

Hill Supporters Say 'People' Campaign Will Win Election

Rep. John Bingham campaigning for John Hill, candidate for governor of Texas was in Rising Star on Thursday, August 17th. He briefly met with folks at the Truck Stop Restaurant.

Mrs. Jeannine Childers was instrumental in arranging the brief stop in Rising Star. Also on had was Democratic Chairman, Gus Dunn.

On Mr. Hill's behalf Rep. Bingham "The General election race for governor will be won by Attorney General John Hill because his campaign is a 'people' campaign and not a 'Dollar' campaign like his opponent is using, according to a group of Hill supporters taking part in a four-day caravan."

The caravan, one of nine being conducted Aug. 15-18 from outlying parts of the state and heading toward Waco where they meet Aug. 18, is headed by Hill's deputy campaign director Harry Ledbetter, who is originally from Breckenridge.

"The Republican candidate for governor is boasting that he can buy the governor's office. He's bragging that he will spend \$7 million to beat John Hill.

"He doesn't know that won't work in Texas, because he's never run for office

before," the caravan leader said.

"John Hill will win the General Election race for governor the same way he won the Democratic Primary race--by reaching out to the great people of this great state.

"The hill campaign conducted 22 of these caravans this spring, and we'll be conducting even more this summer and fall, to take the campaign to every community in Texas. Those 22 caravans covered more than 12,000 miles, and that's what it takes to reach every area of our state. The Hill campaign is prepared to repeat that travel schedule in the General Election, because campaigning in Texas is still a personal thing.

"The General Election campaign will focus on the same issues which brought victory to the Hill campaign this spring--opposition to any new state taxes, property tax relief, holding the line on state spending, and development of our agricultural, water and energy resources. John Hill can bring the leadership it takes to carry out this program and keep Texas prosperous."

support the football banquet. Chances will be 25 cents each and the drawing will be held Sept. 5th. Support the girls in this drive.

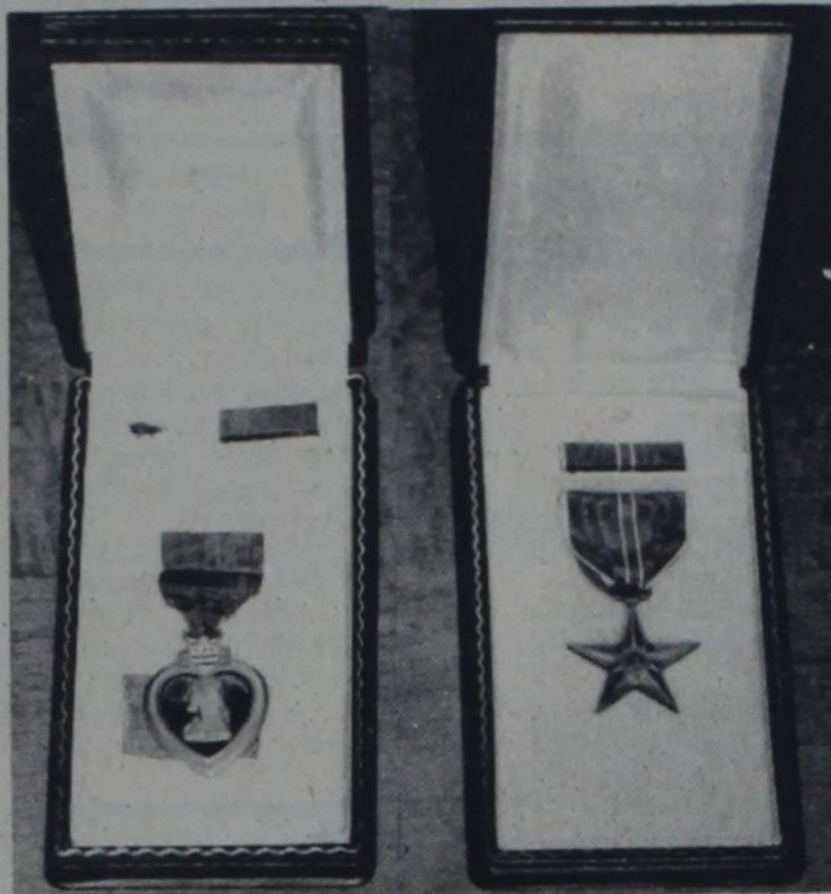

Lane Wells Receives Bronze Star

Bronze Star

Thirty-three years after the events that earned it, official recognition finally caught up with Lane Wells, cashier of the First State Bank, Tuesday of this week.

