## County Commissioners Meeting

Eastland County Commissioners Monday endorsed a program by Central Texas Opportunities to furnish transportation for the elderly, handicapped and poor of the County.

Under this plan a vehicle will be provided for the County - hopefully a van with a lift for the handicapped. This will be available to transport eligible people to the grocery store, doctor, courthouse, and bus connections.

People on Medicare or Medicaid will be eligible for the service for a small cost or nothing - with charges based on income. The program will be supervised by Central Texas Opportunities Inc., and based on a similar program operated by People for Progress in Sweetwater.

This state-funded service will cost the County nothing, with the only local obligation being to provide a place to park the van. There will be a coordinator set up for Eastland County, and this person will make appointments for the transportation.

Lois Robinson of Central Texas Opportunities and

Peggy Roberts of the Eastland County Multipurpose Center explained the program to the Commissioners. Both told of elderly people - especially in outlying towns - who were having great difficulty getting supplies they needed and medical services.

"The need for this transportation is definitely there," County Judge Scott Bailey agreed. It was noted that no taxi service is available in the county.

The Commissioners also said that the transportation service was badly needed in Eastland County, and would help make the elderly and handicapped more independent. Billy Bacon, Commissioner of Pct. 4, made the motion for approval, and L.T. Owen, Comm. of Pct. 3, seconded the motion. Norman Christian, Comm. of Pct. 2 and Richard Robinson of Pct. 1, added their endorsement - making the approval unanimous.

The Commissioners said they expected the program would be in operation by Dec. 1.

The approval of transport-

ation services for Eastland County was an important story from the County Commissioners Court Monday - but a number of other items were also on the agenda. The Commissioners spent much of the morning canvassing the Nov. 8 General Election. They looked over records and mentioned various voting trends, then made a motion to declare the 1988 Election ballots valid.

The election here was well-run, they agreed, with a good turnout. The total vote county-wide was 7,201, with just over 10,000 registered to vote.

The Commissioners also approved an extra \$100 for the County Clerk's budget to pay postage for the unusually large absentee-ballot turnout.

There was some discussing of the up-coming liquor option election in Ranger Saturday, with some of the Commissioners wondering how many people actually lived in the annexed area covered in the election.

On another item, seventeen prisoners were reported as being in jail Monday morning. The clean-up was in progress on the lot north of the jail, and Commissioners made plans to visit it in the afternoon.

During the day another jail-related topic came up - a bill for \$588 for damage to the cable connection on a computer in the Sheriff's office. A representative from the County Auditors office told Commissioners that a repairman - who came out from Dallas - said the damage to the computer was caused by negligence and the County Service policy would not cover the bill. After discussion the Commissioners agreed to pay the amount.

Bryan Neaves, State Highway Supervising Engineer for Eastland County, gave the Commissioners a progress report on measuring county roads and other roads maintained by the county. The preliminary reported showed 683 miles as a total. When this report is officially complete, the figures will be used to allocate road and bridge funds in the various Precincts.

In other matters, Judge Scott Bailey reported that the County had received \$466 from the tax on Bingo games during the last fiscal year. This is 5% after all expenses. Several places in the County conduct this type of activity, which is permitted by law under the Bingo Enabling Act.

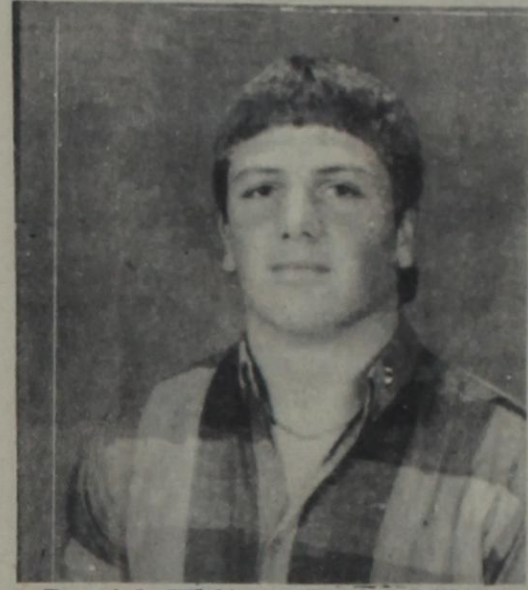
## Election Error

Rising Star Wildcats played their last game of the season in Bi-District play in Early where they met the Edon Bulldogs, runner-up in District 15-A, Friday, November 11. The Wildcats, seemingly jinxed from the start, lost the game 42-2 to the only team which defeated the Cats this year.

