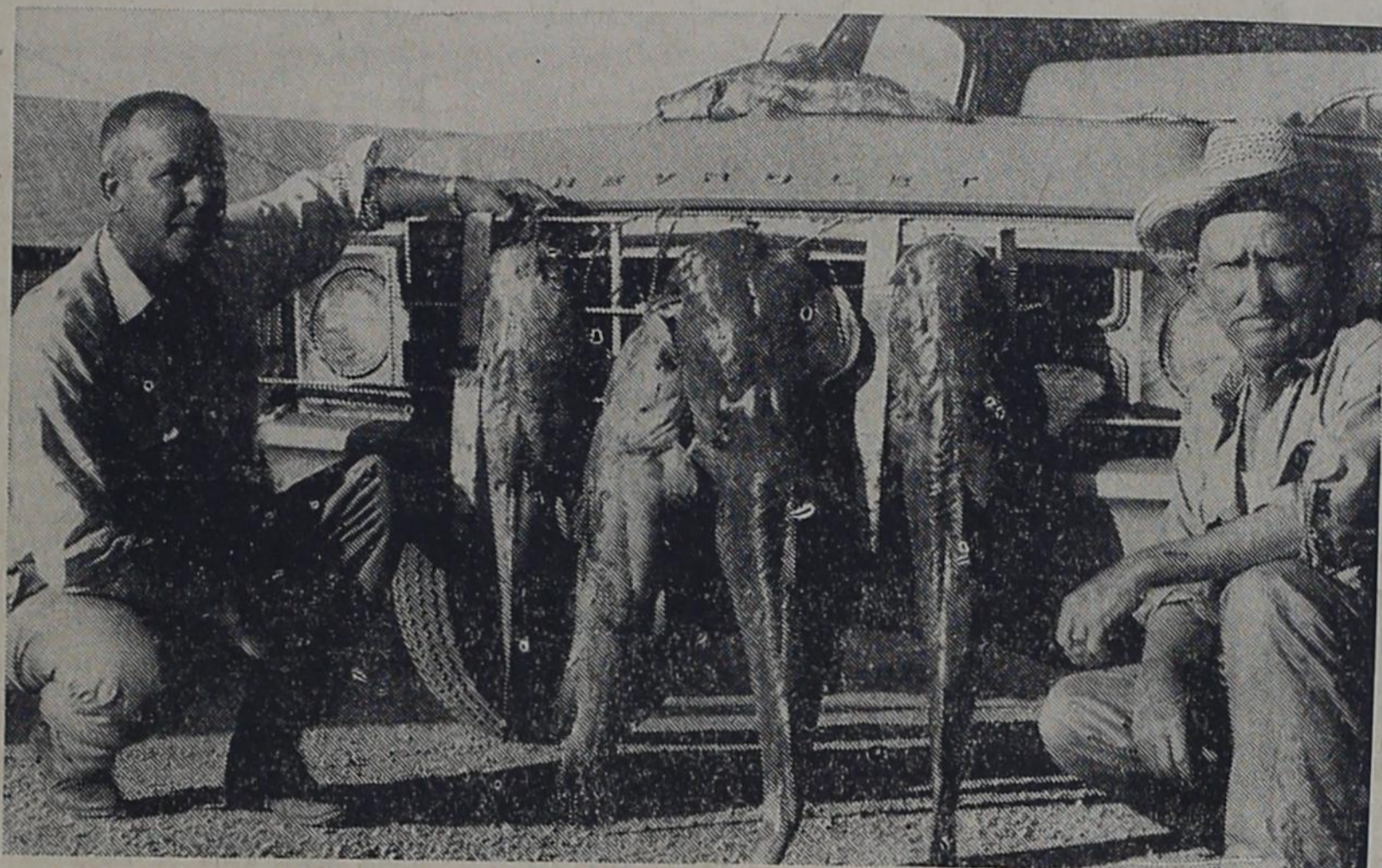

## Crowded Field Foreseen For First Center Golf Invitational

The Lakewood Recreation Center will host its first annual Invitation Golf Tournament August 23, 24 and 25, and already response to the announcement indicates that more golfers will apply than the six flights will accommodate. The tournament committee has limited the field to 96 players, or six flights of 16 players each.

