



Thanks to Ray Agnew we even had a few Blue Peafowls to move.

In the past seven months we have paid out to these families over \$32,000.00.

Many have asked us "What do you do with the animals after you get them?" Well folks, they're put here in cages and put on medicated feeds, wormed, given proper shots, cleaned, aired and prepared for shipment. "Where do they go from here you ask?" Well, again that depends on the animals, size, sex, and whether it's adult, half grown or a baby. The Adult Raccoon, Fox and baby Fox captured this year have been sold into the Eastern States to hunting clubs for the purpose of restocking their

hunting areas. The baby Raccoon, skunk, and ringtail have been sold both wholesale and retail as pets. While the Bobcat have gone to zoos, and game rexerves. The Squirrels to breeding farms. The Jackrabbits to race tracks for greyhounds to run. Armadillos as pets. meat. novelties. and, research. Turtles to pet shops to go as a fad now touring the country "Turtle Racing" While the snakes have gone to zoos, movie industry, research,

and to snake farms. The profits are good from the animal business. We have used ours this year to go back into our business, building cages, buying breeding stock and for household goods, clothes, food, and made a sizeable payment on our place. We used our profits this year and never realized it was possible that we should be putting back for a rainy day. We lost our backer this month and now are looking for a new one. If we had had any idea that we were fixing to be left high and dry, we would have never put our profits back into cages, breeders and so forth, but put back to keep our business running and money rolling to buy our suppliers stock. But as they say "that's the way the cookie crumbles".

But w we're not giving up without a fight, so if God's willing we will stay in business here in Rising Star and keep on buying your animals, reptiles

and fowls. Our winter plans include the buying of live caught adult coon, fox, bobcat as well as their furs and others. Then if we can acquire a new backer, we would like to buy more breeder stock and put in a zoo here in the Rising Star area.
