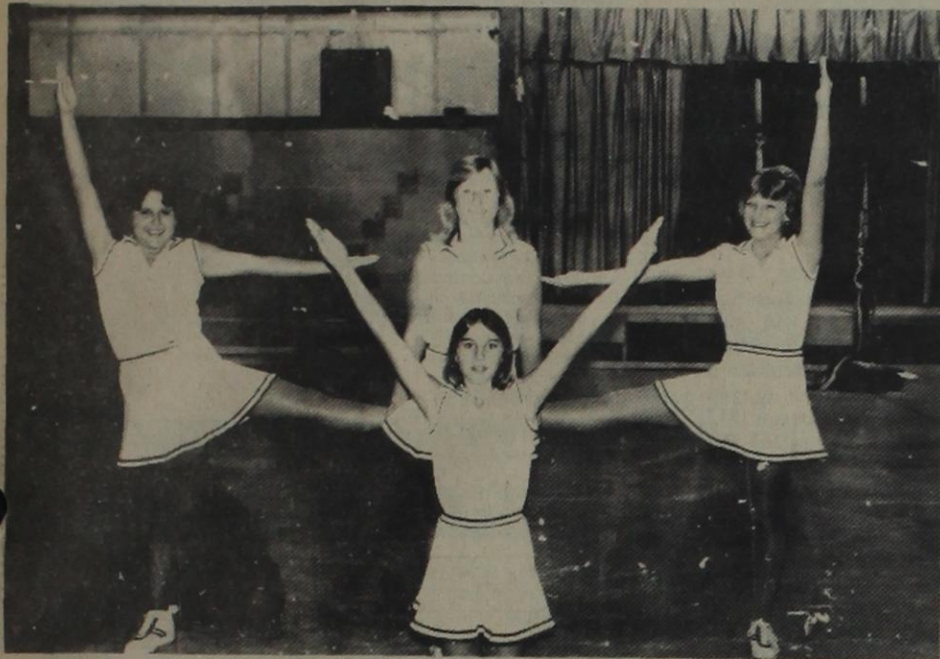

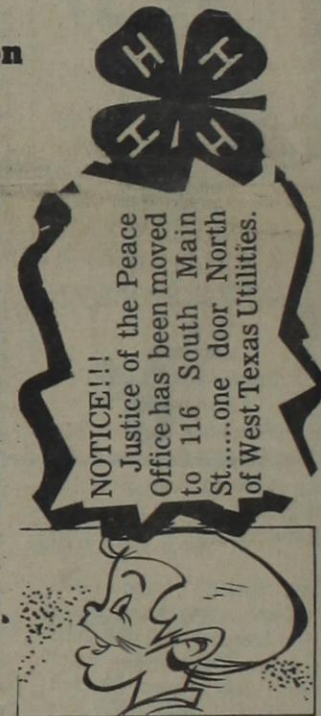

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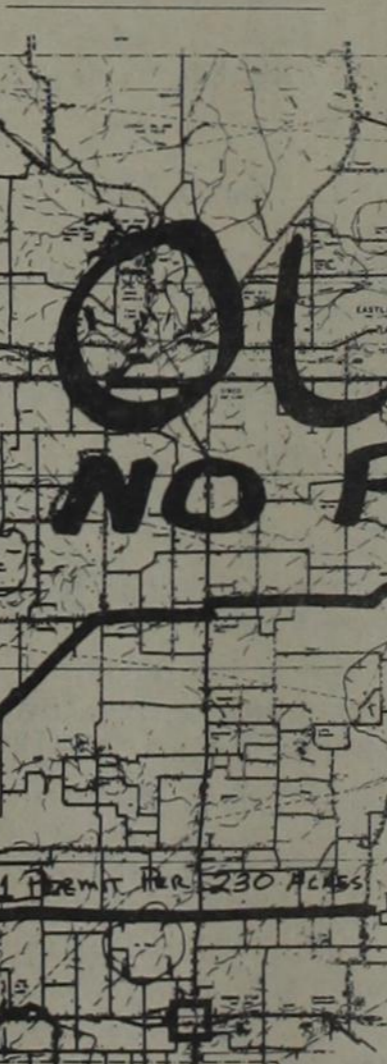

New Switching Equipment Moved To Rising Star

New switching equipment has been delivered to Continental Telephone's switching center in Rising Star, according to Alan Armstrong, Customer Service manager for the firm at Baird. The new equipment at Rising Star will eventually provide updated service for May telephone users as well.

Armstrong estimated that installation and testing would take about 45 days. Telephone customers will be notified of the exact date of changeover when testing is complete.

