A representative from the County Auditors office told Commissioners that a repairman - who came out from Dallas - said the damage to the computer was caused by negligence and the County Service policy would not cover the bill. After discussion the Commissioners agreed to pay the amount.

Bryan Neaves, State Highway Supervising Engineer for Eastland County, gave the Commissioners a progress report on measuring county roads and other roads maintained by the county. The preliminary reported showed 683 miles as a total. When this report is officially complete, the figures will be used to allocate road and bridge funds in the various Precincts.

In other matters, Judge Scott Bailey reported that the County had received \$466 from the tax on Bingo games during the last fiscal year. This is 5% after all expenses. Several places in the County conduct this type of activity, which is permitted by law under the Bingo Enabling Act.



Still unable to move the ball, the Cats punted. Three plays later Eden had advanced 51 yards for a touchdown. With seconds left in the first quarter, the PAT was good and Eden led 14-0.

The second quarter started out with the Cats repeating the forced punting pattern. Six plays later Eden drove 56 yards for a third touchdown. The best of the pecans will compete in the 36th Annual Eastland County Pecan Show in the courthouse lobby Tuesday, November 29th, Pecan entries are DUE TO BE ENTERED BY 4:00 P.M., NOVEMBER 28th. Pecan entries will be weighed and shelled on Tuesday morning. They will be judged Tuesday afternoon and will be on display until 3:00 p.m. on Wednesday.

The show is sponsored by the Eastland County Pecan Growers Association and the Eastland Chamber of Commerce. Chamber of Commerce members will help shell pecans entries for the judging.

The pecan show will include a bake show featuring delicious pecan pies, cakes, candy, nutbreads, and cookies on Tuesday, November 29th. There will also be a pecan centerpiece class. James Wright, Chamber of Commerce manager, invites everyone to come and see the best quality pecans in Texas, as well as prize winning baked

goods. The first county pecan show in the United States was held here in Eastland County in 1952, according to Gordon. This educational program has grown in interest over the years. There are approxi-

Four regional pecan shows are now held for the nearly 1,500 winning entries from the county shows. These regional shows are the "Show Window" of the Texas Pecan Industry. They demonstrate the superior quality of Texas pecans and play a major role in the evaluation of new varieties. Many other states from New Mexico to Alabama have pecan shows patterned after the original one that began here 36 years ago.

This sample of 43 should represent the variety or individual seedling tree and be uniform in size and shell color. There will also be a class for the