Qualifying play will begin Friday, August 23, and will take the form of a Pro-Am tournament. However qualifying may

be done without entering the Pro-Am play and golfers of other clubs may mail their qualifying scores to the tournament officials through the pros of their clubs.

Medalist in the Pro-Am will receive a pair of golf shoes.

All qualifying scores must be in by 6 p. m. Friday when a barbecue will be served at the clubhouse. The entry fee of \$15 for tournament player will include the barbecue ticket, and non-players will be charged \$2. Reservations must be in by 6 p. m. Thursday.

Saturday each tournament flight will play two nine-hole matches in which those advancing in tournament play will be determined.

The final tournament play will be 27 holes of medal play Sunday.

Prizes of golf equipment will be awarded the winners in flights. The tournament committee is composed of James Rutherford of Rising Star and Bill Davey of Cross Plains. R. D. Needham is Center manager.

## Through The Editor's Specs

An eagle is a bird, but it is less than a birdie.

Speaking golfwise.

In my ignorance of the game it has been explained to me that a "birdie" is one stroke under "par." Par, in case you don't know, is the book value of the shares in a company or corporation. In golf it is the book value of a hole. It was probably chosen because golf started out to be a rich man's game. A hole, of course, is an empty place in the ground. In golf parlance it is an empty place in the lawn they call a green that you try to get the ball into with a certain number of 'licks' or par. If you make it in less licks it's known as 'licking' par. You start by knocking the ball off a "tee" several yards away. A "tee" as you know, is the 20th letter of the alphabet. But in golfer language it is something you set a golf ball on to swat it with a goiterous-headed club they call a driver. You see, the hippies were not the first to screw up the English language.

The object of the drive is to get as close to the hole in the green as possible, and above all to stay in the fairway and between the shinnery that is known as the "rough" which is pretty descriptive of how it is when you don't. The air is known to be considerably warmer on the sides of a fairway than in the middle which is one reason golfers like to stay in the middle.

If you make the hole in par, or the number of licks the bookmaker allows for the hole, you are a pretty good Saturday and Sunday golfer, and you probably spend most of your after work time doing the same thing. If you make it in less than the allowed number of licks you are a professional. If you make it in more than par you are just a status symbol and you had better get a hoe and go to work on those weeds your wife has been fussing about. There at least the more licks you take the better your score.

A 'birdie' is when you fill the hole with the ball in one lick less than the oddsmakers allow—say in three when you could have had four. It is generally considered pretty good when it isn't a fluke, which sometimes happens even among the worst of golfers.

An 'eagle' is when you do it in two less than par. When honestly done it is considered quite an accomplishment and worthy of real envy, and there are those who could write books on the technical and aesthetic aspects of the feat. If you do it accidentally when you are accustomed to taking more licks than the law allows, it might be a sensible idea to hang the club in a frame and take up another sport. You'll probably never do it again.

But when you can make three eagles in a row that is really something to crow about.

Art Fisher, who carries golf clubs in his hip pockets, did it Thursday of last week at Lakewood, while playing in a foursome with James Rutherford and John Lee of Rising Star and Lee Crain of Coleman.

It is not recorded that Fisher intends to quit he game.

Governor John B. Williams of the State of Mississippi visited briefly with Mrs. Fred Roberds and her daughter, Pauline, in Rising Star last Sunday afternoon.

The Governor was the honor guest and principal speaker for

the annual Sipe Springs Homecoming earlier in the day, an event by which Sipe Springs residents raise money for the maintenance of the community cemetery.

The Governor was a close friend and U. S. Air Force comrade of the late Lt. Clark Roberds, son of Mrs. Fred Roberds and her late husband, and was flying an accompanying plane which crashed at the same time that the Roberds plane was lost and never found near Belem in South America early in World War II.

Gov. Williams was rescued but he lost an arm in the crash.

