ducers. The producer meeting will be held at Cooke County College.

"This meeting is the culmination of plans which began when Secretary Agriculture Bergland visited with peanut producers in the area early this fall," Stenholm said. "We are extremely pleased that John Goodwin, associate ad-

ministrator of ASCS and Tom VonGarlem, deputy director of the Price Support and Loan Division, will be on hand to work with producers."

Stenholm said the purpose of the meeting was to discuss the peanut program from a broad policy standpoint and to present USDA with an opportunity to respond to questions from producers.

"During his trip to Texas in September, Secretary Bergland showed a great deal of interest in problems faced by peanut producers in the 17th District," Stenholm said, "and promised to

work with growers to promote bette: understanding and cooperation between USDA and producers."

Topics of discussion are expected to range from quotas and additional loan rates for 1980, marketing problems, penalties and identification Segregation peanuts, leasing and sale of allotments and contracting deadlines for additional peanuts.




