### Youth Revival

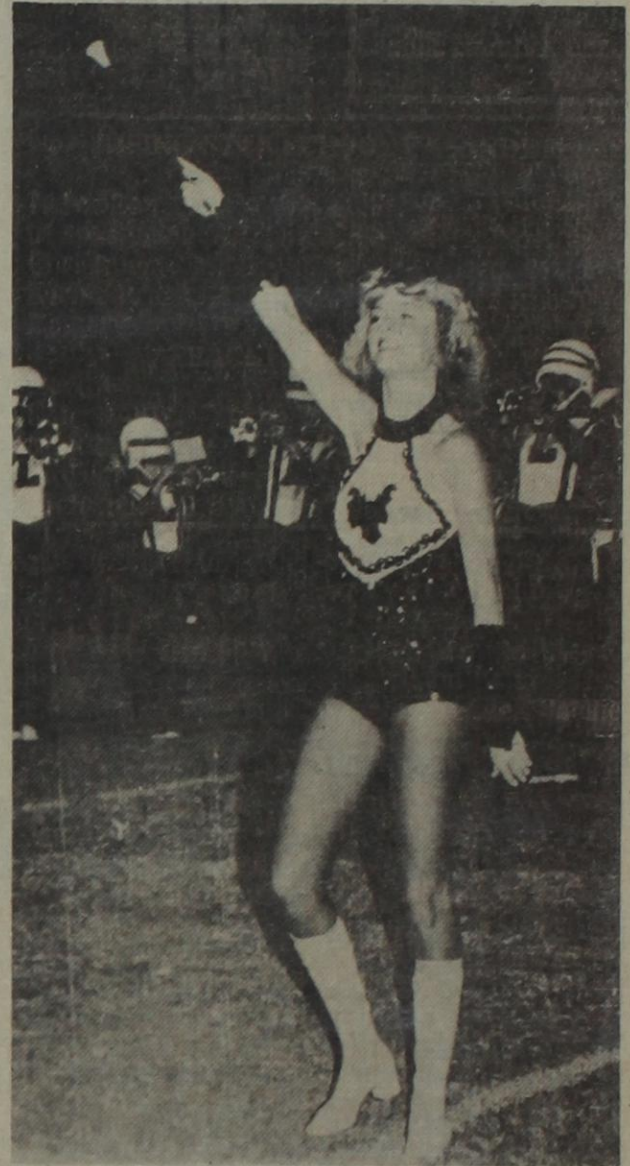

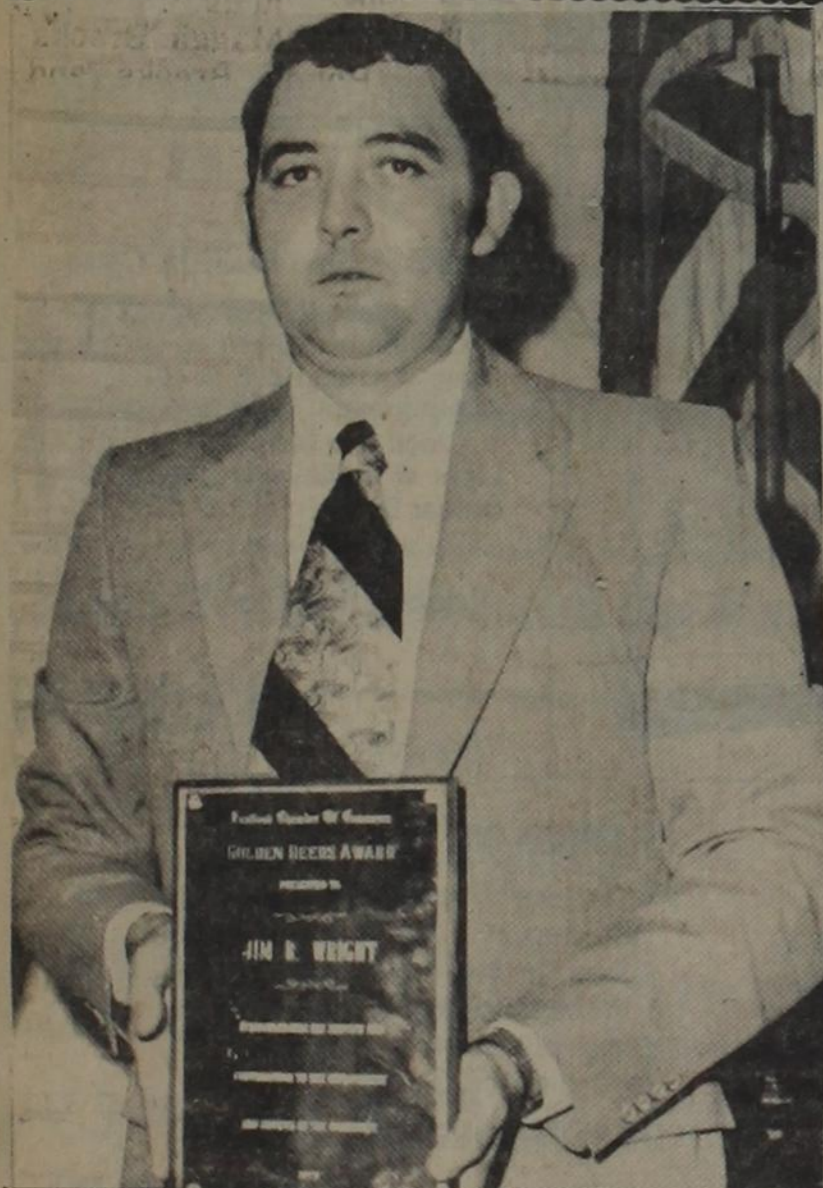

## Judge Jim Wright 91st District Court

Following the Biblical "seven years of labor" in his own Eastland firm, Jim Wright returns as judge of 91st District Court, where he took his oath as an attorney in 1972.

He has become the fifth judge to serve the bench of the 91st—and one of the youngest, state judge in Texas.

He will celebrate his 33rd birthday on Dec. 21—and there's little question that one of his outstanding Christmas-birthday gifts of 1979 will have been the appointment by Gov. Bill Clements to the 91st bench. His predecessors include the late George Davenport and T.M. Collie; Frank Sparks, retired; and Earl Conner, who retired Nov. 28.

Judge Wright was one of three Eastland attorneys who were summoned to Austin for interviews. Two other local attorneys had sought the appointment.

Word came from the governor's office to Wright about 3 p.m. Monday in an informal manner. He was advised that the Secretary of

State would be forwarding documents for the formal swearing in and procedures.

The appointment reportedly became effective last Saturday but no notification into Eastland County was made.

His appointment prompted his immediate resignation as Attorney for City of Eastland, and as a member of the board of school trustees, and other positions.

He took his attorney's oath from Judge Conner on April 21, 1972, and will fill the unexpired term of Judge Conner, which runs through 1980.

Born Dec. 21, 1946 in Gorman, before Eastland Hospital was built, Wright attended South Ward School.

He was a Cub scout, Boy Scout and graduated Eastland High School 1964 and Vice-President Senior Class; Co-Captain Maverick Football team, Basketball team-Track Team-FFA.

He worked for R.M. Sneed Constuction. While attending McMurry college in Abilene he served as News Director for KTXS Channel 12 and

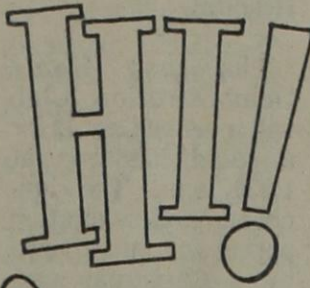
During the eight-week training cycle, trainees studied general military subjects designed to prepare them for further academic and on-the-job training in one of the Navy's 85 basic occupational fields.

