

Canning Tips Offered

College Station-With gardens flourishing, many consumers are attempting food preservation at home to save on food costs. While home canning may look simple, every detail requires careful attention.

If you choose to can some vegetables, the Food Quality and Safety Committee of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas University A&M System, offers these important points:

-Before starting, contact your local County Extension office for the latest information. -Use only high quality produce for best

results. -Be sure to have the pressure gauge on your pressure canner checked. Your local county Extension office usually has the equipment to provide this service.

Also check gaskets

and seals on your pressure canner.

-Follow directions to every detail; do not use your own times or pressures.

--All low-acid foods such as green beans, corn and potatoes must be processed in a presure canner. Water bath methods are not adequate for proper preservation of lowacid foods. Firm, fresh tomatoes which are not overripe may be processed in a water bath. -Use only approved canning techniques; processing in a microwave oven or conventional oven is not an approved

method. -- Use only standard canning jars with lids and rings; old mayonnaise or peanut butter jars are not designed for home canning.

-Do not reuse lids. -Do not overfill jars as this can cause a faulty

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Oil Production Figures Released

DALLAS--Despite a ninth consecutive year of maximum production schedules (the maximum efficient recovery rate) all of Texas' fields, the state's annual output of crude oil and condensate last year fell below the one-billion barrel mark for the first time since 1965. Moreover, a downward production trend continued for the eighth consecutive year since Texas' output peaked in 1972.

The total of 960-million barrels included more than 931-million barrels of crude oil. Also produced was 29-million barrels of condensate, according to figures compiled by Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Association.

Last year's production level showed a drop of more than 46.5-million barrels from 1979 output and was more than 330-million barrels below 1972 production of almost 1.3-million barrels. Nevertheless, production in 1980 pushed the all-time cumulative total since to almost 45.7-billion barrels of crude oil and conden-

Edwin L. Cox, president of the Dallasbased Association, noted that despite the drop in output there is a very encouraging trend in one aspect of industry activity:

Since President Carter began a gradual phaseout of crude oil price controls on June 1, 1979, a phaseout accelelerated by President Reagan, the number of wells drilled in Texas has skyrocketed.

Last year's total of 18,697 wells completed was the largest number since 1957, Cox noted. This compares with 16,149 drilled in 1979 and only 7,728 drilled a decade ago in 1971. At that time, the average price of U.S. crude oil was \$3.48.

"Although exploration costs continue to increase, the industry is committed to a policy of intensive drilling in Texas. It is hoped that successes with these wells will help offset further production declines this year and in the future." Cox said.

Eastland County, which has had recorded production since 1917, last year produced 1,220,079 barrels of crude oil and condensate at the rate of 3,334 barrels per day. Production in 1980 boosted Eastland County's production total through the end of the year to 128,269,920 barrels. Brown County has had recorded production since 1917, last year produced 403,669 barrels of crude oil and condensate at the rate of 1.103 barrels per day. Production in 1980 boosted Brown County's production total through the end of the year to 45,333,621 barrels.

In 1980, 21 counties produced more than 10-million barrels of crude oil. This is a decrease of one county from 1979. The following chart shows 1980 production figures for the state's five top producing counties, all with production in excess of 43-million barrels. Yoakum retained its spot as the state's top producing county. Gaines retained second place, while Ector remained in third place for the sixth consecutive year.

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





Milo, wheat, guar, cotton, and melons are a few alternate crop possibilities.

Due to recent rains, much of the cotton planting has been delayed from the intended planting date. However, there are a few scattered fields over the area where seedlings are beginning to emerge. With this in mind, it should be remembered that the use of hormone herbicides such as 2, 4, D and 2, 4, 5, T should be applied with extreme care, from the present time throughout the summer growing season. Follow the "use precautions" on labels pesticide carefully. The unseen spray mist (drift) of a hormone herbicide can severely injure a cotton plant. Certain hormone herbicides are commonly used in mixtures with liquid fertilizers for weed control in bermuda grass pastures and for post plant, post emerge weed control in milo. The application of the herbicides in these instances adjacent to emerged cotton or melons for example, runs a high risk of crop injury and, if applied, should be done observ-

guidelines. According to 1981 Texas Herbicide Regulations, all spray-

ing all spraying

ing of hormone-type herbicides must conform to the following requirements regardless of whether or not a permit is re-

1) An accurate wind gauge shall be at the place of spraying during such spraying.

