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

Oil is Russia's major weapon produce it more cheaply than it can be produced in this Country, but this maybe incidental. She can sell and barter oil at whatever price suits her convenience. The result is to upset and to depress world prices; to disrupt the internal economy of producing nations.

The publisher of "Oil World" says, "Bartering this low cost necessity of life for Western commodities provides the spearhead for political penetration into the heart of a nation. Witness sugar and nickel for Red oil in Cuba - coffee for Red oil in Brazil - steel products, tubular goods, synthetic rubber and diesel engines for Red oil in Italy.

"So powerful a weapon is oil barter, Europe can be expected to increase its trade beyond the Iron Curtain."

Our government realizes that it is necessary for many nations to engage in foreign trade in order to survive. Both England and Japan are good examples. As a matter of fact, it is necessary for our own country, as sufficient as we are in many things, to trade in order to maintain our present strength and standard of living. We should, however, find ways to supply free world needs and absolutely cut off vital trade with the Soviet bloc. There is good evidence that Russia itself is perhaps 20 years behind us in industrial output, but we are helping her catch up at a more rapid rate than we ourselves

are advancing. In the case of Cuba there is good reason to believe that a "quarantine" such as was imposed last October could dry up her economy in a matter of months to the point of total col-

Our free enterprise system in the world must find ways to compete with a socialistic economy which Lenin said 43 years ago would destroy capitalism.





HOW TO PREPARE AND BAKE FROZEN DOUGH

3 to 4 weeks.

1. As soon as you remove the rolls from the freezer, place them in warm greased muffin tins over hot water, out of any draft, to rise. You may wish to remove the rolls from the paper cups because paper is a good insulator and tends to slow the warming of the dough; or you may wish to set the cups of dough on racks where the warm, moist air can circulate around them. Rolls spread out on baking sheets where they have no support tend to increase in size by spreading out rather than rising.

2. Let the rolls rise in a warm, moist place until light (from 1 to 2 hours). If the rolls rise slowly, "off" flavors may develop and coarse flattened cells and thick, tough crusts may form.

3. Bake the rolls in the usual way at 400 F. If desired, package the dough for rolls without shaping it into rolls in a flat sheet in the same manner as bread dough then thaw and shape the rolls in a similar
