Fire Damages Best Fast Foods



Considerable damage from fire, smoke and water has caused the closing of Best Fast Foods, Highway 36 West. Passersby, Bones and Kay O'Connor, smelled smoke and called in the alarm last Thursday at 2:40 a.m. and Rising Star Rural Fire Department volunteers were on

the scene at 2:45. The fire was contained in about 30 minutes.

Owners, C.W. and LaDena Best, said investigators determined the cause of the fire to be a short in electrical wiring. The Bests had had much of the wiring in the building, built in 1983, re-

placed before they opened for business last year, but the wiring where the fire originated was inaccessible; a wall would have had to be torn out to get to the 220 volt wiring.

The Bests plan to rebuild their business if at all possible. The brick on the front of the building is okay, all except one plate glass window which was cracked and the booths in the serving area should be usable after cleaning; paneling, ceiling and the roof need to be replaced, and some of the equipment, including a new water heater and newly installed water softener, is damaged beyond repair. The inventory, except some packages in the freezer, was ruined.

Best Fast Foods extends regrets to the visiting football teams they had invited to have a meal with them before returning home. They expressed appreciation for their customers and ask for patience as they rebuild their business; C.W. and LaDena look forward to serving you again as soon as possible, they said.

Peoples State Bank, Clyde Purchases Rising Star Bank

Although bank failures across the nation have been a part of the news for several years and many citizens here were aware that the local bank appeared to be destined to become a bank failure statistic, the actual closing of First State Bank of Rising Star last Thursday still dealt an emotional blow to members of this community.

The frequency of bank failures in Texas has made most people realize that the Federal Insurance Corporation does indeed make sure that the depositor's money is safe, guaranteed to the \$100,00 amount specified for each account.

What some of us didn't know first hand until now was that we can continue to use the checks and deposit slips we have on hand; many of our citizens are counted among the senior-aged group and live on fixed income, and this news is a relief to them and others who must manage their money carefully.

First State Bank of Rising Star was one of three Texas banks that failed Thursday, making the state total 88 for the year and the nationwide total 138; First Comanche Bank in Comanche was one of the other banks that failed Thursday.

Texas Banking Commissioner Kenneth W. Littlefield closed First State Bank of Rising Star, which had approximately \$14 million in deposits. FDIC board of directors approved the assumption of assets by Peoples State

Bank of Clyde and the local bank opened Friday morning as a branch of that bank. First State Bank of Rising Star's branch in Eastland was not reopened.

Commissioner Littlefield said the Rising Star bank's failure was largely a result of poor quality loans made by prior bank management coupled with a locally depressed real estate market. Capital deficiencies at the bank could not be remedied and the bank closed at 3 p.m. Thursday and Littlefield appointed FDIC as receiver for liquidation.

While state and federal banking officials continue to work in the Rising Star bank

and until all banking regulations are met, Douglas Ford, the president of Peoples State Bank, Clyde, will be on hand to work with the officials, help smooth the transition for the local staff and meet local banking patrons.

Ford assures depositors that the Rising Star branch will be a full service bank - for the people of Rising Star and surrounding communities. The Peoples State Bank, Rising Star Branch will support the community, schools and their activities.

Peoples State Bank, Clyde is a locally owned bank with over 100 stockholders and will remain locally owned. Continued inside.....

Wildcats Win Over Tigers, 32-12

The Rising Star Wildcats hosted the Hico Tigers last Friday and put away the first win of the season. The weather was less than perfect and a large portion of the game was played in drizzling rain. The final score was Rising Star 32, Hico 12 and the fans and players went home wet but happy. Unfortunately most of the stats were wet also.

With 5:59 on the first quarter clock, Hico connected on a 54-yd. pass play which ended on the Cats' 39-yd. line. Good team defense from the Wildcats forced Hico to punt, but the Cats were unable to get much going. It's hard to generate much offense from your own 1-yd. line. Donny Alcorn had good hang time on his 45-yd. punt and fellow Wildcats, Larry Hollis and Brian Bailey did a fine job of hustling down on the punt coverage to help the Cats get out of field position trouble. First quarter ended 0-0.

Will Ezzell came up with a fumble recovery following a good hit from Hollis and Matthew Harmon and it was Wildcats' ball on their own 23. The mighty defense came up with another turnover just a few plays later when Brandon Geyer's hit caused another Hico fumble. This time it was Donnie Horton who fell on the bouncing pigskin and the Cats capitalized. With 7:24 left in the first half, Alcorn broke through for the 7-yd.

touchdown. Alcorn's PAT out of the hold of Bailey was good and the Cats led 7-0.

Only 1:09 later Hollis tipped a Tiger pass and Geyer came up with the interception. The offense was clicking now. Evans hit Jarod Horton for a 9-yd. completion and Bailey had a 25-yd. gain and another 28-yd. gain to set up another Wildcat TD. With only :35 left in the half, Alcorn rushed for the 1-yd.

TD. Alcorn's PAT was good and the Cats now led 14-0.