It came in the form of a Bronze Star suspended from a red and white ribbon divided by a white stripe and denoting two Purple Hearts certifying shrapnel wounds received on the plains of Normandy and in the Rhine Valley during World War II, as waves of American soldiers plunged into Hitler's fading Germany in the final year of history's bloodiest war.

Lane had long before received the Purple Heart a beautiful medal itself, bearing in bas-relief a profile of George Washington and accompanied by a cluster to denote the second wound,

suffered in the critical Battle of the Bulge.

Why the Bronze Star arrived so many decades later he attributes to the difficulty of find a way through the maze of Army and Defense Department records created by the history of his service.

Lane went onto the Normandy invasion beach on the morning of D-Day plus one as a combat rifleman with Company G, Ninth Inf., Second Division. During a hazardous phase of the initial assault he became separated from his unit and for three days wandered in furtive search of it among enemy-infested territory, creeping along depressions, dodging snipers in trees and sleeping in what shelter he could find. Luckily he found his comrades, and 28 days after

the landing, while advancing at Vire, France, a piece of German shrapnel ripped up his arm and put him in an Army hospital for five days.

He rejoined his unit in his drive toward the Rhine as the American offensive gathered force. Then the Battle of the Bulge erupted in a last and desperate German tactic to break the Allied advance and force it back into the sea. The effort almost succeeded before General Patton's powerful tank columns plunged through the German flank and stopped the enemy's momentum.

But Lane saw none of the outcome. A second piece of shrapnel sent him back to the hospital and added the cluster to his Purple Heart. He never entered Germany proper. After that second wound on December 13, 1944, he was evacuated to England and transferred to the finance department of the Eighth Air Force where he served until the end of the War.

The Bronze Star bears a smaller star within a larger. On the reverse is a circled legend with reads: "For Heroic or Meritorious Achievement" and within the circle is engraved "Lane Wells." The citation accompanying the medal states that its award is based on a combat infantryman's badge already received.

Each medal is accompanied by a military bar in colors and design to identify the wards and to be worn on the breast of a military tunic. There is also a tiny replica of that bar to be worn with civilian clothing.

But the medals and their bars will remain stored in their boxes against the day when they will become treasured souvenirs of the Lanes' daughter, Mrs. Avelon Wende of Cisco.

Rising Star Civic Leader Dead at 74

Hearts were saddened Thursday morning when word reached Rising Star residents of the death of A.D. (Jelly) Jenkins, 74, during the early morning hours at Hendrick Memorial Hospital in Abilene.

A.D. or (Jelly) as he was affectionately known, was a driving force in the economic growth of our community and was a progressive leader in all community affairs. This was evident in the twenty-five plus years that he was secretary-treasurer of the Rising Star Chamber of

Commerce. During his years with the Chamber he was instrumental in organizing the Rising Star Development Corp., which produced the Winfrey Feed and Peanut Co., a major peanut marketing and drying plant. Among his many interests was the Rising Star summer rodeo series, with which he devoted endless hours.

Adrain came to Rising Star in 1922. He attended Southwestern Military Academy and found himself playing tackle and end on the Oak Cliff teams.

During the late twenties, he worked in the Central Texas Oil Fields.

Mr. Jenkins served in World War II making aircraft. After the war he seriously engaged in stock farming and also worked in the oil fields as a driller, producer and lease dealer.

Mr. Jenkins wife, Alva whom he married October 16, 1926 in Ranger then drew him closer into her already successful insurance career. They purchased the Robertson Agency when Mr. Robertson suddenly died in 1952. Mr. Jenkins retained his life insurance and real estate business in the office located on Hwy. 36 even after his retirement in 1976.

The influence Adrain Jenkins had in the progress of Rising Star will continue to be felt for many years despite his passing.

Funeral services were held Saturday, August 19th at 2 p.m. in the Rising Star Church of Christ.