The new switching machine makes use of the latest digital electronic technology. The digital switch is like a computer. It has stored program control and no moving parts. As a

result, the company expects greater reliability and less maintenance with the new equipment.

Continental telephone was the first in the nation to introduce digital switching when it placed its Ridgecrest, California digital long distance switch into service in 1976. Since then, Continental has been a leader in the telephone industry through its rapid conversion of older electro-mechanical switches to the electronic digital versions.

Armstrong explained that economic factors have in the past prevented small telephone exchanges from keeping pace with changes and improvements made in large, urban switching centers. This disparity

is now being eliminated through use of this latest generation of switching machines.

"By the year 2000," said Armstrong, "the entire telecommunications network will be largely digital in both switching and transmission. Rising Star telephone customers will be enjoying the advantages of that new technology in a matter of weeks."

The digital switch will eliminate the "party" or "circle" digit now dialed by Rising Star telephone users when making long distance calls. Direct dialing of person-to-person calls and special billing calls will be introduced with computerized switching center.

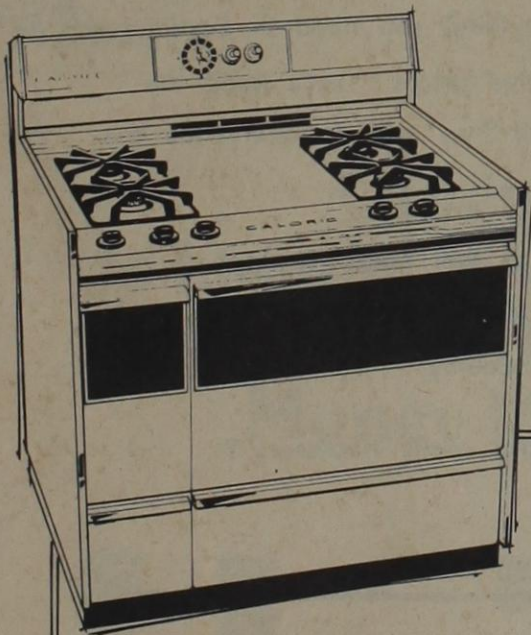

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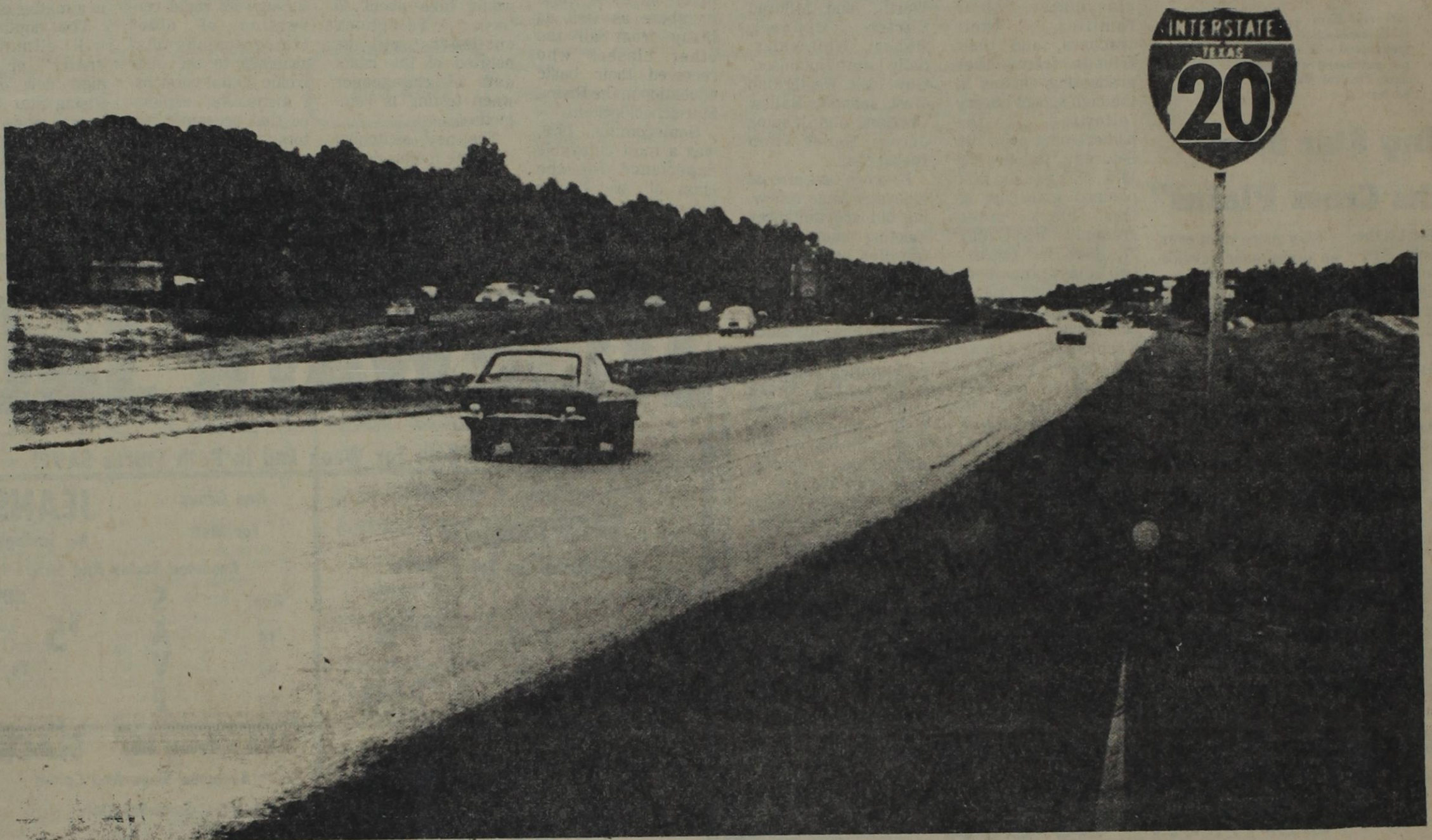

