Once again the people of Rising Star have extended a helping hand to someone in need, and have shown in a realistic way that this little community, located at one of the ten million crossroads of these United States, very definitely has a heart.

The incident in point was this: about 4:30 on a recent afternoon, a small, old model car limped into the eastern city limits, then died rather abruptly. Three youthful and rather weary travelers got out of the vehicle to determine just what mechanical failure had brought their journey to this sudden halt. Upon investigation of the situation, a local city police officer learned that the weary travelers were indeed strangers to our area. They were, in fact, Vietnemese, two brothers and their sister, ranging in age from seventeen to years of age.



## County Tax Election Set For August 14

Faced with what it called a pressing need for more revenue to offset a growing - and whopping - annual deficit and especially to maintain the county road system, the Eastland County Commissioners' Court has asked the county citizens to approve a 30c road and bridge fund tax.

The election has been set for Saturday, August 14. It has been called under an amendment to the State Constitution which permits a county to levy a 30c special tax above the general fund maximum of 80c per \$100 valuation for Farmto- Market lateral roads and flood control purposes.

Last year, said County Judge Scott Bailey, the county spent \$180,000 more than it received in taxes and similar revenues. "If this trend continues," said Bailey, "There is little or no likekihood of a reduction in costs; inflation, with a capitall, has seen to that," said the judge. The only alternative is an increase in revenue.

For instance, a Commissioners' Court fact sheet sets out that a road grader costing \$19,000 in 1964 now cost \$50,000; steel grader blades once priced at 75c per linear foot now cost \$3.50 per foot; the from 17c per gallon to 45c and During the camp, each gasoline from 23c to 50c. These force the county to buy public liability insurance at great cost; to acquire Workman's Compensation coverage at a rate which amounts to \$12 for each \$100 of wages paid, an increase of \$60 on a \$500 monthly wage; and to pay retirement and medical benefits that have become essential fringe elements of almost all public and private employment programs.

Comr. Clarence Dill of the Cisco Precinct figures that he saved the County \$10,000 annually when he did not replace a \$6,000- a- year employee who retired. "Under present conditions,"he said,"we are compelled to cut costs even if it means cutting down on our

There have been whopping increases in the prices of supplies used by the various county departments in the costs of operating the county judicial system and the la w enforcement agencies. It now costs the County from \$400 to 500 just to empanel a district court jury, and proportionately as much in other courts, Bailey pointed out. Meanwhile, the wages and salaries paid by the county are among the lowest in the economic scale . "And uniess the County can compete with private employment," he said, "County services are bound eventually to suffer."

Most endagered, and one of the most essential of these services, is maintenance of the 1,000- mile county lateral road system, which serves a vital and basic county agricultural economy. Here inflation has hit

At present county road and bridge fund costs rely on a 10c allocation of the 80c general fund tax rate pro- rated among the four precincts. "Once upon a time this was sufficient; but with today's costs, it is far too little to meet even minimal standards of maintenance," said Comr. L.T. Owen, whose sprawling district, embracing the Rising Star and Gorman areas, stretches across the southern half of the county and includes a disportionate share of the road burden.

tax allowed by the Constitution Homecoming, October 2, 1976

is the most economical means of meeting the revenue problem. Owen and the other County Commissioners, Dill, Danny Woods of Precinct 1, and Jack Blackwell of Precinct 2, pointed out. They explain that all of its revenues would remain in the county. Nor would it affect the \$3,000 homestead exmption allowed by law. Property owners who qualify within its provisions would then pay none of the increase on homesteads rendered at \$3,000 or less. If, however, the county should have to resort to an increase in valuations - an alternative to the proposed tax increase - for the additional revenue needed to keep its services intact and pay its bills, some of these valuations could, of necessity, be pushed above the \$3,000 exemption ceiling.

