Uses Alfalfa in Crop Rotation



Delma Dean, who operates a farm in the Hilburn community of the Upper Leon Soil Conservation District likes to use alfalfa in his conservation crop rotation. Dean planted between five and six acres to alfalfa in October 1958. He has fertilized his alfalfa and watered it during 1959. To date Dean has harvested 976 bales of hay which he values at \$1.00 to \$1.25 per hale. He has also secured considerable grazing from this area. Root rot has attacked Dean's alfalfa and destroyed his stand. He plans to just move his alfalfa and reseed this fall on another area, Dean feels that this is an econ nical operation as he expects an increase in the yield of the crops following the alfalfa. Dean also uses sorghum almum in his conservation crop rotation, but he experienced some difficulty in following it with peanuts. He had too much volunteer from hard seed which germinated after the summer rains and required considerable labor to destroy. Dean does not expect to have this problem in following alfalfa with peanuts or maize.

Contract on the reconstruction of the section of State Highway No. 36 between Pioneer and the intersection with U.S. Highway 183 in Rising Star, will be let in December, County Comm'r Bob Carter said he has been informed by the State Highway Department. The letting originally scheduled for November was delayed by some unfinished details of planning, but all paper work and securing of rightof-way have been completed with the exception of some condemnation suits which were necessary because some of those who have interest in land to be purchaed for the right-of-way could not be contacted.
