## Rising Star Native Honored At Banquet

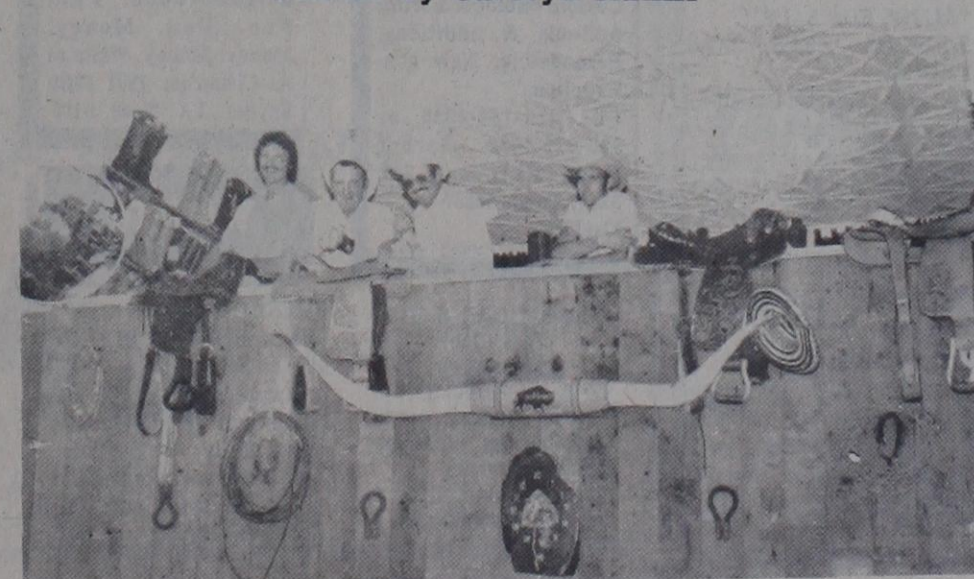

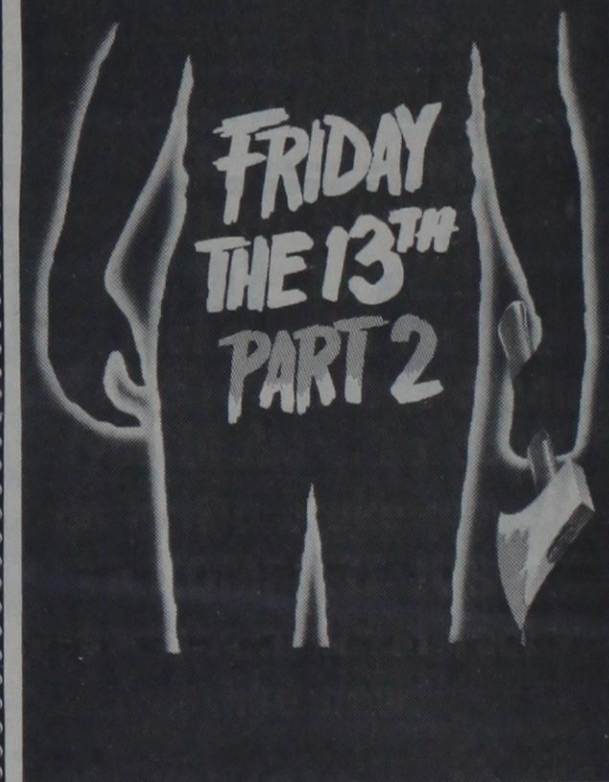

# Pioneer News

Mrs. A.C. Halsell

The thoughts and inspiration I wish to share with you, are not new to me, but only renewed from reading a unique book co-written by Pat Ellis Taylor and Jewel Babbs. "Border Healing Woman" is none other than Jewel Babbs, herself; self-styled and self-made, one so typical of a few women I have known.

One should not expect the mind-refreshing experience of reading about an ordinary person and her contribution to society, when you read the book, Border Healing Woman is an eighty year old woman, born in South Texas, living in the Mexico border area most of her life, a drop-out from sixth

grade, one who loves home-made quilts, clean bedding, goats, (all breeds) people and her God. Though a rugged unconventional person who lived a nomadic life with her parents during the early years of her life, she feels such affinity with her God and the world of his protecting spirits, that she has complete freedom from fear. Fear she might have had of the many kinds of people who came to her "tie house" in the desert, or to the rooms of the hotel and Hot Springs which she owned and operated for a period of time. (H.L. Hunt bought the hotel and Springs after he experienced a degree of healing, himself.) Her method of healing, was

to sit across a room from her patient and with uplifted hands, and complete silence in the room, the patient would feel the healing of the disease. Most any disease is partially healed, or completely healed, except cancer.

