Funeral services were conducted Tuesday afternoon for Mrs. Alva Beatrice Jenkins, 73, longtime Rising Star civic leader and wife of A.D. Jenkins, Rising Star agent and Chamber of Commerce manager. Mrs. Jenkins died at 12:20 a.m. Monday, August 2, 1976 in E.L. Graham Memorial Hospital in Cisco following a 21 day illness. Services for Mrs. Jenkins were at 4:30 p.m. Tuesday August 3 at the First Baptist Church. Burial was in Rising Star Cemetery with Higginbotham Funeral Home directing. Officiating were Rev. Dick Williams, pastor of the First Baptist Church and Owen Aikin, minister of the Rising Star Church of Christ. Mr. Jenkins, affectionately known as "Grandma", was born October 20, 1902 in Comanche. The daughter of the late John Henry and Ginny Thompson, she received her public school education in Comanche. She moved to Rising Star with her family in 1923 from Ranger. At this time she was employed by the Frank Robertson Insurance Agency here. She married A.D. Jenkins on October 16, 1926 in Ranger. Mrs. Jenkins continued with the Robertson firm until 1952 when she and her husband purchased the company and it thus became Jenkins Insurance Agency. Her death marked the end of a 53 year career in the insurance business in Rising Star. In April of this year, both Mr. and Mrs. Jenkins were honored for their long service to the Trinity Universal Insurance Company of Dallas. They were presented a plaque in recognition of Mrs. Jenkins' 50 years with the company and Mr. Jenkins' 25 year tenure. In February of 1975 the Jenkins were honored by the Rising Star Chamber of Commerce at the annual chamber dinner for their long service to the local chamber. Mr. Jenkins was recognized for having served 23 years as secretary-manager and Mrs. Jenkins was also recognized for her devotion to the chamber of commerce and for the supportive work she did for this organization. Mrs. Jenkins was a longtime member of the First Baptist Church. She is survived by her husband, Adrian of Rising Star; one daughter, Johnnie Sue Enciso of Dallas; two sons, Don Jenkins of Gainsville and Bob Jenkins of Houston; one sister, Mrs. Lila white of Rising Star; nine grandchildren and four great grandchildren. MAPLE APPLE PIE Pastry for two-crust pie: 6 cups sliced pared apples 1 cup maple syrup 2 tablespoons flour 1 teaspoon cinnamon 1/2 teaspoon Morton Lite 'Salt' mixture 2 tablespoons unsalted polyunsaturated margarine Milk

Prepare pastry. Roll out bottom crust, fitting into 9-inch pan. Allow 1 inch overhang. Roll out top crust and set aside. Arrange apples into lined pie plate. Combine syrup, flour, cinnamon and salt. Pour over apples. Dot top with margarine. Cut slits in top crust to permit escape of steam. Cover pie. Seal and flute edges. Brush pie with a little milk. Place pie on a cookie sheet in oven. Bake at 425 degrees for about 50 minutes, or until nicely browned. Makes one 9-inch pie.

