Unofficial results, of Tuesday's general election, with absentee voting uncounted, showed Democrat Monty J. Jones to win the office of Justice of the Peace, Precinct 3 with a count of 413 to 104 for the Republican candidate, Gary Rabel.

The other contested race in the county gave Democrat Bill Mieaars a 2,881 to 1,562 victory over Republican Marie Rabel for the position of district clerk.

Rising Star ISD Board Meeting

The Rising Star Independent School District Board of Trustees met October 8 at 8 p.m. in the board room. Present were Larry Wilson, Tony Long, Larry Chambers, Gary Wilson, Frances D. Agnew, Dale Wolf and Joyce Baker.

School personnel present were Dr. Donald E. Bryan, Robby Stuteville and Randy Mohundro; others present were Buddy Cook, Mac Sproul and Kenneth Parker.

The minutes of the September 10 meeting were read and approved.

The board voted 6-1 on a motion by Baker, seconded by Long, to purchase a used satellite system from TI-IN Network; Chambers opposed.

The board voted unanimously to accept a bid of \$9,527 from Buddy's Plumbing & Appliances to repair the gym.

The auditors report for 1989-90, presented by Kenneth D. Parker, was accepted.

There are 125 students in grades 7-12, reported Stuteville. Mohundro reported 112 students in elementary; he also gave the lunchroom report.

No action was taken regarding the dress code.

The "Just Say No to Drugs" and Red Ribbon week programs were outlined by Dr.

Bryan.

The superintendent also reported cash in bank and expenditures and revenue compared to the budget; the budget was then amended as recommended by the administration.

On a motion by Baker, seconded by Wilson, the first reading to amend Local Board Policy EIED was approved in a 7-0 vote. "In addition to TEA requirements for graduation the district requires one additional unit of elective credit in the regular program for a total of 22 units.

"A student who has not successfully completed the twelfth grade shall not receive a high school diploma nor participate in the high school graduation exercise until the student has performed satisfactorily on all sections of the text and completes a minimum of 22 units of credits as described in Board Policy EIED."

The school calendar was amended to hold classes March 28 and dismiss classes on April 2.

The board went into executive session at 11:30 p.m. and returned to regular session at 11:55 p.m. No action was taken.

The meeting adjourned at 12:03 a.m.

vertise for a manager. Reports are that Dr. Barnes plans to sue the mayor for assault. The refrain around town is that everyone wishes the town would regain harmony in its city government.

Wildcats Surprise Baird Bears With 13-6 Win

The Baird Bears traveled to Rising Star last Friday for what they thought was a sure victory. The Wildcats had never defeated the Bears in the history of this fan, so one could hardly blame the Bears for their confidence. Some might think it was the home field advantage while others thought it was the Bears' overconfidence, or maybe it was the loyal fans who turned the tide. And then there was Coach Stuteville's inspirational speech at the pep rally.

But don't let anyone kid you, it was probably all of the above but the main reason was the Rising Star Wildcats came to play ball! All the hours of hard work, dedication and practice paid off when the Rising Star Wildcats defeated the Baird Bears 13-6 in front of an ecstatic crowd of fans.

The Bears kicked off to the Cats and after picking up one first down, the Cats were forced to punt. A partially blocked punt gave the Bears good field position for their opening drive at Rising Star's 49-yard line. The Wildcat defense went to work. On 1&10, Donny Alcorn and Donnie Horton teamed up for a 1-yard loss. On 2&11, Rene Rodriguez knocked the pigskin loose and the Bears lost 6 yards before Larry Hollis came up with a sack for -5 yards on Baird's third play of the game. What a welcome for the Bears. Their first three plays resulted in a loss of 12 yards. It would be safe to say that the entire Wildcat side of the stadium was all on its feet yelling. However, the Bear's defense had done their homework and they were keying on Alcorn until Bailey picked up 11 yards and 13 yards. Jarod Horton had a 15-yard gain on an end around, Alcorn had another 12 and Bailey had another 19 before the first quarter ended scoreless. The Bear's total first quarter offense was 5 carries for -9 yards while the Cats had 21 carries for 101 yards and 7 first downs.

In the second quarter, Baird punted on 4&1 but came up with a pass interception on their own 43-yard line. Baird had a couple of good gains, for 9 and 22 to set up their touchdown. This was Baird's lucky quarter. The swarming, hard-hitting Wildcat defense caused three fumbles in four plays and each time the lucky Bears recovered and each time the fumble resulted in additional yards. Baird scored at 7:20 from 1 yard out. Baird's PAT was unsuccessful and the Bears led 6-0.

