Pre-Registration For Kindergarten Students

Parents are asked to pre-register their children who will enter Kindergarten next fall. All children who will be five on or before September 1, 1988, may attend Kindergarten. Kindergarten is a basic part of the Rising Star School System and the service is available to all students.

Parents are asked to call 643-2431 or come by the elementary principal's office to pre-register their child this week, May 2-6. A screening schedule will be arranged for May 10 for each child. The screening will take about 60 minutes. Each student's hearing, vision, speech, motor skills,

language, ability, and developmental growth will be evaluated at this time. Parents will be given a report on their children's progress at the time of the screening.

Parents are reminded that to enter school in Texas the student must have a state approved birth certificate and a current immunization record. Immunization requirements include: three in a series of DPT and/or a booster after age four, oral polio series, measles, mumps, and Rubella. Please

bring the birth certificate and immunization record at the time of registering, asks Principal Weldon Hill.

Early childhood screening will be conducted at the same time as regular Kindergarten screening. The Early childhood program is to help those children age 3-6 who show to be developmentally delayed or handicapped in any way. If you have, or know of a child who might benefit from this service, please contact the Elementary School office during Kindergarten registration.

Exemption Deadline Nears For Eastland County Residents

Residential property owners within Eastland County are reminded that the deadline to apply for a residential homestead exemption is May 2, 1988.

If a person owned and resided in a residence on January 1, 1988; he or she may qualify for this type of exemption. The homestead

exemption is in the amount of \$5,000 of taxable value for homeowners under the age of 65. For those homeowners over sixty-five years of age or who are disabled, the exemption amount is an additional \$10,000.

It is emphasized that only those homeowners who have never applied for an exemp-

tion or who have changed residences since their original application need apply. If you have been receiving a homestead exemption and have not changed the status of your residence in anyway; there is no need to submit a new application.

CISCO

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

According to the American Cancer Society, one out of every ten women in the United States will develop breast cancer sometime during her lifetime. Every year over 37,000 women die as a result of breast cancer.

According to a spokesman from the Regional Breast Care Center at Women's and Children's Hospital in Odessa, "the death rate from breast cancer could be drastically reduced if women would have mammograms done before a problem exists." By using modern state of the art X-Ray equipment breast cancers can be found when they are about the size of a grain of rice and well before the cancer can be felt. A woman who is diagnosed with breast cancer at this early stage has a 90%-97% survival rate. However, a woman who is not diagnosed until a lump can be felt has approximately a 50% survival rate in five years.

In an effort to find cancers at the earliest possible stage and prevent unnecessary deaths, a Mobile Breast Cancer Detection Unit will be made available to local women on May 5, 1988. 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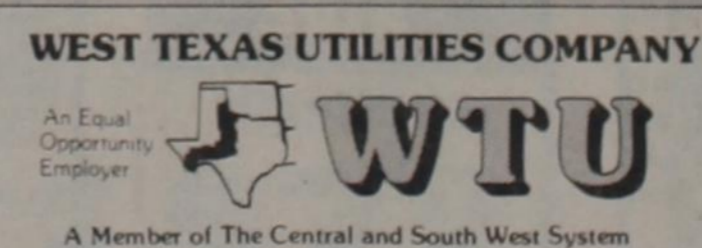

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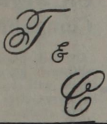

From the dying figure of the Son of God as he hung forsaken on a wooden cross, sang out a plea of such compassion such as the world had never known. "Father, forgive them, for they know not what they do." He had taught His disciples to pray in this fashion in the perfect prayer when he had said: "And forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us."

On the cross He was following His own teaching FORGIVE...blessed word, proof of a Christlike heart. FORGIVE...following in the footsteps of the Master. If men would only learn the meaning of this tender word, war would be outlawed, murder would become only a memory, hatred would forever be banished from the earth and men would live in peace. There would be no more broken hearts. Schisms in the church would have their remembrance only in history. FORGIVE...and the prodigal could once again return to his father's house.

FORGIVE...and the wayward daughter could find her way back home to the mother's arms. FORGIVE...and the divided house could gather once again in an unbroken circle. When the disciples asked

Jesus how many times they should forgive, He gave them this generous standard of behavior...until seventy times seven. Yet how many times has the testimony of the church been besmirched by those who refuse to forgive even once, yet profess to be followers of Christ.

How many of our young people have been driven from the fold by an unforgiving spirit on the part of their elders who condemn rather than offer them counsel and love. Jesus said, "How can ye love the Father whom ye have not seen, when ye love not your own brother whom ye have seen?...Judge not, that ye may not be judged, for with the judgement ye judge, ye shall be judged. And with the measure ye mete, it shall be measured to you again." What a warning this should be to those who are so quick to pass judgement and so tardy in forgiving. The drunkard, the harlot and the prodigal will never be delivered by those who judge them, but by those who live and love them for Jesus's sake. Beef Vote Will be Held May 10

A nation-wide beef checkoff referendum vote will be held on May 10.

The vote, by eligible cattle producers and importers of beef or beef products, is to decide whether to continue the beef checkoff program, says DeMarquis Gordon, Eastland County Extension Agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System. Producers are being assessed \$1 a head on all cattle they sell. Funds from the checkoff are presently financing the Beef Promotion and Research Program.

Eligible voters are producers who owned cattle between Oct. 1, 1986 and March 31, 1988 or persons who imported cattle or beef products during the same ballot in the local Extension office of the county where a producer or importer resides.

Persons who need to cast an absentee ballot must re-

quest one between April 1-29. Eligible Texas voters may request absentee ballots from Dr. Milo Shult, Associate Director, Texas Agricultural Extension Service, System 105-A, Texas A&M University, College Station, TX 77843. Any eligible voter may vote by absentee ballot.

"Mark the absentee ballot and return it by May 3 to the Extension office in the county of your residence," Gordon says.

The Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service will count ballots, determine the

eligibility of challenged voters and ballots, and report Referendum results.


