City/School Filing Deadline Correction

An error was made in this newspaper regarding the deadline for filing for a place on the ballots for the City/School election which will be held May 7 at City Hall. The deadline is Wednesday, March 23, at 5 p.m. Candidates for the City election may file at City Hall; candidates for the School Board election may file at the school office at 114 N. Main.

The joint election will be for members for Rising Star Independent School District Board of Trustees and four members of the Rising Star City Council. The polls will open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. Two places with three year terms and the remaining two years for the place held by

Doug Owen who resigned in January will be filled in the school board election. H.T. 'Bud' Vickers and Larry Wilson are the trustees whose three-year terms expire. Gary Wilson was appointed to fill the place of Doug Owen until the election date.

Three full-term places and one one-year place will be filled on the City Council. Councilmen Clinton Crisp, Kelsey 'Pete' Starks and Cole White presently fill the three-year terms. The place with a one-year term was vacated when Tom Bailey resigned last year. With two more weeks before the filing deadline, only one candidate, E.L. Vaughn, has filed for the City election and none have filed for the school election.

Sheriff Is Only New Local Official

If you think that your Super Tuesday vote didn't count for much, think again.

In Eastland County, election results gave Dee Hogan a twenty-seven vote win over incumbent Don Underwood, so the county by just 27 votes has elected a new sheriff as there is no Republican opposition on the county level. We have yet to learn if there will be a recount.

Results from the Con-

stable and County Commissioner races in Rising Star's Precinct 3 gave incumbent L.T. Owen a 639 to 349 win over Dicky Burgess in the County Commissioner race, while incumbent Constable Gene Hicks won over Lynn Clark 310 to 150 votes.

Hogan had 2066 votes to 2039 votes for Underwood in the race for Sheriff.

The vote count given is unofficial returns from the County Clerk's office.

BAIRD
Three local men were presented with Certificates of Appreciation from the United States Marshall Service last Tuesday - Sheriff Bill Skinner, County Attorney Bob McCool and rancher Roy McAdams. U.S. Deputy Marshall Richard Jones gave the Certificates to Skinner and McCool for their help in numerous investigations during the last year. McAdams was presented one for his work as a part-time employee of the U.S. Marshall Service. The Certificates were signed by U.S. Marshall Clint Peoples and approved by the National Headquarters of the Marshall Service in McLean, Va. Past honorees have included Taylor County Sheriff John Middleton, Taylor County District Attorney's Investigator Travis Tucker, and Nolan County Justice of the Peace Randy King.

Last Monday afternoon Mayor Frank Payne handed over a check for \$65,236 to Neel Association Inc. for a new fire truck, and the Baird Volunteer Firemen took possession of this great new piece of equipment. Although the city has paid for the truck, it will take another four years of the \$2 addition on each water bill to cover the cost. But the truck had to be purchased now, or everyone's household fire insurance in Baird would have gone much higher. This was due to the age of the old truck. The Fire Department is very pleased with this new vehicle, and is erecting a new building to house it and the other equipment.

Mrs. James (Glyndol) Asbury was recently named "Outstanding Clubwoman" of the Wednesday Club of Baird. Mrs. Asbury, a Club, Church and Civic worker, is a native of Baird. first place winners will compete again at District level on March 25-26 in Wichita Falls.



Tax Returns Require Social Security Numbers For Dependents

"Taxpayers are reminded that before filing their 1987 tax returns, they are required to enter Social Security numbers (SSNs), or 'Applied for,' on their tax returns for all dependents, age 5 or older, listed as exemptions," said Glyn Hammons, Social Security manager in Abilene. This is required by the Tax Reform Act of 1986.

"Taxpayers who apply for SSNs now can expect to receive a Social Security card in the mail in 10-14 days after all proofs are received," said Hammons. "However, the closer we get to the April 15 tax deadline, the busier we expect to be.

Avoid the rush and apply now." "If the taxpayer's dependents already have Social Security numbers, they should not apply for another one," Hammons said.

Application for a Social Security number can be made at any Social Security office. You need to complete Form SS-5, Application for a Social Security Number. This is a simple, one-page form with instructions attached. You can get a copy at any Social Security office. Copies also are available wherever you find copies of Federal Tax forms. Anyone age 18 or older must apply

for a number in person, but parents applying for children can do so by mail. All original documents mailed to a Social Security office will be returned. They can start the application process by phone or, if they prefer, by visiting the office. Parents applying at the office will be asked for some proof of their identity, such as a driver's license.

A child or an adult applying for an SSN will need evidence of age, U.S. citizenship or lawful alien status, and identity. For someone born in the United States, an original or certified copy of a public birth certificate can be used as evidence of both

age and citizenship. For children, school, medical, or day care records can be used for identity. Only original documents or certified copies (not photocopies or notarized copies), can be accepted.

