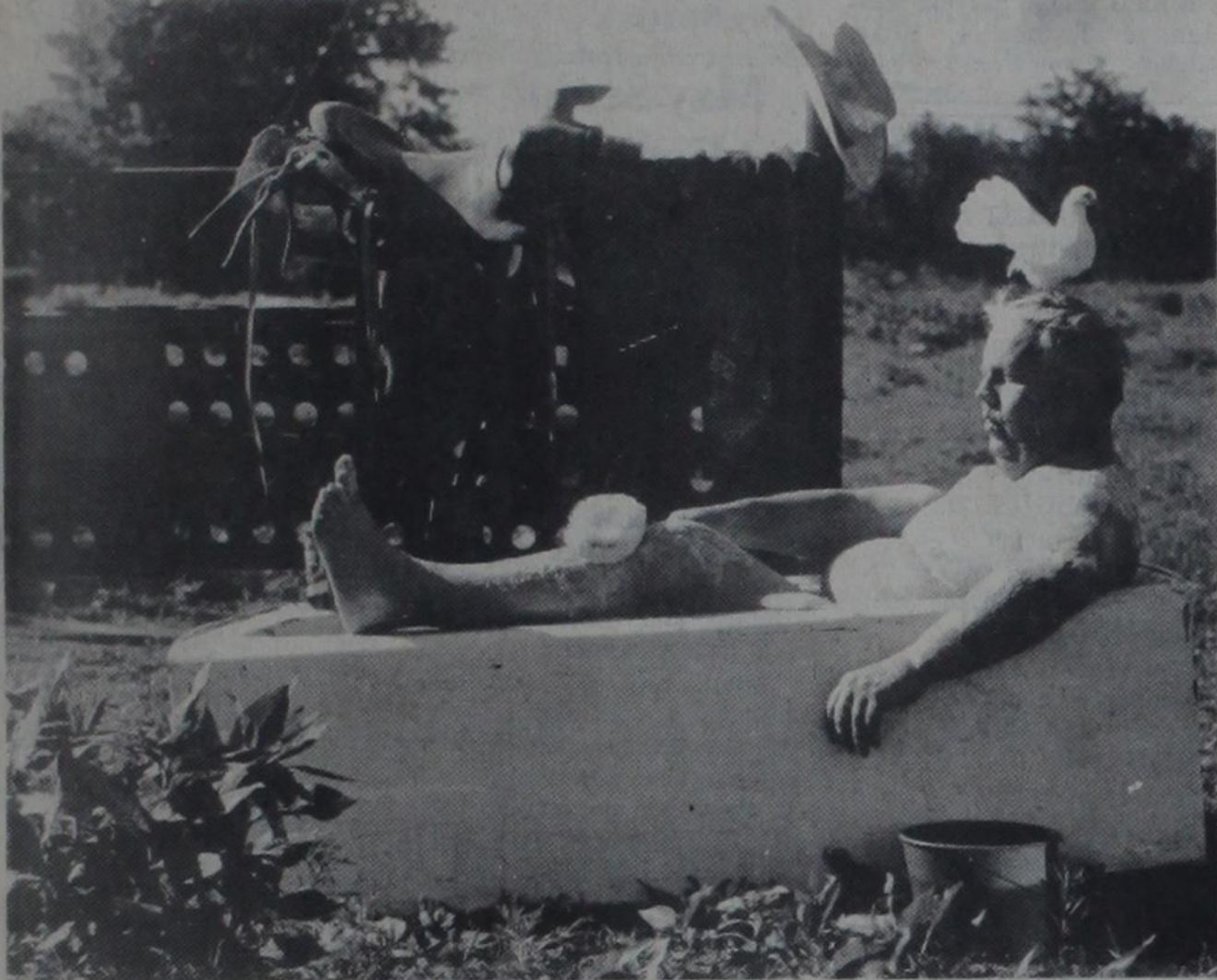

Russian Family Visits Here

Texas is among the tourism industry beneficiaries because of the change in USSR government policy two years ago allowing its citizens to travel out of the country more freely.