The Cats were forced to punt, but Alcorn's punt was a beauty and netted 45 yards. Baird in turn was forced to punt and they had a horrible punt which netted 3 yards. Alcorn followed Hollis's block and dashed 29 yards for the tying touchdown with 3:43 remaining in the first half. The PAT was unsuccessful and the game was tied 6-6.

The Cats had 4th down and inches on Baird's 45 with 1:13 left when the coach decided to go for it. Alcorn picked up 9 yards and the first down but the Cats ran out of

time before they could find the end zone.

The third quarter was a defensive battle but Baird wasn't counting on Jarod Horton's interception. Horton returned the ball 15 yards to the Bear 10-yard line before Alcorn picked up 7 yards and then ran 3 yards for his second touchdown of the game. This time Alcorn's PAT was good and the Cats led 13-6.

In the fourth quarter, Baird seemed to be rallying. They had 1&10 at the Cat 16 before coming up with 1st and goal at the 5-yard line. D. Horton and Wilson made the tackle and it was 2&3. Terry Ware made the initial hit and it brought up 3&2. Wilson and Alcorn's tackles made it 4&1. Alcorn made the next stop and the ball went over on downs.

The Bears were unable to find the end zone. Outstanding defense from the Wildcats allowed them to take over on their own 1-yard line. Following Alcorn's punt, the Bears started again on the Cats' 43. They managed to pick up a 1st down before being stopped short once again. This time it was Wilson who hit them for a 2-yard loss and the ball went over on downs at the Wildcat 26-yard line with 3:01 remaining in the game. Alcorn picked up 20 yards and it was 1&10 on the 46. Two plays later, Alcorn had another 14-yard gain and the Cats had another 1st down. The Cats offense managed to control the ball until only 35 seconds remained in the game. Baird was unsuccessful on a couple of pass attempts before trying to fool the Wildcat defense on the last play of the game. They weren't counting on Brandon Geye who read the play beautifully and stopped them for a 10-yard loss. The Rising Star Wildcats had defeated the Baird Bears 13-6. What a team effort! Everyone played a great ballgame.

Undeclared in district play, the Gorman Panthers will host the Baird Bears next Friday while the Wildcats travel to Tolar. If Gorman beats Baird, the Wildcats will represent the district in the playoffs. But the Cats can't look that far ahead because this Friday they play the Tolar Rattlers. Please come cheer the Cats to victory in their quest for a playoff berth.

All the fans enjoyed the caravan to Gorman so well that we will be having a repeat performance this Friday. If you are going to Tolar, be at the red light at Nall's Quik Stop by 5:30 and we will all travel in a caravan to Tolar.

Weather

A cold front blew in Saturday and brought rain and a freeze with it. Saturday night and Sunday 1.89 inches of rain were recorded in Rising Star. There were reports of slightly heavier rainfall to the northeast of town. Monday morning motorists were greeted with frost as the thermometer dipped to the freezing mark.

Funds Needed to Put Fire Truck to Work

The Rising Star Rural Fire Department has bought a high pressure firefighting pump for the recently purchased 1978 Ford 6x6 and is ready to have a tank put on the truck.

Volunteers have already offered to do the welding free of charge, a very considerable savings for the department, as welders can command a high rate per hour. When the tank is finished, it will need a plasti-coat to prevent rust from getting into the pump and nozzles.

The truck, recently pictured in the newspaper, has an actual 10,300 miles on it and will soon be needed for the winter grass fire season. The lush growth of vegetation will quite probably pose a severe fire hazard and the 6x6 truck is expected to be a great help

in extinguishing blazes in pastures and brush.

Even with volunteers working, funds are needed for materials; it will take an estimated \$4,000 or so to put the truck into service. Funds on hand have been used to buy the truck and pump and your donations are what it will take to get the truck operational.

Cold Front Moves Through County Over Weekend

A big cold front moving across the southwest brought general rains to Eastland County last Saturday evening and early Sunday.

Totals varied from a reported 2.8 inches at Cisco, 1.9 inches at Eastland, 2 inches at Ranger, and less than 2 inches at Carbon and Gorman. Both forks of the Leon River were running Monday, with creeks also running around Lake Cisco.

Along with the blue line of clouds late Saturday came a sharp drop in temperature. Those who wondered "When's the norther going to hit?" found out about 6 p.m. There was more than a 20 degree drop in one hour, ranging from around 70 degrees down to 50. The high on Sunday was 46 degrees, and by Monday morning the area had a killing frost.

There were gusts of wind around the heaviest rains Saturday night, but no damage. There was very little lightning in the clouds, and the water soaked into the dry topsoil with little washing.

Reports were that the rain slowed the peanut harvest, but didn't damage the crop much. About 65 percent of the peanuts in the Gorman area have

already been harvested, with less of the crop harvested on the west side of the county. The moisture was great for small grain crops, which were beginning to need rain.

