralph John Hardy of May won tops with his Vetch and Oat mixture that tested 22.44 per cent crude protein. This was the highest crude protein hay entered.

The Coastal Hay entries were of excellent quality ranging from 7.5 percent to 16.6

percent. The Sudan entries ranged from 3.7 to 8.6 per cent crude protein. The Oat hays ranged from 8.0 to 10.6 per cent protein and the Klein grass ranged from 6.4 to 7.7 per cent crude protein.

The Grand Champion Hay which received 500 pounds of 10-20-10 fertilizer from Travis Gary of the Olin Corp. was a coastal hay entry grown by Jerrell Harris of Rising Star which had a total score of 95.5 and a crude protein of 15 per cent.

Reserve Champion Honors was a tie score of 92 each on the Johnson Grass entry and a Coastal entry both grown by Don Early of Bangs.

I decided that rats weren't the only things to get caught in a maze, so I found a method of attack and entry. A sea of cars stretched around the parking area, emitting humans of every size, shape, and color. We all headed toward the Mecca beyond the walls.

One thought intruded—this new Mall did provide a safe and easy passage for persons in wheel chairs. That was good. It wasn't long, however, before I decided a wheel chair might be the best vantage point for me to see the place too! Provided that I had a strong person who didn't mind pushing me through a half mile of pathways. After all, the area was supposed to contain 88 stores, stuffed with everything material needed to sustain life on this planet.

Some of the inside of the Mall, of course, was beautiful. Fountains are always charming, even if set in rather plastic surroundings. And plants—even if imported—add a lot to the scene. I wondered why I kept thinking of the mesquites and yucca which once stood on this spot—not to mention the wheatfields? Such a massive display left me more bewildered than in a buying mood, although there was soft, happy music to soothe me. Perhaps the mass psychology—display abundance and create a desire for more things—worked on a majority of shoppers. But I wandered and blundered about, finally hunting sunlight. I found myself muttering that it was easier to shop in Cisco and Eastland, especially if you didn't have a million dollars.

So—did one poor Eastland County woman find love, happiness and fulfillment while shopping in the Mall of Abilene?

No, those commodities were not for sale there.

## OBSERVATIONS FROM The River Road

In the early 1950's one of my Grandfathers spent a lot of time in my home. At that time radio stations still carried continued stories in which heroines struggled through various miserable situations. Grandfather, at age 93, found these interesting, and usually sat near the radio to look it straight in the eye. I will never forget one daily introduction to a melodrama, given in the deep voice of the announcer.

"Can this poor girl, who once knew love, happiness, security and fulfillment with a loving husband and two children, ever find happiness again?"

And dear old Granddad, the eternal optimist, would answer right back to that radio: "I say she can!"

As I listened to that story I wondered how that husband could have once been so "loving," since all he did was lurk around the edges of the play and snarl that now since he had divorced Marianne he was not going to let her and the children have another cent!

But the caption of the announcer is more long-lasting than the story, and can still be applied. Right now I am amusing myself with this application: "Can an Eastland County woman, Viola Payne, find love, happiness, security and fulfillment shopping in the new Mall of Abilene?"

I continue to be amazed at pre-planned Shopping Centers, which are springing up like mushrooms in various areas. They spring up so fast, in fact, that it appears more like an Alladin's

Lamp situation. Other resemblances to the Mid-East (inner courtyards and fountains, etc.etc...) could almost lead one into innocent little questions such as: "Where does all the money come from for these establishments? Is it Intra-State or Multi-National, or simply an oil company playing with some loose change?"

These days it is hard to tell. The Mall of Abilene is estimated to have cost over one hundred million, which would keep me in beans, tortillas and typewriter paper for a long, long time.

And one unhappy thing about these Malls is that not only do the stores inside the complexes resemble their chain-store counterparts all over the country, but whole Shopping Centers in different cities resemble each other. This gives rise to a situation where a shopper - if he travels at all - can lose a certain sense of place and identity. In a Mall in Fort Worth I had a feeling that I might step out to the stark outlines of Mt. Franklin above El Paso. Or in the Mall of Abilene one could be in Dallas, Midland, Albuquerque or anywhere. It is the same deadening repetition of chain stores, chain clothing, chain food.