Texas, and more specifically Rising Star, was the destination for the majority of their vacation time in the United States for the Zonin family from Leningrad in the Soviet Union.

Andre and Nina Zonin and their son, Nikita, were guests of the Bob West family who farm near Rising Star. After receiving Bob's invitation last spring to visit here, Nina said she did not at first realize the relative ease of securing a travel visa.

The Zonins welcomed the opportunity to learn of other countries and their cultures first hand by visiting the U.S. and including brief trips to Mexico and Canada.

Observing the different cultures and seeing this country's people living side by side with its neighbors in peace and enriching each other has been a valuable experience for the Russian visitors.

Nina was very enthusiastic about her family's visit in this country. With their acceptance of invitations to stay in the homes of friends, the Zonins feel they have been able to meet "real" people and gain some knowledge of everyday life in America.

One of the real people is Bob West. Nina and Bob first met as students when Nina acted as a tour guide to Bob's college group. She was a student studying the English language and acting as guides to English speaking groups during the summer gave her and her fellow students the opportunity to practice speaking the language.

During later trips to Russia Bob met the man Nina married and the three became good friends. Although it has been a number of years since Bob's last trip to Russia they continued the friendship through correspondence.

Nina is now a teacher of 17th Century English literature at the university in Leningrad and Andre is a professor of library science at a college there. Their 15-year-old son, Nikita, is a high school student and has additional studies in art.

The Zonins first visited friends in New York City, Philadelphia and Washington, D.C. before coming to Texas. Libraries, Andre's special interest, had a high priority of places to visit but they also toured art galleries, museums and places of historical interest.

The Smithsonian Institute and a public library in New York were among the highlights of their visit in that part of the U.S.

After arriving in Texas July 28, the visit to the public library in Dallas, with its outstanding children's department, made a strong impression on Andre. They were also very impressed

with the Lyndon Johnson Presidential Library in Austin. Their trips included San Antonio, Houston and the Gulf coast also. They toured the Alamo, the capitol building and Washington on the Brazos, learning some of the history of the state and the Republic of Texas.

Locally they enjoyed the opportunity to visit with several families and were treated to dinners at Cook's Fish Barn and The Rainbow Cafe. Fruits and vegetables fresh from the farm made a big hit with the Zonins. Nikita enjoyed a week at 4-H camp with Bryan, the son of his host family.

At the time of the interview Aug. 15 the Wests were planning a short trip to Mexico for their visitors. Soon after returning to Rising Star the Zonins planned travel to Canada for a brief stay. They were to board a flight to their homeland from Montreal.

They've met wonderful people enjoyed the hospitality offered to them, Nina said. They found things to enjoy everywhere they went but the Texas visit will stand out in their memories. The friendliness they've encountered is strong in their minds and "We will really miss Texas when we return home," Nina said.

County Commissioners Authorize Ambulance Fund

Eastland County Commissioners Monday voted to take money for the Ambulance Assistance Fund out of the County's General Operating Fund after Oct. 1.

They authorized County Auditor Ray Pruitt to set up an account of \$96,000 to be used to subsidize ambulance service in the county during the next fiscal year.

"The way my money's counting up, that's the only way I can go," said Billy Bacon, Commissioner of Pct. 4. Bacon's Precinct (Cisco) and Precinct 1 (Eastland) have been involved in operating Ambulance Services out of the Cisco and Eastland Hospitals since Patterson Ambulance Service closed in May.

Money from these precincts has paid one-third of the cost of operating the ambulances. The other two-thirds has come from the hospitals and the cities of Cisco and Eastland.

After Oct. 1 money from the General Fund will be divided equally between the four Precincts in the County. The Commissioners estimated this would be around \$2,000 per month each precinct.

Bacon said that to his knowledge the Cisco Hospital "hadn't collected a nickel yet" on the ambulance service based there.

County Judge Scott Bailey said the County had "never been provided a schedule or a rate card on the hospital-based

services," even Patterson did that.

The Commissioners said they would request rate schedules from the hospitals operating ambulances, and an itemized account of the costs.

On another matter, it was reported that the hospital insurance rate for county personnel is going up. Two plans were outlined, and the Commissioners decided on one with a \$200 deductible. Cost of the insurance will rise from \$208 monthly per individual to \$239 monthly.