Owen Aikin, minister, officiated, assisted by Dick Williams, pastor of the First Baptist Church. Burial followed in the Rising Star Cemetery.

Mr. Jenkins was born April 8, 1904 in Gustine.

He was a member of the Church of Christ where he taught a Bible class for 27 years. He was also a member of the Masonic Lodge.

Survivors include two sons, Don of Bartlettville, Okla. and Bob of Houston; a daughter, Mrs. Johnnie Sue Enciso of Dallas; a brother, LaRoe of Breckenridge; two sisters, Eva Argyle of Seattle, Wash. and Inez Buzbee of Austin; nine grandchildren; and seven great-grandchildren.

His wife, one brother and one sister preceeded him in death.

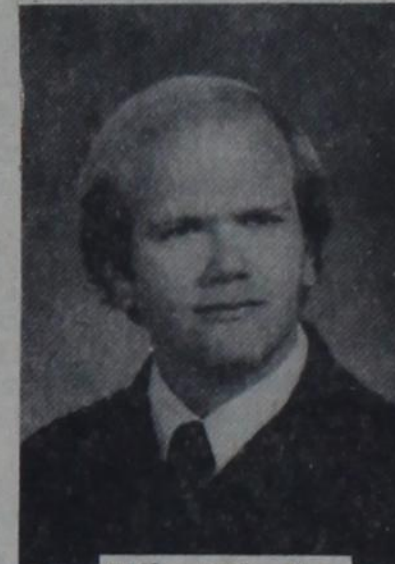

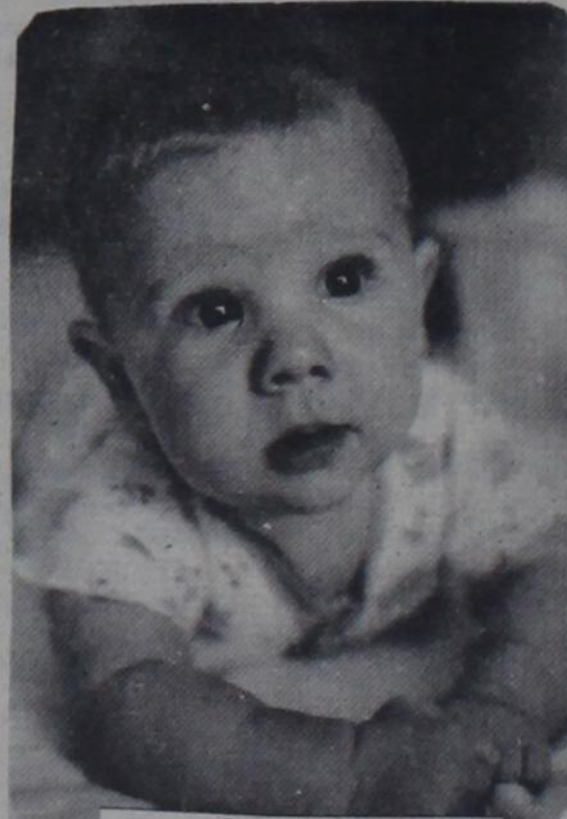
3 1/2, and a seven-week-old baby boy, Walter.

GORDON SPOT

Champions from Eastland County and particularly Rising Star are more common than uncommon whether it be calves or pecans. For example, Jack Setser entry of Choctaw pecans were named State Champions of Inshell pecans at the State Pecan Show in Kerrville last month. Jack's pecan orchard which is known as "Acers of Joy" is located on highway 36 west of Rising Star. The pecans were produced in 1977, was named champion of the Eastland County Pecan Show and Champion of the Regional Pecan Show in Fort Worth in December.

Two other Eastland County pecan entries won first place in the State show. Dan Children caddo pecans and James Alexander's Halbert pecans both won first place. Dan recently moved from Eastland to Cottonwood and James lives near Pioneer. James also had the second place John Garner pecans and the third place natives at the State Show.

Be on the lookout for Fall Army worms in lawns and coastal bermuda pastures. Green bermuda grass in late August seems to be an invitation to army worms. We found very small worm in lawns last Thursday. The tip of the grass appear white as the small worms begin feeding.

