

Shows Big Deficit

Eastland County Commisannually. sioners held lengthy meetings

Monday, with budget proposals for 1989-90 being one of the items under consideration. Discussed but deferred until evening were final deci-

sions on Emergency Medical Service contracts with the cities of Eastland and Cisco, and a vote on the Eastland County Economic Development Council's request for a Resolution on purchasing land for a prison site.

At 11 a.m. the Court held a Public Hearing on the proposed County Budget for 1989-90. This fiscal year will begin Oct. 1. County Judge Scott Bailey read requests for the various Departments. Projected expenditures in

the General Fund were higher than last year, although there were savings in the Office of the County Clerk, County Treasurer, and a few other areas. Pay raises were figured in most of the requests for the new year. Raw figures on the pro-

posed General Fund expenditures were \$2,035,835. With a projected income of \$1,891,638, this made a deficit of \$144,197. A larger deficit was pro-

jected for the Road and Bridge Fund. Income from all Pre-A- Matthew Beech, Lance cincts was anticipated at 4488,701, with requests of \$723,701. This made a deficit of \$235,000.

The county has been operating for the past three years on a budget of approx. \$2.8 million. County Auditor told the Commissioners Monday that a S25-30 million valu-A- Thomas Hodges, Traci ation loss was contributing to the loss of revenue. The loss of all Revenue Sharing money was also being felt. This had



totaled around \$100,000

Richard Robinson, Commissioner of Pct. 1, told the Court that "We are looking at a \$500,000 operating deficit (on this projected budget) counting the new ambulance services.

The City-County-Hospital Ambulance service was projected to cost the county from \$96,000 - \$120,000 for the first year, including the County's part in purchasing ambulances.

After that it was expected. torun about \$96,000 per year, with each of the four Precincts getting \$2,000 per month to use on Emergency Medical Services.

The Commissioners said it appeared they would have to go back and re-figure the budget. County Judge Scott Bailey suggested that they adopt a budget freeze, and then figure any emergency increases from that. No action was taken on this matter. Billy Bacon, Commissioner of Pct. 4, said that something would have to be done: "The only place I see where we can get any more money is from the taxpayer and they're already taxed to death."

Weather

RAIN, RAIN, RAIN

A brief shower increased the mugginess in Rising Star last Wednesday afternoon adding to the lingering humidity from previous rainfall. There was just enough rain to make small puddles on the pavement, then temperatures cooled some later in the afternoon. Another shower dampened the earth Thursday afternoon. Friday afternoon was cloudy and a little more rain fell.

Saturday afternoon, evening and into the night drizzle and light to medium rain fell here. At times thunder and lightning accompanied the rainfall which amounted to 1.7 to 2 inches.

Rising Star citizens saw a change in the weather Sunday morning: The sun shone while the rain fell; the amount of moisture was small.

Monday morning Rising Star received about .3; .4 was reported northwest of town, .35 south and .1 at Williams.

Early Tuesday morning .2 was reported in Rising Star and .1 at Williams.

As this report was being written Tuesday afternoon at 2:00 rain began falling again. It seemed that one storm cell right after another moved across the area for several hours, leaving from 3.8 to 4.7.

Some minor flooding occurred, although Rising Star has escaped the worst of the storms in the past few weeks.
