## Bike-a-Thon Friday

St. Jude Children's Research Hospital officials announced that Mrs. Tricia Hutchinson will chair the hospital's "Wheels for Life" bike ride in Rising Star on Friday, May 6. This ride will raise funds to support the hospital's battle against childhood cancer and other illnesses being studied there.

Founded in 1962 by entertainer Danny Thomas, St. Jude Hospital has become the world's largest center for the study of childhood cancer and is the only institute dedicated solely to the treatment and study of catastrophic childhood diseases. The hospital is non-sectarian and interracial.

In addition to direct treatment of patients throughout the United States and 29 foreign countries, St. Jude has provided the world's doctors with the best methods of treating their own young cancer patients. This life-saving knowledge is given freely and with no charge to any other hospital or private physician.

St. Jude Hospital's dramatic progress has been made possible primarily by

voluntary contributions raised through events such as the "Wheels for Life" bike ride organized by concerned citizens all over America.

Bike-a-thon coordinator, Mrs. Hutchinson, today asked Rising Star residents to join the Hospital's "Wheels for Life" Bike-a-thon slated this Friday, May 6. The route will begin and end at the City Park, with a 5-mile route taking the riders out into the country and back into town. The riders will have adult supervision during the ride.

This ride honors Brian, a leukemia patient at St. Jude. "With every turn of the wheel, riders become 'spokes' men for all the kids with cancer, like Brian," Mrs. Hutchinson said. "This ride is a vital part of the fight against childhood cancer at St. Jude. Riders are really needed. They make or break a bike-a-thon."

Riders sign up sponsors who promise a donation based on each mile completed. All riders turning in money will receive a certificate. Those who raise \$25 receive

## Showdown With National Debt May 14

On Saturday, May 14, Comanche, Texas will be host to the Great American Showdown With the National Debt. The Showdown, sponsored by American Airgunner Magazine, is a grassroots movement aimed at bringing public awareness to the staggering national debt of the United States and the problems that debt will cause for future generations if not dealt with now.

"What we are doing is setting up booths at the various participating businesses and asking children to drop a penny or two into a jar," said Showdown organizer Gary

Cobb. "After they have contributed their pennies, they may sign a petition asking the president to accept their donations to the national debt and asking that he do all he can to help eliminate the debt. The petition, along with the money, will then be sent to President Ronald Reagan."

The Great American Showdown with the National Debt would not be possible without the support of companies such as Daisy Manufacturing and Marksmen International, the two major airgun manufacturers who have donated various airguns,

targets and other items. Also participating is Higginbotham's, a company home-based in Comanche. They will be setting up displays with penny jars and places for the children to sign the petition to the President in seven of their 19 Home Center locations. These loca-

tions, all in the surrounding area of the Showdown, include: Brownwood, De Leon, Rising Star, Stephenville, Dublin, Hamilton and Comanche.

## Pre-Registration For Kindergarten Students

Parents are asked to pre-register their children who will enter Kindergarten next fall. All children who will be five on or before September 1, 1988, may attend Kindergarten. Kindergarten is a basic part of the Rising Star School System and the service is available to all students.

Parents are asked to call 643-2431 or come by the elementary principal's office to pre-register their child this week, May 2-6. A screening schedule will be arranged for May 10 for each child. The screening will take about 60 minutes. Each student's hearing, vision, speech, motor skills, language, ability, and developmental growth will be evaluated at this time. Parents will be given a report on their children's progress at the time of the screening.

Parents are reminded that to enter school in Texas the student must have a state approved birth certificate and a current immunization record. Immunization requirements include: three in a series of DPT and/or a booster after age four, oral polio series, measles, mumps, and Rubella. Please bring the birth certificate and immunization record at the time of registering, asks Principal Weldon Hill.

Early childhood screening will be conducted at the same time as regular Kindergarten screening. The Early childhood program is to help those children age 3-6 who show to be developmentally delayed or handicapped in any way. If you have, or know of a child who might benefit from this service, please contact the Elementary School office during Kindergarten registration.

## DAR Group Met

The Charles Crawford Chapter of the DAR met April 25th at noon at K-Bob's Restaurant. The meeting was opened with the ritual prayer. After lunch, Regent Flora McCanlies led the group in the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag of the United States of America, followed by the President General's message from the current DAR magazine.

The Defense Report was given by Helen McAnelly. It concerned the terrible drug problems that burden our country, and the toll of lives and resources they take.

