

Editor's Note: The following letter was written by Mr. Ben A. Butler to Hon. Dolph Briscoe, Mr. DeBerry, Engineering Director and other state officials concerning the lack of denotation with regard to the IH- 20 exit for Rising Star.

Dear Governor Briscoe: Twenty miles North of Rising Star runs Interstate 20, a veritable greensward of highway signs and construction dedicated to the laudable purpose that no motorist who uses our Texas highways should ever suffer

inconvenience, delay or danger in traveling from one place to another within our State or to other States. It is beautifully engineered and built and has saved

millions of hours of time for the traffice that uses it. It is essential to our economy and to a military competence, should ever there be (and God forbid it) an act of war against us. How easy it is to travel upon it; what a monument to the genius of Texas highway builders! I am proud of it; I enjoy driving upon it!

But I drive also in a sense of some intimate sadness - as if in the bigness of its concept - - its leaping architecture across the vastness of West Texas, it seems to have lost something of a spiritual significance, a recognition which gives meaning to mechanics and technology, as people of power and responsibility so often acquire a belittling conviction of distant and vague omnipotence. No government, no political organization, which does not interpret its benefits in terms of direct service to the individual, is worthy of the

important, the motorists who use our highways - - and thousands of strangers pass through Rising Star every week - - are entitled to dependable and accurate highway directions. The question is suggested:

Just how reliable and politically honest are the publications and signs which purport to guide the flow of State traffic?

The temptation is to suspicion and bitterness, but ill will is a poor substitute for reason. We know in our just moments that our higher public officials carry opburdens responsibility, including all too recurrent and costly political campaigns, that absorb far too much of their time and effort.

But somewhere in those warrens that spread along Congress Avenue and the environs of Barton Creek are those who know better and the question we would ask them is: "Why?"

Rising Star is not a beautiful town in some uncitizenlike aspects. But it has some of the most beautiful and talented people to be found in any community near its size. I know; I've

By what right, I ask, does the Texas Department of Highways or the overlording Bureau of Public Roads erase from the physical map of IH- 20 a community of more than 1,200 people bearing the most unique and one of the most beautiful in all the United

I should also mention that on Highway 36 from Abilene to Cross Plains there is not a single sign giving mileage or direction to Rising Star. The existing signs "Abilene- Cross Plains" and then "Abilene- Comanche", although Rising Star is 12 miles East of Cross Plains and between it and Comanche.

Palace Drug Store was once burgarlized again Wednesday morning between the hours of 3 and 4 in the morning.



State at Large includes all peanut producing counties in the State of Election of these members

The application must be signed by the candidate and by at least ten peanut producers who are qualified to vote in the election and must be filed at least thirty (30) days prior to the elec-

No candidate, unless so nominated, shall have his name placed on the official ballot. However, this does not prevent the writing of the name of any candidate on the ballot by any qualified voter at the election. Spaces shall be provided on the ballot for such write in candidates.

### Working Parents May Receive **Payments**

Working parents who earned less than \$8,000 last year may again be eligible for payments of up to \$400

from the government. To qualify for Earned Income Credit persons must have had an adjusted gross imcome or earned income of less than \$8,000 in 1977 and must have maintained a household for the entire year for their child who was under 19, a full-time student or a disabled dependent.

For eligible persons the credit is 10 percent of the first \$4,000 of earned income with a maximum credit of \$400. The credit is reduced by one dollar for each \$10 of earned or adjusted gross income over \$4,000 phasing completely at the \$8,000 income mark.

The credit can be applied

From IRS

against income taxes owed or, where no tax is owned can be received as a refund. Eligible persons can qualify

for Earned Income Credit even though they may have paid in no income tax during the year, but the IRS stressed that they must file .a 1977 Federal income tax return to get it. The IRS will automatically compute the credit for taxpayers. Eligible Form 1040 filers must write "EIC" and the name of the qualifying child on line 57 of the return. Taxpayers who file Form 1040A need only write the name of the qualifying child on line 10. Publication 596, "Tax Benefit for Low-Income Individuals," contains details on Earned Income Credit and is available free at offices.

"From an income tax standpoint there are two types of income- - ordinary and capital gains. The basic difference in the two is the way they are taxed," says Trimble, an agricultural economist.

## An Appeal From Chief







### 1978 Crop Peanut Support Levels, Sales Policy For

Washington: National average support levels of \$420. per short ton for 1978 crop quota peanuts and \$250. per short ton for 1978 crop additional peanuts were announced today by

Secretary of Agriculture Bob Bergland. The \$420. quota level is the legal minimum and the additional level is based on estimated export demand and prices.

The two tier level of support is new and required by the Food and Agriculture Act of 1977. For the 1977 crop, there was only one support level and \$430.50 per short ton, or \$410.50 per ton after a deduction of \$20. for storage, handling and inspection. This deduction will not be made under the 1978

Quota peanuts are those grown within the poundage quota established for the farm for the 1978 marketing year. Additional peanuts for the 1978 marketing year are those sold from the farm which are in excess of the

Sales of quota and additional peanuts for domestic edible use, including use as seed, will be made by CCC at not less than 105 percent of the quota loan rate, plus costs, if sold on or before December 31, 1978, or 107 percent of the quota loan value if sold after that date (exception: sales of additional peanuts for domestic edible use, -if sold and paid for during the harvest season at the time of delivery by the producer, will be made at not less than 100 percent of the quota loan value, plus costs). Sales policy for peanuts sold for export and domestic crushing will be announced a later

#### **Article And Feature** Writing Course At CJC




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


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
