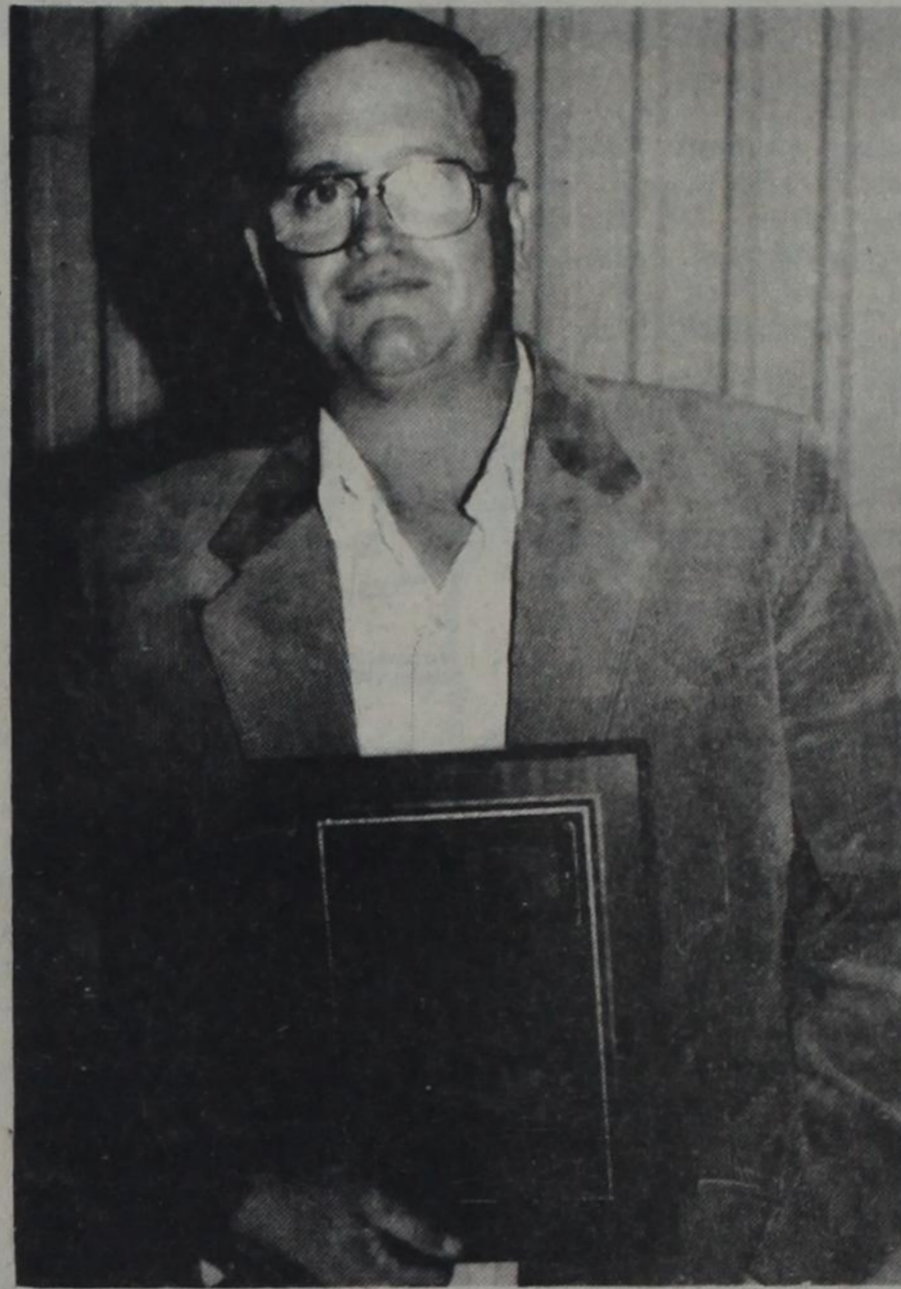

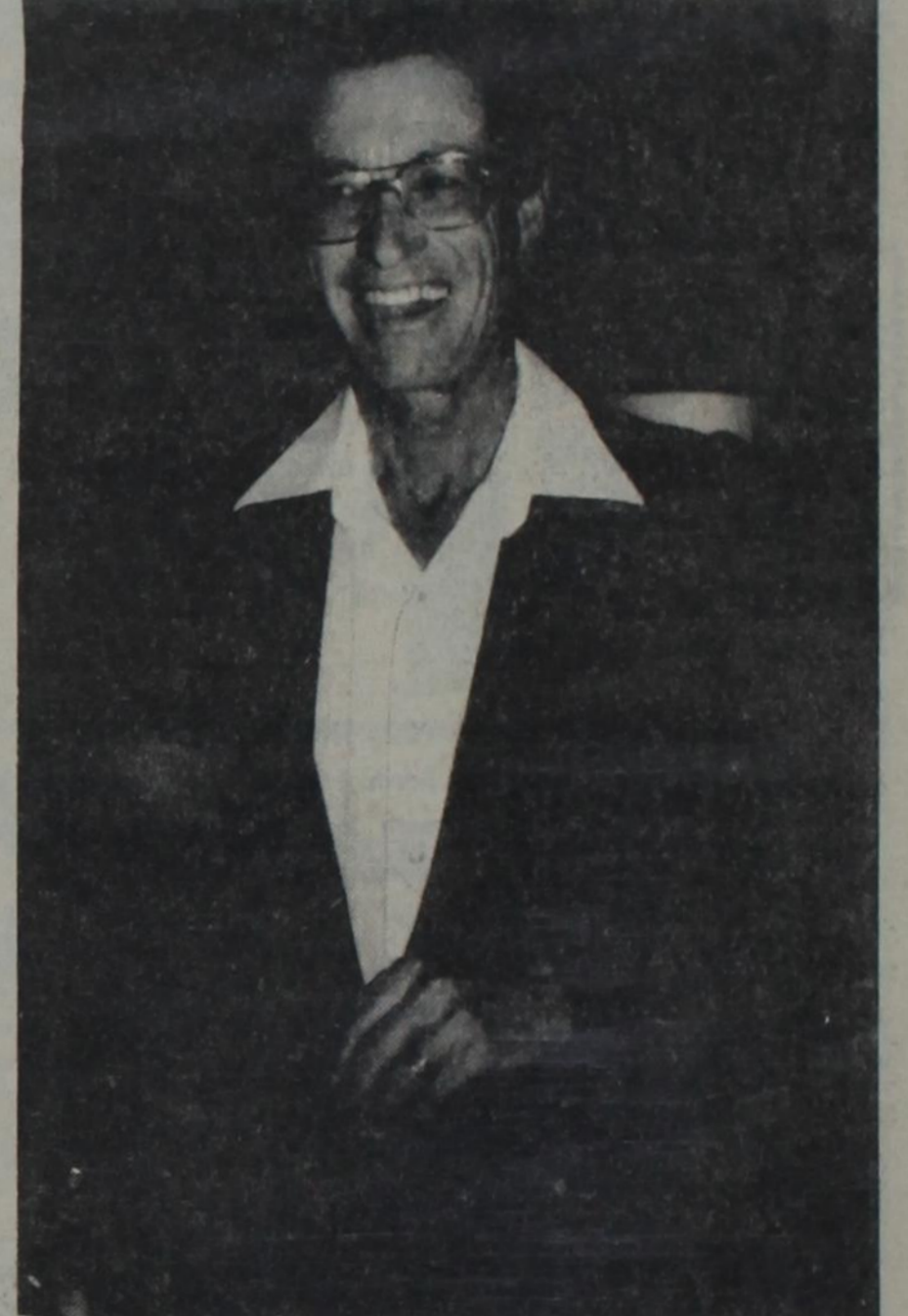
Awards Given, Miss Rising Star Crowned at Banquet

County Democrats Held Convention March 19

Eastland County Democrats held a rousing, heated, occasionally boisterous, and emotional County Convention in Houston, June 17 and 18. Dr. Dunn, Murray Heyser, Hicks, Olin Odom, D.W. Powell, Ken Halford, Phyllis Halford, Pullman, Judge J.G. Lyerla, and Truman Kirk will join with 221 delegates that make up the 22nd Senatorial District of 14 Counties. These delegates representative support is spread out with Dukakis, 33.34%; Gore 25%; Gephart 8.33%; and uncommitted 33.33%. The County Convention supported Dukakis with 31.11%; Gore with 24.45%; Gephart with 4.44%; Simon 2.22%; and uncommitted with 37.78%.

The resolutions committee, chaired by Ruby Halbert, presented five resolutions for the convention to adopt for the state convention to consider in Houston. The resolutions dealt with aid to small community hospitals or help for maintenance of the small community hospitals; aid to public schools in low income areas; a \$10 per barrel import tax on foreign oil; aid to small towns and cities in low income areas (revenue sharing); and assisting Attorney General Jim Maddox in requesting matching funds for collection of child support.

