



State Fish Record Application Rules Modified

The state fish records committee of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department has announced several rule changes for anglers seeking certification of state record fish.

The new procedures, which will become effective April 1, are designed to enhance consistancy with rules used by the two major world record certifying organizations, the International Game Fish Association and the Freshwater Fishing Hall of Fame.

Dr. Gary Matlock, fisheries director, said an important change requires that potential state record fish must be caught from public waters. This excludes fish from private, club or fish hatchery waters or private ponds not accessible for angling by the general public, Matlock said.

Another change worth noting is that ties for rod and reel records are accepted. Fish taken under the unrestricted category (by legal methods other than rod and reel), must exceed the weight of the existing rod

and reel records. Also, fish affixed with an electronic transmitter or other tagging device to assist in locating fish are not eligible. A fish may not have been knowingly caught more than once by the same person for a state record. Might mention also that this addition was brought about

Discuss Money Before The Wedding

COLLEGE STATION --Discussing money before the wedding is one of the things that could help make your marriage work over the long-haul.

According to family economics expert Nancy L. Granovsky, conflict over finances often grows out of differences in attitudes toward money that the partners bring with them into the marriage.

"Couples can manage their money with the least conflict when each partner has an equal influence over decisions and the basic decisions are made before marriage," she maintains.

Granovsky, who is a home economist with the Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service, suggests that couples look at each other's financial situation -- income, deductions, obligations and taxes.

Here are some of the issues she says couples wedding:

· Debt repayment. For example, will pooled resources pay for student loans, or will the person who accumulated the loan pay for it?

· Ownership. If a spouse contributes to car payments, for instance, will he or she share in the title?

 Managing income. Will income be pooled or kept separate? If it's kept seperate, who will pay for which expenses? Financial chores. How

many bank accounts will

there be and who will write

the checks and balance the bank statement? Credit. If both partners have credit cards, how many will be kept and how

will they be used? "One of the most useful things a young couple can do is make a financial plan for their first six months of marriage," suggests Granovsky. "They should discuss their spending and saving habits, including when and for what each is most likely to overspend."

"The plan should include money for every imaginable expense, including personal expenses, car tags, insurance, gifts, clothes, utilities, medical costs, rent, savings, church and charitable contribu-

The home economist says that making a spending and saving plan gives couples the chance to discuss their short-term and long-term goals and lifestyles.

"Discussing finances before marriage should amek the shift from 'his and hers' to 'ours' much easier and may help prevent conflict later," she emphasizes.



WASHINGTON - The U.S. Department of Agriculture has agreed to make emergency help available to ranchers and farmers whose land was blackened by a wall of flames that roared across five West Texas counties last weekend, U.S. Sen. Phil Gramm says.

"Two programs have been approved by USDA," Gramm said. "The emergency feed program allows USDA to share the cost of feeding cattle; under a second program, USDA

can provide assistance to rebuild burned fencelines."

"The emergency feed program will pay half the cost of providing hay, feed grains, and mixed feed to help cattleraisers who are hardpressed to replace feed that was ruined by the fire," Gramm said.

"This will provide some rapid assistance," Gramm said of the department's

"I have been assured by

the Texas Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service that the programs will be implemented immediately," he said.

"I intend to work to see the federal government participate to the maximum extent posible to help farmers and ranchers get back into normal production and to put the devastating impact of the fire behind us," Gramm said.

An estimated 289,700 acres of rangeland were burned by the fire that swept across portions of Shackelford, Callahan, Haskell, Coleman, and Throckmorton counties, Gramm noted.

moving to Cisco. The couple's children grew up in Cisco, attending local schools and Texas colleges. Their son Jim now lives in Longview, Texas, where he works as an executive pilot. He and his wife Linda have three children: Kent, 18; Kathy, 14; and Melanie, 9.







She has worked with the drug prevention program for six years and has conducted Parent Teacher Association drug awareness workshops, teacher inservice training, law enforcement seminars, youth conferences and other programs. She spoke to students in Rising Star several years ago.

Mrs. Golightly challenged Rising Star citizens to get involved in drug prevention at the grass roots level to work for a drug free Rising Star. She pointed out that members of a community often deny there is a drug problem because they don't know how to handle the problem. She recommends that adults make personal commitments to kids and that kids make personal commitments to themselves.

Peer pressure begins by third grade, she said, and suggests that children be taught at this level about drug use and build an attitude of no tolerance to drugs. There is no such thing as responsible drug use.

"Just Say No," Parents Against Drunk Driving and drug free parties for students are some of the positive group action taken to reduce the drug and alcohol problems. The number one cause of death to persons from 14 to 24 is drunk driving. With fewer students now using drugs, that stil leaves 57 percent of high school students who have used drugs in the last

"YOU CAN make a difference," Mrs. Golightly said. With all groups working together, the parents, school personnel, police, churches and community leaders with and for the young people, a drug free

by Irene S. Mayfield Rising Star, a beautiful name, was given by our ancestors who came West to seek freedom, justice and create a new life with better living conditions.

At one time, Rising Star was chosen as one out of ten of the most beautiful names in Texas.

Many stories, as to the origin of the name, have been given. From historical notes given to me by early

settlers, I found the following version.

When early settlers met to choose a name for its post office, Star was presented. Elizabeth Scott Goss, who settled here in 1876, spoke up and said, "Let's name it Rising Star as it will be a rising

Rising Star, supported by agriculture, ranching and oil has prospered through the years. At one time we had three banks, three drug stores, four doctors, several department stores, cafes, filling stations, a bakery, two blacksmith shops, a movie and opera house, many churches and schools.

In 1903, an organization called "Old Settlers" was started. At one of these meetings there were 2,000 in attendance. In 1927 this organization became "Old Trail Blazers." They were active until about 1986. In 1900 our population was 2,500 and in 1981 it was 1195.

Today, in spite of the economy, our citizens are working hard to bring back prosperity to our city. We are proud to see improvement and citizen interest and support. Our citizens are a brotherhood who have always given their support and are eager to give of their talents and time to worthy

We are proud of our volunteers who serve faithfully with our ambulance and fire depart-

We know that joy comes from giving, that an active mind finds something to do and that beauty is the handiwork of God to be preserved. Life gives us a choice. We have no yesterday, time took care of that, tomorrow may never come. We have TO-

Reflect of the past, work today to preserve our city and contribute to the future. Pray for guidance and thank God for divine leadership. Where there is a will there is a way. The Lord gives us everything at the price of ef-