Though demonstrative religion is not her style, her life and ministry are evidence of "the fruits of the Spirit" as given in Gal. 5:22 and 23. A para-phrased quote from Jewel Babbs is "Work will hurt none, only stress kills." Very fitting into the philosophy of the book are some quotations from George Plagens, a newspaper columnist;

"We must love people into the kingdom of God." It was Jesus Himself.....that won people in His day. Their hearts were captured and won by the radiance of a face that shone with all the light of God's glory on it.

Whenever Jesus was around, people felt something like the peace of God, the love of God and the power of God flow through their lives. It was His presence that communicated this. To us communicating means using words. To St. Augustine, as to Jesus, it was one loving heart kindling another.

To walk with Jesus and be quiet—could this be the secret we should learn? To uncover the secret is mankind's greatest challenge, and most hopeful promise."

The book reminds me again that God wants his people to be well, and that he gave us a nature that has a great power to heal so many of Mankind's ills; may be more power than the sometimes conflicting effects of modern medicine. If you have not read "Border Healing Woman" read it. It

provokes thought about our (lack of) sense of values in this troubled but beautiful world, in which we live.

Depending on your age and earnings for 1981, your social security office can give you information which will assist you in making a decision on your retirement.

If you are under age 65, you can earn up to \$4080 in 1981 and receive all benefits due. If you are age 65 through 71, the annual exempt amount is \$5500 for 1981. If you are age 72 or older, there is no limit on how much you can earn.

If you earn more than the annual exempt amount, you may still be able to receive some benefits. The rule is that \$1 in benefits is withheld for each \$2 you earn above the exempt amount. Therefore, even if you do not retire completely, you may be able to receive some benefits.

When you retire, monthly benefits can also be made to certain members of your family. These include a wife, or husband 62 years of age or older; a wife younger than 62 if she is caring for the worker's child who is under age 18 or disabled, and who is receiving monthly payments on the basis of the worker's record; unmarried children from age 18 to 22 if full-time students; and children over 18 who were severely disabled before age 22, and who continue to be disabled.

When you apply for benefits, you need to bring your social security card and pro-

of date of birth. An official record of birth or baptism recorded early in life is preferred. Forms W-2 (Wage and Tax Statement) or self-employment tax returns for the past two years should also be brought with you. These are needed so that all of your earnings can be considered in figuring benefits.

A husband or wife who is applying should have the same documents. Birth certificates of any eligible children are needed if an application is filed for them.

Do not delay applying if any evidence is not available. Call the Abilene social security office. The people there can tell what other evidence may be used. The number is 698-1360 or call toll free if you are outside Abilene 1-800-392-1603.

## Windfall Profits Tax Being Discussed

Senator Lloyd Bentsen urged members of the Texas Independent Producers and Royalty Owners Association (TIPRO) at their annual meeting to continue their efforts to pass legislation which would exempt the first 1,000 barrels a day from the windfall profit tax.

Bentsen told the group at the Fort Worth meeting, "We must push for this exemption for it places an unnecessary and unfair burden upon the oil industry when they can least afford it and when this country needs the energy to further reduce its dependence on foreign oil." Bentsen further stated, "I think you have a good chance of winning in the House, and if so, I think we will have an excellent chance to pass it in the Senate this year."

Texas Congressman Kent Hance, sponsor of the legislative proposal in the U.S. House of Representatives, also encouraged TIPRO members to push for passage of the legislation. Hance stated, "We have obtained 205 cosponsors of the exemption. It is important that each of us do everything possible to obtain an additional 13 cosponsors to acquire the majority

necessary for passage."

Senator Bentsen has introduced legislation in the Senate, S.B.85, and Congressman Hance in the House, H.R.2451, which would exempt royalty owners and independent producers from the first 1,000 barrels per day of oil production from the windfall profit tax.

Other congressional leaders addressing the nearly 800 convention attendees were Senator John East and Texas Congressman Phil Gramm, Bill Archer, Tom Loeffler, and Charles Stenholm. TIPRO, an Austin-based organization, has been actively involved in the effort to gain support of legislation introduced in Washington by Senator Bentsen and Congressman Hance which would reduce the burden of the windfall profit tax on the independent oil and gas producer and royalty owner.

### Six Flags Figures Show Strong Trend

Arlington, Texas--Six Flags Over Texas has begun daily operation following a spring season which saw average daily attendance up more than 16 percent over last year.

The theme park's general manager, Ray Williams, said more than a half million visitors were counted through Memorial Day.