Treasurer Bernice Durham was absent because of illness, so Flora McCanlies gave the treasurer's report.

The program on "History of the Continental Congress" was presented by Dinah Wilson. The first Continental Congress convened in Philadelphia. It was initiated to consider and act on the situation arising from the "Intolerable Acts" enacted by the British Parliament in retaliation for the Boston Tea Party and other acts of opposition to British rule.

About fifty delegates, including John and Samuel Adams and Patrick Henry, met on September 5, 1774 to try to restore harmony with England, but they did call for a boycott of British import and export trade. They adjourned October 26, 1774.

The second Continental Congress met in Philadelphia May 10, 1775. Parliament had rejected the petition of the first Continental Congress. Revolutionary ferment was growing. The assembly of the Continental Congress was considered a revolutionary act, but the delegates, including George Washington, still tried to find means of reconciliation with the mother country. However, in August of 1775, the British Crown had issued a proclamation for suppressing rebellion and sedition in the colonies; in September they had contracted for the use of 20,000 Hessians to use against the colonists.

After that, opinion turned more and more toward independence, and on July 4, 1776, the Declaration of Independence was adopted. This Continental Congress adjourned December 12, 1776.

Mrs. Emily Perkins gave a talk on repairing and restoring bridges over the Sudbury and Assabet Rivers near Lexington and Concord where the American Revolution began.

Those present at the meeting were Mmes. Emily Perkins, Dinah Wilson, Helen McAnelly, Sarah Alford, Flora McCanlies, and two visitors, Connie Hightower from Rising Star and Patsy Lenard from Cisco.

In the New Testament, individual congregations were autonomous and self-governing. There was no central organization on earth. Each congregation had elders (where there were men qualified to do the work (1 Tim. 3:1-7)

with deacons, evangelists, and other members serving under them. These elders were also called bishops, overseers, pastors, and presbyters. Each congregation was responsible to God for its work, worship, service, and discipline.

8. WE TEACH SINNERS TO DO THE SAME THINGS THE APOSTLES TAUGHT THEM TO DO IN ORDER TO RECEIVE THE REMISSION OF SINS.

We teach that one must HEAR the gospel (Rom. 10:17), BELIEVE that Jesus is the Son of God (Heb. 11:6; John 8:24), REPENT of their sins (Acts 17:30-31), CONFESS Christ before men (Rom. 10:9-10), and be BAPTIZED in water for the remission of sins (Acts 2:38, 8:38-39; 1 Pet. 3:21). Jesus gave the "great commission" (Mt. 28:18-20; Mark 16:15-16), "He that believeth and is baptized shall be saved; but he that believeth not shall be damned." The apostles carried out the "great commission" and we earnestly endeavor to do likewise!

## Beef Checkoff: A Report Card

Just over one year ago, agricultural history was made. One industry took control of its own future into its own hands says, Bill Brown, Co-chairman of the Eastland County Beef Referendum Steering Committee. Betty Hart is the other County Co-chairman.

On October 1, 1986, the nation's beef producers began working together on a program called the Beef Checkoff. The idea was that every single producer and importer would invest \$1 per head of cattle sold towards beef promotion, research, consumer education and advertising.

Working together, the beef industry decided to take a gamble: it would seek to reverse the decade-old decline in consumer demand for beef and to fight back against misinformed critics who claim beef is not nutritious.

The purpose of the program is simple: fight back with facts and information about beef, and thereby change consumer attitudes and help build demand.

So far, the program is working well. For starters, everyone pays - even importers. That helps make the program fair and equitable, and it ensures that the investment is spread throughout the industry.

A common misperception among some beef producers is that Checkoff funds are mostly used for "overhead" such as offices, salaries, airline tickets, etc.

In fact, exactly the opposite is true. Beef Board administrative costs are strictly limited to 5 percent of all Checkoff dollars collected.

There is also a strong element of local control. "Up to 50 cents of every Checkoff dollar may be kept by state beef councils, where local producers can make decisions about local programs," says Brown.

Finally, the key to the program is that it is run by the producers themselves. A 113 member Beef Board oversees the program. The Board consists of representatives of every segment of the beef industry.

**More than 100 Programs**  
A common misunderstanding is the assumption that the Beef Checkoff is primarily a program of advertising. In fact, only about half of all Checkoff dollars are used for national, regional and institutional advertising.

No one questions the fact that the advertising has the most immediate effect on consumers. In one recent study, 14 million self-described "light" beef users purchased beef more often after seeing Checkoff-funds ads.