My first introduction to the Mall of Abilene came in the form of some unsolicited credit cards. One day I was tempted to go look over the establishments, although I heard rumors that a chain Book Store there did not keep works by local authors. When I finally located the Mall—perched in an unhandy place on the south side of town—its first effect was rather jolting. The outlines were vast, a dirty beige color, and constructed in a style

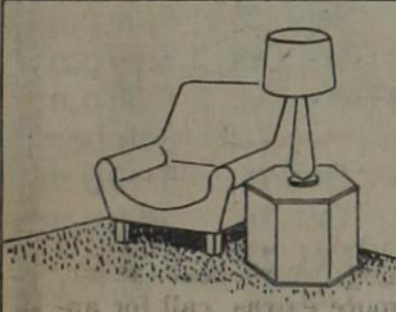

**Selling Out?**  
Many senior citizens sell their long-time, older homes upon retirement. They no longer need all that room for upkeep and the cash can come in handy if it's time for a warm-weather area!

Following is a checklist for older homes which will ensure that you get top-dollar should you be selling an older home:

-Check the attic for any loose-fill insulation between the attic floor joists, the best place for attic insulation.  
-Make sure there is no

damp plaster, especially near top-floor ceilings, the inside of exterior walls and ceilings and partitions under bathrooms.

-Buyers will be wary if there is a noticeable bounce to the staircase when you walk on it. Substantial vibration usually indicates structural problems—which should be corrected whether the house is being considered for sale or not.

-Keep any fireplaces "operational." Evidence of recent fires in the fireplace is a reassuring sign.

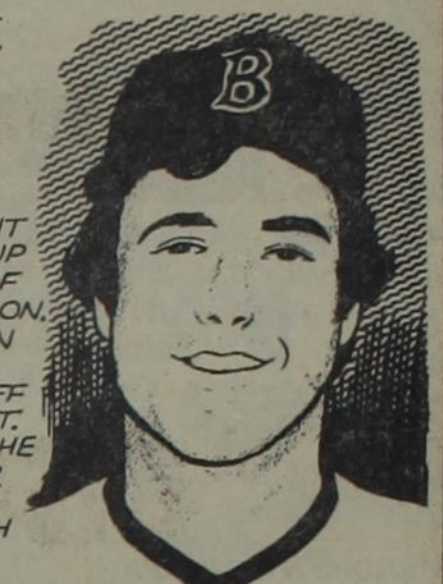


**Sharpen Knives**  
When using a stone to sharpen your knife, hold the back of the blade at a 10 to 15 degree angle from the stone and stroke the cutting edge against the stone in one direction (see arrow). Stroke from the heel of the blade to the point, first one side, then the other. Honing oil applied to stone assures smooth strokes, floats loose particles away.

