A.C.H.S. Blanks Wildcats 24th Annual Rising Star Homecoming Schedule Announced



Dedication ceremonies were held Tuesday at the new Odessa Natural Gas Plant located at Carbon.

W.D. "Bill" Noel, West Texas industrial giant, co-founder and first president of Odessa Natural Corporation was honored Tuesday during dedication ceremonies at Odessa Natural Corporation's new natural gas plant in Carbon, which was named for him.

Odessa Natural, a wholly owned subsidiary of El Paso Products and the El Paso Companies employs 60 people and operates the gas transmission

and gas plants branch. Headquartered in Odessa, Odessa Natural Corporation operates 600 miles of gas transmission pipeline in West and Central Texas.

The new facility, a joint venture with Valero, is a cryogenic liquids extraction plant with a capacity of 30 million cubic feet per day of natural gas. From this natural gas, 170,000 gallons of natural gas liquids such as ethane, butane, propane and natural gasoline can be

extracted daily. Since 1973, ONC has purchased, transported and marketed natural gas in this region through the operation of the Bend Arch Pipeline.

The new plant encompasses the latest technology in reducing emissions and air pollutants.

Local WTU Manager Announces Proposed Rate Increase

West Texas Utilities Company has filed application for a general rate increase, Travis Williams, local manager announced today.

The official filing was made Tuesday, September 30, with incorporated towns for retail customers within their jurisdiction and with the Public Utility Commission of Texas for an increase to customers outside incorporated towns.

The proposed rates would produce an increase in total revenue of \$12,729,619. This amounts to 8.27 per cent based on revenues of \$153,914,156 for the test period ending this past June 30.

The company requested that the new rates become effective November 4.

One of the basic reasons for the increase was cited as inflation.

"The cost of providing electric service continues to increase more rapidly than revenue," the manager said.

This rate adjustment would be only the second general retail rate increase in the company's entire history, which goes back more than 50 years. The other increase was in 1973 and amounted to about six per cent across the board.

"We've managed to make that six per cent go a long way," Travis Williams, manager said, noting that every other utility company in the state, and probably in the nation, has had at least one increase since then and most of them have had several.

Several reasons were given as to how WTU has been able to manage without a rate

increase during the past several years of double-digit inflation. Chief among these was the timing of WTU's power plant construction.

Its newest and largest station was completed in the mid-1970's and provided generation reserves sufficient not only to last for several years but to allow profitable energy sales to other companies.

The company also cited its reputation as a conservative company with firm control of its expenditures.

However, the WTU manager said, the company can no longer absorb the effects of inflation without risking a dangerous decline in its financial condition. Of necessity, the company is entering into a multi-year construction program which will include a new coal-fired power plant and several high voltage transmission line projects.

The proposed rates were based on detailed analyses of each customer rate class, including studies of their energy usage patterns, the investment required to serve them, and the cost of operation applicable to those customers.

The Company's rate structure, which now has over 125 rates for many types and classes, would be reduced to less than 30 rates. The effect of the increase on the different customer classes would vary according to present relative rates of return from each class.

For example, the typical residential electric bill would increase by about 10 per cent.

Although customer bills have risen substantially in the

COMMENTARY

By Myrtle Owen

Since Scripture does not contradict itself, it seem reasonable to conclude that the passages describing Christ's coming for the saints and With the saints indicate the two phases of His coming.