More than \$4 million will be spent this year on research - research that is designed to respond to questions raised by critics. One recent study helped demonstrate how beef is important as a source of iron. Other scientific studies are looking for the true facts relating to cholesterol, cutability, and safety of beef products.

Checkoff dollars fund a wide array of marketing and

promotional programs that help bring consumers those facts. For example, the "Meat Nutri-Facts" kit has been distributed to more than 5,000 dietitians and 2,000 grocery locations throughout the United States. And the Checkoff has distributed more than 20,000 beef promotions displays and handouts at grocery stores as well as a series of informational videotape cassettes called "Meat Features".

**Investment Dividends**  
Beef producers are beginning to look at the Checkoff as an investment that will pay real dollar dividends over the short and long term. And the investment is already starting to pay off.

One independent study found that consumer purchases of beef increased an average 28 percent where checkoff "point-of-purchase" materials are available. In another study, veal purchases increased as much as 32 percent as a direct result

of a special veal promotion campaign in one test market.

Overall, consumer attitudes about beef are changing - for the better. In one six month period, the number of Americans who believe beef is an important part of their diet increased from 51 percent to 56 percent.

**Decision Day**  
On May 10th, beef producers have an important decision to make. They are being asked to vote on their future. May 10th is the day that a nationwide referendum will be held on the future of the Checkoff.

Any individual, regardless of age, who has owned cattle between October 1, 1986 and March 31, 1988, is eligible to vote. Voting will take place at the Eastland County Extension office in the basement of the Eastland County Courthouse, during normal business hours, and registration will take place in that office on the same day.

## Young Farmers and Ranchers Meet

There will be a meeting of young farmers and ranchers in Eastland County at the Eastland County Farm Bureau Building on Monday, May 9, 1988, at 8:00 p.m.

Jamie Gipe, Co-ordinator for the Young Farmer and Rancher Program at Texas Farm Bureau in Waco and Ned Meister, member of the TFB Legislative Department will be guest speakers. They will do a presentation of the overall views of the

Young Farmer and Rancher Program and update current legislative activities which concern the agriculture industry.

Young men who are involved in agriculture as producers in Eastland County are invited to attend. Farm Bureau membership is not a requirement.

## Mid-Year Crop and Livestock Reports

Austin...Beginning June 1, representatives from the Texas Agricultural Statistics Service will be contacting farmers and ranchers across the state to help set the 1988 planted acreage estimates and mid-year livestock inventories.

"These surveys are very important this year because they will be the first measure of the impact of the changes in the 1988 national farm program," state statistician Dennis Findley explained.

"Information from the surveys will provide Texas producers with solid facts and figures they can use when making their production and marketing plans in light of these changes."

Individual reports will be combined with other reports to set state estimates. Results of the confidential interviews, conducted by telephone or in person by field enumerators, will be published later this summer. The 1988 acreage forecast will be published July 12, and the mid-year cattle inventory will be published July 29.

"Remember, these are sample surveys, so if you are contacted it is important to provide the requested information, since one report represents similar operations of the same size and type. Our estimates can be no better than the numbers producers provide," Findley added.

## Possum Kingdom Lake

To date, 140 relief wells have been installed to relieve subsurface water pressures which had been detected in the dam's foundation. In addition, a large number of sophisticated monitoring devices have been installed which are capable of measuring very small movements of the dam. No significant movement of the dam has occurred since the lake was lowered in April 1987.

Mr. Ron Corso, Director of Division of Inspections for the Federal Energy

Regulatory Commission in Washington, D.C., who approved the refilling plan, expressed appreciation for the cooperation his agency has received from the Authority during the repair period.

Cost of the repair work to date has reached about \$9 million. Additional repairs and improvements for the dam now proposed are estimated to raise the total cost of the work to about \$20 million. The present schedule is for all work to be completed in late October 1989.