The worms are easiest killed when they are small. Insecticides to use in the

lawn include Carbaryl (Sevin), diazinon (Spectracide) or trichlorfon (Dylox). Evening applications are preferred. Do not water or mow lawn for 48 hours after application.

You can begin a productive fall garden now that will supply you with an even better looking crop than your spring garden. But if you want that fall garden to produce, don't try to nurture the plants that are still left in your spring gardens. You need vigorously growing plants, so start from scratch with fresh seeds.

Fall gardens have a definite advantage over spring gardens. Since the soil is warmer, germination occurs quicker and the seedling has a better chance to reach its maximum potential.

Since most vegetables are of a subtropical origin, the warm summer months give seedlings a better beginning. A fall garden also allows you mature plants to thrive in the cooler fall months instead of suffering from hot weather as spring vegetables do.

Many vegetables do exceptionally well in a fall garden, including lettuce, broccoli, cabbage, brussels sprouts, greens, cauliflower and carrots.

To achieve the best in quality and quantity from your fall garden, plant early enough to allow the crop to reach its full potential by the first frost.

Sales Tax City Rebates

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Tuesday said Texas cities netted a record \$236.4 million in sales tax revenues during the 1978 fiscal year, a 14.8 percent increase over the previous budget year.

Peanut growers in Eastland County are optimistic about the peanut crop says County Extension Agent De Gordon. Good rain came the first week of August just when the peanuts needed abundant moisture. The peanuts plant's need for moisture is greatest when the plant is 60 to 90 days of age. Good moisture at that time provides the plants the opportunity to grow a vine and encourages rapid flowering to produce pods. The rain not only helped dry land peanuts, but was also beneficial to irrigated crops. The rains took some pressure off the irrigation wells and also recharged the wells with a new supply of water. Many of wells were getting weak as a result of the drought the last year. Although the peanut crop looks good now, growers can not be assured of a good crop without more rains in the next two or three weeks. The agent says dry hot winds the last few days are causing peanuts to wilt and

be stressed for moisture. Late August and September rains will be needed for the pods to mature into high quality peanuts. Peanut growers need a very good crop in 1978 to off set heavy losses suffered in 1977. A year ago Eastland County growers harvested 34,140 acres and averaged 1,091 pounds yield per acre. Gordon said this yield would not have been so bad if a large portion of the crop had not been segregation III peanuts. The segregation III problem was caused by the drought and the peanuts were worth much less than the top grade peanuts. In summing up the peanut situation Gordon says the crop has never looked better in the first half of August, but weather during the next month and good production management will determine the size of the peanut crop. A bumper peanut crop could be worth from 9 to 10 million dollars to Eastland County.

In an effort to avoid subscription increases because of recent postal increases, your local newspaper to adopting a new renewal plan which hopefully will keep postal costs down so that subscription rates may remain as low as possible.

Cattle Numbers Continue Decline

COLLEGE STATION--Cattlemen across the nation are continuing to reduce their herds, but some point toward a buildup by next year.

Dr. Edward Uvacek, Jr., livestock marketing specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, notes that recently reported lower cattle numbers mean producers are still in the liquidation phase of the cattle cycle.

Total cattle and calf inventories on July 1 were 7 percent below a year ago while beef cows were down 9 percent. The specialist says beef cow replacement heifers were also down sharply, but nine states reported an increase in such heifers and one had no change from last year.

"This, in itself, might be signaling a somewhat different attitude among cattlemen and may point toward a buildup by next year," contends Uvacek. "Thus it appears cattle production is ending the old

cycle which began in 1967. If this prediction is correct, cattle numbers should increase during the next few years.

"This new buildup, however, may be extremely rapid and somewhat shortened," believes the marketing specialist. "I look for another peak in numbers by 1985 or 1986."

Uvacek says the calving rate is still extremely low. The 1978 calf crop is estimated to be 4 percent smaller and come from 7 percent fewer beef cows. Of course, this calf crop number is only a preliminary figure and will be finalized at the end of the year.

Feeder cattle and calves available for feedlots in the second half of this year are also down compared to a year ago. The specialist points out that while the feedlot demand probably won't continue at its present rate, these reduced supplies should still keep feeder prices favorable.