He has always since kept in touch with the Roberds family. Some 300 to 400 persons attended the Sipe Springs Homecoming and heard Gov. ### PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TWELVE ON THE BALLOT (SJR14)

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 14 proposing an amendment to Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding a new Section 52a to give the Legislature the power to authorize cities and counties to issue revenue bonds for industrial development purposes.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a new Section 52a to read as follows:

"Section 52a. The Legislature shall have the power to authorize cities, counties, and towns to issue revenue bonds for industrial development purposes, or in aid thereof; provided, that property acquired from proceeds of the bonds shall be subject to ad valorem taxes. Legislation passed in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment shall not be invalid solely because of its anticipatory nature. The tax revenue, the utility revenue, and the revenue from services of any county, city or town may not be used to pay any

bonds issued pursuant to this authority nor the interest thereon."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:

"FOR the constitutional amendment to give the Legislature the power to authorize cities and counties to issue revenue bonds for industrial development purposes."

"AGAINST the constitutional amendment to give the Legislature the power to authorize cities and counties to issue revenue bonds for industrial development purposes."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

### PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER ELEVEN ON THE BALLOT (HJR60)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to add Section 64 to read as follows:

"Section 64. (a) The Legislature may by statute provide for consolidation of governmental offices and functions of government of any one or more political subdivisions comprising or located within El Paso or Tarrant Counties. Any such statute shall require an election to be held within the political subdivisions affected thereby with approval by a majority of the voters in each of these subdivisions. Under such terms and conditions as the Legislature may require.

"(b) The county government, or any political subdivision(s) comprising or located therein, may contract with another for the performance of governmental functions required or authorized by this Constitution or the Laws of this State, under such terms and conditions as the Legislature may prescribe. No person acting under a contract made pursuant to this Subsection (b) shall be deemed to hold more than one office of honor, trust or profit or more than one civil office of emolument.

The term 'governmental functions,' as it relates to counties, includes all duties, activities and operations of statewide importance in which the county acts for the State, as well as of local importance, which is required or authorized by this Constitution or the Laws of this State."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:

"FOR the constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for consolidating governmental offices and functions and allowing political subdivisions to contract for performance of governmental functions in El Paso and Tarrant counties."

The date, August 1, is drawing close in Eastland County concerning farmers who have peanuts, cotton and feed grain. Farm operators must certify (report) their acreages in the county ASCS office by August 1 to be eligible for payments, price support, and history credit on peanuts, cotton, feed grain, and diverted acres.

As of July 22, approximately 250 farms had not filed a report of acreage, according to Jesse G. Meredith, county office manager of the Eastland County ASCS office. He went on to say that the certification was about 75% complete. He urged all producers who have not reported to do so immediately. This includes farmers who requested measurement service. Mr. Meredith expressed his thanks on behalf of the county committee and office staff for the fine cooperation received from the county farmers this year on this new procedure of crop reporting.

"Failure to report," said Mr. Meredith, "could cause the difference of receiving only \$.04 a pound instead of \$.11 a pound for peanuts. Feed grain and cotton participating farms will lose payments and price support if they fail to report their acreages."

### It Has Been

Opening of the 1918-19 session of the Rising Star Public School was attended by a full group of patrons and a full faculty, on September 16, 1918.

A short impressive program was rendered. Rev. Seba Kirkpatrick, pastor of the Methodist Church, gave the invocation and the audience joined in singing America.

Short talks by Rev. H. B. Ram-sour, pastor of the Baptist Church, Mrs. M. G. Joyce, D. M. Jacobs, J. J. Gregg and Superintendent of Schools Eli W. Nance. Thelma Neel and Sybil Henderson gave readings and Mrs. Frank Perkins delighted the assembly with piano music.

The faculty was made up of the following teachers, E. W. Nance, Superintendent, H. R. Ar-rant, Principal, Misses Velma

Amis, Myrtle Bowden, Lucy Nunnally, Grace Jones and Reba Ransome and Mrs. A. Morris.

E. W. Nance, a successful teacher of several years experience, had recently moved to Rising Star to make his future home and was hired as superintendent of schools. Mr. Ar-rant's home was in Runnels County. The other teachers had previously taught in the local school or rural schools nearby and were well known here.

The school ran without incident for a few weeks despite gloomy drizzle, continued cloudy weather and frequent heavy rains.

Then the boom fell, in the form of deadly Spanish influenza, a new type disease that not only baffled our local practitioners, but every doctor in the United States. Nothing had ever been so terrifying.

