"HOP" HOPS ON— O.C. "Hop" White, Hurst code enforcement officer put in his last day Friday after 11 years with the city. He will assume the same position in Addison at a higher pay rate. He was honored by his fellow employees at a luncheon Friday.

## Hop White Retires After 11 Years

After 11 years with the city of Hurst, Code Enforcement Officer O.C. "Hop" White said he is leaving to assume the same position in a city half the size for \$10,000 more a year.

He sat back in his brown, leather recliner and sighed. White has enjoyed his time with the city and is proud of his accomplishments, but feels its time to move on.

"I feel it is time. Maybe you get stale in one place," he said.

President of North Central Texas Chapter of International Conference of Building Officials, White has accepted a position with the city of Addison which has a population of 12-15,000.

The city had a luncheon for him Friday, which was his last day and presented him with a briefcase. City Mgr. A.J. Brown said Hop gave the city 11 years of dedicated service.

A Code enforcement officer is responsible for administering and enforcing laws governing planning, zoning, building, electrical, plumbing and mechanical codes.

"A code enforcement officer is about the only protection a consumer has between the builder and the buyer," he said.

If the code doesn't protect the life, safety and general welfare of the citizens, he says it is useless.

HIS MAJOR accomplishment was a complete revision of the Hurst code program. The 1965 Southern Standard Code was revised to the 1979 Uniform Code.

One of the first things White did when he assumed the position was issue permits for the North East Mall. Over the years, he couldn't compute how many permits, have been issued.

He works with several bodies of city government, including the Public Works Department, Planning and Zoning Board of Adjustments (ZBA) and all code boards.

Anytime ZBA meets, he said it is usually to decide on a requested code variance. White explains what the codes and ordinances are, and why. The board hears about 12-15 such requests a year, he said.

ZBA is very powerful, they can grant a variance for anything except property rezoning. Once the ZBA rules, it is law. But, he has not let the power get out of hand.

"I don't let the boards run the city, I'm a stronger code enforcement officer than that. (In the future) let's not let the boards dominate, or get in the habit of granting variances," he said.

White is an athlete turned code enforcement officer. He was born and reared in Rising Star, from there he went to school at Texas A&M University. His parents are Mrs. Oscar White and the late Oscar White, Sr. His wife is the former Louise Whitehead from Cisco.

Although he was an all-around athlete, he excelled in track and hurdling. And he was good. He placed in several Fort Worth and Texas Relays.

In 1942, he was the top man in the Southwestern Relays in Louisiana. He also participated in boxing championships.

Why didn't he make a career out of professional sports?

Professional sports were not lucrative in 1948," he said. When drafted by the St. Louis Cardinals, he was offered a \$5,000 contract as a wide receiver.

After eight

semesters, he got married one summer and never returned to college.

He engaged in contracting work until 1964 when his code enforcement career began as chief inspector in Copper's Cove.

White is looking forward to moving on. Addison is 90-95 percent high-rise commercial buildings now, which he sees as a new challenge.

"One of these days," when he retires, White plans to return to his farm in Rising Star.

# Daughter Of Thornhill's To Wed In April

In 1963, Nelda Lee brought her mother, Onis Lee, and everything she could load in her trunk to Odessa where she took a teaching position in the art department at Ector High School.

Utilizing her background in art history and the fine arts, the Odessan has continued in the field and has recently been recognized by the American Society of Appraisers with their highest award, that of senior certifications after successfully completing a course of

study and intensive examination.

Mrs. Lee earned a bachelor's degree in fine arts from North Texas State University, where she was president of the NTSU art educators, and later entered graduate studies at Texas Tech University in Lubbock and San Miguel de Allende Art Institute in Mexico.

She has studied throughout Europe including museum courses at the Prado in Madrid, Spain; the Louvre in Paris, France; the Vatican in Rome, Italy; the Na-

tional Gallery in Washington, D.C.; the Alte Pinakothek in Munich, Germany; and the Kimbell in Fort Worth.