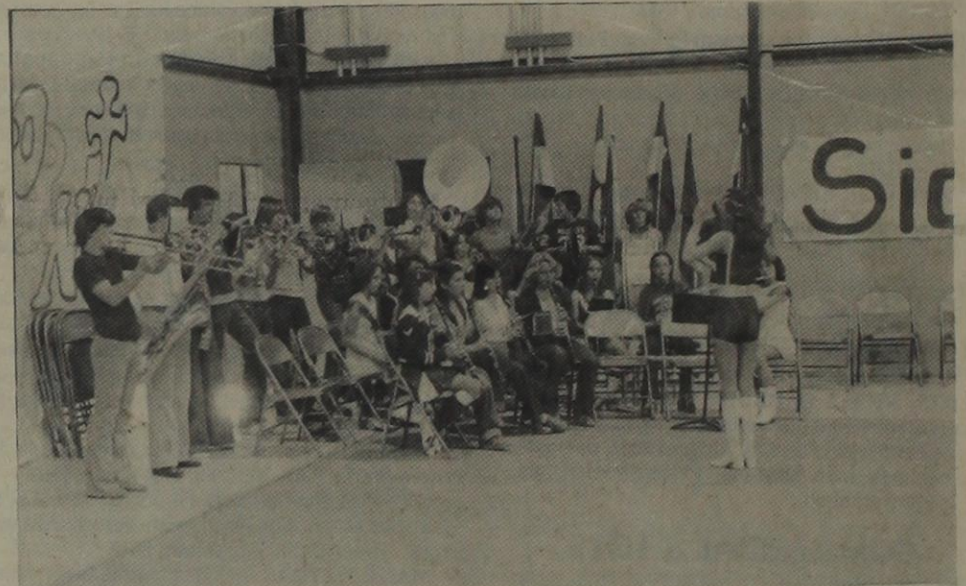

Sales Tax Nets \$616.83

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Monday said Texas cities shared \$22.2 million in rebates from the one-percent local option sales tax for October.

Bullock said this month's allocation pushes 1979 payments to date to more than \$364.6 million, compared to \$329.9 million paid to Texas cities during the same 10-month period in 1978.

Dallas' check for October will be \$2.7 million, raising that city's payments this year to a total of \$43.2 million, up 11 percent over last year's rebates for the same period.

Houston will receive \$4.7 million this month, bringing its yearly total to \$76.4 million, a 10 percent increase over payments through October last year.

Fort Worth will receive an \$ 877,251 allocation for this period for total payments in 1979 of \$14.5 million, a 6 percent increase over payments during 1978.

San Antonio will get \$1.3 million for the allocation period. San Antonio has received \$20.3 million this year, compared to \$19 million during the same period in 1978.

The city sales tax, which is collected by merchants and businesses along with the state's 4 percent sales tax, is rebated monthly by Comptroller's office.

Rising Star received \$580.10 compared to \$616.83 for the same period last year, bringing the 1979 payments to a total of \$12,814.84.

USDA Asks For Comments On 1980 Peanut Program

Washington---The public has until Nov. 15 to make recommendations for the 1980-crop peanut program, Ray Fitzgerald, administrator of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, said today.