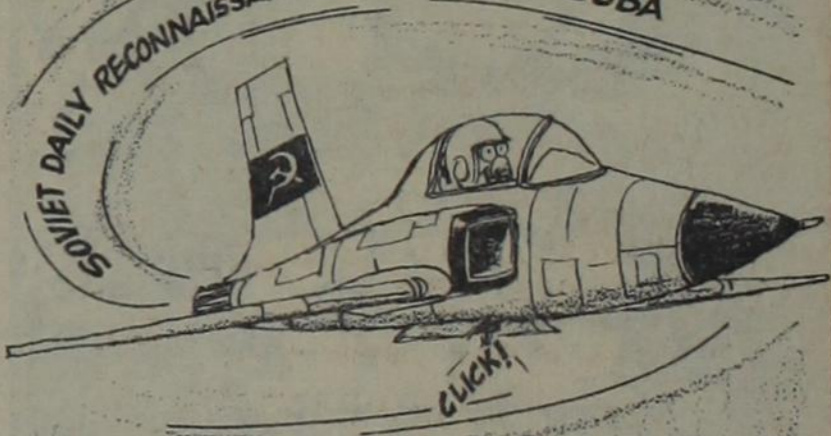

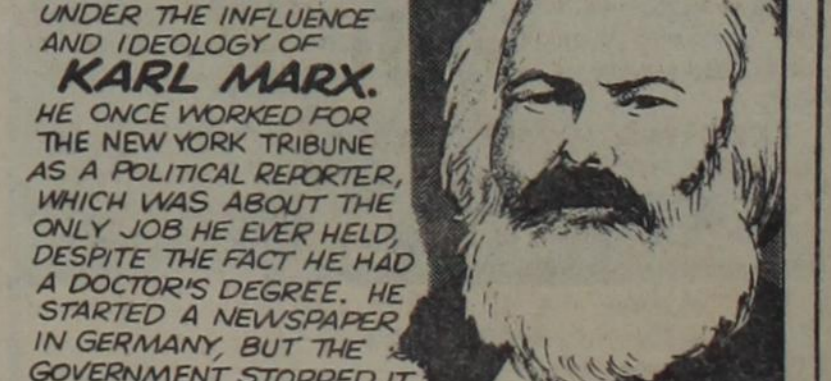

# Amendments Pro - Con

Rising Star voters will go to the polls on Tuesday, November 6, 1979 to voice their opinion on three proposed Constitutional Amendments.

Voting will take place from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. at City Hall.

E.L. Gaines is Election Judge. Also assisting Mr. Gaines will be Laverne Carroll, Dr. Kenneth Morrison, Inez Elliott and Mary Claborn.

## AMENDMENT NO. 1-H.J.R. No. 108

Proposing an amendment to Article IV, Section 26, of the Texas Constitution to authorize the legislature to provide terms of office of notaries public and to specify the appointment of notaries public for the state instead of for each county.

The proposed amendment to Article IV, Section 26, of the Texas Constitution would authorize the legislature to provide terms for office of notaries public that are not less than the current terms of two years and not more than four years. The amendment also would provide that the secretary of state shall appoint a convenient

number of notaries public for the state instead of the present appointment of a convenient number of notaries public for each county. I would add temporary provisions to the Texas Constitution to establish January 1, 1980, as the date on which the amendment would take effect and to provide each person appointed a notary public before that date would continue to serve as a notary public for the term for which the person was appointed.

## ARGUMENTS

### FOR:

1. Extending the term of office of notaries public from two years to four years and appointing notaries public for the state instead of for each county will reduce government personnel and will reduce costs to both the government and notaries public by decreasing the number of renewals and reappointments to be made.

2. Processing notary public applications and renewals is time-consuming and costly for county clerk's offices. The personnel in those offices could better spend their time performing other duties, and many county clerks favor the change. Currently, all applications must be forwarded from the county clerks to the

secretary of state for approval, and applying directly to a centralized office for appointment as a notary public would be more efficient and would avoid the middleman step.

**AGAINST:**  
1. The convenience and personal contact that is found in county clerks' offices, especially in rural counties, would be lost if the secretary of state took over all responsibility for appointing and reappointing notaries public.

2. This proposed amendment would increase state control over a function that has been handled successfully at the local level. It would add to the growing state government bureaucracy and would be an instance of centralization of state government bureaucracy and would be an instance of centralization of state government down to and through the office of notary public.

**AMENDMENT NO. 2-H.J.R. No. 133**  
Proposing a constitutional amendment to provide for legislative review of the process of rulemaking by agencies in the executive department.

The proposed amendment would authorize the legislature to enact law establishing procedures for

"legislative review" of state-agency rulemaking. The law could prescribe condition for agency rules to take effect and could provide for implementation of this authority by delegating powers to one or both houses of the legislature or to committees of either or both houses. The proposed amendment expressly recognizes that this scheme would be an exception to the separation of powers doctrine.

## ARGUMENTS

### FOR:

1. The proposed amendment would provide for the close and continuing supervision needed by the state bureaucracy in order to make it more responsive to the people and to the public policies expressed by their legislature.

2. If legislative committees are given the responsibility of continuing review of agency rulemaking, it is likely that the legislature will learn to be more careful and precise in the way it delegates this power to state agencies.

3. The legislature should review state agency rules because it delegated the specific rulemaking authority to the agencies in the first place, and the rules have the effect of laws.

4. Just as the governor's veto is a necessary check on the powers of the legislature, legislative review of agency rules can serve as an important check on the powers of the executive branch.

**AGAINST:**  
1. The proposed amendment clearly would infringe upon one of the fundamental principles of American government—separation of powers. Under this principle the legislature makes law, the executive branch carries it out, and the courts resolve disputes under the law. Legislative review of agency rulemaking is an obvious encroachment of executive power.

2. If legislative committees get involved in the day-to-day process of agency rulemaking, then special interest groups will have one more chance to impose their will on the public. In many cases four or five sympathetic legislators might be able to block administrative actions that are needed to carry out policies set by the legislature.