As the only certified senior appraiser in this area of Texas, Ms. Lee joins a group of only 100 fine arts appraisers in the nation. "Many appraisers devote a majority of their time to estate appraisals and the certification of art objects. The Internal Revenue Service also employs a number of appraisers to handle estates and to evaluate charitable contributions," says the Odessan.

Achieving the possible degree in her field, the gallery owner served two years as an associate appraiser before taking an exam to become a full member of the American Society of Appraisers. After five years as a Society member she was eligible to take the three-part examination leading to a senior appraiser'ship.

"Members of the American Society of Appraisers are expected to maintain a high level of expertise in their fields through continuing education," says Ms. Lee, "and, in turn, are qualified to train persons interested in entering this field."

She points out that there are many

tremendous estates of personal property in the West Texas area, and the field for appraisers is vast. "Appraisers are utilized by bank trust departments, insurance companies, and by individuals. In many cases, when a person purchases a painting or sculpture of value, an appraiser is called in to make an appraisal for insurance purposes."

As a gallery owner as well as an appraiser, she cautions prospective art buyers: "When someone buys an expensive piece of art, they should receive a guarantee that the piece is authentic. And, in many cases, an appraisal will accompany the art.

"Dealers are usually good about allowing the buyer to bring in his or her own appraiser if an appraisal has not been made, prior to the purchase of the work," she adds.

Aside from her professional activities, Ms. Lee is an artist in her own right. She has also been active in several civic endeavors, including the Ector County Committee active in the formation of the Texas Fine Arts Commission, recipient of life membership with the Odessa Chamber for outstanding community service; recipient of special recognition as top fund raiser for the Odessa Family YMCA building fund; a member of the board of directors and county chairperson for the American Heart Association, and member of the board of directors for the Odessa YWCA, to name a few.

She has published numerous art and art history articles for trade magazines, and listed in the International Who's Who in Arts and Antiques since 1976; Outstanding Young Women in America, 1968, 1977; and Who's Who in American Art since 1978, among others.

Ms. Lee is also active in political circles is a member of the Sixth and Jackson Church of Christ, and has a daughter, Jeanna, 8.

Ms. Lee graduated from Rising Star High School, Rising Star, Texas in 1959, as Salutatorian of her class.

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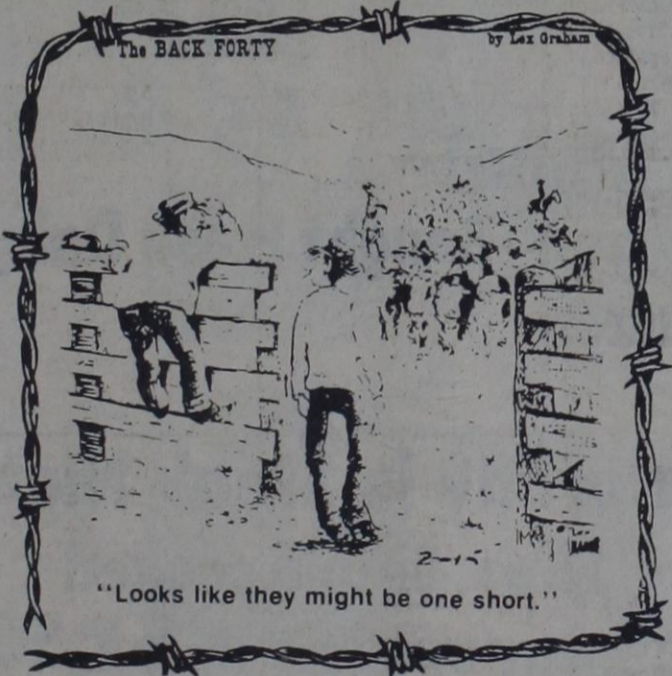

