· Over at Brownwood a passel of Baptists have ganged up to publish-or should I say republish — the memoirs of a frontier Methodist preacher, which may or may not indicate the degree to which the ecumenical movement has progressed in these enlightened times.

The result is no literary masterpiece, but it does offer an interesting and intimate view of life as it was lived in the raw and rocky days after the Civil War when our more aggressive ancestors, fleeing the economic wreckage of the Old South, sought harborage and a new Beginning in the Southwest.

The basis of the book is an autography of the Rev. Peter W. Gravis, first published at Comanche in 1892 and entitled. "Twenty-Five Years on the Outside Row."

The ancient book is written with more fervor than literary merit, but its somewhat sketchy accounts of brushes with the Indians and now and then with the brethern of other doctrinesand its on-the-spot accounts of the hardships of West Texas frontier life make interesting and imaginative reading. One wishes the writer had been more specific in his detail.

Of particular value to those who would read the memoirs in more depth and understanding is a scholarly section of notes by Dr. T. R. Havins, professor-emeritus of history at Howard Payne College, and James W. Day, director of State Archives at the Texas State Library. Publisher of the book is the Cross Timbers Press at Brownwood, a pseudonym for Clark Courey, a former Rising Star boy and owner of the Banner Printing Company.

What impressed me most reading the book is its reflection of the zeal and fervor of those frontier preachers. They were dedicated men. They had to be. No doubt theirs was the spirit of most of those pioneers who came westward to establish the foundations of the society in which we live so luxuriously today. We complain of drouths, the heat, the cold, of slow business, high taxes, inflation and a lot of other troubles, fancied and real-

But how many of us who now sit on cushioned pews in air-conditioned churches, listening to the eloquences of a college-trained minister would be willing to follow a Master they now so comfortably adnit into a wilderness where:

"Part of the time in the winter I slept on the flooron my overcoat, with my boots for a pillow. I kept warm by keeping up a roaring fire, and as one side would get warm, I would turn the other, and thus kept turning from side to side, through many long winter nights. My assessment for support was only four hundred dollars and



Hutton succeeds Oscar L. Schaefer whose term expired on July 1. The new county committeman resides near the Sabanno community, where his farm holdings are located. He is farming approximateld 230 acres of peanuts this year. Hutton was one of the first persons to irrigate peanuts in Eastland County, and he has had success in this venture. He has a herd of commercial cattle in addition to his crop farming enterprize.

Mr. Hutton joins Coda A. Me-Daniel and Truit Morris on the committee. The purpose of the county committee is to act on the eligibility of individual applications for all types of FHA loans in Eastland County. They also review borrower's progress, aid the county supervisor in adapting the agent's loan policies to local conditions, and offer technical agriculture advice.

The Eastland County FHA office is now processing three Com munity facility loan applications. They are for a rural water sysem at Morton Valley, a recreation area at Cisco., and a peanut drying plant and storage facilities at Pioneer. Two community facility loans have already been closed. One for water system at Olden, and one for the Lakewood Recreation Center near Pioneer. The five projects involve loans amounting to approximately 747.000.