The District 16-A champion Wildcats ended play with 9-2. Senior Reil Barron returned the opening kick-off for a touchdown, but a clipping penalty negated the score, putting the Cats back to Edon's 45 yard line. Four plays later the Cats came up short by inches and Edon took the ball on their own 35.

The Wildcat defense held the Bulldogs, forcing a punt, but another Wildcat penalty gave Edon a first down. Again the defense forced an Edon punt on 4th and 8; this time it was a Wildcat fumble which gave the ball to Edon. Working from Rising Star's 22-yard line, the Bulldogs scored and the PAT was good, with the score 7-0.

The Cats' offense was forced to punt, giving Edon a strong field position. Sophomore Donny Alcorn recovered a Bulldog fumble on the Wildcat 10. Still unable to move the ball, the Cats punted. Three plays later Edon had advanced 51 yards for a touchdown. With seconds left in the first quarter, the PAT was good and Edon led 14-0.

The second quarter started out with the Cats repeating the forced punting pattern. Six plays later Edon drove 56 yards for a third touchdown. At 8:39 on the clock, Junior Toby Long blocked the PAT and Senior Stacy Green ran the ball back the 90 yards for the two-point safety. The score was now Edon 20, Rising Star 2.

On their next drive the Wildcats were forced to punt. Edon tried the flea flicker on the return, but Donny Alcorn wasn't fooled and his tackle forced Edon to cough up the ball. The Cats recovered on the 34-yard line and four plays later the ball went over on downs at the 32.

The Wildcats came up with another chance when Junior Derrick White stripped the ball and recovered it on Edon's 34-yard line. It seemed the Cats might get back in the game here when Jimmy Evans hit Stacy Green for a 10-yard pass, securing a first down. Green was hurt on the play and left the game. Evans hit Reil Barron for a nine-yard pass play bringing up 3rd and 1 and the next play put the ball on the six-inch line. A Wildcat fumble and Edon recovery gave the

Dogs the ball on their own five-yard line with 1:53 left in the half. Edon connected on a touchdown pass just as the clock ran out. The run for two points was good and Edon went to the dressing rooms with a 28-2 lead.

Early in the third quarter Donny Alcorn came up with another Bulldog fumble, giving the Cats the ball on their own 37-yard line. The Cats were unable to capitalize on the turnover when three plays later the Bulldogs intercepted Evans' pass on the Wildcat 14. Edon made another touchdown and PAT, leading 35-2.

The Bulldogs scored again less than 1:15 later on a pass play; however a Bulldog penalty brought the touchdown back. The Wildcat defense valiantly tried to stop the Dogs but Edon scored with 3:46 left on the clock for the third quarter. The PAT was good and Edon led 42-2.

The Wildcats had two more players, Junior Alan Havens and Sophomore Bobby Flores, sidelined with injuries during the third quarter.

The fourth quarter was more of the same, with the major difference that Edon was unable to capitalize on the Wildcat turnovers. The final buzzer sounded with a score of Edon 42, Rising Star 2.

Euen's win of this game doesn't negate the Rising Star Wildcats' great year. No one, except the coaches and players, expected the Wildcats to have a winning season, much less be undefeated in district play. Watching the Wildcats win game after game and im-

proving each week, it soon became an exciting year.

A great deal of credit must go to the coaching staff. Nathan Allen, Robby Stuteville and Le Jones. These coaches made the Wildcats believe in each other. It was this teamwork and dedication that made the Cats "great in '88."

For the five Seniors, Reil Barron, Kevin Bond, Stacy Green, Johnny House and Shawn Morrow, there is no next year in high school football; but for the remaining 19 Wildcats, everyone had better watch out - these boys know how to win!

Goals are to motivate participants to set short-term and life-long goals, to update participants on the latest drug information, to strengthen the concept of self-worth, and to help youth deal with the pressures and stress that is common to all adolescents.

Registration at the Camp Inspiration cafeteria will be between 4:30 and 5 p.m. on Saturday. And the conference is for parents as well as youth, with sessions for each.

Natalie Stevens, a 4-H club and Youth Council member, will make the introductions at 5 p.m.