On Hico's first play of the next series the Wildcat defense struck again. This time Jarod Horton came up with the interception, but with only :22 left before the half, the Cats were unable to capitalize.



Crimestoppers Begin Fast \$50 Program

Shoplifting is a costly problem for local merchants and it forces stores to raise their prices. The loss each week can be in the hundreds or thousands of dollars in Eastland County alone. And as the Christmas shopping season approaches, the problem can get worse.

Serving as a liaison between the business community and law enforcement, Eastland County Crimestoppers is undertaking a Fast \$50.00 program to discourage and fight shoplifting.

Beginning October 1, if a person witnesses someone shoplifting in a store in Eastland County and that person reports it to a store clerk, giving a positive identification of the shoplifter and describing what was taken, and the shoplifter confesses or is convicted, then the witness will be paid \$50.00 by Crimestoppers. The witness can remain anonymous and still collect the "fast" fifty dollars. If you don't know a person who is shoplifting, an auto plate number and a description may help with the

Rebate

Austin - Checks totaling \$84 million in monthly local sales tax rebates have been sent to cities and counties in Texas.

This month's checks reflect taxes collected on July sales and reported in late August by businesses filing monthly tax returns.

All local sales taxes must be approved by local voters and may be used for any local city or county expenses.

Rising Star's net payment this period was \$689, compared to payment last year of \$1,126.51, a decrease of 38.84%.

Payments to date for 1990 are \$12,074.04, compared to 1989 payments to this date of \$12,986.35, a 7.03% drop.

5. Exhibitors must be responsible for their own sales. Exhibitors should bring money for making change.

6. Exhibit articles should have a label attached giving the owner's name and price of article (if the article is to be sold). All money from the sale of articles will go to the owner. Exhibitors should bring a cloth or bed sheet and cover their exhibit display when it is left unattended. (Exception is that house plants

do not need to be covered).
7. The Bazaar will be held in the former Western Auto building, Eastland. Entries should be brought in on Friday, October 5, between 8 a.m. and 10 a.m. All articles, not sold, should be removed from the building by 5 p.m. on Saturday, October 6.

8. Tables will not be furnished. Space will be available for two (2) card tables per person. Please bring your own chair.

9. Past winners of the Oldest Man and Woman Exhibitor award are ineligible to receive the honor during the current year's Bazaar.

10. The Oldest Man and Woman attending the Bazaar opening ceremonies on Friday, October 5, at 10 a.m. will receive special recognition as part of the program.

11. Extension Homemaker Clubs will sponsor the concessions on Friday, October 5.

A Sore Subject

Q. What can I do to prevent canker sores?
A. A canker sore or mouth ulcer can be painful, and make eating, talking, and even smiling uncomfortable. Experts say that physical damage to the mouth usually starts canker sores, so it's a good idea to avoid hard-bristle toothbrushes, and hard, sharp foods such as peanut brittle that might cause injury. Recurrent sores occur in persons lacking in iron, folic acid and vitamin B-12. Sores are most likely to start in times of stress, or after a cold or fever. Certain foods also seem to trigger attacks; nuts, chocolates and citrus fruits are the worst culprits. Canker sores normally heal by themselves in about ten to fourteen days.

Peanut Price Support Loans Are Available

Jerry Harris, Chairman of the Texas State Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee, said all eligible producers may obtain loans on their 1990-crop peanuts.

"Price support loans will be available for warehouse-stored peanuts, and farm-

stored additional peanuts, from harvest time through January 31, 1991," Harris said. Loans on farm-stored quota peanuts will be available through March 31, 1991, he said.

The national support price for 1990-crop peanuts is \$631.47 per ton for average

quality quota peanuts and \$149.75 per ton for average quality additional peanuts.

"Generally, quota peanuts are those peanuts within the farm's poundage quota that are mandated for domestic edible use, or retained for use on the farm," Harris said additional peanuts are peanuts that are placed under loan at the price support rate for additional peanuts, or are marketed through an approved contract for exporting

or crushing. "Generally, additional peanuts are peanuts that are produced in excess of a farm's poundage quota," the ASCS official explained.

U.S. peanut production for 1990 was forecast in August

at 2.1 million tons, 4.7 percent more than last year. USDA estimates the harvested area at 1.71 million acres, 3.7 percent more than last year and the largest acreage for harvest since 1951.

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





County Commissioners County Resources Assoc. Makes Plans Vote on Expenditures

Requests for expenditures were a big part of the County Commissioners agenda at the Court meeting Monday.

Four bids were opened on the County Group Health Insurance, however. These were from Time Ins. Co. of Milwaukee, Wisconsin, Finnas Butler Ins. Co. of Strawn, Agent Dee Rucker of Abilene, and Shawn Wells.

After discussion the Commissioners appointed a committee to study the bids. A called meeting was set for Wednesday, Sept. 26, 1 p.m. back in the Commissioners Courtroom. At that time possible action will be taken on the bids.

County employees and elected officials are presently insured through the Texas Association of Counties.

On another matter, John Davis of Jedco Designs of Clyde passed out preliminary maps and told the court that practically all rural roads are now numbered. He made plans to travel with each Commissioner into his Precinct and make any corrections.

