USDA Proposes Amendment To Referendum

Proposed amendments providing for confidentiality in voting and making the conduct of a beef

referendum more efficient and less time consuming were announced today by Ray Fitzgerald, administrator of the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS).

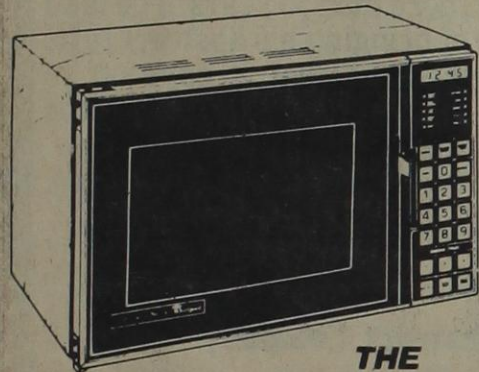
Under the Beef Research and Information Act, beef producers may vote to authorize the federal government to withhold a fixed amount from each cattle sale to be used for research and promotional purposes. Under an amendment to the Act passed last year, the number of producers needed to approve such an order was reduced from two-thirds to a majority of producers voting in a referendum. Today's proposed amendments to the regulations are to reflect this change in the law.

The proposed changes provide for: (1) voting by secret ballot; (2) reducing the registration and voting periods from 12

days to 4 days; (3) reducing the time allowed for challenging a producer's eligibility to register and vote; and (4) reducing the time for the ASCS executive director to make a determination on the challenges.

The proposed amendments in no way obligate the Secretary of Agriculture to hold a referendum.

The amendments appeared in the Federal Register August 7. Written comments must be received no later than October 9 and may be sent to the Hearing Clerk, U.S. Department of Agriculture, Washington, D.C. 20250. Church Sponsors Food Shower For Women Of St. Kitts

Baptist Women of the First Baptist Church sponsored a food shower for two young women from St. Kitts Island. The girls are in the United States on study visas and will return to St. Kitts sometime in

November. They attend a business school in Abilene and are sponsored by the Second Baptist church in Abilene. Several other churches in the area help pay tuition, rent, and food bills.

We delivered the food and some cash to Rev. Clayton Pennington, pastor of the Second Baptist Church on Sunday afternoon. Our time was short but here is a brief account of our visit with the girls.

We were able to spend only about twenty minutes with Ursil and Melvie from St. Kitts Island. It was very rewarding, enjoyable, and informative twenty minutes. We asked as many questions as time would allow. This is some of the information we received.

St. Kitts (area 65 sq. mi.) is one of the Virgin Islands, belong-

ing to Great Britain. The people are very poor. They are mostly of African descent. The girls did not know any of their genealogy. Their people, as far as they know, have always been there. A little research on our part suggests they are probably descendents of slaves escaped from slave boats bound for America.

We found them (probably in their very early twenties) to be very alert, friendly, intelligent, and anxious to let people know about their home. They have never seen frost, much less natural ice or snow. They did not have their air conditioner on while we were there. If you remember, it was in the upper 90's Sunday afternoon.

The first European name connected with St. Kitts is that of Christopher Columbus, who discovered the island on his second trip to the new World. The first Englishman associated with the island was Sir Thomas Warner, who began colonizing it for the British in 1623. The French started about four years later.

Southern Baptist work was started on the Island by pastor Conner, who was an Anglican minister until he visited in the States in 1963, where he was introduced to and impressed by Southern Baptist work. He either met or found the name of Rev. Riely Fugitt and began correspondence with him. A Friendship was started and there has been continuous relationship between the two men and their churches since.

Pastor Conner is pastor of Antioch Baptist Church. There are two other Baptist churches on the island. Mt. Carmel, pastored by a Bro. Jones, and Calvary Baptist Church. Mt. Carmel, with a membership of about two-hundred, is the home of Ursil and Melvie.

In these churches women are allowed to do anything except preach. They teach,

help in open-air meetings, sing, etc. The churches practice rigid church discipline requiring their members to give an account to a committee of the church for any lengthy absence from church services. They do not attend movies, dance, drink, or engage in other worldly activities without being disciplined by the church. Women must not wear slacks, they must wear hats to church, and their dresses must be of modest length (at least below the knee). They may own televisions but very few do because they have to pay a high fee or tax to the government in order to do so.

Schools are now state supported and are free to the "intelligent" (not smart-as Americans say). Only those who show this intelligence are allowed to remain in school until they are sixteen. Both of these girls had to finish their high school education by night school because they reached sixteen before they finished. To support these schools, policemen, and firemen taxes are very high.

Most people are very poor. They earn their living by working in the sugar industry which lasts only six months of the year. The rest of the year they are employed only about two days a week molding (?) the fields. (I was never positive I understood the word correctly but I think molding is the term they used). At least I did understand it meant to cultivate or prepare it for next year's crop.

On their return to the Island the girls plan to open a school to teach others what they have learned here. I asked what they needed most in order to do this. The greatest needs are materials such as typewriters, and duplicating machines, then books and paper. I asked what kinds of books, in particular,

were needed, they said all kinds of good books for all ages of people, religious and non-religious as well.

The ones mentioned that struck a responsive chord in my thinking were factual books for the very young-not just silly story readers. The people speak English-English (very precise) But American written and produced books are easily read and understood. Besides these they mentioned guitars because they use them extensively in their church services. This is done mostly because other musical instruments are so very expensive. They call themselves "Kitticians" (my spelling).

Smith thought he would tease them a bit so he asked them if there were any good-looking young men. He didn't make a thing off of them. They assured him there were, but did not give away any secrets about their personal plans along that line. But we certainly felt they had no fear of remaining "unclaimed blessings" all their lives.

We feel the generous food offering you sent will bare fruit far beyond the immediate use. These young women gave us the impression of being deeply dedicated to the service of our Lord.
