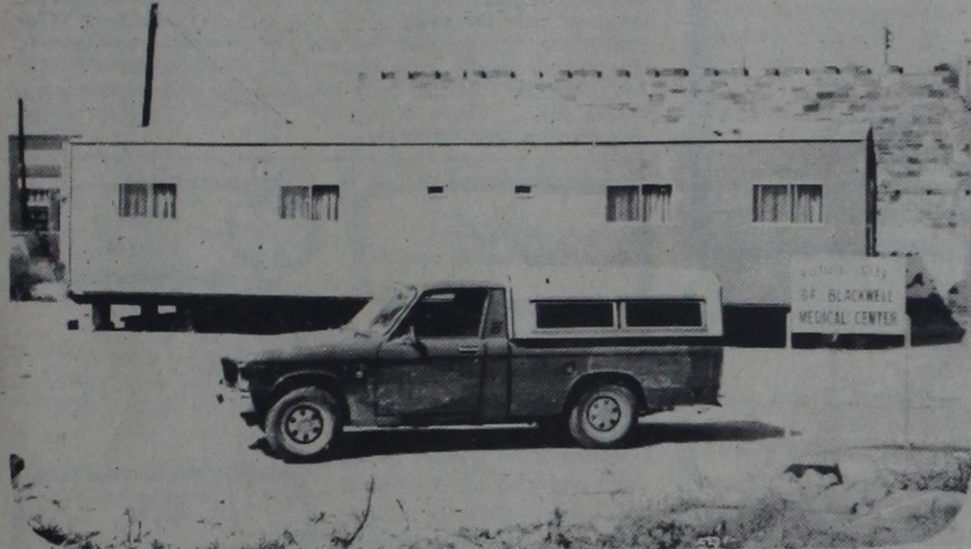


New Medical Facility Moves To R S



A new medical facility is scheduled to open in Rising Star during the month of September.

Ken Moyer, coordinator, administrator of the project stated that plans are underway to move furniture and fixtures within the next week or so to the portable building which was moved several weeks ago to Rising Star. It is located on east highway 36 on a lot bet-

ween A.P. Smith's Barber Shop and Chambers Grocery. The facility is leasing the lot and has plans in the future to build a permanent structure to house the physicians offices. Mr. Moyer, who works out of Blackwell Hospital in Gorman said they hope to have a staff of at least 2 doctors in the clinic. Local people are expected to be hired as receptionist and

clinical staff. Plans are for the clinic to be open five days a week and also on Saturday. Moyer went on to say, once the physicians are established here, someone will be on call 24 hours a day for emergencies.

Moyer concluded, "We are looking forward to serving the Rising Star community and are striving for the best quality care we can give."

May Centennial To Feature Pageant

On Saturday, September 19, at 8 am people will start registering for the observance of May Community's one hundredth birthday. 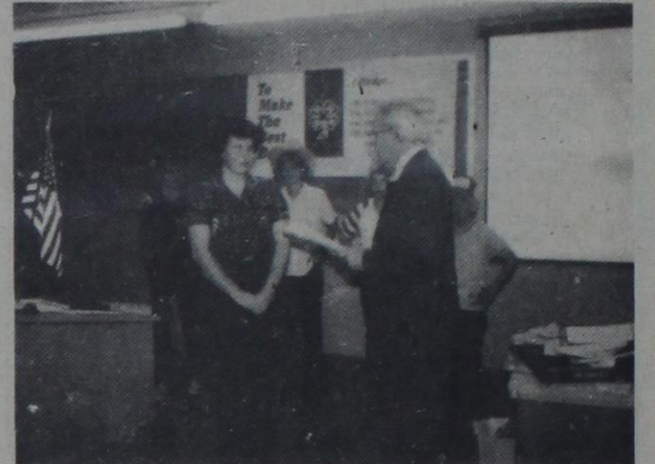