The clouds cleared away by Monday, and temperatures climbed back into the 60's. Cooler weather and more rain was forecast by Wednesday or Thursday, however.

The Texas Municipal league (TML), representing over 940 Texas cities and over 13,000 local officials named State Representative Jim

Parker (D-Comanche) as its Legislator of the Year at the TML Conference in Corpus Christi October 25-27.

The award was unprecedented in that it was given in a year during which the state legislature did not meet in regular session. TML normally makes a legislator of the Year presentation following each regular session to outstanding members of the House of Representatives and the Texas Senate. However, in appreciation of the work Representative Parker did during special sessions on legislation limiting the personal liability of all public officials, the League made the award in an "off-year."

The bill would have limited the individual liability of public servants is the action giving rise to a claim was within the scope of their offi-

cial duties. Governments across the country are experiencing a crisis in hiring and retaining qualified employees because public employees face unlimited personal liability for doing their jobs. After passing the House overwhelmingly, the bill died in the Senate on the final day of the last session.

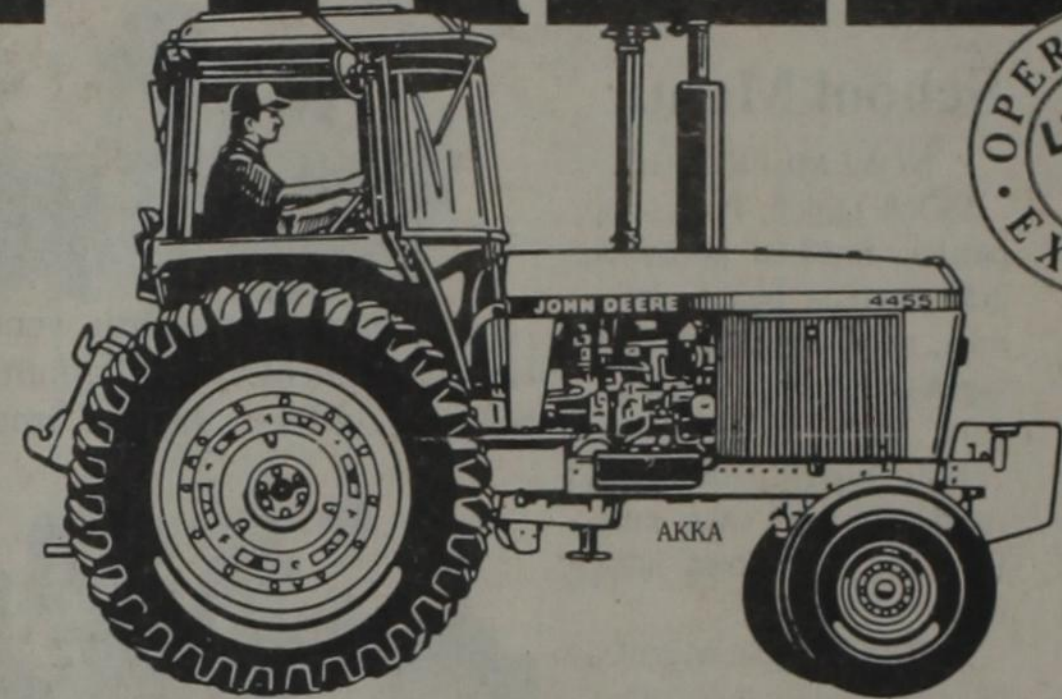

Representative Parker said he plans to refile the legislation as soon as possible for consideration in the next session, which begins in January 1991. "Like General Douglas MacArthur, 'I shall return.'" said Parker.

Dental Dialogue

The Topic Is Toothpaste

Q. What is the history of toothpaste?
A. Throughout the years, people have used an unusual variety of abrasives as toothpastes. About 4000 years ago the Egyptians used a substance made of incense, green lead, and verdigris (the green crust that forms on metal when exposed to water or air) as a dentifrice. The Chinese experimented with ground fish bones to clean their teeth. During the Middle Ages, the Arabs were the first to recognize the danger highly abrasive materials could have on teeth, especially the sand and pumices contained in some products. In Europe, acids were used to remove stains, and similar agents continued to be used until the early part of this century. It wasn't until 1934 that the American Dental Association began rating toothpastes as "accepted" or "unaccepted."

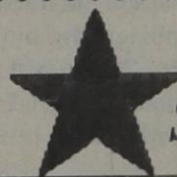

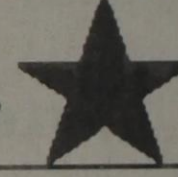

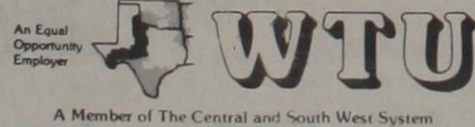