3. The people have consistently rejected attempts to expand the time the legislature is in session. If this amendment is adopted, legislative committees may be "in session" on a year-round basis.

4. The legislative committee and staff members who would review agency rules do not have the same level of expertise and understanding as do agency officials who deal with the problems daily. Furthermore, the length of time that the legislative committee would take to review and make decisions could postpone the effectiveness of important and immediately needed regulations.

## AMENDMENT NO. 3-S.J.R. NO. 13

Proposing a constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for the guarantee of loans for purchase of farm and ranch real estate for qualified borrowers by the sale of general obligation bonds of the State of Texas.

This proposed constitutional amendment would add Section 50c to Article III of the Texas Constitution, authorizing the legislature to establish a program of state guaranteed loans to be used for the purchase of farm or ranch land.

The amendment would authorize \$10 million in general obligation bonds, the

proceeds of which would be administered by the commissioner of agriculture without appropriation for the purpose of:

1. guaranteeing loans made by private lenders to individuals for the purchase of farm or ranch land;

2. acquiring mortgages or deeds of trust on lands purchased under a guaranteed loan.

3. advancing to the borrower a percentage of the principal and interest due on a guaranteed loan.

The amendment would require that any advances made to a borrower bear interest at the rate of six percent. The amendment would also provide for investment of the bond proceeds and would place a first call on the treasury for repayment of the bonds.

## ARGUMENTS

### FOR:

1. The family farm makes an important contribution to the health and economic well-being of the state, but the average age of Texas farmers is reaching 55. This proposed amendment would aid young men and women who have been unable to begin in the farm and ranch business because of the high price of land and the extremely high down payment required on the land (now averaging 20 percent) by making affordable loans available.

2. Because of safeguards concerning who is eligible for loans, the risks to the state from defaults are minimal and land speculators and large corporations will not benefit. Furthermore, in case of a default, the state would be able to resell the land with the possibility of making a profit because of the initial requirement for a fair appraisal before a loan is approved and because of increasing land values.

3. The proposal has been modeled after a successful Minnesota program, and that state's experience show that the loan security program is a viable way to encourage young farmers and ranchers.

4. Large corporations are gaining control of more and more agricultural land in the state, and this loan program enables individuals to begin to operate economically efficient and competitive farms or ranches.

### AGAINST:

1. A state guaranteed loan program financed by bonds means that the state is, with borrowed money, assuming the risk of default for loans

made by private lenders. Not only is this government interference with traditionally free marketplace, but it is also an unreasonable assumption of risk without tangible benefit to the state as a whole. If the presently unstable economic conditions were to worsen, the taxpayers would bear the cost of the defaulted loans. The potential for that default is reflected in current interest rates and down payment requirements; without that potential, state guarantees would not be needed to encourage private lenders to make loans.

2. Even with no or few defaults, the program is not without cost to the taxpayer. Under the enabling legislation, the costs of administering the program through the commissioner of agriculture

are paid from appropriated funds. In addition, the guarantees may tend to create higher land prices and add to the inflation rate.

3. Although the number of individual farms and ranches has dropped by 50 percent since 1940, there are no proven ill effects from the decline which justify a guaranteed loan program. Farms have become fewer, larger, and more expensive to operate, but have also become far more productive.

4. The "payment adjustments" provided for under the proposed amendment and the enabling legislation are, in effect, loans to the individual borrowers. The state, therefore, is not only assuming the risk of a private lender on the

## Retirement And Survivors Insurance

With the enactment of the 1977 Amendments to the Social Security Act, congress made several significant changes in the Social Security program. One of the most important of these changes involved the amount people can earn while entitled to Social Security benefits.

Beginning in 1978 there are two separate earnings limits, one for people age 65 and over and one for those under age 65. For those age 65 or older, the earnings limit in 1978 was \$4,000.00 and was increased by \$500.00 in 1979 to \$4,500.00. This limit will continue to be increased by \$500.00 per year through

1982, when the limit will be \$6,000.00.

The earnings for those under age 65 was \$3,240.00 in 1978 and \$3,480.00 in 1979. Increases in the limit for years after 1979 will be determined under the automatic cost-of-living adjustment provision of the law. These increases are usually announced toward the end of each calendar year.