COMMENTARY

HINDRANCES TO PRAYER: What various hindrances we meet, In coming to the mercy-seat. Yes, they are many. But here again, most of them are our own making. God wants us to pray. The devil does not want us to pray, and does all he can to hinder us. The devil knows that we can accomplish more through our prayers than through our works. He would rather have us do anything BUT pray. We need not fear the Devil and his evil spirits, if our eyes are ever on the Lord Jesus. God's holy angels are stronger than the devil's angels, and we can let the celestial hosts guard us. The evil angels, to them we can lay to their charge, for keeping us from our prayer life, which so often wreck our prayer. We no sooner kneel to pray life, when we "just then remember, did I turn the fire out from under the kettle? Or the

prone rings, these thoughts come from the enemy of our souls." The only cure for wandering thoughts is to get our minds fixed on God. Undoubtedly our worst enemy is ourselves. We should remember we are a child of God, and one who is living as a child of God should pray like a child of God. The great question is: Are we harboring any foes in our hearts? Are there traitors within our hearts? God cannot give us His best spiritual blessings unless we fulfill conditions of trust, obedience and service. Do we not often ask for blessing we are not fitted to receive? Dare we be honest with ourselves, alone in the presence of God? Dare we sincerely, "Search me, O God—"? Is there anything in me which is hindering God's blessing for me and through me? We are the problem that needs discussing or dissecting! Prayer is all right! There is no problem in prayer to the heart which is absolutely stayed on Christ. Lets face the question: Do I possess the attitude of gratitude? Nine out of 10 people are ungrateful, practicing base ingratitude, failing to give praise and thanks to God. This is a Bible fact! (Romans 1:21, Because that, when they knew God, they glorified (or praised), Him not as

God, neither were thankful; but became vain (or conceited), in their imaginations, and their foolish heart was darkened. Questions To Ask

