HIGGINBOTHAM'S

It Has Been

A former farmer and blacksmith was ordained to preach on Easter Sunday 1894, at the Amity Baptist Church, which he helped to organize in 1878. This was the first Baptist church to organize in this section.

Nine persons of Baptist faith met under a brush arbor they had built from trees cut from a nearby forest, and organized the church.

This preacher was none other than the loved and revered Rev. S. C. Steel, known all over this area as "Bro. Steel". Once he said laughingly, "I traded my pistol for a Bible in the spring of 1894, when I was ordained to preach."

Shortly after his ordination "Bro. Steel" was called as pastor of the Pleasant Valley Church in the northern part of Brown county. This was the first church he pastored. He continued to pastor the church all of his lifetime. However he pastored other churches in Brown and surrounding counties.

Mr. Steel came to Texas from

Arkansas in 1865, settling in Hunt County.

Along with eight others, he and Mrs. Steel came to this section in three ox-wagons in 1867 and settled in the Amity community. He is credited with building the fourth log cabin in the community. He dug the second well.

In the party that came to this area was Thomas Steel, father of S. C. Steel. The father was born in 1804 and died in 1879 and is buried in the Amity Cemetery.

The first blacksmith shop in Eastland County was established in 1871, by this would be preacher, at the site of Rising Star, on the main stage line from Cisco to Brownwood. Mr. Steel operated the shop for a time and sold it to Eli Cox and Joe Cone. He then went to May and opened a blacksmith shop there.

The Rev. Mr. Steel saw Brownwood for the first time in May, 1876. He and five neighbors were traveling from their homes in the Amity community, to the south

west to see the country. Brownwood was an out post of civilization; only a few stores and homes there. The Pecan Bayou was on a rise and the party forded the stream and went on to the Colorado river. The river was so high and waters so swift they dared not ford it and they turned back and made their way home.

Wild game was plentiful in this country, said Mr. Steel, and a good marksman could ride along and shoot all the meat he needed for the use of his family.

The first steam boiler ever brought to Brown county was hauled from Fort Worth by Mr. Steel in 1877 for the late John T. Yantis and his father. The Yantis established the first steam gin and mill at Clio, in northern Brown county. The boiler was hauled by five yokes of oxen, and took a month to make the trip.

Mr. Steel attended the first Baptist church organized at Rising Star in 1882 about one mile east of the present site of the town. He went to Sipe Springs for mail, as did all the people at May, Cross Cut, Cross Plains and other communities.

In May, 1883 "Bro. Steel" took his first degree as a Mason at Sipe Springs. He was the first elected Worshipful Master of the Rising Star Lodge.

It has been said of this man. "He officiated in more marriages and preached more funerals than any other preacher in this section of Texas."

Rev. Steel made his home in May for many years. He was an unusually strong man and had not been previously ill. He ate a hearty lunch at his home on April 6, 1934. Shortly after noon he was stricken by an apparent heart attack and died immediately.

One of the largest crowds ever to have attended a funeral gathered to pay tribute to this man of God, "Bro. Steel."

Browsing With Bev

Mushrooms, once used mainly in gourmet cooking, are being used for a wide variety of purposes. Mushrooms can be broiled, sauteed, simmered, marinated and serve in raw salads. They complement meat, poultry, fish, eggs and other vegetables, mushrooms are low in calories and rich in iron.

Fresh mushrooms should feel dry and firm. Small brown spots on the crown mean the mushroom is ripe, not spoiled. The size of a mushroom is not related to its age and does not have any particular effect in quality or taste.

If not used immediately, mushrooms should be refrigerated in a shallow tray covered by a soft, moist towel. Moisten the towel each day to keep the mushrooms fresh. When ready to use, run cold water over the mushrooms and wipe dry with a paper towel. Do not soak them. If you like, snip off the stem but do not peel the crowns. Much of a mushroom's nourishment and flavor is in the peel.

Never cook mushrooms more than ten minutes or they lose their natural moisture. Canned mushrooms may be used in place of where raw mushrooms are specified. Crowns are best suited for garnishing meats. Buttons slices and bits and pieces are best for sauces, gravies soups, omelets and casseroles. Frozen mushrooms require little thawing and can be use in place of fresh ones. Dehydrated mushrooms are often used in soups. Never pick wild mushrooms to eat. Some are mildly poisonous and only someone professionally trained can determine these poisonous species.

THE FAMILY LAWYER



PRIZE CONTEST

"COUNT THE DOTS AND WIN A COLOR TV!"