Sheriff Dee Hogan reported that a lady working part time in his office as a statistician will take the position of Jailer after Oct. 1. The hiring of another jailer has been previously approved by the Court.

The Commissioners also agreed to a request for \$300 to buy specialized clothing used by the Sheriff's Department in drug raids.

Hogan reported that the jail population is down - only eleven prisoners were currently in the county jail.

On another item, Auditor Ray Pruitt asked for clarification on \$5,000 put up for matching Grant money in the District Clerk's office. The Commissioners stated that only \$910 of this could be spent on equipment if the Grant approval did not come through.

The Commissioners discussed whether to have the

car allowances for the Constables and J.P.'s in the County listed as salary for each office. They decided to give these individuals the option on whether or not to list these allowances as salary.

On taxation, County Judge Scott Bailey said he would like to remind the people of the county that the Homestead Exemptions for persons over 65 yrs. of age are being continued on county taxes. These exemptions are granted to the disabled as well as to persons over 65, the Judge said.

The Commissioners adjourned before noon. Their next regular meeting will be on Monday, Aug. 28.

Fishing Outdoors

Sept. 3, 1989 E.C.B.C. Club Tourney

Minnow dunking at Lake Leon for crappie is excellent right now. The early fall like weather has started a good run on these beauties. While the majority of anglers are reporting excellent numbers with around one third keeping size, I did here one report of only bragging size being caught. The one difference in this anglers strategy was not using red house minnows and keeping with the smallest he could buy. The areas seem to be from 7 to 15 feet around timber. Good catches are coming from all past producing spots.

And the yellowcats still seem to be inching towards an all out fall run. Jimmy Gerth of Amarillo landed a near 20 pounder Friday. The bait used wasn't that different. In fact the angler hadn't even baited his line yet when the big cat took a liking to the bare hook.

I have spoken often over the years about the great fish catching of the spinner bait. Well one of the prime times of the year for this hawg caller are upon us.

A spinner has three pluses in its favor; it resembles a moving bait fish, produces flash, and puts out vibration.

A newer style of flash has come about in recent spinners with the introduction of Strike King's new Diamond Leaf. Even in murky water this new blade really shines.

Vibration is probably one of the most important fea-

tures of the spinner and Lonnie Stanley's Vibrashaft can give you the best, due to the tapered wire Lonnie uses in his lure.

Here are two baits which are the same, yet differ. To gain the best of both worlds remove the Strike King blades and place them on your Stanley Vibrashaft and hold on.

I see where Mr. Hank Parker of Hank Parker Outdoors T.V. fishing show has won the B.A.S.S. Classic. I will try to have a little more in depth look at Hank and the prestigious B.A.S.S. Classic at our next meeting here at Fishing Outdoors.

Stephenville Man Receives 25 Years For Robbery Case

EASTLAND-Daniel Perales, 29, of Stephenville received a maximum sentence in prison Wednesday after a jury found him guilty of robbery.

In an earlier trial, Perales' conviction of aggravated robbery for the same incident was overturned by an appeals court.

Testimony in that trial showed Perales and his brother, 25-year-old Robert Perales, smothered L.E. "Compound" Clark of Desdemona with a pillow and beat him on the chest.

Clark was in the De Leon Hospital six days. The incident occurred at Clark's home on Feb. 18, 1988.

The conviction in the first trial was reversed when the appellate court decided the state didn't substantiate the allegation of serious bodily injury, said District Attorney Emory Walton.

In the second trial, Perales was found guilty of robbing 89-year-old Clark of money and items.

According to testimony in 91st District Judge Jim Wright's courtroom, Perales

and Robert Perales robbed Clark of about \$125 cash.

They also took car keys, car titles and a record book from the house. One car title was in Robert Perales' possession when he was arrested, according to court testimony.

Clark had loaned Daniel Perales \$500 the week before the robbery, it was also revealed in testimony.

Robert Perales received a 10-year, probated sentence and a \$10,000 fine in an earlier trial. he is in the Eastland County Jail for revocation of probation.
