The Rising Star City Council met in a called meeting May 19, 1977. Mayor John Lee called the meeting to order. Floyd Joyce, Franklin Cox, Lavelle Killion and Weldon Lee answered roll call.
Floyd Joyce made a motion to renew the contract with Graves heirs to buy gas from Crownover well for 90¢ per MCF. The contract will be in effect for 3 years. An addendum will be added to existing contract to extend this lease. Motion seconded the motion and it carried.
Weldon Lee made a motion to adopt a resolution authorizing Mayor John Lee to borrow up to \$125,000. From First State Bank for 1 year - subject to extension if need be. The money will be used for updating gas system. The motion was seconded by Floyd Joyce and the motion carried.

Son of a mountain sman and early settler of Texas, L.L. (Pa) Epley was born May 25, 1880 near Sweetwater in Nolan County. At an early age, he and his brothers and sisters moved to Williams' Ranch on the Bayou in Mills County. Later, at the request of the Mob, Dan Epley and his family left their home with their few possessions and headed for the Oklahoma Territory Land Rush in a wagon. The family remained here for two years, returning to Mills County near Mullin. It was here that Pa met and married Alice Fisher, daughter of William P. Fisher, in December of 190. Over a year later, they traveled to Jarrell in Williamson County and it was there in 1914 that their son, Earl Epley was born. In 1915, the Epley's moved to Brown County, near May, where they have remained for some 60 years. During this time, he and his son Earl were actively engaged in ranching. In 1970, Pa became a resident of the Twilite Acre Nursing Home in Rising Star. Helping him celebrate his 97th birthday Wednesday will be his son, and wife, and Mr. and Mrs. Earl EPLEY OF May; three grandchildren, Billy Epley and Herman Epley both of May; and Mrs. Adrain Beck of Early; and four great-grandchildren.

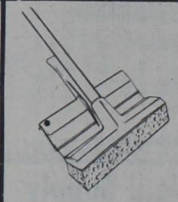

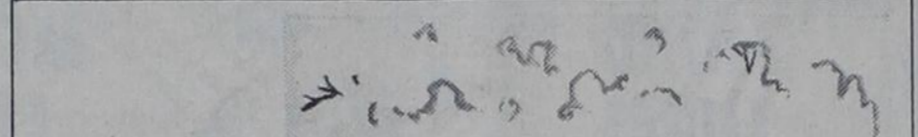

FARM ACCIDENT SURVEY UNDER WAY

A statewide farm accident survey in progress shows that farm machinery and recent winter weather have taken their toll. The survey involves some 300 volunteers who are collecting facts about accidents on a

sample of 3,000 Texas farms and ranches. Early returns of accident descriptions indicate the 30 per cent have involved slips and falls, with the majority involving falls on ice. Other falls included those from ladders and slips and falls on mud. Another 30 per cent of the reported

accidents involved machinery, with tractors leading the list. Other accidents involved the mishandling of animals, inadequate lifting of materials, and misuse of handtools, points out a safety engineer with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Info For Filing Disability Claim

Persons applying for disability benefits can help the social security office process their claims if they will bring with them the following information, according to Glyn Hammons, Manager of the Abilene Social Security Office.

Since the Social Security Administration secures the medical reports directly from your doctors, bring with you the names, addresses, telephone numbers and approximate dates of visits to your doctors. If you have been in a hospital, you will be asked the name and addresses of the hospital and the dates you were a patient in the hospital. Also, you will need your birth certificate, military discharge papers and workmen's compensation papers. If you have children who may be paid benefits, we will need their birth certificates and their social security numbers.

Information about the work you have done is needed. Bring your income tax return if you were self-employed and your statement of Earnings Form W-2 from your employer if you worked for wages. You will also be asked for the names and addresses of previous employers.

Bring as much of this information with you when you contact the social security office to file your claim as you can since it is needed to complete your claim for disability benefits.

If you have questions about the social security disability benefits or information needed to file a claim, contact your social security office at 142 South Pioneer, Abilene, Texas.

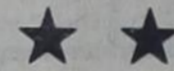

POST PLANTING CARE OF YOUNG TREES--Summer is a critical period of recently planted shade and ornamental trees, says a landscape horticulturist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Water is the prime need since trees lose a great deal of moisture from the leaves and

stems. Also, young, transplanted trees have a limited root system so they can only use water that is close by. Trees should be watered regularly, once a week on sandy soil and 10 days to two weeks on clay or loam soil. The soil should be moist to 12 to 18 inches after watering.