We believe it is scripturally correct to assume that the intervening period between the two is the time when the world will experience the Great Tribulation, involving the reign of antichrist and the outpouring of God's wrath on the wicked (Daniel 12:1,2,10-13); Matthew 24:15-31; 2 Thessalonians 2 Paul indicated certain things must take place before the day of the Lord (of which the Great Tribulation is a part) can begin. An individual called the man of sin (antichrist) will appear. The mystery of iniquity has been at work since Paul's time but is being restrained by the power of the Spirit working through the true Church. Only when the Church is removed from earth by the Rapture can this man come forward publicly. In Thessalonians 5, following the passage on the Rapture in chapter 4, Paul taught about the Day of the Lord. He warned of the

destruction it will bring to the wicked, V 2-3. He was quick to assure Christians that those who abide in Christ will not be overtaken by it (v. 4). Still speaking of the Day of the Lord, Paul wrote: "For God hath not appointed us to wrath, but to obtain salvation by our Lord Jesus Christ" (v.9). It seems clear that he meant the deliverance of believers from the judgements of the Day of the Lord, including the Great Tribulation. Christians are told repeatedly in New Testament to be watchful for the Lord's appearing. Never are they taught to watch for the Great Tribulation or the appearance of antichrist. To expect that such things must happen before the Rapture destroys the teaching of imminence with which the New Testament is replete.

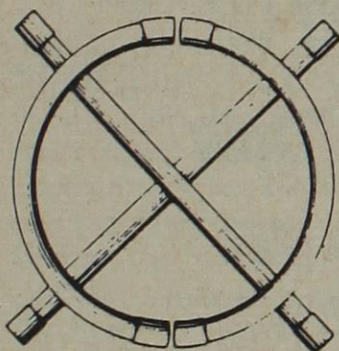

4-H'ers "Expanding Horizons"

Seeking new knowledge and skills to become better citizens and leaders—that's the challenge extended to all youth by the theme of this year's National 4-H Week, "Expanding Horizons." The weeklong observance is set for Oct. 5-11.

More than five million youth between the ages of 9 and 19 are currently enrolled in 4-H throughout the United States, Puerto Rico, Guam and the Virgin Islands. Texas boasts a 4-H enrollment of some 140,000 boys and girls.

"4-H is the nation's largest out-of-school educational youth organization," points out Dr. John T. Pelham, state 4-H and youth leader with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, the parent organization of 4-H in Texas.

"4-H continues to offer unique learning experiences for youth through its time-tested 'learning by doing' approach," says Pelham. "4-H'ers become involved in a variety of practical, real-life activities that range from agriculture and clothing to health and wood science. Programs vary according to youth needs and community resources."

The theme, "Expanding Horizons," challenges all 4-H members to seek new knowledges, acquire life skills and build on personal strengths. Members are encouraged to strengthen their citizenship and leadership abilities and to assume positive roles

in a free democratic society, notes the 4-H leader.

"The 4-H program involves youth from all social and economic backgrounds and gives them an opportunity to key in on such vital issues as energy conservation, better human nutrition, wise use of natural resources and combating inflation. In addition, 4-H youth gain knowledge and skills for their future careers," adds Pelham.

While 4-H is still a mainstay with rural youth, participation of urban youth has tripled in the past ten years. Today, 23 percent of all 4-H members nationwide live in suburbs or cities of more than 50,000 population. Nineteen percent live on farms, 40 percent live in small towns, and 18 percent live in towns and cities of 10,000 to 50,000 population.

The 4-H program garners much of its support from a legion of volunteer leaders who give unselfishly of their time and resources to help youth grow and develop, points out Pelham. More than a half million volunteer leaders across the nation play a key role in the total 4-H program; almost 22,000 of these are in Texas.

Texas boasts a total of 1,973 organized 4-H Clubs and 886 special interest clubs. The largest group of Texas 4-H'ers live in towns under 10,000 population—43,244. The next largest group is in

cities over 50,000 population—39,104—while 29,018 live on farms and ranches and 21,866 live in towns and cities between 10,000 and 50,000 population. Organized television groups include 7,459 members.

What are the most popular project areas among Texas 4-H members? Foods and nutrition leads the top 10 by a large margin with an enrollment of 37,860. Second is electric with 13,017, followed by clothing, 10,390; horse, 9,751; creative arts, 9,442; safety, 8,422; swine, 8,093; beef, 7,914; and sheep, 7,626.

