ARTIST C.B. Hill The drive up to C.B. Hill's Route residence ends at a comfortable treeshaded house, guarded by numerous dogs, cats and chickens. The cacophony created by the assortment of animals at the sight of a strange car brings Hill himself out to see

what is going on. Hill's face is lined and friendly. A spry 70-year-old that worked for years as an automobile paint and body man, he is a far cry from the stereotyped, berated image of an artist. But, he is an artist, never-

theless. Hill has turned the tool of his trade into an art medium. He paints with a spray gun, once used to do touch-up work on auto paint jobs, to create wondrous, geometric paintings that have a threedimensional effect

even close up. "There's no limit to

the designs I can make with that thing," the artist smiles. "I cut me out a pattern and I don'y know what it will look like until I run it off."

Hill favors large circular paintings that have eccentric wheels of patterns within still more wheels. The overall effect is a geometric, almost 3-D, work of art that appears to move if you stare at it for more than a mimute,

While he has been doing this type of painting for a few years, he has been writing with the industrial tool for about 25 years. Hill creates huge Christmas cards and birthday greetings with the awkward spray gun for his friends with a hand so steady it amazes even him.

"I can write better with that gun than I can with a pen," he admits. "I guess it's because I have done it

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

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

To continue my story the Possum Kingdom Area, Palo Pinto Co., could take one of many directions. There is the Costello saga, four brothers and a sister who had lived all their lives on ranches extending for miles along the banks of the Brazos River; how they were forced to sell land and houses and make their exodus as best they could. There was the social, religious and educational change, the story of the filling of the lake in twentyfour hours, when officially it should require ten years; the protests, and lawsuits vrs the government, made by landowners of the area; and the story of two killings in the little town of Pickwick, these and many others, about incidents which happened before the dam was built.

One E.P. Costello, whose ranch and ranch home was across the river from his brother's ranches. His ranch home was built atop a mountain, where he had lived with his wife and three daughters for many years. His persistence in holding his home reached the point where they became residents of a small island, when the lake water surrounded the mountain. The island was reverted to the district, but it was agreed that Costello could live there on the island until the condemnation suit was settled. Court procedure started in 1940, in Palo Pinto District Court. Costello was awarded thirty-five dollars per acres, in Eastland the suit. The case was sent to the Court of Civil Appeals in Eastland, then to the Supreme Court in Austin. The Supreme Court affirmed the verdict of the lower courts.

Living on the island was inconvenient in many ways. The Costellos were unable to have a telephone as a line could not be strung across the lake. Twice he was taken across the lake, at night, due to illness. From the ilsand to the Pickwick store, where he kept his car stored, was two and one half miles. He kept two motors to use on his boat or his barge to be sure to have one in condition at all times.

After Mr. Costello received his money from the Brazos River Conservation District, he purchased 700 acres from Mr. A. Dalton, who owned ranch lands in the area but not included in the lake district. He was more fortunate than many other people, who had to move. Moving into a modern ranch home not far from the ranch country, where he had lived since a boy, and only eight miles west Graford, their nearest shopping center, all contributed to healing the inconveniences they had known, in leaving along time family

There was a total of 31 locally grown hay enteries.

Ralph John Hardy of May won tops with his Vetch and Oat mixture that tested 22.44 percent crude protein. This was the highest crude protein hay entered.

The Coastal Hay enteries were of excellent quality ranging from 7.5 percent to 16.6 Early of Bangs.

percent. The Sugan entries ranged from 3.7 to 8.6 per cent crude protein. The Oat hays ranged from 8.0 to 10.6 per cent protein and the Klein grass ranged from 6.4 to 7.7 per cent crude protein.

Amendments Pro - Con

AMENDMENT NO. 1-H.J.R. No. 108

Proposing an amendment to Article IV. Section 26, of the Texas Constitution to authorize the legislature to provide terms of office of notaries public and to specify the appointment of notaries public for the state instead of for each county.

The proposed amendment to Article IV, Section 26, of the Texas Constitution would authorize the legislature to provide terms for office of notaries public that are not less than the current terms of two years and not more than four years. The amendment also would provide that the secretary of state shall appoint a convenient number of notaries public for the state instead of the present appointment of a convenient number of notaries public for each county. I would add temporary provisions to the Texas Constitution to establish January 1, 1980, as the date on which the amendment would take effect and to provide each person appointed a notary public before that date would continue to serve as a notary public for the term for which the person was appointed.

ARGUMENTS

FOR:

1. Extending the term of office of notaries public from two years to four years and appointing notaries public for the state instead of for each county will reduce government personnel and will reduce costs to both the government and notaries public by decreasing the number of renewals and reappointments to be made.

2. Processing notary public applications and renewals is time-consuming and costly for county clerk's offices. The personnel in those offices could better spend their time performing other duties, and many county clerks favor the change. Currently, all applications must be forwarded from the county clerks to the secretary of state for approval, and applying directly to a cetralized office for appointment as a notary public would be more efficient and would avoid the middleman step.