If the dependent you claim does not have a Social Security number by the time you are ready to file your

Federal tax return, you should apply for one and enter the words, "Applied for," on line 6c, column (3) of your Federal tax return. This will be acceptable to the IRS.

"For more information about applying for a Social Security number, call us," Hammons said. "You may dial a toll-free number -

1-900-200-4636 - for a brief recorded message. If you then need to speak with a Social Security representative, a toll-free "800" number will be given at the end of the recorded message, or you can call the local Social Security office in Abilene at 698-1360."

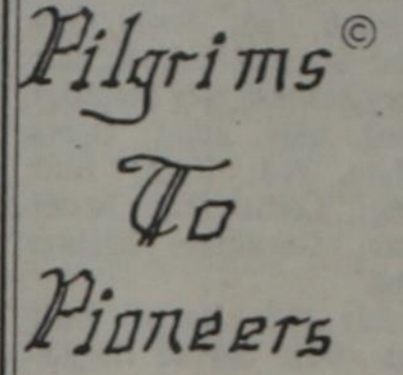



Social Security

It is important that the people in the Big Country area know when they should get in touch with Social Security. Glyn Hammons, Social Security manager in Abilene, said recently.

Not knowing when to contact Social Security could mean lost benefits which could never be recovered, Hammons said.

A person should contact Social Security:

Before getting his or her first job to get a Social Security number, which is required to get proper Social Security credit for earnings. People who change their names should also contact Social Security to get a new card. A person should allow at least two weeks.

After a death in the family to see if survivor benefits can be paid.

When someone in the family is disabled to find out if disability benefits can be paid.

At retirement, at age 65 for full-rate benefits or as early as 62 for reduced benefits. A person should sign up for Medicare two or three months before 65, even if there are no retirement plans.

Any time there is a question about Social Security.

When a person calls Social Security, the people there can tell:

How much work credit is needed to be insured for benefits.

Who can receive benefits. How to replace a lost Social Security or Medicare card.

How to get a free statement of the earnings reported to the person's Social Security record.

What documents a person needs when applying for benefits.

Most all Social Security business can be conducted by telephone. The number for the Abilene Social Security office is 915-698-1360. The office is located at 142 S. Pioneer.

According to the American Cancer Society, one out of eleven women in the United States will develop breast cancer sometime in her lifetime. It is currently estimated that over 37,000 women die each year as the result of breast cancer.

The American Cancer Society has established guidelines for mammography in asymptomatic women. (Women who have no symptoms of disease). Those guidelines have been adopted by the American Academy of Family Physicians, American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists, and The American College of Radiology. Those guidelines are:

- I. 35-40 years of age - One baseline mammogram.
- II. 40-50 years of age - A mammogram every 1-2 years depending on breast type and risk factor.
- III. 50 years of age and over - An annual physical examination and annual mammogram.
- IV. Asymptomatic women under 50 years of age with significant high risk factors should be examined at appropriate intervals. These risk factors include previous breast cancer and family history of cancer.

V. A symptomatic woman should have a mammogram at any age when she experiences a mass, nipple discharge, skin changes or unexplained breast pain.

A screening mammogram is an x-ray of the breast using extremely low dosages of radiation (usually comparable to dental x-rays) and is designed to find very early cancers.

A female technologist who is highly trained in mammography will perform the examination.

The charge for the screening mammogram is \$50.00. The Unit accepts cash, check, Visa, Mastercard and American Express.

Thursday, March 10, 1988 Fishing Outdoors

As water temperatures on area lakes begin climbing into the 50° range, more bass move shoreward to absorb the heat and cash in on the growing food supply.

Warmer water is a definite key, the backs of sun-baked covers could be as much as 10° warmer than the main lake and the bass in these areas are experiencing a healthier appetite.

During this time one of my favorite baits is a spinner. Retrievers can be quickened to a more moderate pace, but don't expect those lunkers to chase one moving like a bullet yet.

Try casting beyond stick-ups, logs, stumps or weed patches and use a steady retrieve past the cover. Sometimes it pays to even bump your spinner into the cover to entice that lunker into biting.

Often times, larger fish prefer something other than a straight retrieve. For this reason, learn several variables to try next time out. As always the key to success is often trying something different; be flexible.

Dropping a spinner bait is probably the hottest big-bass techniques when fishing one at this time of year. Timing and concentration are a must. After casting beyond the intended cover, bring the spinner bait back to the edge and stop it, allowing the lure to free-fall. The rod tip should be lowered as the lure drops, so that the bait will fall straight. Maintain only a small amount of tension to detect light strikes.