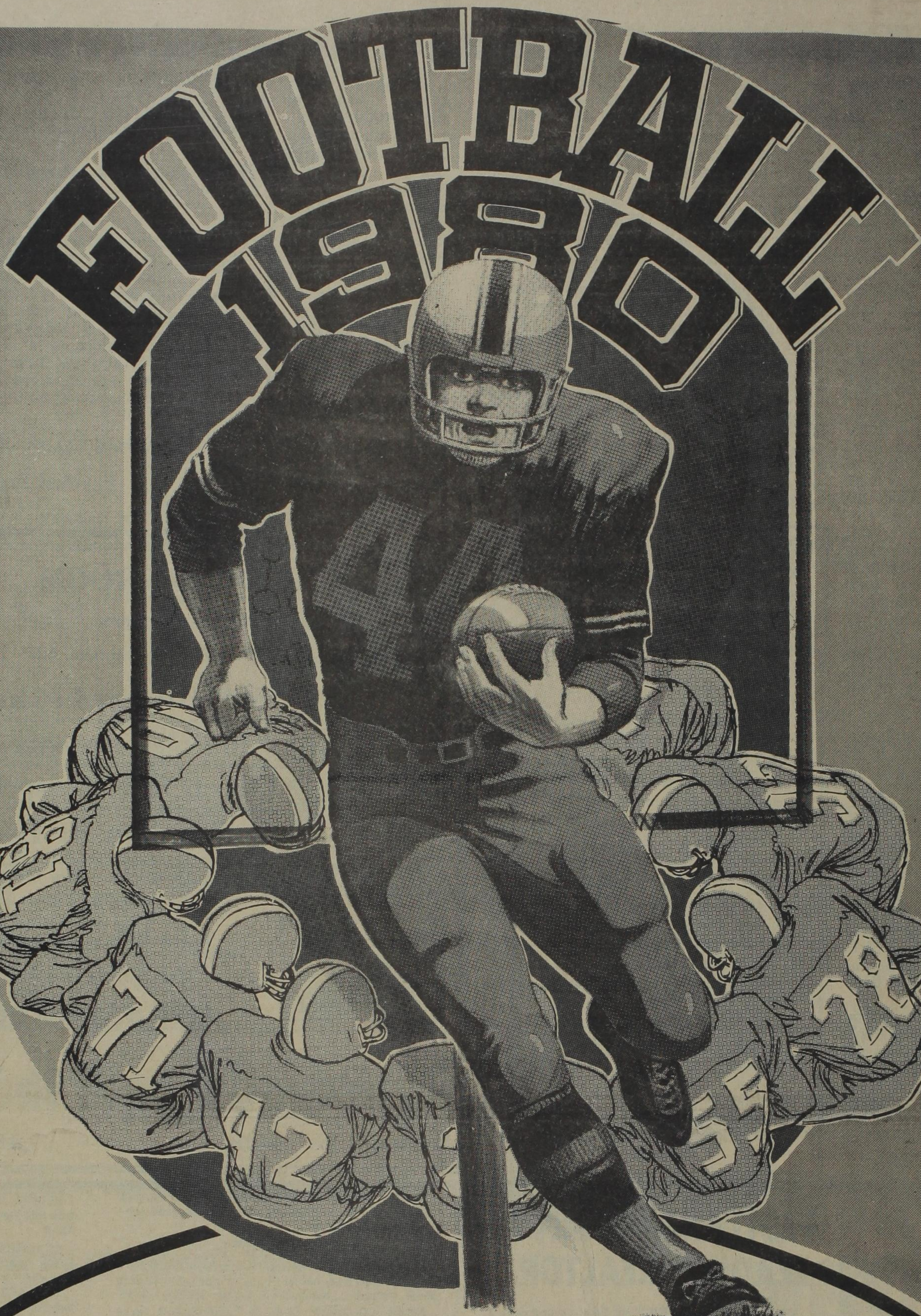