Another significant change in the law was the elimination of the monthly earnings limitation. Prior to 1978, a person could be paid benefits for any month in which he did not earn more than one-twelfth of the yearly earnings limitation

or did not render substantial services in self-employment. Under the 1977 amendments, this monthly earnings test was eliminated except for one year. The first year a person receives monthly benefits, payments can be made for the months in which he does not earn over the monthly exempt amount and does not perform substantial services in self-employment. After that year, payments will be based only on the beneficiary's total

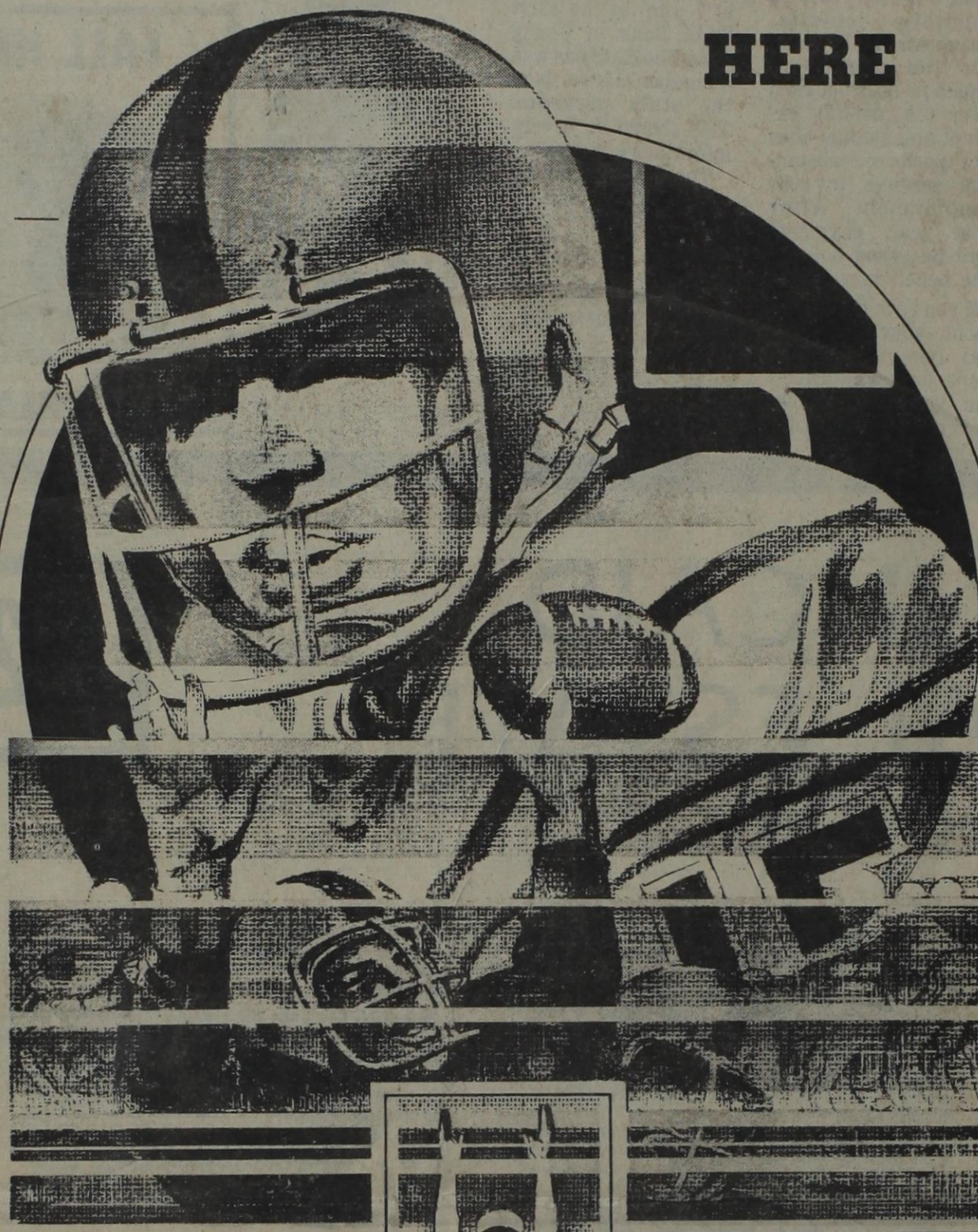