"In 1980 we had an average of 11,260 guests per day," he noted, "and this year the daily average is up to 13,433. This indicates to us that prospects for the summer season are extremely strong."

He added, "When you consider the unusual amount of

weekend rain we have had this year, the numbers are even more impressive. We'd say the state's tourism outlook is excellent. Our attendance is traditionally one of the best barometers."

For the summer months, Six Flags Over Texas is adding a nightly fireworks show to its entertainment lineup. The fireworks spectacular will be presented at 9:30 each evening through labor day.

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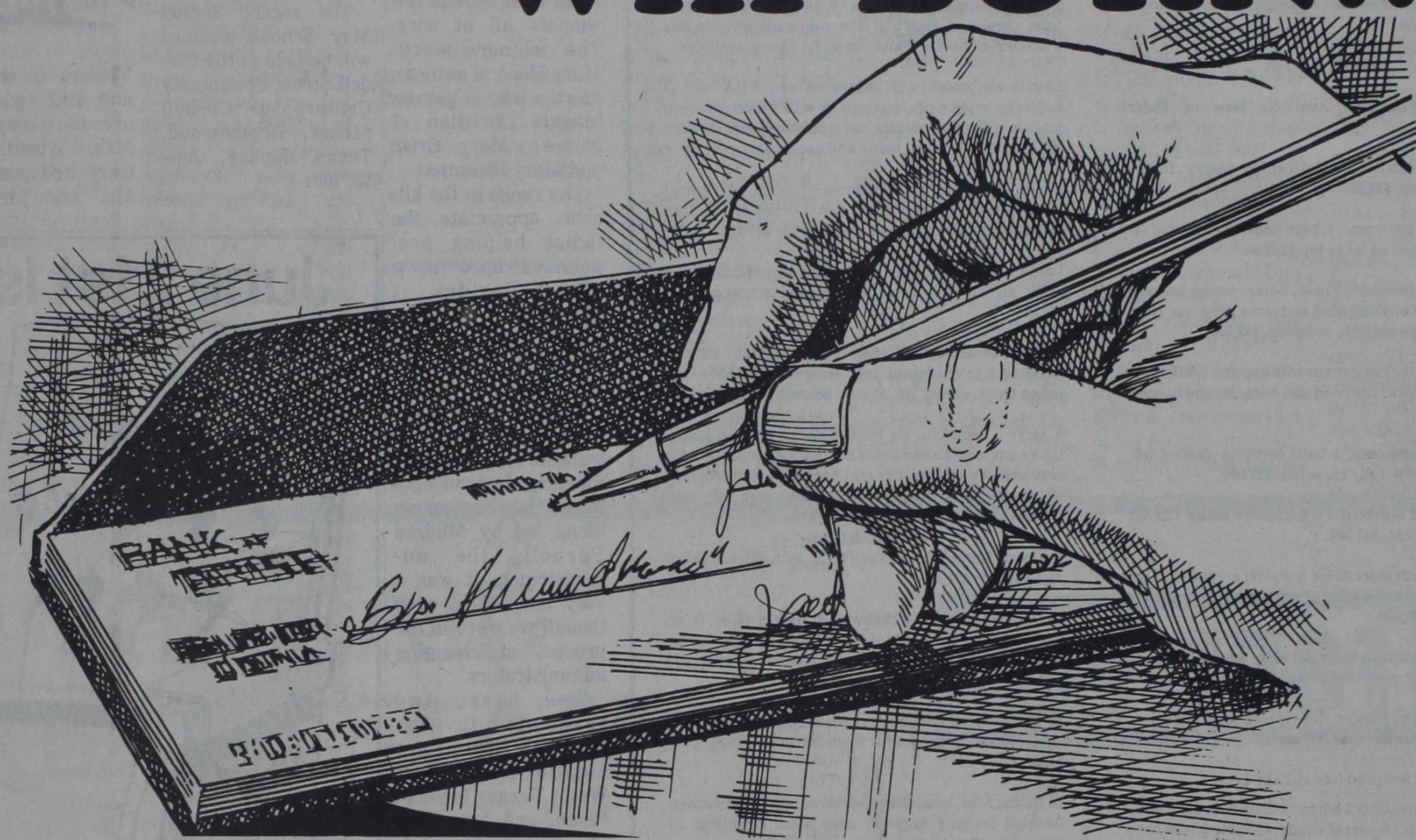

Congressional Comment

Washington, D.C.—A four-year omnibus Farm Bill has been formally voted out of the House Agriculture Committee that, if passed by this Congress, is in many ways unacceptable to U.S. farmers and ranchers.

