

Jury Selection Underway

In LeFlore Trial

to begin in the capital murder trial of Charles LeFlore in 91st District Court until late in the week if then.

The trial got underway Monday when some 400 citizens were called as prospective jurors, and that number was whittled down to 118 (through excuses, sickness and/or other causes), and Presiding Judge Jim Wright ordered the remainder to be grouped into 25s to report on succeeding days for questioning

Each prospective juror

Testimony isn't expected was being interviewed individually and separate from the other prospective jurors, so it's likely to take a long time to seat a jury.

LeFlore, 20, a Cisco oil field worker, was first indicted in January for the shooting death of convenience store worker Debra Garcia. The woman disappeared Nov. 29 from Quickway Grocery, where she worked, and her body was found in a roadside ditch two days later.

The 91st District Court Grand Jury later re-indicted LeFlore on capital murder charges, for which he is be-

ing tried. The re-indictment was seen as an attempt to have LeFlore's statement admitted as evidence. It had been earlier been refused as evidence by Judge Wright, and he ruled a second time that it could not be entered because of defense testimony given regarding the taking of the statement, at the first motion to consider the statement.

Don L. Wilson is defense attorney and prosecutors are District Attorney Emory Walton and Eastland Attorney Bill B. Hart, who has been named a special prosecutor in the case.

The Secret of God's Work Is To STAND: Jehoshaphat said, "If, when evil cometh upon us, as the sword, judgement, 10 pestilence, or famine, we stand before this house, and in thy presence, (for thy name is in this house) and cry unto thee in our affliction, then thou wilt hear and help." (II Chronicles 20:9) We could call this chapter, "Know your foundation." After Jehoshaphat declared exactly who he was praying to, and recognized what God had done for him in times past, he then began to recite examples of God's power.

Now we see him lay the cornerstone of his prayer, declaring before the house of God that contained the name of God, and the Word of God. Jehoshaphat resorted to the highest authority known to man, and that is the Word of God, What he is saying is, "Lord, the petition that I am about to make is not based on folklore, mythology, the pagan religions of neighbors, our superstition, witchcraft or any form of demon power, but I stand here upon your Word for you have declared yourself to be the god of Israel!" He stood upon the Word! Word of God.

Now we hear a prayer from the depths of their being. Now they begin to search out the Word of God to really stand upon. We have often heard the phrase, "God answers prayer." It would be more correctly stated that "God answers fervent prayer, God answers prayer that is based upon His word." Take the example in the book of Acts.