Consideration will be given to written comments on the following:

...the amount of the national acreage allotment;

...the amount of the national poundage quota;

and ...the apportionment of such allotment to states.

The secretary of agriculture is required to announce by December 1, a 1980 national acreage allotment of no less than 1,614,000 acres and a 1980 national poundage quota of not less than 1,516,000 short tons (3,032 million pounds).

The national poundage quota will establish the quantity of 1980-crop peanuts eligible for loan at the domestic support rate.

The secretary may increase the quota if for any marketing year he determines estimated requirements for domestic edible use and a reasonable carryover will require additional production. Under the 1979 peanut

program, the national acreage allotment and the poundage quota were established at the legal minimums of 1,614,000 acres and 1,596,000 short tons, respectively.

Proposals on loan rates and program operating provisions will be issued later.

Written comments should be sent to the director, price support and loan division, ASCS-USDA, room 3741, South Building, P.O. Box 2415, Washington, D.C., 2003. Comments will be available for public inspection during normal business hours in the office of the director.

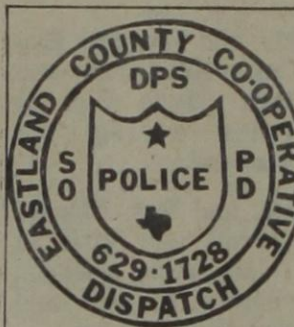

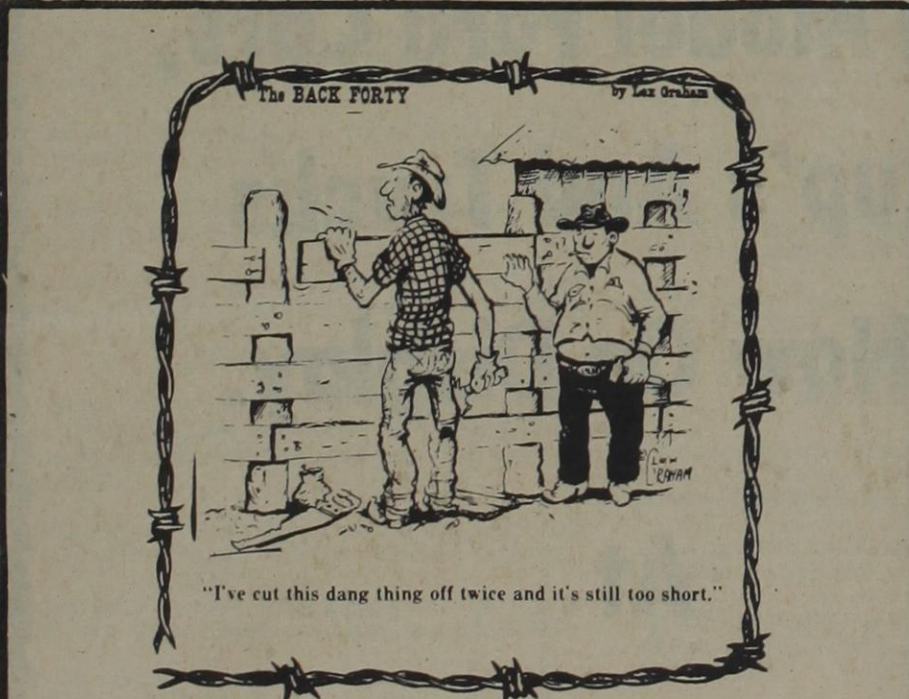

The county-wide hayride and weiner roast was enjoyed by Tabitha Hutton and Travis Parson. They hope the whole thing will be repeated again this year.

Four Japanese youths were honored guests at the Eastland County rally day and won the hearts of all without being able to speak "Texas" English. Travis Parson and Tabitha Hutton regret that the others did not attend this jam-packed ten hours of "learning by doing". They had a chance to learn leather

tooling, sand art, potato printing, frizbee baseball, square dancing, paper folding art taught by the Japanese and all the games, etc. You don't have to be in a contest to be a part of 4-H and have a wonderful time.

All club members are active in church, school and sports and a credit to their club even if they did not enter any contest during the past year. But since this is National 4-H week those members who were active should be presented to their neighbors as bearers of honors for the whole community, as indeed, they are.

Sam was the club president, member of the County 4-H Council, attended the state level camp, placed first at both county and district with a form and ranch management demonstration. His record book on beef swept county and district competition. Had he been old enough it is likely he'd have done very well in state ratings.

Neil's record book on an automotive project was first alternate to state. He served as the boys chairman on the County Council a member of the District 8 Council, a delegate to the Texas 4-H Congress and rated third on a grass judging team at district trials. He also had a public speaking project.

