

expect a heavy infestation of weevils. The pecan weevile has a two year life cycle and two years ago the infestation was heavy. The soil moisture in most areas of Eastland is ideal for emergence of the weevils.

The adult weevil is a brownish weevil about three eights long. The weevils snout is as long as the body. If the weevil punctures the pecan while it is in the water stage the nut falls. After the nut kernels have hardened, the female chews a hole in the shell and deposits her eggs in little pickets in the nuts. Creamy white grubs with reddish brown heads hatch and feed inside the nuts during the fall, completely consuming the kernel and finally reaching a length of about three fifths inch. The grubs then chew a hole about 1/8 inch in diameter in the shell, emerge from the nut and drop to the ground in late fall or winter. They burrow into the ground where they stay for two

Jarring of limbs gives an indication of weevil presence in trees. To accomplish this, place a large sheet under a tree and jar the limbs with a padded pole. Weevils will drop to the ground and remain motionless for a short period of time.

When you find an average of three weevils per tree control measures should be applied. Two to four applications of Carbaryl (Sevin) made at 4 to 12 day intervals will give effective control of the adult pecan weevil.

Mulches are important for the fall vegetable garden to conserve moisture and reduce soil temperature. But gardeners should be aware that diseases and insect pests can be introduced with some mulches.

For example, memtodes can be brought into the garden, particularly when using peanut hulls as a mulch. Peanut hulls do serve as a carrier of root knot and lesion nematodes which attack garden vegetables.

In addition to the nematode problem, organic mulches such as grass clippings, leaves and plant debris have the possibility of increasing a disease known as Southern blight. Southern blight is a fungus that lives on organic material in or near the soil surface. During the summer after an extremely dry period followed by scattered showers, plants may begin to wilt and die rapidly. The base of the plants may show a white fungal growth with small light tan to dark brown structures the size of a pin head or so. These are

Work For A Better **Spring Lawn**

SPRING LAWN--A homeowner can take a few steps to insure a weed-free winter lawn and good recovery of the lawn next spring, notes a turfgrass specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Control such lawn insects as chinch bugs, white grubs and armyworms since weeds will quickly invade insect damaged areas. Protect Against Credit Card Loss

loss to avoid problems and financial burdens.

Millions of credit cards are lost or stolen each year with millions of dollars of unauthorized purchases made on these cards, says Claudia Kerbel, a consumer information specialist.

Consumers are partially protected against financial losses when credit cards are lost or stolen. The federal Truth-in-Lending Act provides that the maximum liability of a credit card holder is \$50 for unauthorized charges made

on a credit card. However, many consumers carry a number of credit cards and if, for example, they lose 10 cards,

they are liable for \$500, Ms. Kerbel points out. Ms. Kerbel is with the Texas Agricultural Ex-

tension Service, The Texas A&M University System. To avoid problems and financial burdens of credit card loss, follow these tips: 1. Cut up and throw away all cards not needed or used

regularly. 2. Maintain in a

safe place a list of all credit

cards and their numbers. 3.

Protect against credit card Keep a list of the toll-fee numbers to contact if cards

are lost. Most companies that provide credit cards will provide a postage paid postcard to send in the event that the credit card is lost or stolen. Keep this in a safe place becuase it will show the credit card number as well as a toll-free number to call. 4. Notify the issuer of a lost card immediately. 5 Upon receiving a new card, sign it immediately. 6. 

The annual Fall Harvest Festival unfolds Sept. 15-17 at the Dallas Farmer's Market to the sounds of banjos, mandolins and



For Cattle

Proper manage-ment of the beef cattle herd is important during hot summer weather to avoid production losses and possibly even some deaths, emphasizes a beef cattle specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. 