Davis also said he would leave the Commissioners some blank signs and extra numbers for signs that were stolen or shot into.

On the next item, the court was informed that the Computer system serving the Courthouse planned to raise rates 7 percent on contract maintenance, beginning Dec. 1. The only way the County could avoid that raise was to make a contract now for future maintenance and lock in the current price.

Norman Christian, Pct. 2 Commissioner, made a motion to go for a 24 mo. contract. The motion was approved. Either party can cancel with 90 days notice.

Also granted was a request by Richard Robinson, Comm. of Pct. 1, that he reimburse the Eastland Volunteer Fire Department \$2,400, the cost of two exhaust fans. This money is already in the precinct budget.

Other Emergency Medical Services were also discussed. L. T. Owen, Pct. 3 Commissioner, said that he had tried more than once to give the Rising Star Volunteer Ambulance Service the \$12,000 allotted for the current fiscal

year. He said he would try one more time, and if he got no response he would like to give the money to the Rising Star Rural Fire Department.

The Court passed a Resolution allowing the money to be given to the Rural Fire Department if the Rising Star Ambulance Service does not accept it.

On an item from Precinct 1, the court granted a request by a citizens from the Norwood area of Eastland to allow "no parking" signs to be posted near her property. She reported that people park on her property to escape mud on their own, and it creates a problem.

The matter of the County Dispatch Budget came to the attention of the Court. The Commissioners amended the 1990-91 County Budget to pay an increased assessment of \$4,358 for dispatch salary increases.

Commissioners agreed the dispatch should complete its Budget earlier next year, so that it could be studied before the County budget was finalized.

Richard Robinson, who represents the Commissioners Court on the Dispatch Board, reported that he voted against this increase.

"But I was the only one who voted against it," he said. Billy Bacon, Comm. of Pct. 4, gave a report on the County Jail. He said there was a total of 16 prisoners, with one "Blue Warrant," 11 for the County, and 4 for T.D.C.

"The jail is shining like a new dollar," he also said. "I believe you could eat dinner right off the floor."

On other law enforcement matters, the Commissioners voted to continue supporting the County Court as a Trial Court. County Judge Scott Bailey requested that his salary be set at the customary 80 percent of the District Judges salary, which would be \$61,000.

"We generate the salary. The money is there," the Judge said.

Commissioners Billy Bacon and Richard Robinson voted "yes" on the request, saying that they believed the


APPLE OAT-BRAN MUFFINS


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

West German Visitor Makes Rising Star Stop

Many wives of U.S. servicemen have said goodbye to their husbands when the men were deployed to Saudi Arabia since the Iraqi takeover of Kuwait in the Mideast last month.

Michelle Butler is one of those wives. And like many others, she will put household goods in storage near the base in Kentucky where her husband was stationed and move to where her family is. In this case, Michelle's family is the family of her husband, Jody Butler, an Army corporal who received his orders to go to Saudi Arabia September 10. Michelle's own family is in West Germany.

Michelle came to the United States in April, following her marriage to Jody in March in her hometown of Altrip, West Germany. After she takes care of moving and all it entails, the young bride will be ready to go to nursing school or take the next state exam for registered nurses in order to resume the nursing career she began four years ago in West Germany. While

Jody is overseas, Michelle will stay with his parents, Butch and Marijo Butler of Breckenridge. She expects to find hospital related work in or near Breckenridge until she has a state license to practice nursing.

A visit from Michelle's grandmother, Rose Weber of Altrip, West Germany, had already been planned before Jody's orders were received and Michelle and her grandmother came to Texas to visit with the Butlers and do some sightseeing during Mrs.

weekly. Although Rose Weber speaks some English, Michelle translated most of the interview for her grandmother. The younger woman speaks English with a slight trace of "Texas" in her accent. After two years in West Germany Jody had lost much of his Texas accent, but it returned in full when he arrived back in the states last spring, his wife said; if any "Texas" accents her English, Michelle said she picked it up from her husband and his family since her arrival in this country. At first it was very difficult to understand her new relatives with their Texas accent, Michelle added.

Michelle had had seven years of English in school, where it is taught at elementary through college levels. Friendship with American women from New York and Michigan helped with her ability to converse in English, as did having American servicemen as guests of the Weber family at Christmas time each year. Michelle also studied Latin and French in school.

Mrs. Weber offered her encouragement to Michelle for the time Jody will be away and related her own experience in waiting. Rose's husband served in Russia seven years and when he finally returned home, had three bullet wounds. His health is not robust and Mr. Weber, now 71, felt he shouldn't attempt the airplane trip to visit in the United States.

Jody's grandfather is also a veteran of World War II and his grandmother also had the experience of waiting for a serviceman husband to return home. Michelle and her grandmother came to Rising Star last week to visit Jody's grandparents, Robert and Edra Butler.

Michelle anticipates that after her grandmother's visit ends it will take two to three weeks before she can be back in Texas, in the wide open spaces and among the friendly people. She is looking forward to that time.