I have personally fought many of the proposals in that bill throughout the drafting process and, having failed to revise some of the more unacceptable elements, will introduce an amendment calling for the expiration of the legislation at the end of the 1982 crop year.

The Farm Bill, as approved by the Committee, does not address the current pro-

blem facing agriculture and that is profitability in the marketplace. We must have programs that will enable the farmer to receive a reasonable profit on his investments. The question that I have continued to raise is why we should continue the same programs that have placed our farmers in such critical financial conditions. We need to look at alternatives that will address this problem in a more favorable and realistic fashion.

As a farmer, I know and realize that we cannot continue to operate as we have in the past if we are to survive. We cannot produce at an un-

profitable level indefinitely. We must have agriculture prices on a paying basis if we are to continue to have a plentiful supply of food and fiber.

As a Congressman, I just don't believe that we have done our best for the farmers of this country through this legislation and in calling for the unusual one-year bill I hope that we can at least "cut our losses" to the greatest extent possible.

I strongly favor a permanent change from the traditional practice of drafting new agricultural legislation in the opening days of a new administration and a new Congress.

The first few weeks of a new Congress and a new administration are very chaotic under the best of conditions and this is certainly no time to be writing legislation of the importance of the 1982 Farm Bill. Congress and its committees

need several weeks to organize and to become effective. At the same time, a new administration usually takes several weeks or months to get personnel on board and even longer to determine specific policy goals.

Due to the requirements of the Congressional Budget Act, we find ourselves in the position of writing four-year legislation before any one has a good idea of what direction they want to go.

I believe that by passing a one-year bill this session and a four-year bill next year, Congress can give the legislation the careful consideration it deserves.

Homes for Foreign Students Sought in Rising Star Area Thursday, June 11, 1981

Home for foreign high school students wanting to come to the United States and learn about middle income American family life are being sought by area representatives of the Youth Exchange Service (YES). Rev. and Mrs. Don Jeffreys of Trinity Baptist Church, Sweetwater, are the Texas representatives of YES, based in San Clemente, California. "We want to place one or two students in the Rising Star area and are looking for homes to provide temporary lodgings, meals and love."

The students are carefully screened by the YES home office. "We want only the top class students from other countries in this program." The families are screened by the Jeffreys'. Single Adult homes may also be acceptable to host a student. The students

are between 15 and 18 years of age and because of their economic backgrounds in their home countries, these students are potential national leaders in the future.

"We don't want them to be guests in your home," Jeffreys said, "but want them to become a part of your family during the stay here. We want them to learn about middle American family life so when they return home, and for those who do become national leaders, they will have had an experience with Americans."

Most of the students come from South America and Europe. YES tries to match as nearly as possible the likes, dislikes, hobbies, interests, and personalities to the same characteristics of the host families.

Recent students

from the YES have visited Roby, Amarillo, Grafard, Oldham and Hawley. The Jeffreys' were among the first families in Texas to host a student under this program with their student coming from Brazil. Other students currently in Texas are from El Salvador, Mexico, Argentina and Germany.

This is one of the best educational methods available for children in the home—whether young or teenage. Participation in the program as a host or hostess also makes teenage children eligible to become exchange students in a foreign country if they are interested.

The exchange program arranges transportation, medical coverage, and arrival and departure dates for the students. For more information

on the program, contact the Jeffreys' at 915-235-4822, or 915-235-2991. In order for students to arrive for the fall school term host families need to apply as soon as possible, preferably by June 15. Applications need to be in by October 1, for a student to arrive in December or January.

# Assistance for Elderly Available

Thursday, June 11, 1981

Low income families containing members age 65 and older may receive needed assistance in July to help cooling their homes. Under the cooling phase of the federally-funded Home Energy Assistance Program (HEAP), the Texas Department of Human Resources (TDHR) proposes to make a one-time-only payment to qualifying Supplemental Security Income, food stamps, and Aid to Families with Dependent Children households.

The program established by Congress in 1980 provided assistance this past winter to approximately 475,000 needy families by distributing \$25 million in benefits. Because of the harsh effect of Texa summer heat on elderly persons, participation will be limited to low income households containing elderly persons.

Under TDHR's plan, those households with elderly persons not receiving an automatic payment, may apply

between August 3 and August 31, 1981. Each county in Texas will have a designated location where members of such households can apply.

A household's resources cannot exceed \$1800 for one person or \$3000 for more than one person. The value of a homestead, cars, personal and household belongings will not be considered as resources. All household income must be verified and gross monthly income cannot exceed the following limits:
