Through The Editor's Specs

With this issue of The Rising Star, this newspaper begins the 78th year of its existence. Uneer one name or another and a succession of editors, it has gone on, year after year, chronicling local history as it happened and providing a medium of fact and opinion which has made a definite contribution to the development of its area.

Seventy-seven is a lot of years. It is almost as long as this town is old.

But, as a matter of fact, most newspapers in our area began existence very soon after their towns were established. This is a significant fact of our free society. No sooner was a pioneer settlement founded than a newspaper began to be published.

It didn't take much to start newspapers back in those days. A hand cranked press and a shirttail full of type was about all that was needed. An entire print shop could be carried upon the back of a mule—at least in a hack drawn by one of the animals.

It didn't take a great deal of business ability to run a frontier newspaper. It took an element we designate by an unmelodius 4-letter synonym for intestinal fortitude and a goosequil dipped in nitric acid. A lot of that was squirted back and forth in those days as rival editors battled for field and virtue. The history of the Star contains at least one of those much dramatized episodes of western gunplay. Two editors "shot it out" in a street battle and one of them was killed.

The victor, I am told, later became a Methodist preacher.

But for all the uncouth and "personal" journalism of the frontier, we owe to it much of the credit for the liberties we noy enjoy. It gave our pioneering folk a medium for enlightment and public debate on issues formative of our way of life, and for the exposure of evil in a day when individuality ran to violent extremes. Most of the editors of those days were men of courage and remarkable vision. They were children of n their time, and a yeasty time it was!

The challenges of today are more subtle, more "sophisticated", but none the less real and serious. The responsibility that lies upon the Amican press and the other great media of fact, opinion and communication is awesome in a time when so many "isms" attempt to lure our people from the virtues of democracy and a self-reliant freedom.

But so long as it meets that responsibility, so long as it remains responsible to its own conscience and dedicated to the enlightenment and the welfare of the people who read and listen, our democratic system has a means of correcting its own errors and strayings.

In this day of bigness, the emphasis is laid upon our large metropolitan journals and our great TV and radio combines. The role of the small daily and the country weekly is often lost to sight in the mammoth complex of modern journal-

But each of these small papers has a definite and vital part to play in the vast drama of our day, an important responsibility to its own field, a challenge to do the job where it is. And that job is a part (Continued on Page Eight)

State election law regulations will apply in both elections.

The general election box will be located in the dining room of the American Legion Hall on South Main. Charles Ballew will be the election judge and he wlil be assisted by; Fred Price, Mrs. Love Shults, Mrs. Lila White, Mrs. Frank Gray, Mrs. Woodie Chambers, Mrs. J. R. Bucy and Mrs. Ozzie Burns.

The polls will open at 8 a.m. and close at 7 p.m. While no poll tax will be required for voting, voters between the ages of 21 and 60, inclusive, must have been registered as such, and those who paid their poll taxes early in the year are automatically registered. Those who registered during the special registration period in the Spring are of course, eligible.

Persons who were over 60 years of age in 1965 are not required to register in this county and may vote without having 1, 1965, however to be exempt.



Altom Explains Requirements Of Registration Law

Recent conflicting statements have resulted in misunderstandings about voter registration requirements, Eastland County Tax Assessor - Collector Edgar

"Section 34 of the Texas Elecquilt was finished and another tion Code gives uc the qualifications and requirements for voting, " he said.

"Every person subject to none of the foregoing disqualifications who shall have attained the age of twenty-one years and who shall be a citizen of the Unite? States and who shall have resided in the state one year next preceeding an election and the last six months within the district or County in which such person offers to vote and who shall have registered as a voter, if required to do so, shall be deemed a qualified elector," he quoted from the law.

Any qualified elector who is over sixty (60) years of age on the day of an election at which he offers to vote and who does not reside in a city of ten thousand (10,00) or more inhabittants may vote at the election without having registered as a

In other words, no person between the age of 21 and 60 will be be permitted to vote unless he has registered in accordance with the provisions of this code,

"41A states that the county tax collector-assessor of each county in this state shall be the registrar of voters in that coun-

Registration period began Oct. 1, 1966 and will end Jan. 31, 1967. Those persons registering in this period will be qualified to vote from Feb 1 1967 to Feb. 29, 1968, he explained. Applications for registration may be obtained at the Chamber of Commerce office in Cisco, the City Hall and Jenkins Insurance Agency in Rising Star, Todd's Variety Store in Gorman, and the Commercial State Bank in Ranger. These may be mailed to Edgar Altom tax assessor-collector, Box 389, Eastland, Texas and certificates will be written and mailed to applicants at no charge, Altom

The registration certificate of a person who registers before he becomes a qualified elector (21 years of age) shall have stamped or written thereon the following: Not entitled to vote before (blank) date on which he will become a qualified elector to be inserted in the blank).

The same notion shall also be placed opposite his name on the list of registered voters, Altom explained.

The following suggestions for speeding Christmas mail delivery were offered this week by Postmaster Cliffogene Witt; Mail for Armed Forces Over-

Christmas parcels and greeting cards by surface transpor_ tation should be mailed by Nov. 10. Air mail parcels should be mailed from Dec. 1 to Dec. 10.

Matches of all kinds and lighter fluids may not be mailed to overseas addresses. Cigarettes, other tobacco p.oducts, coffee and other various items are prohibited in parcels addressed to some military post offices.

All articles should be packed in boxes of wood, metal, solid fiberboard, or strong double faced corrugated fiberboard. All fiberboard boxes should be securely wrapped in heavy paper. Each box should be well tied with strong cord and have sufficient cushioning material to prevent any rattling or loosening of articles within the box and to prevent crushing of the

A slip showing list of contents and names and addressesof the sender and addressee, should be enclosed in each parcel mailed, whether overseas or domes-

Domestic Mail:

Gift parcels for distant states should be mailed before Dec. 5 to insure delivery before Christmas, and those for nearby areas shoud be mailed by Dec. 15.

Greeting cards for distant states should be mailed not later than Dec. 10, and those for nearby areas by Dec. 15.

Greetings cards prepaid at first-class rates may be sealed and contain messages, and will be given priority of dispatch, delivery and forwarding. Also undeliverable first-class mail is returned to the sender at no additional cost if the return address is shown on the envelpoe.

Be sure the address on all mail is clear, legible and complete with zip code. Your local post office employees will be happy to supply you with needed zip codes of your regular correspondents.

Ask for the beautiful Special Christmas Stamp which will go on sale at your local post office Nov. 2.