The disease was no respecter of person, it swept our town and community as it did every other town and community.

Entire families were stricken and death was rampant.

Doctors were on duty day and night. Pharmacists only left their posts of duty long enough to snatch a bite to eat. They improvised cots in their prescription departments for the only moments of relaxation to be had.

Railroad stations, freight and baggage rooms, were stacked with boxed caskets waiting to be shipped to distant burial grounds.

This terrible agent of death swept the Military Camps where hundreds of young men were training for duty overseas during World War I and took it's enormous toll.

All church services, schools, movie theatres and public gatherings of all kinds were suspended during these weeks and months of the deadly scourge.

Citizens were warned to do their grocery shopping and medicine buying in as short time as possible and go directly back to their homes.

Doctors advised the use of disinfectants on clothing, highly medicated inhalants, and gargles before anyone left their homes, for the bare necessities of life.

Everyone was cautioned not to visit in homes where there were flu patients. In fact they were warned not to visit at all "to stay away from people."

At last, late in the year influenza ran it's course and at long last people picked up the broken threads of life and started all over again.

### PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT (HJR20)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 11a, Article VII, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 11a. In addition to the bonds enumerated in Section 11 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas, the Board of Regents of The University of Texas may invest the Permanent University Fund in securities, bonds or other obligations issued, insured, or guaranteed in any manner by the United States Government, or any of its agencies, and in such bonds, debentures, or obligations, and preferred and common stocks issued by corporations, associations, or other institutions as the Board of Regents of The University of Texas System may deem to be proper investments for said funds; provided, however, that not more than one per cent (1%) of said fund shall be invested in the securities of any one (1) corporation, nor shall more than five per cent (5%) of the voting stock of any one (1) corporation be owned; provided, further, that stocks eligible for purchase shall be restricted to stocks of companies incorporated within the United States which have paid dividends for five (5) consecutive years or longer immediately prior to the date of purchase and which, except for bank stocks and insurance stocks, are listed upon an exchange registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission or its successors.

"In making each and all of such investments said Board of Regents shall exercise the judgment and care under the circumstances then prevailing which men of ordinary prudence, discretion, and intelligence exercise in the management of their own affairs, not

in regard to speculation but in regard to the permanent disposition of their funds, considering the probable income therefrom as well as the probable safety of their capital.

"The interest, dividends and other income accruing from the investments of the Permanent University Fund, except the portion thereof which is appropriated by the operation of Section 18 of Article VII for the payment of principal and interest on bonds or notes issued thereunder, shall be subject to appropriation by the Legislature to accomplish the purposes declared in Section 10 of Article VII of this Constitution.

"This amendment shall be self-enacting, and shall become effective upon its adoption, provided, however, that the Legislature shall provide by law for full disclosure of all details concerning the investments in corporate stocks and bonds and other investments authorized herein."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the constitutional amendment providing for investment of the Permanent University Fund by the Board of Regents of The University of Texas in certain types of securities within the prudent man rule."

"AGAINST the constitutional amendment providing for investment of the Permanent University Fund by the Board of Regents of The University of Texas in certain types of securities within the prudent man rule."

### PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER EIGHT ON THE BALLOT (HJR49)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. Section 21 of Article 16 of the Constitution of the State of Texas is amended to read as follows:

"Section 21. All stationary and printing, except proclamations and such printing as may be done at the Texas School for the Deaf, and paper, except that for the Judicial Department, shall be furnished under contract, to be given to the lowest and best bidder under such regulations as shall be prescribed by law. No member or officer of any department of the government shall be in any way interested in such contract."