AGAINST: 1. The convenience and personal contact that is found in county clerks' offices, especially in rural counties, would be lost if the secretary of state took over all responsibility for appointing and reappointing notaries public.

2. This proposed amendment would increase state control over a function that has been handled successfully at the local level. It would add to the growing state government bureaucracy and would be an instance of centralization of state government bureaucracy and would be an instance of centralization of state government down to and through the office of notary public.

AMENDMENT 2-H.J.R. No. 133 Proposing a constitutional

amendment to provide for legislative review of the process of rulemaking by agnecies in the executive department.

The proposed amendment would authorize the legislature to enact law establishing procedures for

state-agency rulemaking. The law could prescribe condition for agency rules to take effect and could provide for implementation of this authority by delegating powers to one or both houses of the legislature or to committees of eith or both houses. The proposed amendment expressly recognizes that this scheme would be an exception to the separation of powers doc-

ARGUMENTS

FOR:

1. The proposed amendment would provide for the close and continuing supervision needed by the stae bureaucracy in order to make it more responsive to the people and to the public policies expressed by their legislature.

2. If legislative committees are given the responsibility of continuing review of agency rulemaking, it is likely that the legislature will learn to be more careful and precise in the way it delegates this power to state

3. The legislature should review state agency rules because it delegated the specific rulemaking authority to the agencies in the first place, and the rules have the effect of laws.

proceeds of which would be administered by the commissioner of agriculture without appropriation for the purpose of:

1. guaranteeing loans made by private lenders to individuals for the purchase of farm or ranch land;

2. acquiring mortgages or deeds of trust on lands purchased under a guaranteed

3. advancing to the borrower a percentage of the principal and interest due on a guaranteed loan.

The amendment would require that any advances made to a borrower bear interest at the rate of six percent. The amendment would also provide for investment of the bond proceeds and would place a first call on the treasury for repayment of the bonds.

ARGUMENTS

FOR:

1. The family farm makes an important contribution to the health and economic well-being of the state, but the average age of Texas farmers is reaching 55. This proposed amendment would aid young men and women who have been unable to begin in the farm and ranch business because of the high price of land and the extremely high down payment required on the land (now averaging 20 percent) by making affordable loans available.

2. Because of safeguards concerning who is eligible for loans, the risks to the state from defaults are minimal and land speculators and large corporations will not benefit. Furthermore, in case of a default, the state would be able to resell the land with the possibility of making a profit because of the initial requirement for a fair appraisal before a loan is approved and because of increasing land values.

3. The proposal has been modeled after a successful Minnesota program, and that state's experience show that the loan security program is a viable way to encourage young farmers and

4. Large coporations are gaining control of more and more agricultural land in the state, and this loan program enables individuals to begin to operate economically efficient and competitive farms or ranches. AGAINST:

1. A state guaranteed loan program financed by bonds means that the state is, with borrowed money, assuming the risk of default for loans

made by private lenders. Not only is this government interference with traditionally free marketplace, but it is also an unreasonable assumption of risk without tangible benefit to the state as a whole. If the presently unstable economic conditions were to worsen, the taxpayers would bear the cost of the defaulted loans. The potential for that default is reflected in current interest rates and down payment requirements; without that potential, state guarantees would not be needed to encourage private

lenders to make loans. 2. Even with no or few defaults, the program is not without cost to the taxpayer. Under the enabling legislation, the costs of administering the program through the commissioner of agriculture are paid from appropriated funds. In addition, the guarantees may tend to create higher land prices and add to the inflation rate.

3. Although the number of individual farms and ranches has dropped by 50 percent since 1940, there are no proven ill effects from the decline which justify a guaranteed loan program. Farms have become fewer, larger, and more expensive to operate, but have also become far more productive.

Retirement And Survivors Insurance

With the enactment of the 1977 Amendments to the Social Security Act, congress made several significant changes in the Social Security program. One of the most important of these changes involved the amount people can earn while entitled to Security Social benefits.

Beginning in 1978 there are two separate earnings limits, one for people age 65 and over and one for thoes under age 65. For those age 65 or older, the earnings limit in 1978 was \$4,000.00 and was increased by \$500.00 in 1979 to \$4,500.00. This limit will continue to be increased by \$ 500.00 per year through ly earnings limitation

1982, when the limit will be \$6,000.00.

The earnings for those under age 65 was \$3,240.00 in 1978 and \$3,480.00 in 1979. Increases in the limit for years after 1979 will be determined under the automatic cost-ofliving adjustment provision of the law. These increases are usually announced toward the end of each calendar

Another sinificant change in the law was the elimination of the monthly earnings limitation. Prior to 1978, a person could be paid benefits for any month in which he did not earn more than one-twelfth of the yearor did not render substantial services in self-employment. Under the 1977 amendments, this monthly earnings test was eliminated except for one year. The first year a person receives monthly benefits, payments can be made for the months in which he does not earn over the monthly exempt amount and does not perform substantial services in selfemployment. After that year, payments will be based only on the beneficiary's total

If you have questions about your earnings and how the retirement test will affect you. you may call the Abilene Social Security Office at 698-1360.