At 5:10, "Future Outlook for Today's Youth" will be presented by Brownwood youth minister Joe Wilkerson.

Parents and youth will separate into two groups, with a session for parents and a session for youth. These sessions will begin at 5:30 and end in time for supper at 7:30.

After supper there will be a sock hop from 8 until 12 at the Lost In The Fifties Diner.

The youth session will include: Getting Your Parents To Listen - Stephanie Snyder; Gimme A Break - Joe Wilkerson; and a panel discussion on drug awareness.

The adult session, presented by Kathy Swift of Summer Sky in Stephenville, will cover: Communication Skills; How To Survive In Today's World; and Update On The Drug Scene.

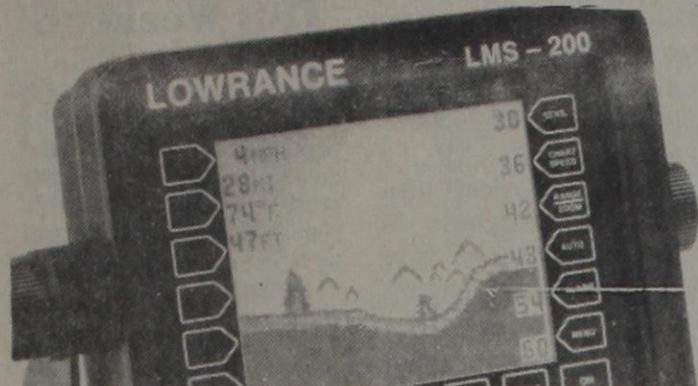

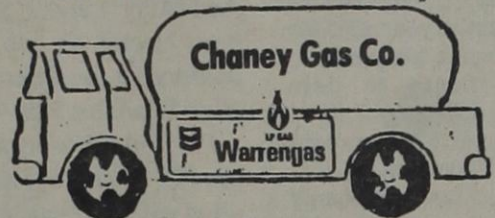

## Telephone Assistance Aids Elderly and Disabled

A new financial assistance program, aimed at older, disabled Texans, has been established by the Texas Legislature in cooperation with the local exchange telephone companies throughout the state. "Tel-Assistance" is the name given to the new program.

"Tel-Assistance will reduce certain charges on a qualifying person's telephone bill by 65 percent," according to Tim Raven, President of the Texas Telephone Association. "Eligible customers may have Touchtone service or custom calling services, however, the discount will not apply to these services."

Raven adds that Tel-Assistance service recipients will also receive appropriate reduction of the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) line charge. Discounts do not apply to long distance, telephone equipment or installation charges.

The Tel-Assistance program is under the direction of the Texas Department of Human Services. To qualify

for Tel-Assistance, an applicant must meet several requirements.

Applicants must be 65 years of age or older and must be disabled. Additionally, applicants must be the head of a household and have an income at or below the Federal poverty level.

"Additional information regarding Tel-Assistance is available from the Texas Department of Human Services," Raven said. "Interested parties can call toll-free, 1-800-343-8353, or write to Tel-Assistance Service, Texas Department of Human Services, Mail Code 952-X, P.O. Box 2901, Austin, Texas 78769."

Applicants for the program are processed by the Department of Human Services, as well. The Department will advise telephone companies if a person is eligible for Tel-Assistance.

The pecan show will include a bake show featuring delicious pecan pies, cakes, candy, nutbreads, and cookies on Tuesday, November 29th. There will also be a pecan centerpiece class. James Wright, Chamber of Commerce manager, invites everyone to come and see the best quality pecans in Texas, as well as prize winning baked goods.

The first county pecan show in the United States was held here in Eastland County in 1952, according to Gordon. This educational program has grown in interest over the years. There are approxi-

mately 70 county pecan shows with over 100 counties participating.

Four regional pecan shows are now held for the nearly 1,500 winning entries from the county shows. These regional shows are the "Show Window" of the Texas Pecan Industry. They demonstrate the superior quality of Texas pecans and play a major role in the evaluation of new varieties. Many other states from New Mexico to Alabama have pecan shows patterned after the original one that began here 36 years ago.

Anyone who grows pecan are invited to enter pecans in

the county show says, Charles Walker, President of the Eastland County Pecan Growers Association. A minimum of 43 pecans is necessary for each entry. This sample of 43 should represent the variety or individual seedling tree and be uniform in size and shell color. There will also be a class for the smallest pecans.

Plaques will be given for the three champion entries - Inshell, shelling, and native. Rosettes will go to the exhibitors of reserve champions and ribbons will be awarded to the first three entries of each variety.

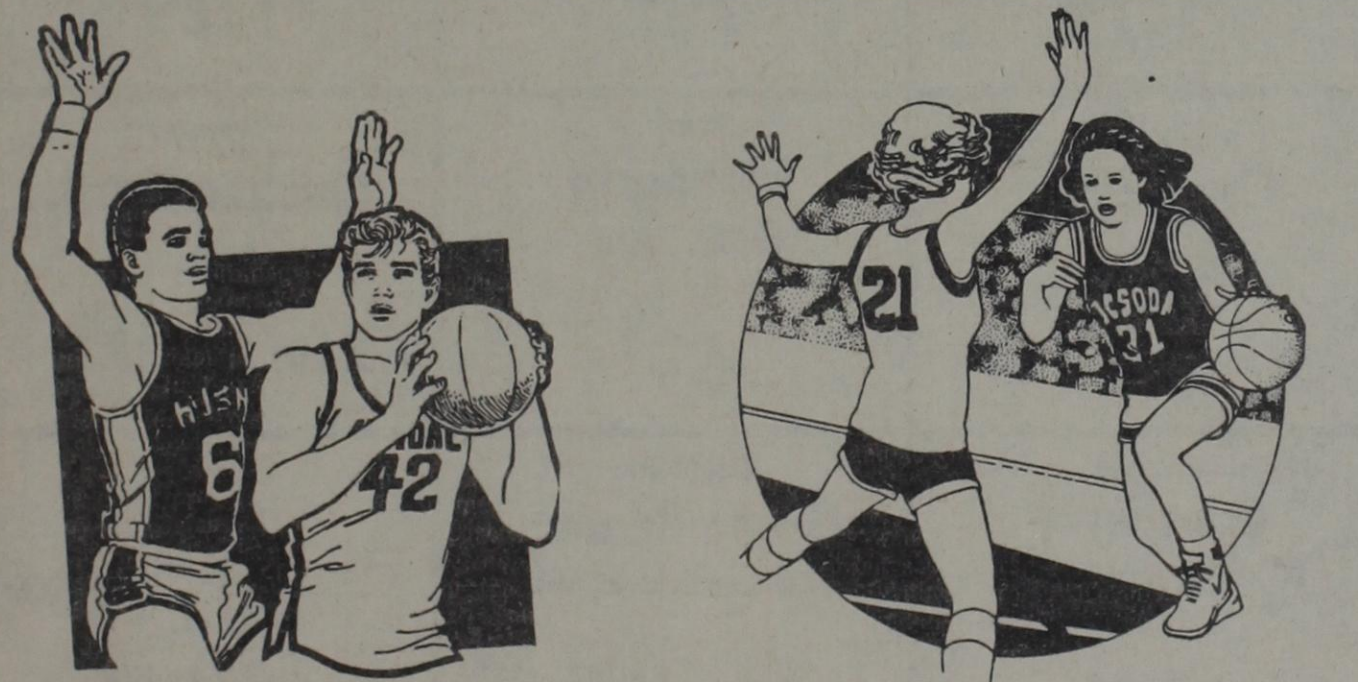

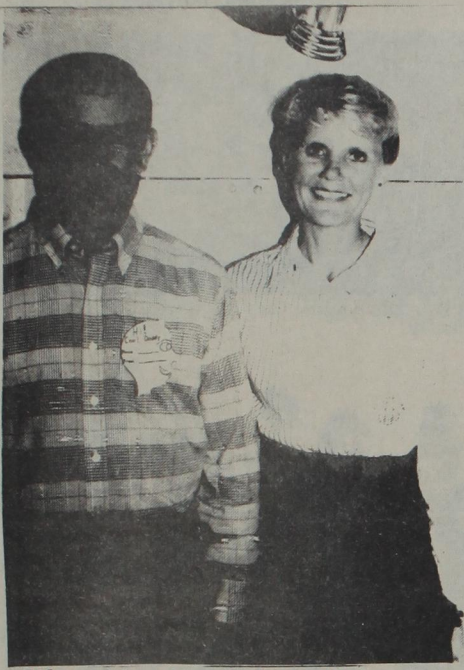