Ourselves about Praise: 1. Am I a "fair-weather Christian?" who only praises the Lord when all is well and my circumstances are ideal? (I Thess. 5:18). 2. Does my life lack that overflowing spirit of praise that characterizes those who are rooted, grounded and established in the faith? (Colossians 2:6,7). 3. 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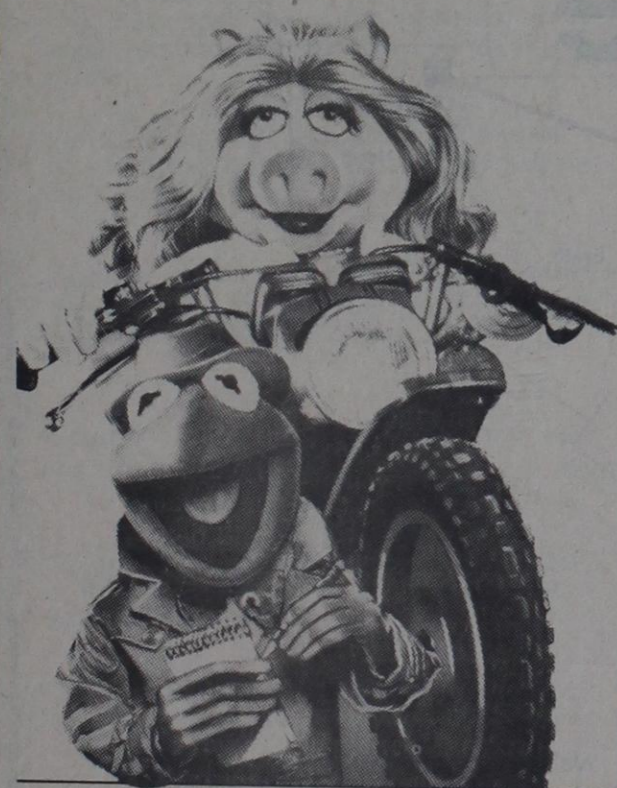
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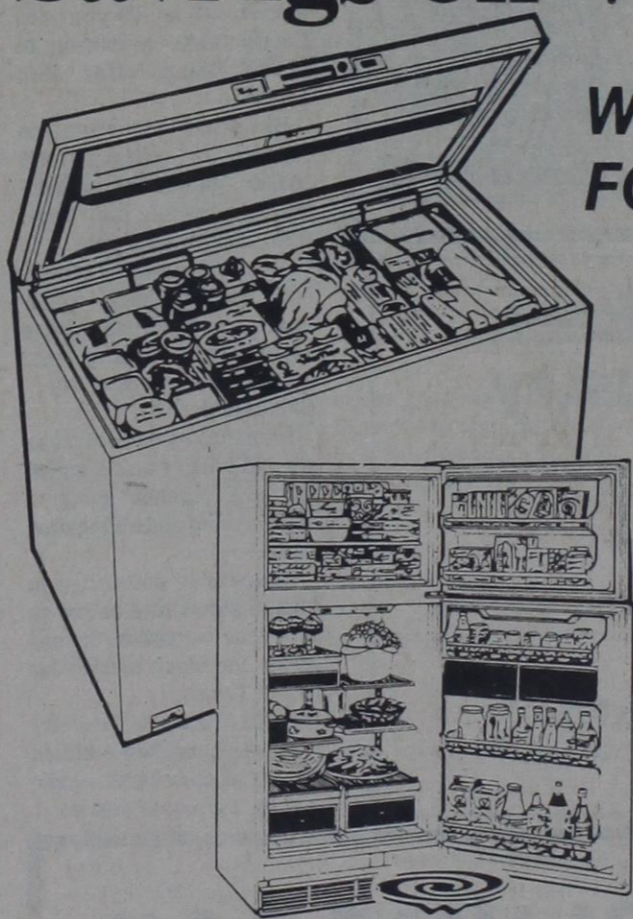
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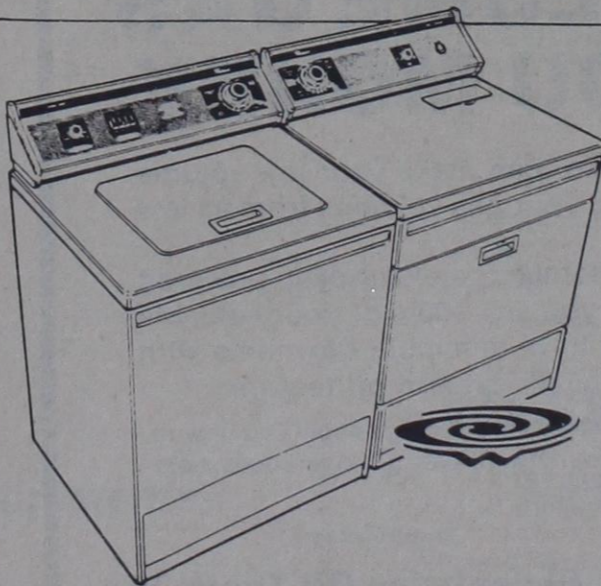

The United States Has Reserve Oil In Storage

In order not to get caught in another severe oil shortage similar to the once faced by the United States following the 1973-74 Arab oil embargo, the federal government established a Strategic Petroleum Reserve

(SPR) in 1975.

Congress authorized a 500-million-barrels storage program using five underground salt domes located along the Texas-Louisiana Gulf Coast which is being filled at an average

rate of 325,000 barrels of crude daily, according to the American Petroleum Institute in Washington, D.C.

The program, which was increased from the original 400 million barrels to 1 billion barrels, total to be in storage by Dec. 22. As of Aug. 3, 173.1 million barrels had been stored in the five locations which includes: Bryan Mound, Texas - 63.1 million barrels; Bayou Choctaw, La. - 35.5 million barrels; W. Hackberry, La. - 41.7 million barrels; Sulphur Mines, La. - 6 million barrels; and Weeks Island, La. - 32.2 million barrels.

The cost of the original 500-barrels program was estimated at about \$8 billion and the final, 1-billion barrel program, \$20 billion. The price tag on developing the storage facilities was \$875.9 million and the purchase of the 173.1 million barrels stored to date, \$3.6 billion.

The biggest source of the oil stored now was the North Sea (England) with 53.7

million barrels followed by: Mexico, 34.6 million barrels; Libya, 23.5; Iran, 18.2; and Alaska, 16.4. Nigeria, Saudi Arabia, Ecuador, Algeria, Dubai, Egypt, Norway and Venezuela each shipped amounts less than 10 percent for the SPR.