2) No person shall spray herbicides when the wind velocity exceeds ten (10) miles per hour.

3) It is unlawful for a person to spray hormone-type herbicides with aircraft equipment at an outlet pressure which exceeds 30 pounds per square inch. As an alternative to this maximum pressure, the equipment may be so regulated to give not less than a 200 micron

Now, we have gone through three weeks of June and it has been too wet to plant. Many of our peanut, cotton and grain sorghum crops have not been planted yet. Some have replanted two or three times.

The weather also delayed wheat harvest and hay harvest. Because of rain during the last 30 days the forage sorghum crops are the best we have seen in this county. The problem is getting

these forage crops baled before they get too mature.

We are still below average in rainfall for 1981, even though we had 3.8 inches in May and 4 inches in June. Some parts of the county have had more than this amount. In Eastland we have recorded 13 inches of rain in 1981.

The cool weather the last week or 10 days has also been unusual. It is pleasant, but unusual for mid-June.

With a quick phone call, any producers in Eastland County can get the latest information or a variety of agricultural commodities.

The information is available through "TOMI" (Telephone Outlook and Market Information), a system built around recorded

telephone messages that are changed periodically to provide up-to-date information.

recorded The messages are prepared by Extension Service economists, using the latest available information.

The number to dial is 713/845-6437. Market and outlook information is available 7 days a week, 24 hours a day.

The schedule on information available through TOMI is announced about 2 weeks before the beginning each month and is available from the county Extension office.

The only cost is the distance telephone call. Since it is open 24 hours a day you may call when the telephone rates are cheapest.



Agriculture Strong But Farmers Under Pressure

THRALL—Agriculture is one of the strongest industries in this country, but unless our farmers get some help, we could see a food crisis by the end of this decade, State Rep. Dan Kubiak told a gathering of some 700 at the annual Stiles Farm Foundation Field Day here June

"The production of wholesome food will be a major concern in the years ahead unless steps are taken now to remedy the plight of farmers," Kubiak, of Rockdale, stressed. "Without agriculture, this country would be on its knees.

Agriculture must become the concern of both producers and onsumers," Kubiak emphasized. "The cost-price squeeze and the limitation of natural resources that our farmers face are issues that must be addressed. Interest rates and fuel costs are simply too high for our farmers to cope with."

For agriculture to survive and for our food needs to be met, farmers must make better use of marginal land, they must make better use of water, and they must lower their energy requirements and other input costs, the state legislator pointed out.

Kubiak noted that "agriculture is strong in Texas because of our abundant natural our resources, strategic geographical location, and our resourceful people and leaders."

He lauded the work of Texas of Texas A&M University and its agencies, the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station and the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, for their work in making agriculture what it is today in the state and for futuristic thinking in dealing with the many problems that lie ahead. "The work here at Stiles Farm (conducted by the Experiment Station and Extension Service) demonstrates a total management system designed to increase production," Kubiak added.

"Dollar-wise, we have the best research institute in Texas A&M University among those found anywhere in this country," he said. "Our investment agricultural research and Extension programs are the best use of state funds that we can make. Agriculture in Texas produces a 40 to 50 % return for every dollar invested. No other industry can make that claim.

"For agriculture to survive in the years ahead, we must do something about spiraling property taxes and high interest rates, and we need to produce more of own energy," said Kubiak. "We also need to do more in the area of market development for our agricultural products, and that's why I'm calling on the (House speaker Speaker Bill Clayton) to name a special committee to deal with this key issue."

Kubiak noted that he is concerned about the present decline in

agricultural production that has lead to management, cotton rising food costs and production, forage the high average of farmers in this country duction, programtoday-59.7 years. "we mable calculators in need more young people in agriculture, and we need to work hard to increase production and agriculture. if we are to survive as

a nation," he said. Prior to Kubiak's address, field day visitors had an opportunity to see and hear about various phases of crop and livestock production under way at Stiles Farm. Discussions centered on fish farming, sorghum varieties, brucellosis research, soil and water conservation programs, gardening, swine production, and replacement heifer management and bull Thrall, Linda Stedge of selection.

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