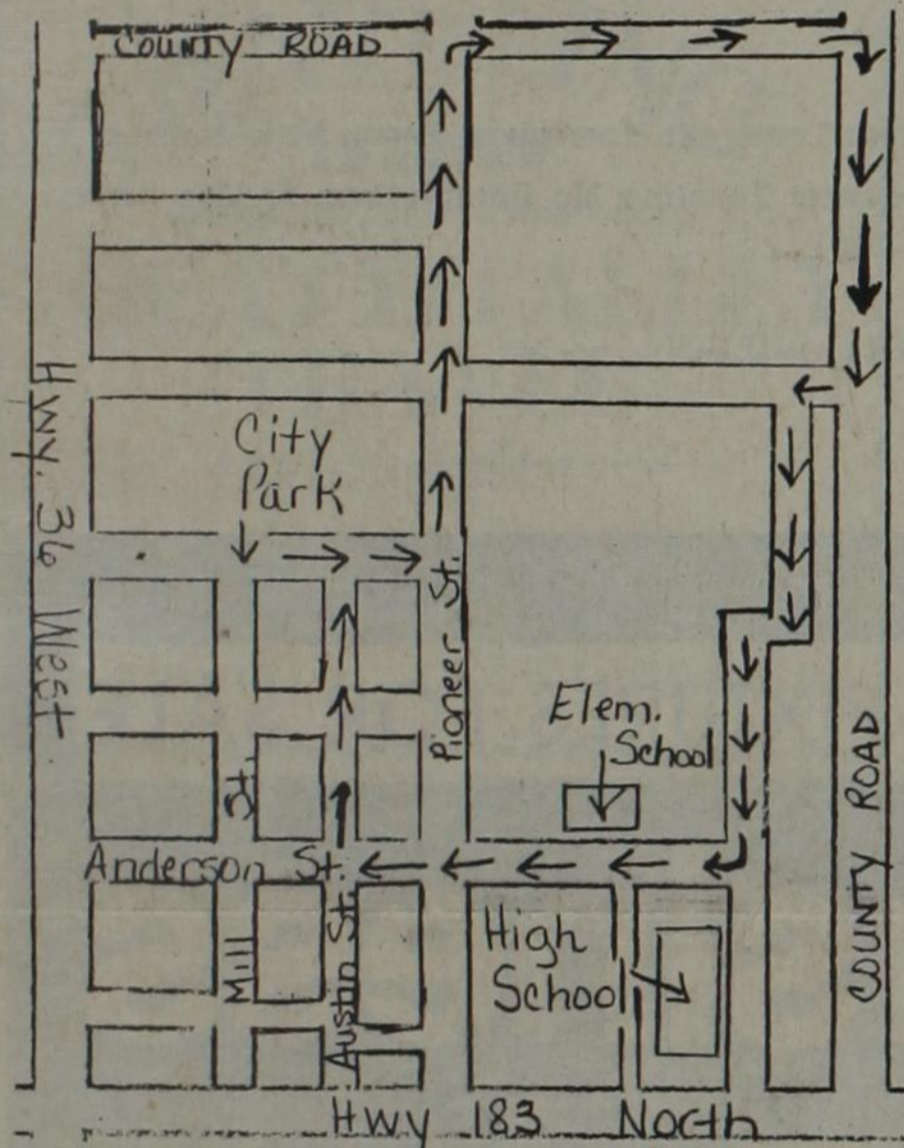
a certificate and a St. Jude T-shirt. When \$75 is raised, the rider receives a sports bag, a T-shirt and a certificate.

## Possum Kingdom Lake Refill Begins

Carson Hoge, General Manager of Brazos River Authority, announced April 26 that the gates have been raised on the dam at Possum Kingdom Lake and the process of refilling the lake to an elevation 995 feet has begun.

Hoge advised that a minimum of three additional large relief wells must be installed in the dam and their effectiveness in reducing uplift pressures on the dam evaluated prior to raising the lake level above elevation 995 feet. Hoge estimated that this additional work would take three weeks, followed by a one week stabilization period for measuring the effectiveness of the enlarged well system.

Hoge made the announcement at a public meeting held at the lake and attended by an estimated 350 local residents. The rate at which the lake refills will depend upon the occurrence of inflows from the watershed upstream of the lake. Assuming that the additional work goes as planned and if

sufficient rainfall and runoff occur to raise the lake level to elevation 995 feet or less by June 1, a second decision on returning the lake to its normal maximum operating level of 1,000 feet will be made.

In March 1987, during a routine inspection of the dam, potentially serious problems in the foundation of the dam was discovered. It was calculated that the margin of safety for the dam was less than that considered acceptable. Consequently, the lake level was drawn down 13 feet from the normal maximum operating level of 1,000 feet as a safety precaution while investigations were made at the dam. The temporary maximum operating level of 987 feet was reached on April 24, 1987. Lowering of the lake level to 987 feet was ordered by the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission, which licenses the hydroelectric generating facilities at the project.