From 1977 through early 1979 delays were encountered in the program because the storage sites were not completed. A second delay, which halted the delivery of oil to the sites until September 1980, was caused by: federal budget consideration; a "tight" crude oil market in 1979 brought about partially because of the halt in Iranian oil shipments; an agreement at the Tokyo Economic Summit, which included the United States, not to place undue pressure on world oil prices by purchasing oil for strategic stockpiles; and attitude among some of the oil-supplying nations.

1 Arrested In Untaxed Diesel Smuggling

AUSTIN—Efforts to halt the smuggling of untaxed diesel fuel along the Texas-Mexico border Friday resulted in the arrest of a 58-year-old Laredo man, according to State Comptroller Bob Bullock.

Bullock's investigation showed an estimated 100 million gallons of untaxed fuel was coming into Texas from Mexico each year.

"I intend to put the contraband fuel business out-of-business because these smugglers are stealing from the taxpayers in this state," Bullock said.

Texas taxes diesel fuel at six and a half cents a gallon with the revenue going to highway and state education funds.

Inexpensive diesel fuel in Mexico sometimes as low as 17 cents a gallon helped create the black market for fuel in Texas.

Texas routinely collects taxes on more than a billion gallons of diesel fuel a year sold by legitimate dealers.

This review should be made, Hammons said, so people will know where they stand in relation to the annual earnings test. This test is the measure used to deter-

mine the amount of benefits that should be paid a working beneficiary.

In general, a person is due all benefits for a year if his or her earnings do not exceed the annual exempt amount. For people under 65 all of 1981, the annual exempt amount is \$4,080 and for people 65 and over any part of 1981, the amount is \$5,500.

The general rule is that \$1 in benefits is withheld for each \$2 of

earnings above the annual exempt amount.

A person who expects his or her earnings to exceed the annual exempt amount should notify Social Security so that the appropriate amount of benefits can be withheld. This way, the person can avoid the possibility of having to repay any incorrectly paid benefits.

Hammons said that people should remember that gross wages, not take home pay, count for purpose of the annual earnings test.

On the other hand, a person whose earnings are considerably less than he or she expected should also notify Social Security to see if benefits can be started again.

People who want more information should contact the Abilene Social Security office. The people there will be glad to answer any questions. The office is located at 142 S. Pioneer and the

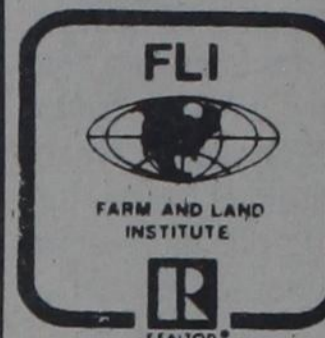

Eastland County farmers will have an opportunity to see first hand research being done on several crops next Thursday, September 10. That is the date of the Crops Field Day at the Texas A&M University Research and Extension Center at Stephenville.

The facilities will be open for inspection from 1 to 5 p.m. with riding tours of field research beginning at 2 p.m.

Joint sponsors of the field day and the tours are the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station and the

Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

The center is located at the junction of U.S. Highway 281 and FM 8 two miles north of the downtown area. The best way for Eastland County people to locate the center is to continue east on FM 8 until it joins 281. The center is on the left at this junction.

Guests on the riding tour will pass by major research sites and will hear research scientists discuss alternate crops, including cotton, guar, sesame and pearl millet; peanut irrigation; planting patterns; and peanut varieties. Topics also

will deal with soil-borne disease research on peanuts and new fungicides and application techniques for peanuts.

Other discussions on peanuts will include dry land, skip-row plantings and demonstrations of seeding rates for Spanish and runner varieties.

County Extension agents from surrounding areas will act as tour guides.

Research and Extension personnel will be cooperating in putting together displays on forage research for dairy and livestock production and on horticultural research and recommendations for this area of the state.

