Need for such a bill was brought about by a Supreme Court heart. decision and a subsequent series of decisions by lower federal courts. Under precedents thus stablished, the government could be forced to open all its files on demand of the defense. In the case of the FBI, this meant that its sources of information and methods of investigation would become known to all-to the vast benefit of criminals. It also meant that serious harm might be done to innocent people if the contents of its "raw" or unedited files, which naturally contain unproven rumors and charges, were made public.

The matter was a very delicate one. On the one hand, it was necessary to protect defendants from proceedings of a Star Chamber nature. On the other hand, it was necessary to protect the FBI from potential disaster. The new bill is designed to attain both objectives. It says that defendants are entitled only to reports relevant to a witness' testimony. Then it authorizes trial judges to examine wanted reports, and to decide which parts should legitimately be given to the defense.



Otherwise the election must be called within 60 days after the petition has been filed. Subsequent elections upon the same questions cannot be called within two ! years of any prior election. Under this law those schools which integrated during the 1956-1957 term are permitted to continue integration unless this system of operation is abolished by an election held in the manner mentioned above. Another provision under a section of the law dealing with integrated schools is that a student shall be denied transfer from one school to another because of race or color.

The bill provides that if a school district should desegregate without first being authorized to do so by an election of the qualified electors residing thereeligible to receive any Foundation Program Funds. In other words, it loses State School Support funds.

AUSTIN .- Those twin menaces-cancer and heart diseasehung up a grim new record for year, a final tabulation of death statistics shows.

Of a grand total of 69,671 deaths from all causes during 1956, almost half were due either to heart disease or to cancer. Heart disease killed 22,888 while cancer claimed 10,168.

While the number of cancer deaths has increased perceptably in the past three years, the increase has little real significance. The rate of deaths from cancer in Texas is still well below the rate for the United States as a whole. This state registered 112 deaths from cancer for each 100,-000 population, while the rate for the rest of the nation was 146 deaths per 100,000 population.

The disparity between the Texas-U. S. cancer death rate is probably due to the fact that Each child will cost Texas has a younger population. 





Fertilization is the main prac- TRANSFERRED tice to emphasize in the fall care for lawns, says E. M. Trew, extension agronomist. Lawn grasses will remain green longer in the fall and will grow off earlier next spring.

The fertilizer should be applied about a month before the first expected frost, advises Trew. When summer grasses are pushed into lush growth by late fertilization, some grass may be damaged by a hard freeze. Also, applying the fertilizer too late prevents the grass getting the most out of it before going dormant

Apply a complete fertilizer with a 2-1-1 or 1-1-1 ratio at a rate to supply two pounds of actual nitrogen per 1,000 square feet of lawn, recommends the specialist. This amount of nitrogen would be found in 20 pounds of 10-5-5 or 10-10-10, or in 25 pounds of 8-8-8.

After the fertilizer has been spread, Trew advises watering it down. Soak the soil at least six inches deep. Plenty of moisture is necessary, for the plants can't use the fertilizer until it is dissolved. If the soil is already wet, just wash the fertilizer off the grass and onto the soil.

Ryegrass is sometimes overseeded on Bermuda to give green color during the winter. But, Trew says, this is sometimes harmful to the Bermuda. The ryegrass is usually growing in the spring when the Bermuda should start and unless the ryegrass is kept closely clipped, it often gives the Bermuda serious competition for light, moisture and plant food. If ryegrass is seeded on a Bermuda lawn, Italian or annual ryegrass should be used, for these plants die in the spring. Ryegrass should not be overseeded other than Bermuda.