So sad the poster in a furniture store window. In case of a tie, duplicate prizes were to be awarded.

Sure enough, two contestants—a man and a woman—turned in answers that were exactly right. After due deliberation, the store named the woman as the winner on grounds of "neatness and legibility." The man was offered a small radio as a consolation prize.

But when the man filed suit, the court held that he too was entitled to a television set. The court said the store had no right to make new rules after the contestants, by submitting their entries, had already accepted the original offer.

For the contract created in a prize contest is just as binding in the eyes of the law as any other kind of contract. A winning contestant can enforce his rights in court.

But suppose the rules say: "The decision of the contest judges shall be final."

Even then, if judges tamper with the rules or use other trickery to foil a winner, the law will still uphold his claim to whatever he has legitimately won.

On the other hand you cannot insist on a prize if you yourself have not lived up to the rules. For example,

A car dealer offered a valuable gift certificate as first prize in a drawing. But according to the rules of the contest ticket stubs had to be deposited "in person" at the dealer's showroom.

As it turned out, the holder of the winning number had sent his stub in by messenger. A court ruled later that, since he had not complied with the terms of the offer, he had not earned a right to the prize.

What if the contest is an illegal lottery? Then, even if you do win, you should not expect a court to enforce your claim. As a general rule, the courts will not lend their aid to carry out an illegal contract.

The Supreme Court has given the reason: No court of justice can be made the handmaid of iniquity. There can be no legal remedy for that which is itself illegal." 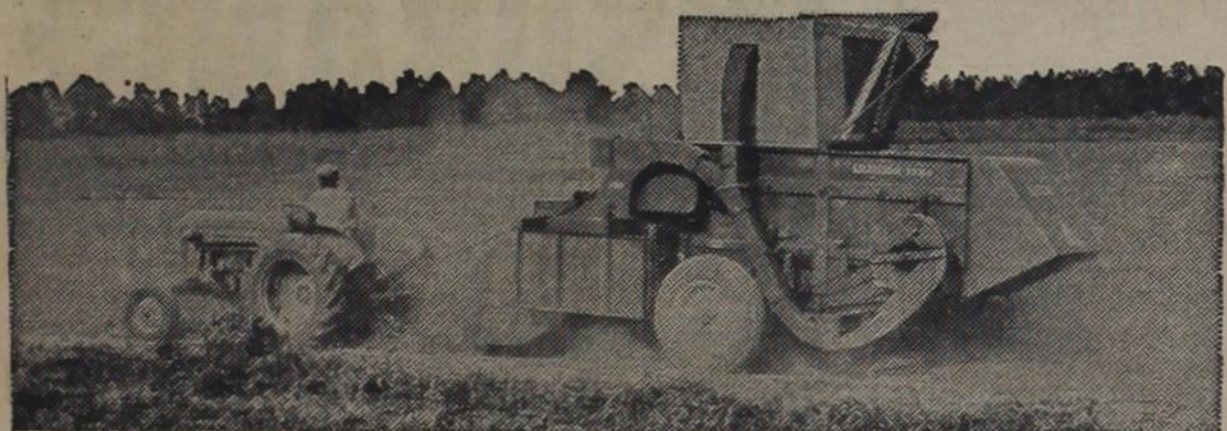