She has not been sorry and can tell all younger members that they can have all the fun she has enjoyed.

Brad Fortune is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Bobby Fortune and is serving as club president. He carried such projects as beef, sheep and gardening the past twelve months. He and teammate Sam Scott placed first at county and district with a farm and ranch management

demonstration. They've topped their competition at district for three topped their competition at district for three years and finally, this year they will be old enough to go to state. Brad's record book on gardening was blue ribbon quality at both county and district. Now that his age will not be stopping him short he will make it to state events.

Jami and Jerry Long are the children of Mr. and Mrs. Rex Long and have sheep as their main projects.

Jami had the grand champion lamb at the Eastland county Livestock Show for the third year straight. He record book on sheep won county competition and placed second at district.

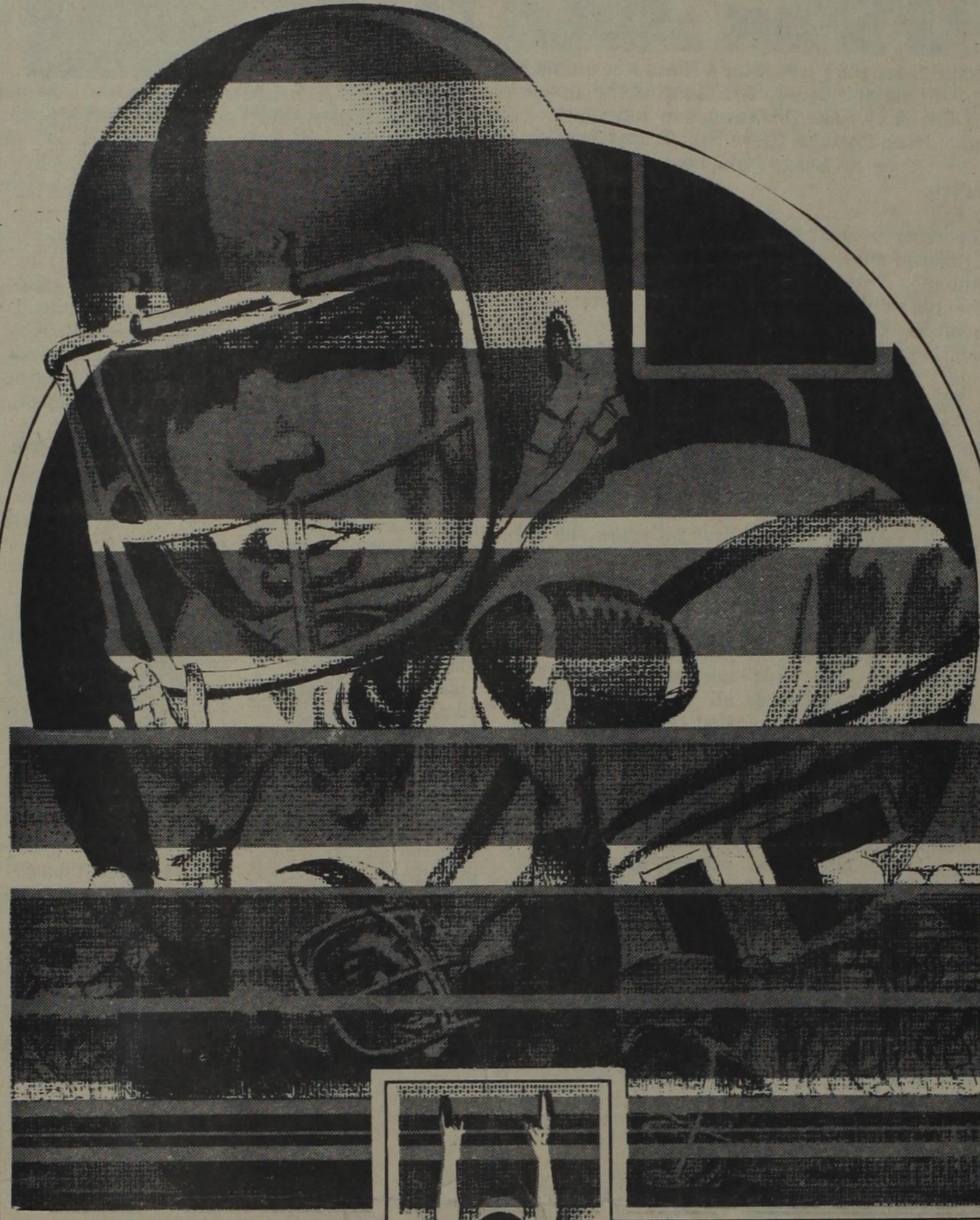
