## Violent Weather Damages Trees

Violent weather caused considerable damage to trees several miles east of Rising Star Monday, May 30. Although fields were too wet to get into to check closely, Charlie Campbell reported that he could see five trees blown over and the tops missing from at least four others. He also lost a

fruit tree and noted that limbs were strewn over a large area.

Pea-sized hail accompanied the tornadic-like winds that caused the damage to the trees. Campbell lives 10 miles east of Rising Star and reported more than two inches of rain Sunday and Monday.

Contributions may be made to the New Ambulance account in the bank, REACT reporter, Mrs. Terry Wilkerson, has announced.

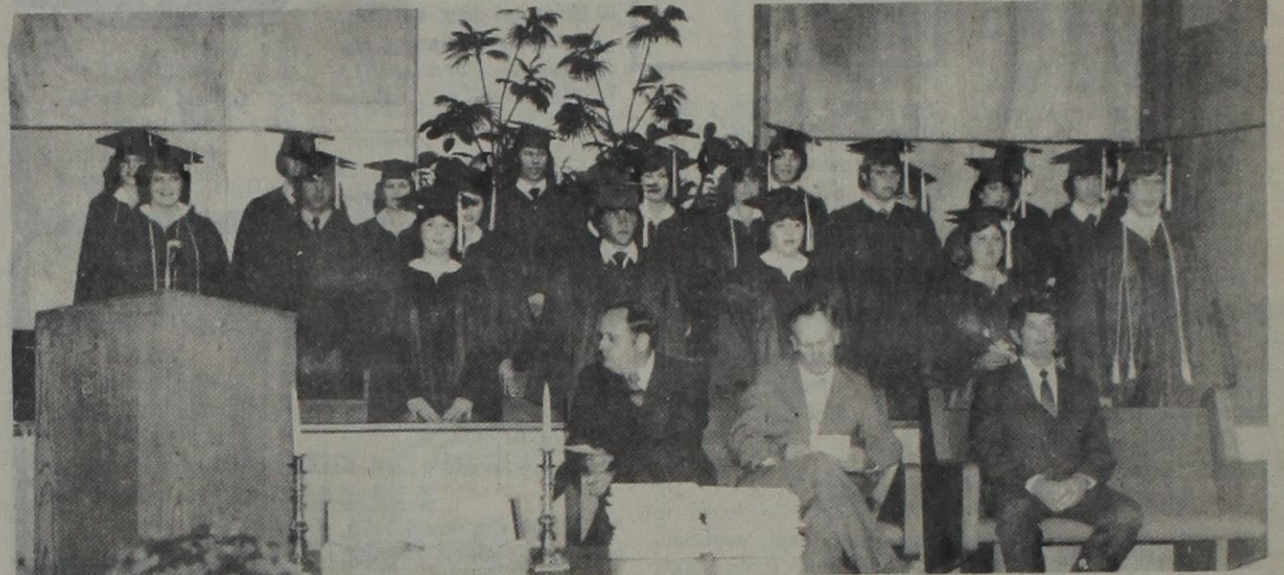
## Amity Homecoming, Cemetery Association Meeting

Mix all ingredients together. Pour into a greased baking dish. Bake in 350 degree oven about 45 minutes or until done. Mix ahead of time for better flavor. Freezes great.

The End of the World According to the Bible: We are talking today about the end, that is, the end of the world. Actually, this is not a new subject for this thought has been with man since his existence. The world had a beginning and, naturally, it will have an end. This irreversible process of the decay of the planet earth has raised great concern among the leading scientists of our time. Indeed, the world is beginning to worry about its end. A great number of scientists in all countries of the world are working feverishly to identify the cause and possibly