But more seriously, an increase in valuations would have the effect of increasing state revenues from county property with no more benefit to the county. The state, the Court pointed out, levies a tax of 12c per 100, and this tax would be collected on all the higher valuations and sent to

Austin. "Revenue Sharing Funds from the federal government have been of great assistance in county cost meeting obligations,,' said Bailey; but the County Judge expressed doubt that the benefits of these federal funds, politically uncertain as they are, has been enough to offset the inflation they helped fuel . "They could be cut off at the whim of the national administration," he

reminded. Because most taxpayers make their payments early," he said, "But if no taxes were paid before the January 31 deadline, that balance would be wiped out by the end of the year," he said, warning that unless revenues from tax sources can be increased to meet climbing operating costs, it is certain to be further endangered.

At present the County has no

bonded or warranted indebtedness. Its only deferred obligations are for the original microfilming of the County Clerks records and for road maintenance ma chinery being paid out of current revenues. But there is no assurance, say the County Commissioners, that Eastland County will not be called upon to is ... bonds or warrants for futu a needs For that reason, they point out, it is essential that the county maintain a sound and solvent financial posture as the basis for a good credit ratinfg. Eastland County has never defaulted on a debt and ,"we hope the citizens of the county will help us keep that record good by voting the 30c roa d and bridge fund tax." said Bailey.

One prospect in which the county may be forced to issue time obligations is being seen in state and federal standards for modern jail facilities . The antiquated Eastland County detention structure is older than the turn of the century. It is regarded as certain it will come under severe government scrutiny.

"Our obligation as your Commissioners' Court,,' said Bailey, "is to manage the county financial affairs in an efficient and soun d manner We are laying this need before the people of the county in the hope they will make it possible for us to do our job well and maintain the services so vital to county order and welfare."

5-6 lb, boneless beef brisket 1 tsp. onion powder 1 tsp. garlic powder 1 tsp. celery salt 1-1/2 tsp. salt 34 tsp. black pepper

1/2 cup Worcestershire sauce

1/2 cup liquid smoke

1 cup barbecue sauce

Place brisket in heavy duty aluminum foil and sprinkle on both sides with liquid smoke. Then sprinkle with onion and garlic powders and celery salt. Place in covered container in refrigerator and let marinate overnight (at least 8 hours). Next day, sprinkle both sides with salt, pepper and Worcestershire sauce. Wrap securely in aluminum foil and bake covered at 275 degrees for four hours. Uncover and pour barbecue sauce over the brisket. Cover and bake one hour longer. Cut in 1/2-inch slices and serve with additional barbecue sauce. Can be served hot or cold. Yield: 8 to 10 servings.

#### Bumper Grain Harvest Revitalizes State's Feedlots



TEXAS FEEDLOTS ARE ON THE UPSWING-The slump that hit feedlots in Texas during 1973 appears to be over, according to Agriculture Commissioner John C. White, Placements into Texas feedlots during April were 22 percent above April 1975 figures. Bumper grain harvests played an important role in the recovery.

AUSTIN-The slump that hit feedlots in Texas and the nation in 1973 seems to finally be over, and indications are that more grain-fed beef will be showing up in markets across

the state. "The state's feedlot owners rang in the new year with red meat production in January 1976 showing a 27 percent increase over production during the same period in 1975," Agriculture Commissioner John C. White

Cattle and calf slaughter accounts for a large part of the overall red meat figure,

White explained. Upturns in the state's feedlot business are here to stay, most experts feel. Feedlots which had been idle during much of 1975 are filling again with beef on the

The most recent statistics available indicate that placements into Texas feedlots during April were 285,000 head, 21 percent below March 1976 but, more important, 22 percent above April 1975 figures.

And a 14 percent increase in production of red meats during April was reported. Red meat production so far this year is slightly more

than 1 billion pounds compared with 935 million pounds in 1975.

A bumper crop of the feed grains - corn and sorghum - helped the feedlot recovery by resulting in cheaper feed. Total stocks (including oats and barley) as of April 1 were estimated at 144 million bushels, 34 percent above a year ago.

Wheat production during 1975 reached a record 131.1 million bushels. The sorghum crop of 374.4 million bushels was the second largest on record, as was the corn crop of 113.3 million bushels. The oat crop, at 19.5 million bushels, more than doubled the 1974 crop.

**AUSTIN-The 1975 Texas** Livestock Statistics book has been published, Agriculture Commissioner John C. White has announced.

"The book presents up-to-date county estimates for cattle, hogs, sheep and goats on ranches and farms,"