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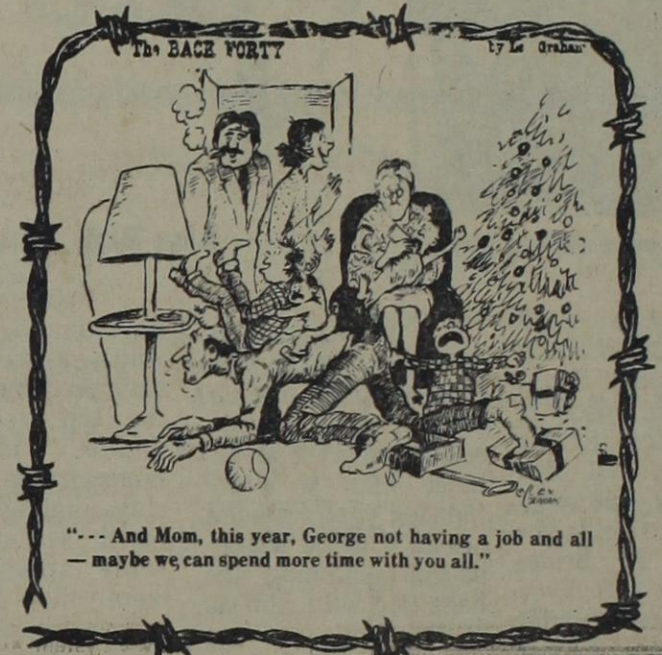

Stenholm would be filling a position vacated by Congressman Marty Russo of Illinois, who has stepped down to become a member of the House Ways and Means Committee.

## Two U.S. Dept. Of Agriculture Administrators Will Meet With Peanut Producers

Congressman Charles W. Stenholm announced today that two top administrators of the U.S. Department of Agriculture will be in Gainsville December 13, to meet with area peanut producers.

The producer meeting will be held at Cooke County College.

"This meeting is the culmination of plans which began when Secretary of Agriculture Bob Bergland visited with peanut producers in the area early this fall," Stenholm said. "We are extremely pleased that John Goodwin, associate ad-

ministrators of ASCS and Tom VonGarlem, deputy director of the Price Support and Loan Division, will be on hand to work with producers."

Stenholm said the purpose of the meeting was to discuss the peanut program from a broad policy standpoint and to present USDA with an opportunity to respond to questions from producers.

"During his trip to Texas in September, Secretary Bergland showed a great deal of interest in problems faced by peanut producers in the 17th District," Stenholm said, "and promised to

work with growers to promote better understanding and cooperation between USDA and producers."

Topics of discussion are expected to range from quotas and additional loan rates for 1980, marketing problems, penalties and identification of Segregation 111 peanuts, leasing and sale of allotments and contracting deadlines for additional peanuts.

Workers who have severe mental or pysical disability benefits can help speed the processing of their claim if they gather certain information before they apply, Glyn Hammons social security district manager in Abilene, said recently.

Having this information available when applying will help speed the interview and enable social security to process the claim in a more efficient manner.

The information needed includes:

.Social security number.

.Date last worked.

.Date sickness began or injury occurred.

.Nature of the illness or injury.

.If no longer disabled, date of recovery or return to work.

.Dated and places of treatment, including names, addresses, and telephone numbers of doctors, hospitals, institutions, or clinics.

.Service serial number and VA claim number if medical care was received in a service or VA hospital.

.The kinds of jobs worked at most in the 10 years before disability began.

.Names, social security numbers, and dates of birth of spouse and children.

.The compensation number if he or she filed a claim for worker's compensation.

.Telephone number.

Mrs. W.C. Wilson of route two, May, is taking orders. She received orders for twenty-two copies Sunday morning.

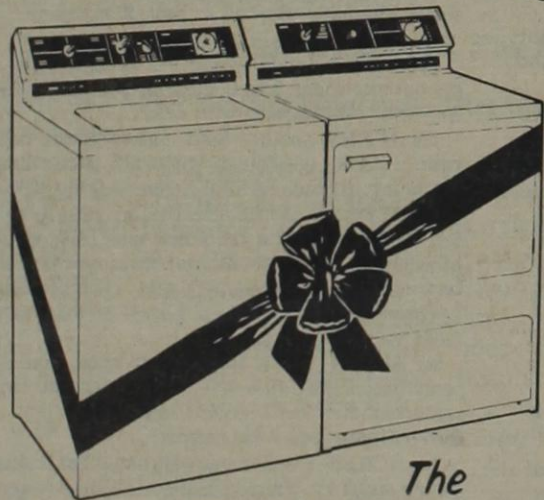

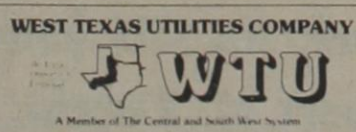