A resolution adopting Charlie Stenholm as a favorite son for president failed to pass the committee. The credentials committee, under Judge J.V. Heyser's leadership, approved all voters as Democrats of Eastland County.

The delegates committee, chaired by June Hicks, designated twelve delegates for the State Convention in Houston, June 17 and 18. Dr. Dunn, Murray Heyser, Hicks, Olin Odom, D.W. Powell, Ken Halford, Phyllis Halford, Pullman, Judge J.G. Lyerla, and Truman Kirk will join with 221 delegates that make up the 22nd Senatorial District of 14 Counties. These delegates representative support is spread out with Dukakis, 33.34%; Gore 25%; Gephart 8.33%; and uncommitted 33.33%. The County Convention supported Dukakis with 31.11%; Gore with 24.45%; Gephart with 4.44%; Simon 2.22%; and uncommitted with 37.78%.

Hogan Is Sheriff Nominee

The canvass and recount have been completed and Dee Hogan is officially the Democratic Party's nominee for Sheriff of Eastland County.

The recount changed the vote totals slightly, but the outcome was the same. Dee Hogan had 2,072 votes to 2,036 votes for Don Underwood, with 73 voters not voting for either and 2 votes disqualified.

County Democratic Party Chairwoman Mary Bailey, as agreed to by both candidates, chose four uninvolved people to make the recount.

Cecil Deadman was chairman of the recount committee, which also included Frances Cox, Sandy Goode and Sandy Lyerla. The total Democratic Party vote, according to the recount committee, was 4,183 in Eastland County. The two disqualified votes were in Rising Star's Precinct 7.

A one vote correction was made in several of the boxes while the biggest corrections were made in the Cisco and Olden boxes. The Cisco and Olden changes each affected the outcome by only five votes.

Wednesday's recount gave Hogan a 36 vote win over Underwood rather than the 27 vote edge first reported.

Winning candidate Dee Hogan gained 9 votes in the recount. The nominees have to also win in the General Election in the fall to gain the offices they are seeking, and on the local and county levels in Eastland County, they won't have any opponents listed on the ballot.

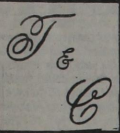

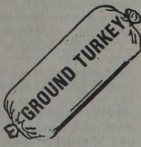

Jerry Sitton and Mary Dorcas Green were born only 20 miles from each other - he in Marlowe, Oklahoma, in 1911, and she in Hastings, Oklahoma, in 1916. They met in 1937 in Kilgore, Texas, where he worked as a newspaper reporter and she was a secretary/bookkeeper for a gas company. A mutual friend, thinking they would make a nice couple, arranged for them to go on a "blind date." It was not long before he popped the suggestion, "Miss Green, let's I and you get married."

They were married on March 26, 1938, in the pastor's study of the First Baptist Church of Hallsville, Texas. The Sittons continued

to live in Kilgore until he went into the U. S. Navy in 1942.

During World War II, Sitton was a navy flier. He was stationed in Livermore, California, where their daughter was born in 1943; in Olathe, Kansas, where in 1944 their son was born; and in the Philippine Islands. While he was overseas, his wife and children lived in

USDA Will Offer Assistance To Texans Hit By Range Fire

WASHINGTON - The U.S. Department of Agriculture has agreed to make emergency help available to ranchers and farmers whose land was blackened by a wall of flames that roared across five West Texas counties last weekend, U.S. Sen. Phil Gramm says.

"Two programs have been approved by USDA," Gramm said. "The emergency feed program allows USDA to share the cost of feeding cattle; under a second program, USDA

can provide assistance to rebuild burned fencelines."

"The emergency feed program will pay half the cost of providing hay, feed grains, and mixed feed to help cattlemen who are hard-pressed to replace feed that was ruined by the fire," Gramm said.

"This will provide some rapid assistance," Gramm said of the department's decision.

"I have been assured by

the Texas Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service that the programs will be implemented immediately," he said.

"I intend to work to see the federal government participate to the maximum extent possible to help farmers and ranchers get back into normal production and to put the devastating impact of the fire behind us," Gramm said.

An estimated 289,700 acres of rangeland were burned by the fire that swept across portions of Shackelford, Callahan, Haskell, Coleman, and Throckmorton counties, Gramm noted.