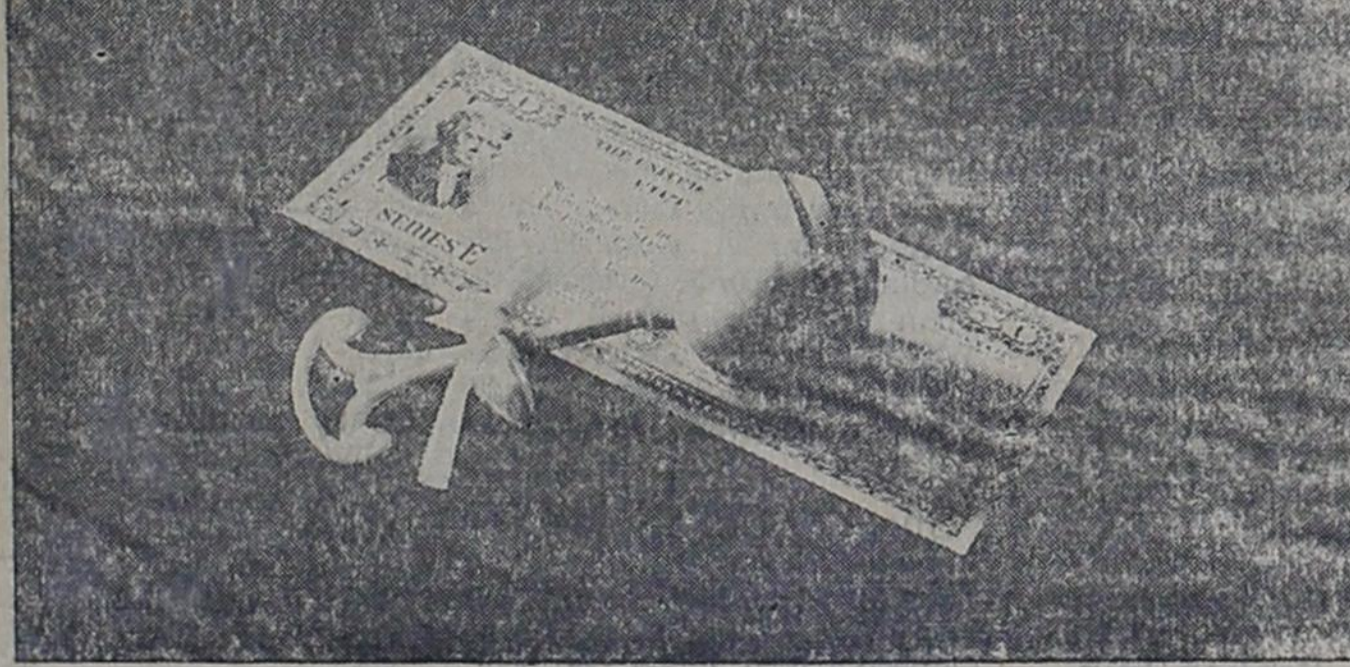

"FOR the constitutional amendment removing certain provisions relating to purchase of fuel and furnishing the rooms and halls of the Legislature and the requirement that the Governor, the Secretary of State, and the Comptroller must approve certain contracts of purchase."