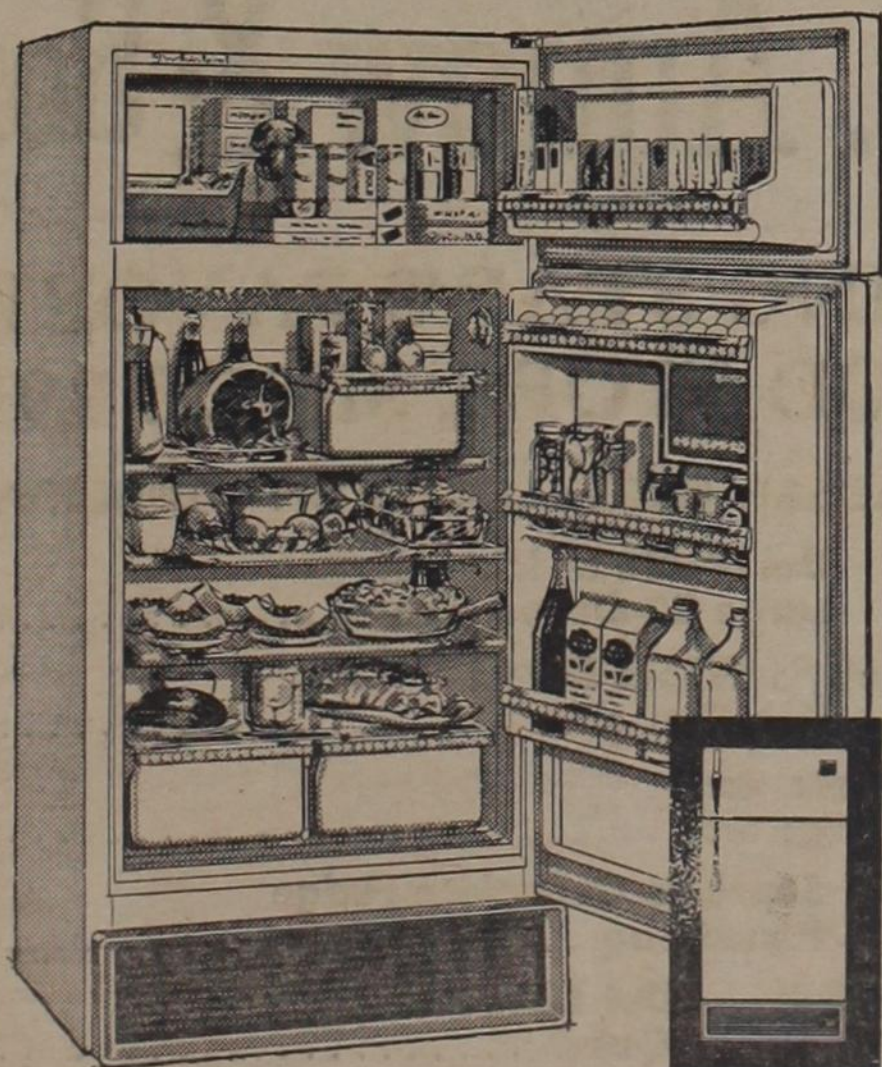

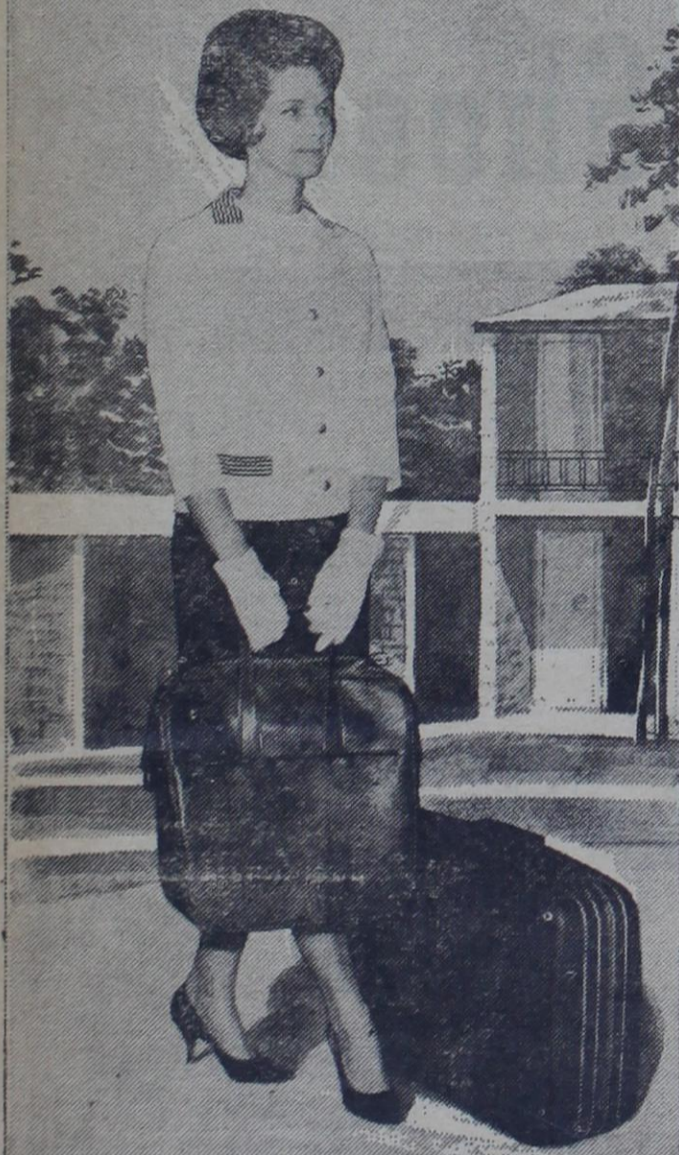