These early saints would never have dreamed of breaking that link, either through indifference to the appointment or by lengthening the period between the Memorial Feast. It was weekly and it was extremely meaningful each time they engaged in it.

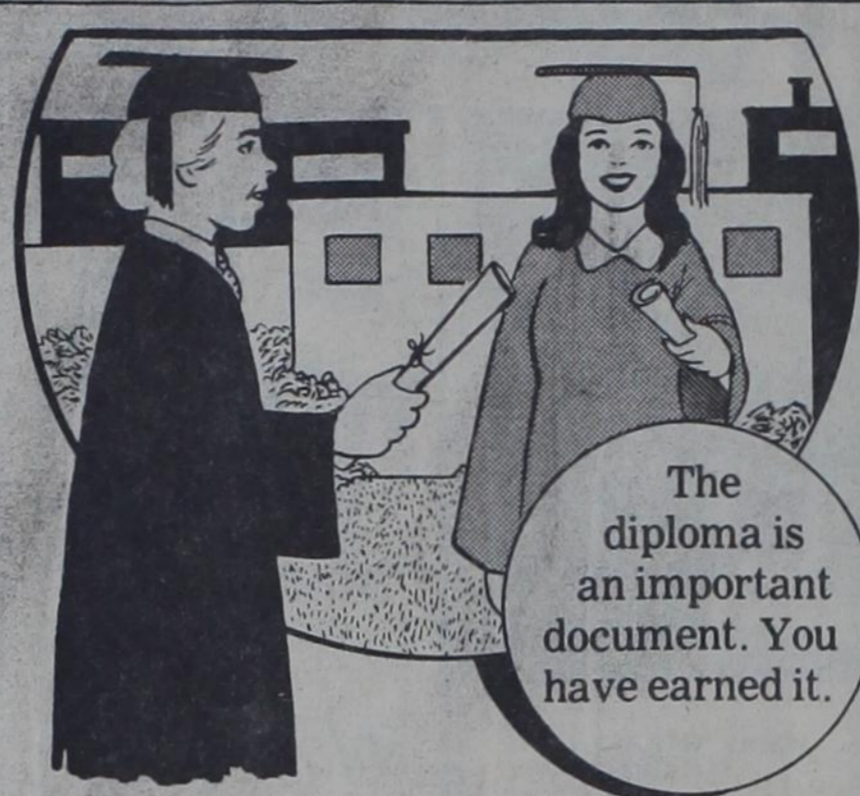
Calvary Full Gospel Assembly

GORDON SPOT

Pecan nut casebearers have started laying eggs on pecans in Eastland County, reports DeMarquis Gordon, County Extension Agent for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. This means that pecan producers and homeowners should check their trees closely for egg deposits and nutlet damage by newly emerged larvae and begin a spray program if necessary. Cool night time temperatures during the past 3 weeks have resulted in erratic moth activity. Eggs are deposited on the tip of the developing nutlets.

Egg lay and hatch has been noted in several areas during the past week. Field inspections made in Eastland County indicate the best time for spray application will be now through June 1. Producers with early maturing varieties will need to treat a few days earlier than areas with late maturing pecans.

Insecticide applications should begin soon after the first nutlet damage is observed, points out Gordon. Many producers treat too early for this pest. It is best to have 1 percent to 2 percent entries before sprays are applied. A second application may be required where eggs are found and nutlet damage continues 7 to 10 days after the first application.

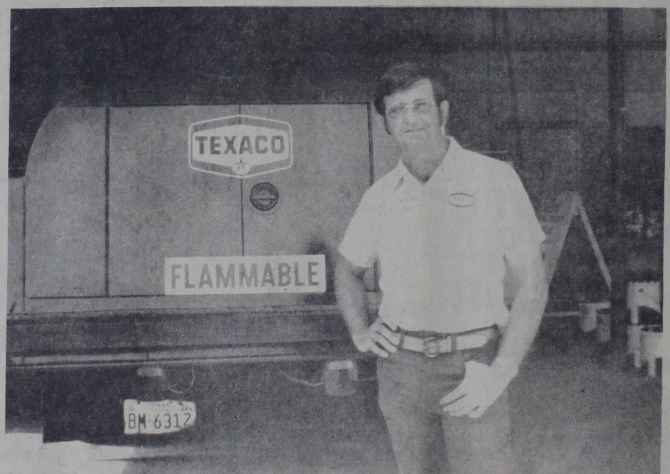