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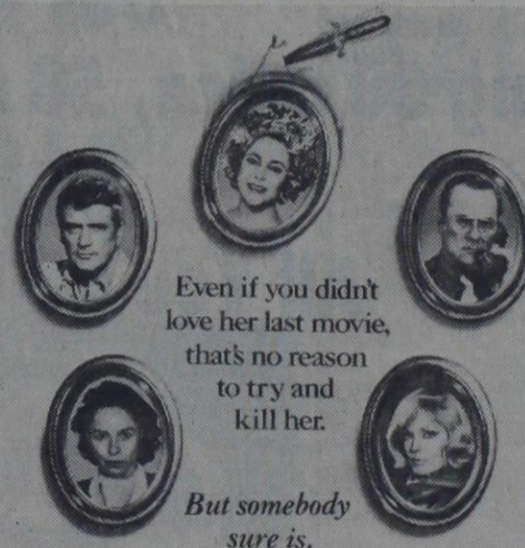

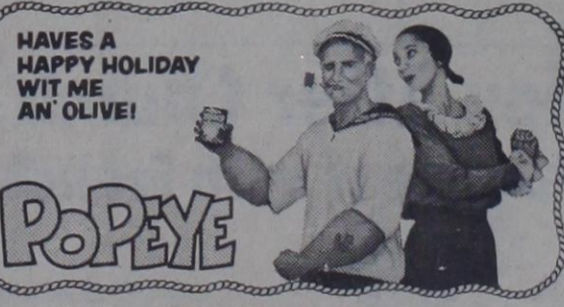

Reading about her, soon made me think of my own personal acquaintance with her. I remembered her reading "Dishpans and Derricks", "Gypsy Heart", "Two Poems," (the two poems being first a dewberry pie made in her kitchen, and then a polished sonnet written at her desk) and others. I remembered one of her favorite quotations, "Now sweet the moonlight sleeps upon the bank." I remember the first honor graduate Gold Medal, awarded by the newly organized Saturday Club and presented Mrs. Robertson. (The irony and humor of this event being that what I received was an empty box, due to the late arrival of the medal. Days later Mrs. Robertson pinned it on my shoulder.) I remember her beautiful hair, her pleasant smile. I remember her encouraging me to become a teacher. I

remember how American and English Literature came alive to me and others she taught. I remember our class party at her home, making candy, (be sure and put a pinch of salt in it, she would say) and the fun of going later to see the play presented under a tent by a traveling theatrical group. Mrs. Robertson was a great educator, as well as a poet Laureate. The last four lines of her "Inland Seas" follows: And when the moon's pale crescent gold dips low Above the wheat where vagrant winds blow through. There comes a moment when I surely know The beauty of an ocean night anew. A typographical error in spelling in my last column, needs to be corrected. The clause "Referring to the Tribune God" should be, "referring to the Triune God." Recent visitors with Mr. and Mrs. W.G. 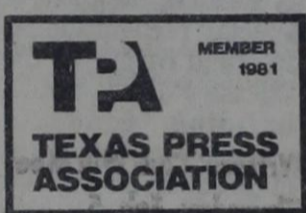

It's taken a while to finally make a commitment to art, but at 71, Maudie Bailey no longer has to worry about raising a family and has returned to her canvases and oils.

January's artist of the month at the Abilene Chamber of Commerce, Mrs. Bailey says the works she's done prove that senior citizens can be productive if they want to be.

And she certainly wants to be. The Abilene Artist is quick to note that if one feels being a senior citizen means being non-productive, then it's likely he or she will be.

Born in Brown County and married in 1928, Mrs. Bailey, whose works hang in the chamber of commerce until February, took art about two months in 1930, but discontinued it to raise a family.

In 1946, "I had a daughter at Abilene

Christian College and one in high school, so I thought I could continue art lessons—but along came another baby (this one a son)."

Her husband being employed by Phillips Petroleum eventually saw them transferred to Louisiana—"out in the swamps." She helped organize clubs for tennis, bridge and bicycling.

Art, however, was forgotten, she said, even after she moved to Abilene in 1953. In 1973, she joined a friend in taking a correspondence course in art.