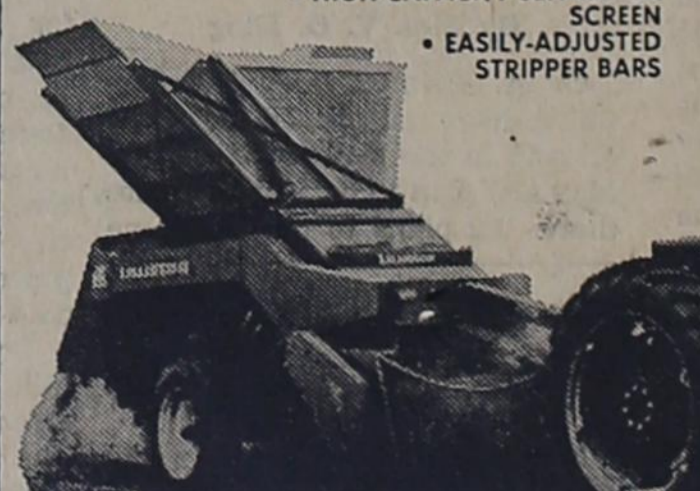

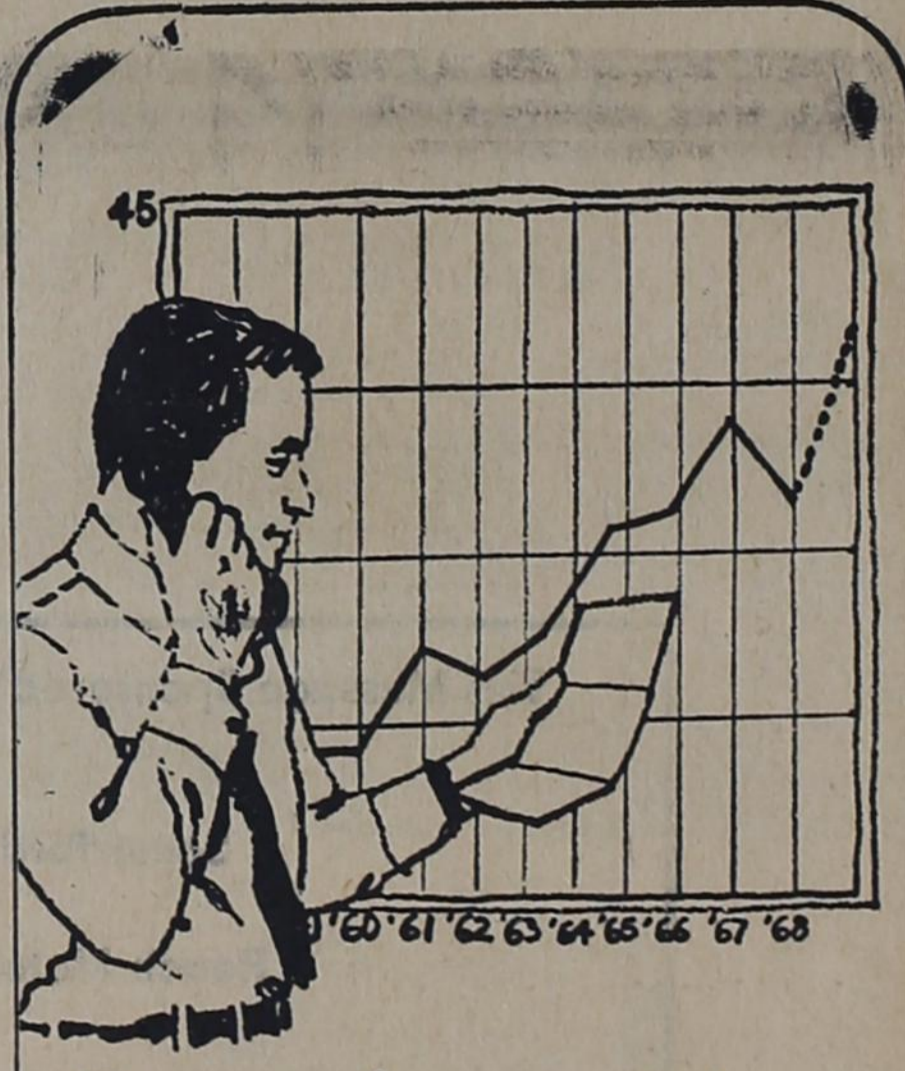

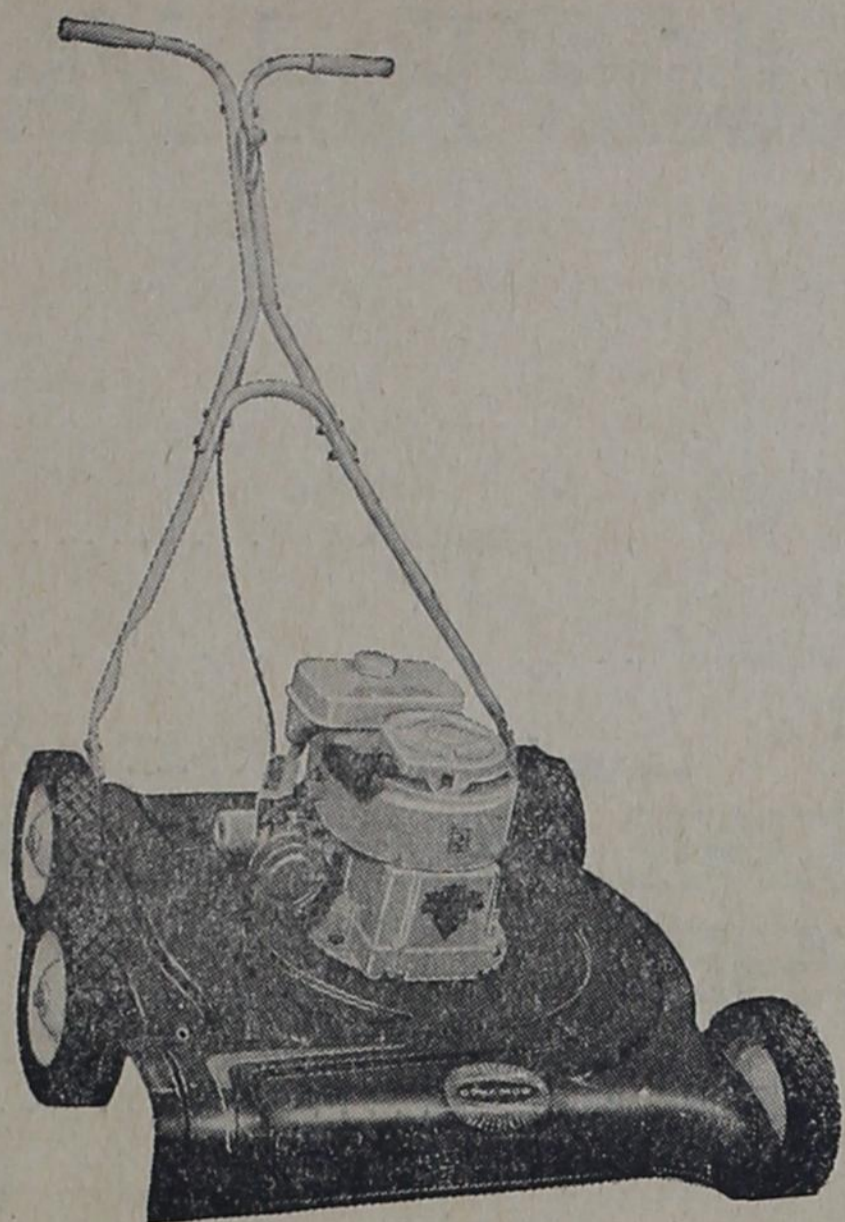

housing developers, cities, and other. A sound program of soil and water conservation can reduce sediment damage by as much as 90 percent - nothing else will, he said.

## Sediment Ruining Many Texas Lakes Says SCS Official

"Sediment causes more pollution than any other substance," H. N. Smith, State Conservationist for the Soil Conservation Service, reminded this week in announcing a new SCS booklet on the subject. The publication, entitled "Sediment — It's Filling Harbors, Lakes and Roadside Ditches," is now available free from SCS offices and may be obtained from the Rising Star Work Unit Office according to John W. Lee.

Smith said sediment ruins lakes, kills fish, and costs millions in taxes for dredging and filtering. It also carries other pollutants, such as chemicals with it. Most phosphates and pesticides, for example, are carried on sediment. Erosion control measures are effective in reducing pollution from these sources.

The SCS official said the new publication points out that more than half a billion cubic yards of eroded land is dredged each year from streams, navigation channels, estuaries and harbors at a cost of 40 cents a cubic yard. Cost of keeping it out of these places through proper conservation practices would be only a fraction of that. "Also, our sediment studies on reservoirs show that sediment is damaging practically every lake in Texas," Smith stated. "In fact, several cities have had to build new lakes because the old ones filled with mud. And this is not just a Texas problem - it's also a national problem." Lake Brownwood, for example, caught only about 40 percent of the sediment in the period 1949 to 1959 as it caught the previous 10 year period. This reduction is attributed to the accelerated soil and water conservation program on farms and ranches in the watershed, Lee points out. Even with this progress, a great deal remains to be done in the approximate 970,000 acres above the lake. Lee estimates that approximately 75 percent of the land has a good conservation plan with approximately 65 percent of the needed treatment applied.

Sediment also destroys spawning beds for game fish, ruins their eggs, and reduces their food supply. In many small streams across the State, sediment has filled the deep pools that were once a refuge for fish during dry weather.