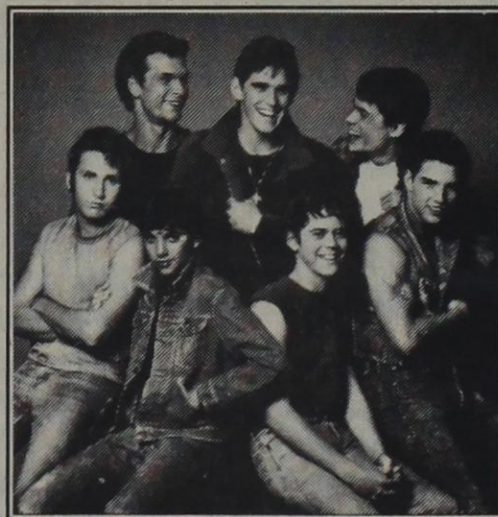

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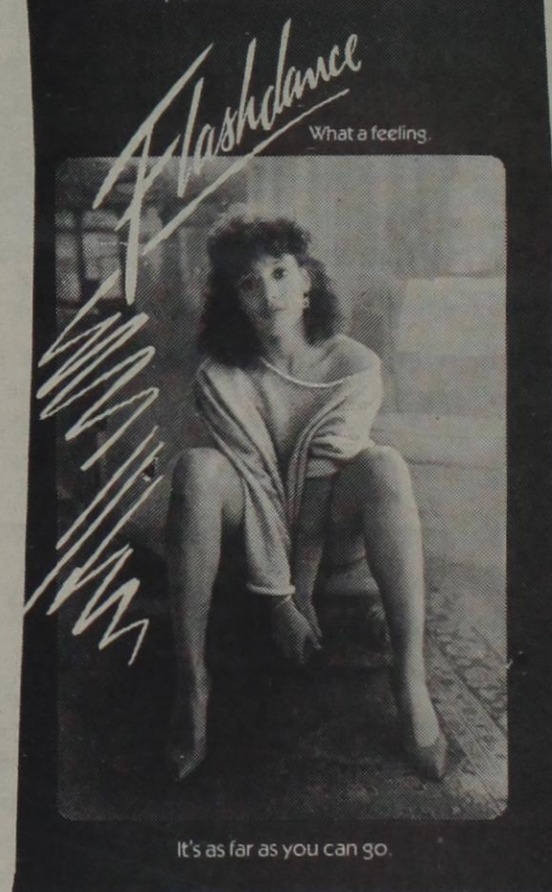

## Chenoweth Files To Drill No. 2 Craighead

Ranger-based Grover L. Chenoweth has filed for permit to drill the No. 2 Craighead, a wildcat for oil or gas to be located five miles south of Cisco. With projected total depth of 1,700 feet, the well is in a 160-acre lease in Eastland County's H&TC RR Co. Survey, A-743.

A wildcat for oil or gas is scheduled for spudding five miles south of Carbon by Morrison Energy Co. of Abilene. The well will be known as the No. 12-1 Marvin Unit No. 12, with projected total depth of 3,200 feet. It will be situated in a 40-acre lease in Eastland County's Andrew Kent Survey.

Yellow Mound Oil Co. of Cisco has revealed plans to drill three 400-foot developmental wells in the Nimrod Field. The operator has 44-acres leased, with drillsites in Eastland County's H&TC RR Co. Survey, NE/4 Sec. 112, Blk. 3 and has designated the ventures are the No. 1, 2 and 3 Notgrass B. Drillsites are 10 miles southwest of Cisco.

Nathan L. Apple of Lewisburg, Kansas has filed for permit to drill the No. 1-B Wesley Warren, a projected 750-foot wildcat for oil or gas, one mile northeast of Gorman. The venture will be in a 160-acre lease in Eastland County's H&TC RR Co. Survey, Sec. 3, Blk. 1.

Flowing at the rate of 33 barrels of crude oil and 510,000 CF casinghead gas per day on a 10/64 choke, the No. 1 Hamon was completed in the BBB&C RR Co. Survey, A-663 by Ridge Oil Co. of Breckenridge. The wildcat showed flow-

ing tubing pressure of 1,150 PSI.

Drillsite is in a 40-acre lease in Eastland County, quarter of a mile northwest of Ranger.

After entering the pay zone at 3,720 feet, the well went to 3,803 foot bottomhole. It was perforated to produce from an interval 3,755 to 3,765 feet.

Richey & Co. Inc. of Ft. Worth has recorded a successful developmental well in the REB Field. It is the No. 1 D.S. Raney, showing potential for 27 barrels of oil, along with 160,000 CF casinghead gas per day on a 10/64 choke.

