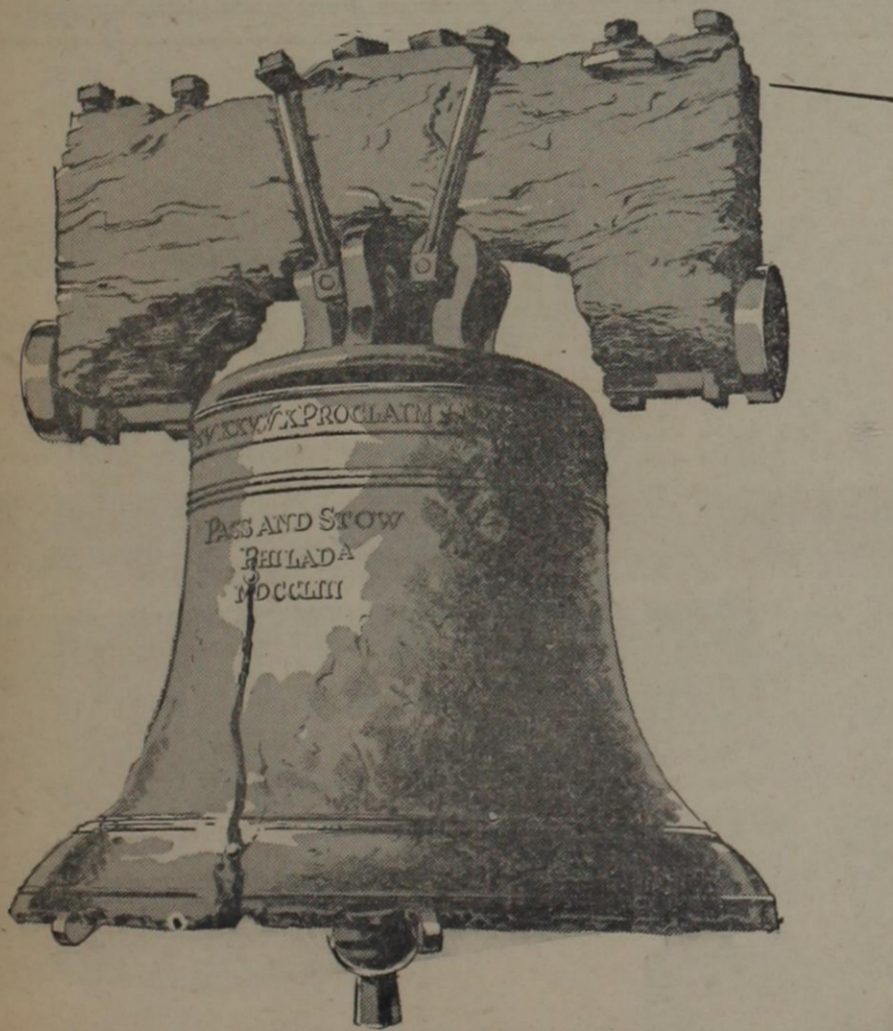

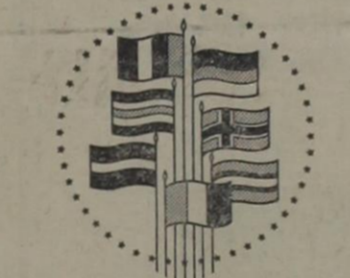
Deer hides are again being collected and sent to the school. Carl Irby takes care of these for us.

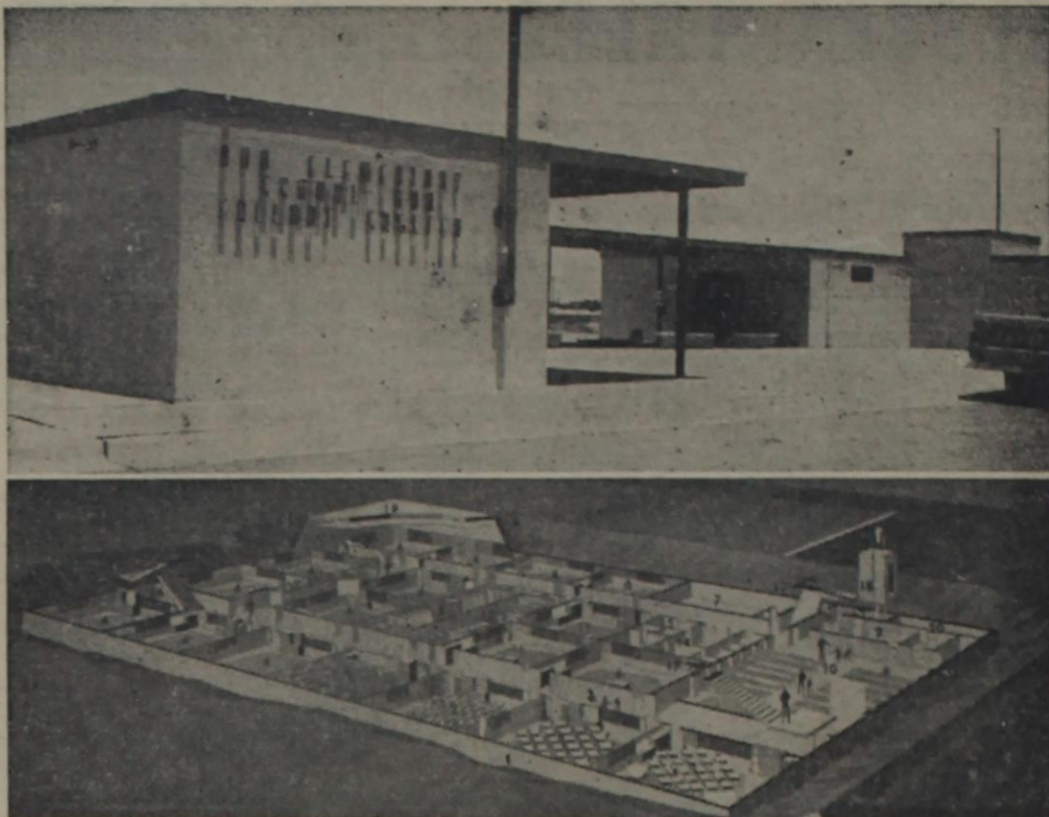

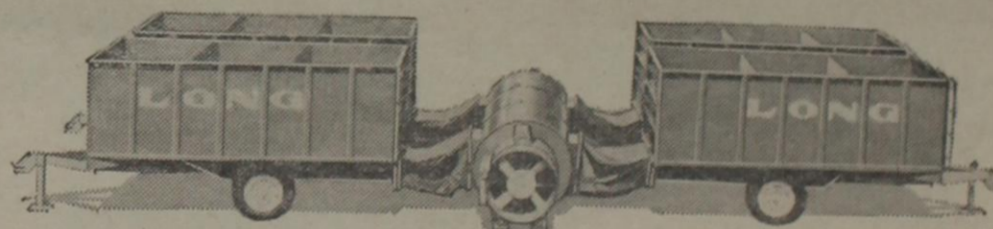

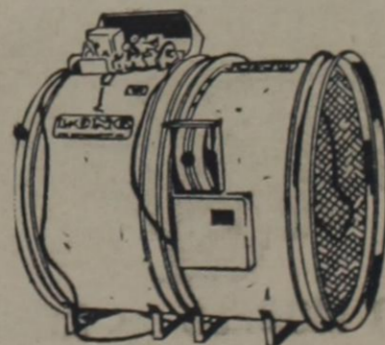