Smith said that the sad thing about sediment is that it hurts the land where it comes from and it hurts the water where it goes. And it's all caused by soil erosion. He pointed out, however, that it's not just a farm problem. Last year, 1.5 million acres of land were stripped bare for housing developments, new roads, and other construction. Sometimes it's years before anything is built on this land - and, in the meantime, it erodes.

Smith thinks the only answer to the sediment problem is a constant vigil on the part of every user of land - farmers, ranchers,

Are your pecans turning white because of powdery mildew? Due to the cool humid weather that has prevailed in the Eastland County area this year, powdery mildew is a problem on pecans. There are two chemicals, Du-Ter

and Cyprex, that will help control powdery mildew on pecans. Neither chemical will completely control the disease, but will partially reduce the number of infected nuts and the size of the powdery mildew spots.

There is a short supply of peaches in this area this summer. Several things happened to the peach crop. Late freezes and hail ruined peach crops in many sections of the county. Excess rainfall during blooming caused an increase in the blossom blight stage of Brown Rot. Continued high humidity throughout the spring has increased the disease problem.

Many producers were unable to spray their trees at the right time because of the rains in the spring. Since they were not sprayed to prevent insects, many of the peaches were lost.

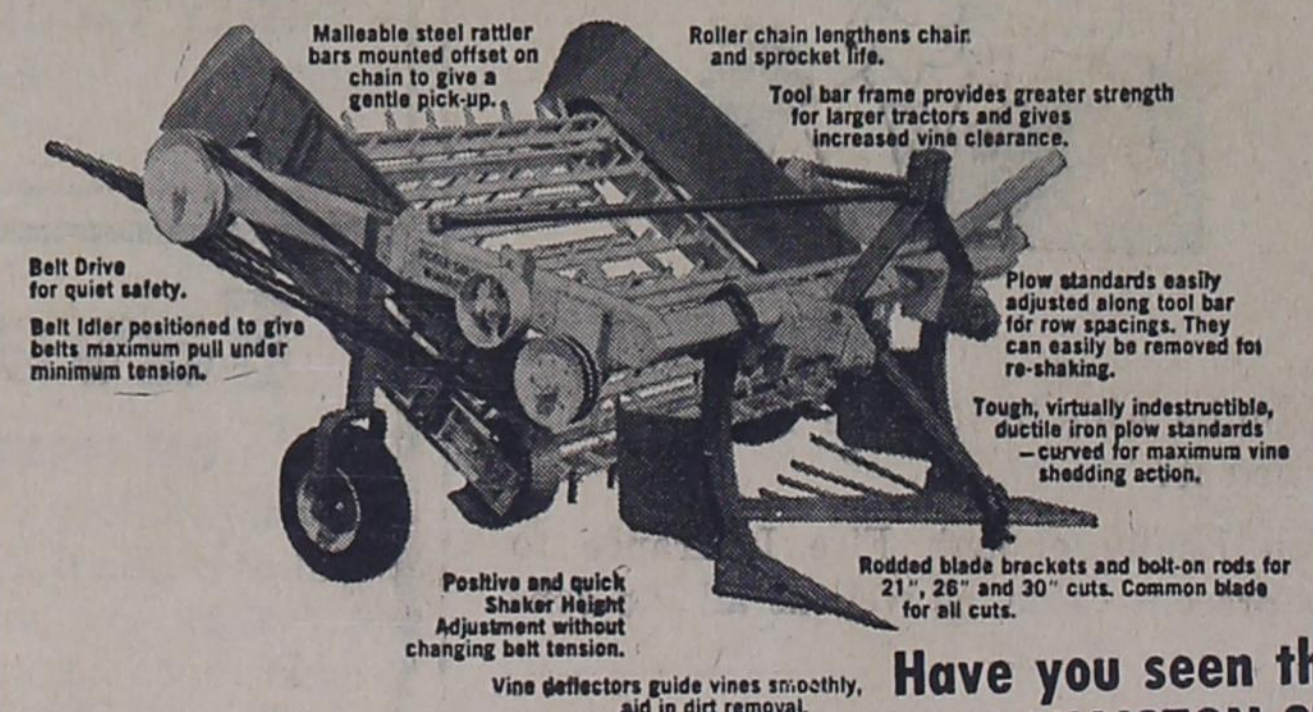