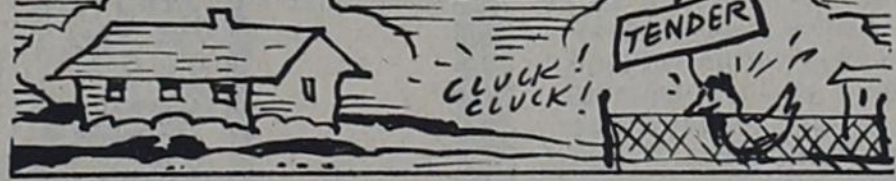

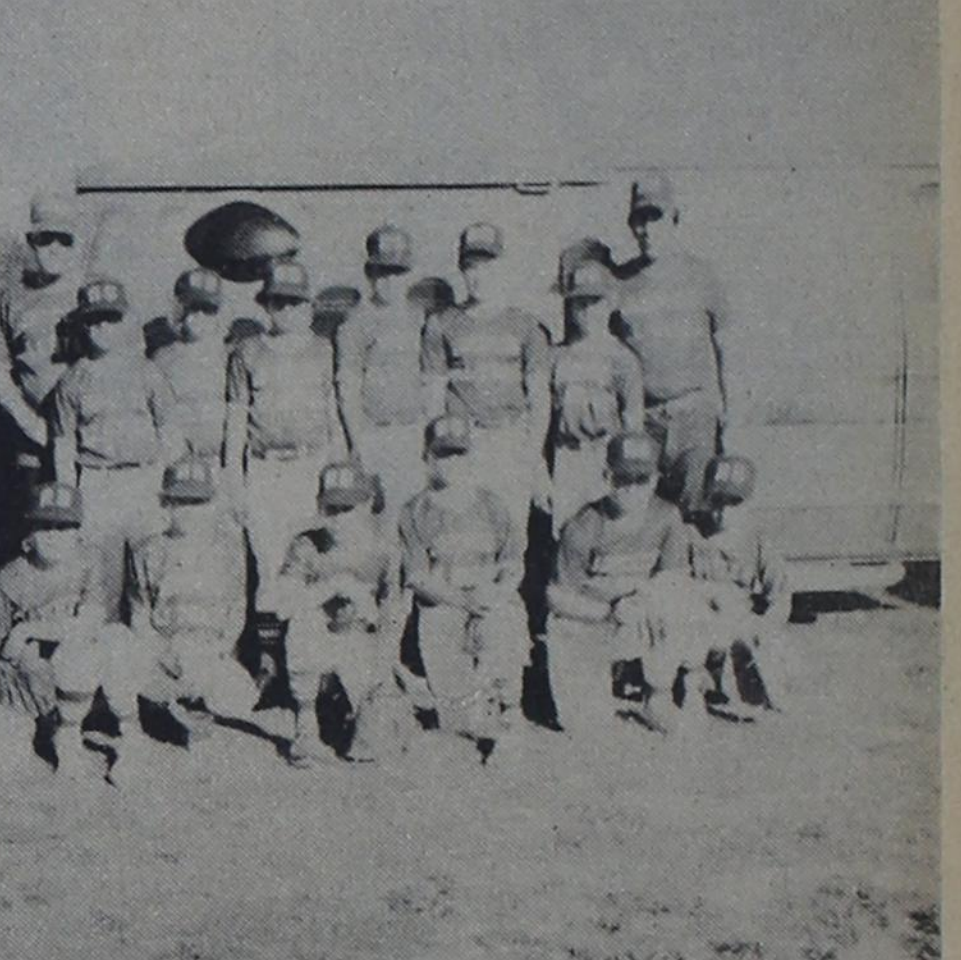
SAFETY CORNER Expect the Unexpected



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Texas Taxes



By BOB BULLOCK, State Comptroller

AUSTIN—Inheritance Tax exemptions for surviving family members should be increased to ease the financial burden imposed on many Texans, particularly residents of rural areas, by a tax law enacted more than 50 years ago.

The Inheritance Tax Division of the Comptroller's Department is now conducting a study for me so that I can recommend to the next Legislature an exemption level that would help out the heirs of smaller estates without significantly affecting state tax revenue.

The present exemption of \$25,000 for the surviving spouse and each surviving child was set in 1923 and has not been changed since.

That \$25,000 back in 1923 would be worth about \$79,000 today. And rural land that sold for \$20 or \$25 an acre then would sell for \$350 to \$750 an acre now.

The unfortunate result of having an exemption level which has not kept pace with changes in the economy and the value of the dollar is that some rural citizens—farm and ranch families—are occasionally compelled to sell part of their family owned land in order to pay the combined inheritance and

estate taxes.

There's no question that it is an inequitable system. The small farmers and ranchers already have enough trouble trying to stay in business and keep from being squeezed out. And family owned farms and ranches are important to the continued health of the Texas economy.

What I am interested in doing is setting a fair exemption level that would be as realistic in 1976 as \$25,000 was in 1923, while not significantly reducing the \$50 million in Inheritance Tax the state collects each year.

The Comptroller's Department is working closely with the Ways and Means Committee of the Texas House of Representatives, the State Bar of Texas, the Texas Farmers Union, and the Texas Farm Bureau in order to develop a reasonable and acceptable exemption level.

Re-Elects Cunningham

Austin—Delegates at the second annual state convention of the Independent Cattlemen's Association have ranked relief from rising property taxes and defeat of state and federal land use legislation high on the Association's agenda for the coming year.

Calls for action on taxes and land use were among several policy resolutions adopted at the four-day convention of ICA members from over the state.

The delegates also reelected Golaid rancher T.A. Cunningham as president. Other officers elected were Dr. C.E. Payne, a Bryan veterinarian, first vice president; Roy Wheeler, Pleasanton, second vice president; John Nelson, Hempstead, secretary; and Bill Whitehead, Sonora, treasurer.

The tax resolution said that farm and ranch lands have reached their limits in property tax burdens and called on all taxing authorities to seek other sources of revenue. The resolution also called on ICA to seek coverage for "all family farms and ranches" of state constitutional provisions for assessment of rural lands at agricultural productivity value.

The land use resolution said that ICA "rejects all contentions that state government land use planning is an acceptable option" to federal land use threats which ICA has fought since its beginning.

Keynote speakers during the convention included Sen. John Tower, U.S. Rep. Bob Krueger, U.S. Rep. Alan Steelman, former Gov. Allan Shivers, Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby, Texas Animal Health Commission chairman Norman Moser of DeKalb, Sen. Bill Patman of Ganado, Rep. Joe Hubenak of Rosenberg, and Rep. Susan Gurley McBee of Del Rio.