Drillsite was in an 80-acre lease in the H&TC RR Co. Survey, A-1452, five miles northwest of Eastland, in Eastland County.

The well indicated potential for 6 barrels of oil on an open choke. With drillsite in a 40-acre lease in Eastland County's H&TC RR Co. Survey, the well had total drilling depth of 1,439 feet. It entered the pay horizon at 1,390 feet and will produce from a set of perforations 1,391 to 1,393 feet into the wellbore.

Abilene-based Chapparral Minerals Inc. has turned in first production figures on its No. 1 C.C. Pippen, a successful developmental well in Eastland County's Dothan Field.

Pumping oil at the rate of 5 barrels per day, the well was tested on an open choke.

Drillsite was in a 40-acre lease in the TE&L Co. Survey, Sec. 3167, five miles east of Putnam. The well was taken to a total depth of 3,170 feet, after entering the pay zone at 3,068 feet. Production interval will be 3,070 to 3,109 feet into the wellbore.

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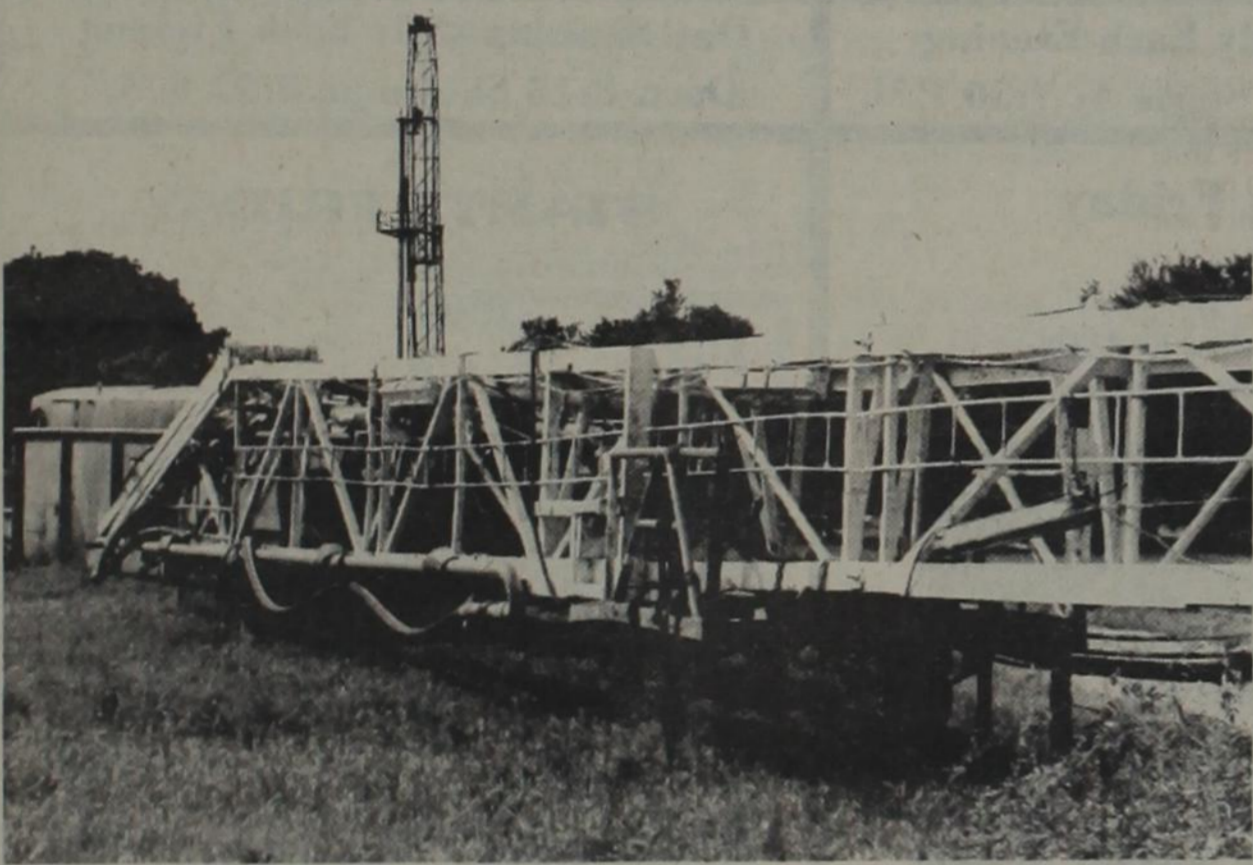

It's pecan nut casebearer spray time for Eastland County. This is the little worm that can destroy the entire pecan crop in a matter of days if not controlled. Commercial pecan producers as well as homeowners with back yard trees need to be on the lookout for the casebearers.