In 1947, Sitton purchased the Cisco Daily Press and moved his family to Cisco in 1948. Under his ownership, the newspaper became the Cisco Press. For many years, he wrote a popular column called "The Gay Philosopher," which eventually was renamed "People and Things."

After moving to Cisco, Sitton joined the naval reserve, in which he was active for 25 years.

Sitton's holdings grew to include the RangerTimes, the Eastland Telegram, and the Rising Star under the collective title Eastland County Newspapers, Inc. Mrs. Sitton worked with her husband as sometime-manager, reporter, bookkeeper, paperboy, and "girl Friday."

In 1950, Sitton established the Longhorn Press, a mail-order small book publishing company. He sold the Eastland County Newspapers to H. V. O'Brien in the early 1970's and claimed to retire. Although he continued to write "People and Things" regularly until last November. The couple still operate the Longhorn Press.

Since retiring, Sitton has worked in six foreign countries having production problems under the auspices of the International Executive Service Corps.

Sitton is a long-time

member of the Masons, the Shriners, and the Lions Club, of which he is a past president. He has served on the Cisco city commission, the public school board, and the college board of regents. Mrs. Sitton was for years active in Girls Scouts and P-TA. She has been a member of the Hospital Auxiliary since its organization. They have been members of the First Baptist Church and the Cisco Country Club since moving to Cisco.

The couple's children grew up in Cisco, attending local schools and Texas colleges. Their son Jim now lives in Longview, Texas, where he works as an executive pilot. He and his wife Linda have three children: Kent, 18; Kathy, 14; and Melanie, 9.

Their daughter Judy is married to David Callarman. They and their three children, Leigh, 17; Brian, 15; and Mark, 13; live in Cisco. He owns and operates David Callarman Insurance, and she teaches English at Cisco Junior College.

The Sittons' children added this statement: "Jerry and Dorcas Sitton have always been steadfast, giving, and loving as parents and grandparents. We are thankful for their long lives and for this opportunity we have to honor them. We sincerely hope all our friends and family will come to help

She spoke to students in Rising Star several years ago. Mrs. Golightly challenged Rising Star citizens to get involved in drug prevention at the grass roots level to work for a drug free Rising Star. She pointed out that members of a community often deny there is a drug problem because they don't know how to handle the problem. She recommends that adults make personal commitments to kids and that kids make personal commitments to themselves. Peer pressure begins by third grade, she said, and suggests that children be taught at this level about drug use and build an at-

titude of no tolerance to drugs. There is no such thing as responsible drug use. "Just Say No," Parents Against Drunk Driving and drug free parties for students are some of the positive group action taken to reduce the drug and alcohol problems. The number one cause of death to persons from 14 to 24 is drunk driving. With fewer students now using drugs, that still leaves 57 percent of high school students who have used drugs in the last month. "YOU CAN make a difference," Mrs. Golightly said. With all groups working together, the parents, school personnel, police, churches and community leaders with and for the young people, a drug free

Today, in spite of the economy, our citizens are working hard to bring back prosperity to our city. We are proud to see improvement and citizen interest and support. Our citizens are a brotherhood who have always given their support and are eager to give of their talents and time to worthy causes.

We are proud of our volunteers who serve faithfully with our ambulance and fire department.

We know that joy comes from giving, that an active mind finds something to do and that beauty is the handiwork of God to be preserved. Life gives us a choice. We have no yesterday, time took care of that, tomorrow may never come. We have TODAY!

Reflect of the past, work today to preserve our city and contribute to the future. Pray for guidance and thank God for divine leadership. Where there is a will there is a way. The Lord gives us everything at the price of effort.