"It was fun," she said, "but we didn't accomplish very much." Later, as a senior citizen out at Rose Park, she took lessons under Mickey Walker.

"I was 68 years young and this was my first real opportunity for lessons," she said, adding that she helped in painting the mural which is now well-

known at the Rose Park dining room.

Since her lessons, she continues to paint, with some of her most successful pieces being painted on the lids of old paint cans, she said.

The Bailey's formerly lived in Rising Star.

**County Judges, Commissioners To Hold Confab**

COLLEGE STATION--Some 60 county judges and commissioners from throughout Texas will gather here Feb. 17-19 to discuss issues for more effective county government.

The 23rd annual County Judges and Commissioners Conference at the Ramada Inn will feature such notables as Gov. Bill Clements, Attorney General Mark White, Texas Commissioner of Agriculture Reagan Brown, and U.S. Rep. Phil Gramm.

Gramm will deliver the keynote address on Wednesday morning, Feb. 18. White will also speak at that session. Clements and Brown are scheduled to address the conference on Thursday morning, says John Gilmarin, county officials program specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

The first day's program will feature a special session for county judges on handling DWI (driving while intoxicated) trials while county commissioners will hear about programs concerning maintenance of rural roads, weed and brush control along rural roads, and mosquito control.

Among other speakers on Wednesday will be W.J. Estelle, Jr., of Huntsville, director of the Texas Department of Corrections, who will discuss TDC industries, and State Rep. John Whitmire of Houston who will talk about rapport between county officials and state senators and representatives. There will also be discussions on computerization of county operations and rural county fire prevention districts.

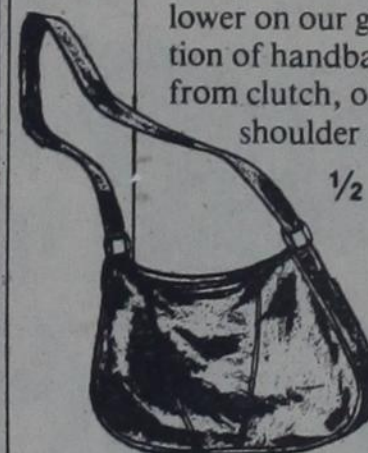

## Greater Mountain Top Pentecostal Church Burns Note On Annex Debt

The Greater Mountain Top Pentecostal Church board and Pastor burned a note on a debt for the church's annex last Sunday. The Mountain Top Church added the annex to house the educational facilities, game rooms for the youth, dining hall and complete modern kitchen, some year and a half ago. The note was scheduled to be paid "off" in 1986, but due to the faithful congregation's monthly offerings the note was paid for, some five and one half years early.

Reverend John C. Jones came to the church to pastor in Spring of '68, and during that time the church has moved from the "old" location approximately one quarter of a mile off highway 183 to the present property with highway frontage. The new sanctuary was built and then followed the annex. The church property has paved parking areas, beautifully appointed sanctuary, and one of Cisco's largest congregations. The membership has shifted during the past

thirteen years from basically rural to basically "Cisco" membership. ### COMMENTARY By Myrtle Owen

The Time Of Jacob's Trouble; For nearly two thousand years, we have been living in a parenthesis, a pro-

phetic interval, a time "in between." Daniel's prophecy in the vision of the seventy weeks called for a period of 490 years when God would deal especially with Israel. 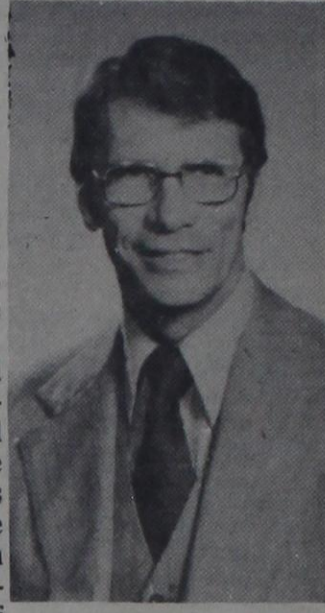