Based on our scouting the last few days, casebearers should be showing up on the young pecans about May 30 to June 3.

Because of cooler spring temperatures, the casebearer is emerging a little later than normal this year. To time spray applications for casebearer control, first check for eggs on a daily basis. The insect eggs are normally found on the tips of nutlets and are about the size of the ball in a ball-point pen. The eggs are white when first laid, then turn red over a three-to-five day period before turning white again after they hatch. Apply an insecticide the third day after the first egg hatches so as to kill the larvae before they enter the nutlets. Since the larvae will hatch over a week-long period or more, a second spraying may be necessary.

If you are going to spray only one time, spray about June 2 or

3. If you plan to spray twice apply one spray about May 30 and a second about June 6.

I found the first casebearer egg on May 25 in the Gorman area. This indicates that the moths have begun to deposit eggs and we can expect to find more by the weekend.

Insecticides recommended for casebearer control include Sevin, malathion, Zolone, diazinon, Guthion and Pydrin. Before using these materials, read the label directions; then follow them carefully.

The casebearer has 3 generations per year. It is approximately 42 days between the occurrence of each subsequent generation. Some years the second and third generation of this pest cause considerable nut damage. Total nut loss is usually greater during the spring generation because an individual larvae may destroy a complete nut cluster. Later generations usually damage one or two in the cluster.

The threat of a federal quarantine on Texas cattle has cattlemen wondering what might happen. There is one thing that cattlemen can do and should do. All female calves should be vaccinated for brucellosis. We urge livestock

producers to begin a vaccination program against brucellosis as soon as their calves are eligible.

Vaccination with Strain 19 vaccine is an excellent tool in the control of brucellosis, and all dairy and beef producers should contact their veterinarians and set up a schedule as part of their regular vaccination program.

According to the National Brucellosis Technical Commission, Strain 19 has proven to be about 95 percent effective against brucellosis under average field conditions. The state will pay for the vaccine as part of the revised brucellosis control program.

For best results, and to decrease the number of false reactors in later tests, dairy heifer calves should be vaccinated at four to six months of age, and beef heifer calves at 3 to 10 months of age. However, you may vaccinate heifers up to 12 months of age. Calfhood vaccination is an important element of the revised Texas brucellosis control plan and should be considered as routine as vaccination for other diseases.

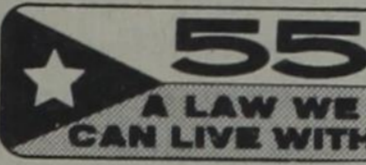

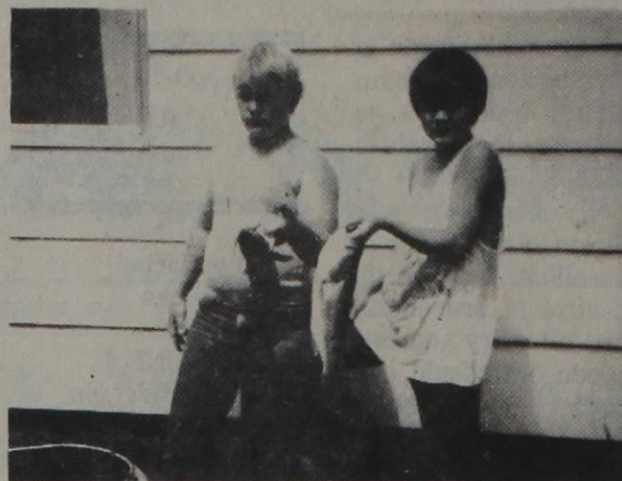