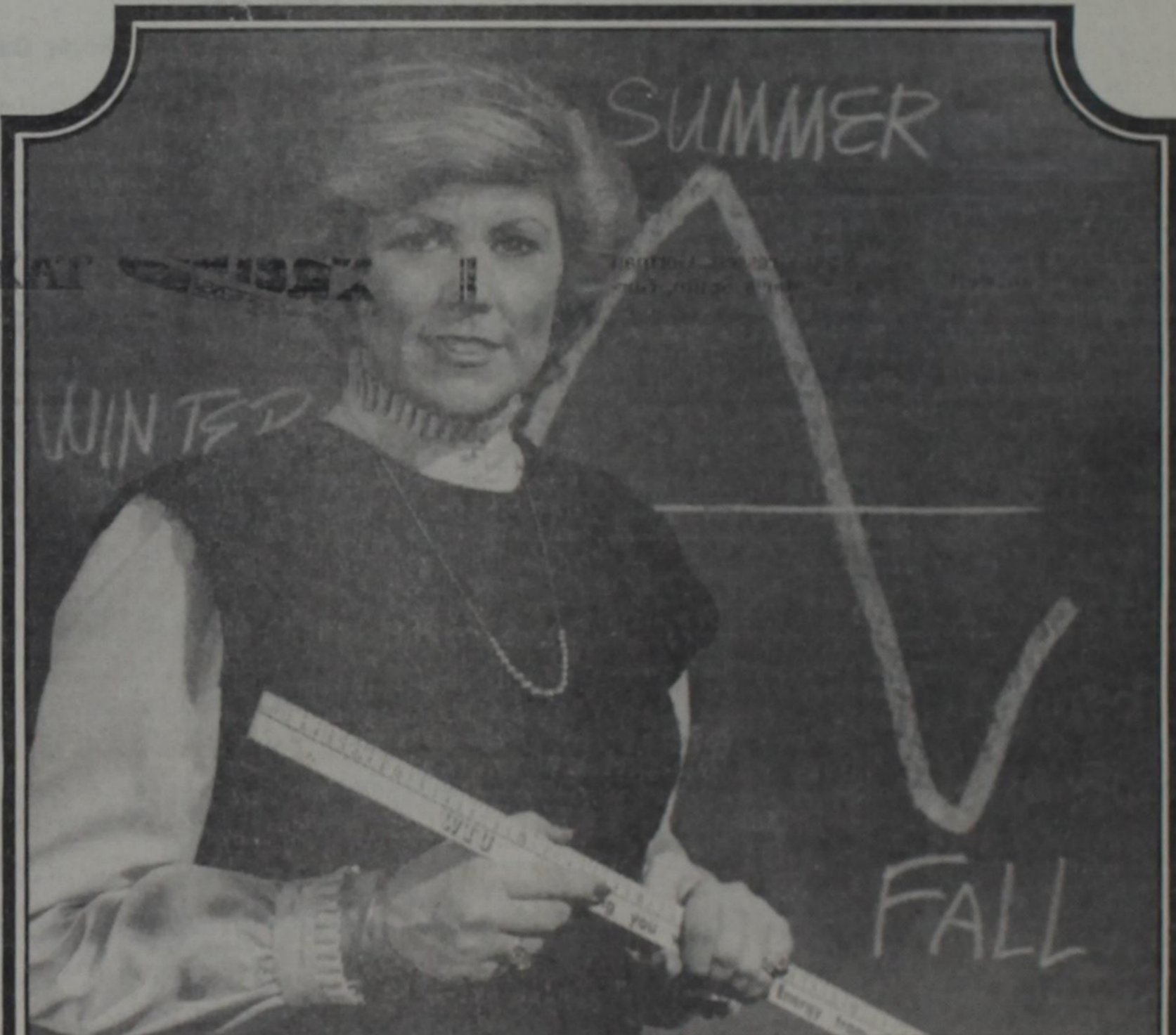

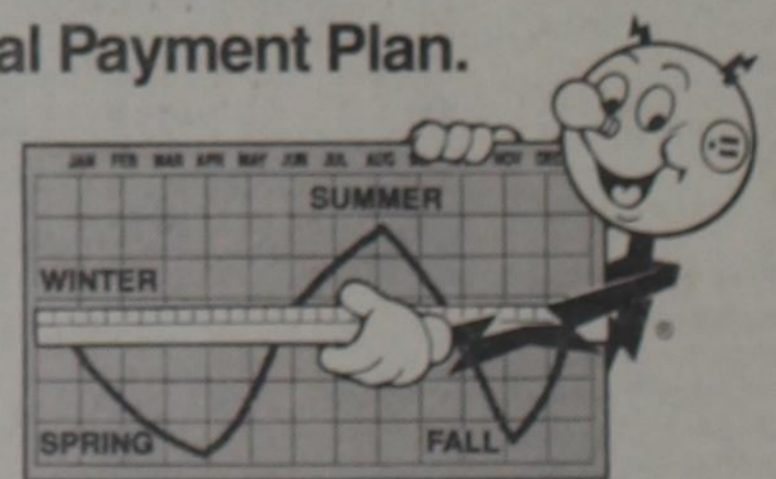