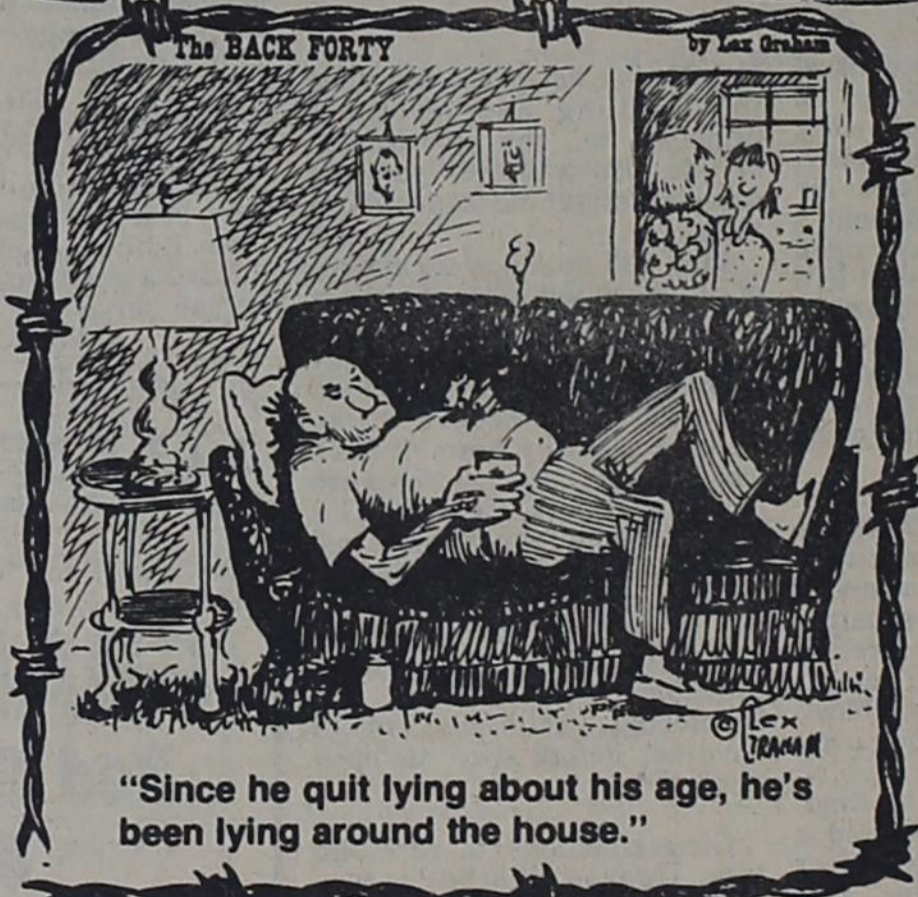

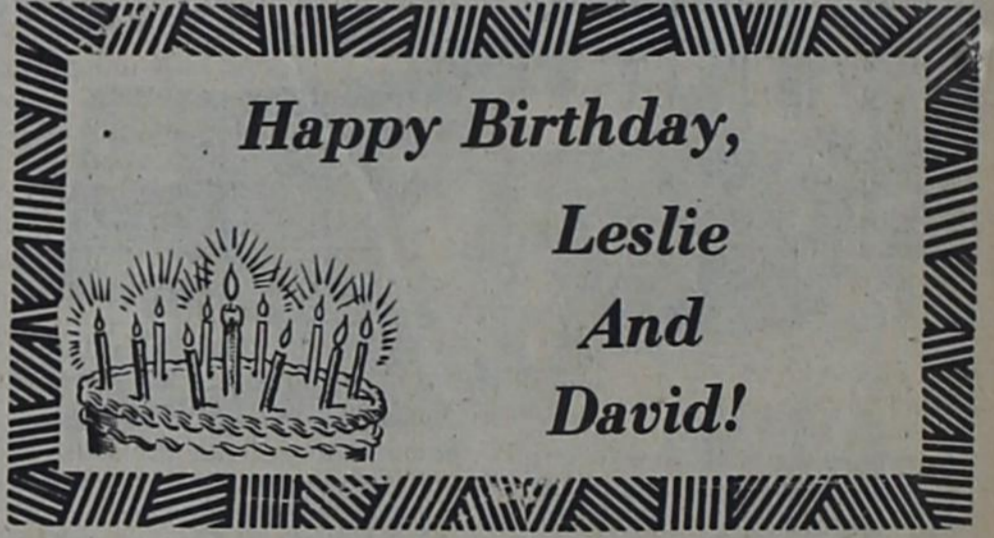