In view of some of the critical decisions presently facing peanut producers, we feel that they have put together facts that will help our people choose the best route for their operation.

A new insurance plan authorized by Congress is now available to wheat and barley growers in Eastland County, according to Ardell M. Kalmbach, District Director of USDA's Federal Crop Insurance Corporation. A key feature of the insurance program, which is designed to replace the ASCS disaster payments program, is that the government pays up to 30% of the premium cost.

Another important feature, Kalmbach adds, is the opportunity it provides for wheat and barley growers to choose the amount of protection they want to carry. It is possible to purchase a policy that guarantees 50%, 65%, or 75% of the local average yield. Policyholders can also select the price per

bushel they want to be paid in the event of a loss. The choices are \$2.50, \$3.50 and \$4.50.

Kalmbach offers this illustration of how the insurance works: In an area where the average yield has been 18.2 bushels per acre, farmers can elect to carry a policy that guarantees 9.2 bushels, 12.9 bushels or 14.0 bushels. If a wheat grower chooses the maximum guarantee of 14.0 bushels per acre and the maximum price per bushel of \$4.50, he will be paid an indemnity of \$4.50 for each bushel his yield is below 14.0 bushels per acre.

Because of sharply higher production costs and last year's drought losses, Kalmbach points out that most policyholders are choosing insurance that protects their entire production investment. Others are carrying enough insurance to guarantee the amount of income needed to meet specific financial obligations, such as the repayment of bank loans or land rental payments.

The deadline to apply for 1982 crop wheat and barley insurance in Eastland County is September 30. Federal All-Risk Crop Insurance policies can be purchased from the local FCIC representative or from private insurance agents and lending institutions. Wherever purchased, the protection and the cost are the same. For more information please call 1-800-447-4700 or contact your local ASCS office.

Hay producers throughout Eastland County are urged to

enter their hay in the ninth annual Eastland County Hay Show says County Agent DeMarquis Gordon. The hay show will be October 2 during the Fair.

The hay must be entered by September 16 since samples must be sent to the forage testing lab for protein analysis. One bale of each variety may be entered by leaving it at any farm supply store or vocational agriculture class room in Eastland County. The exhibitor should put a tag on his hay giving name, address and kind of hay. There is no entry fee required. All entries must be in bale form, either round or regular bales.

They hay will be judged on protein content and physical characteristics which indicate intake and digestibility as well as other factors that affect animal performance.

Ribbons will be given on all entries and plaques will be awarded to the owner of the champion bale in each class.

Classes include Alfalfa, Coastal bermuda and other bermudas, Sorghum and Sudan Hybrids, Other Perennials, Oats, Peanut and Legume mixture.

All entries will become the property of the hay show and the bales will be auctioned off to help defray the cost of the analysis and awards.

Consumers who respond to the first advertisement receive more fantastic offers by return mail. Offers of additional jewelry at bargain prices

membership in a gem collectors organization and other bargains too good to miss are made in attractive ways to get you to continue purchasing gems, or more expensive items than the original offer. Claims of low monthly payments of fees hid the real cost of your purchase.

Super consumers should not get caught by this and other consumer schemes. Unbelievably low prices may sound inviting but don't let visions of instant wealth dim your common sense caution.

Six warnings signs to be aware of and watch for so that you don't become another consumer fraud statistic:

- * Unbelievably low prices
- * Exaggerated claims or lavish guarantees
- * Just what you have been waiting for
- * Extra assurance of seller's honesty
- * Appeal for help
- * Pressure to 'act now'

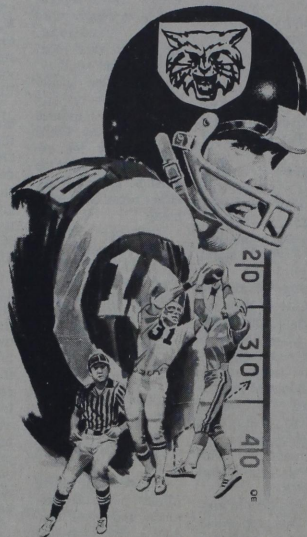
