

## Stenholm Makes Stop in Rising Star



Congressman Charles Stenholm addressed some fifty people early Wednesday morning as he made a brief stop in Rising Star on his way to another engagement in Abilene.

The Congressman spoke briefly outlining different programs and explaining various cuts the Reagan Administration has proposed. Stenholm also spoke of the national debt. "At this time, he said, we are faced with a trillion dollar debt." That is a staggering figure, almost incomprehensible to you and

I. To put it another way, Stenholm said, "To pay the interest alone on this figure—every man, woman and child living in the United States would have to pay \$400.00" Something must be done.

nate energy supplies, student loans and loans to auto manufacturers.

Stenholm introduced his Field Representative in this area. She is Beth Morgan, former assistant to Rep. Jim Wright. Beth is married to attorney, James Morgan. They reside in De Leon.

Ms. Wayna Criswell, English teacher at RSHS and a group of journalism students were also on hand to meet with the Congressman. Brad Barnes presented Mr. Stenholm with a decorated jar of jelly beans.

## Peanut Industry Faces Major Threat

According to Ross Wilson, Secretary of the National Peanut Growers Group, it appears that an all out effort will be made by the Reagan Administration to make major changes in the peanut program.

He said that Agriculture Secretary John Block has informed Georgia Congressman Charles Hatcher and Georgia State Agriculture Commissioner Tommy Irvin that USDA will seek to abolish the peanut acreage allotment. Such a change in peanut legislation would enable anyone who so desires to produce peanuts. Poundage quotas would also be phased out under the USDA proposal by reducing present farm quotas 10 % per year during the period 1982-1985. The administration also calls for the current quota support rate to be maintained throughout the life of the bill. The end result of the administration proposal, Wilson said, would be elimination of the traditional peanut program.

Wilson said indications that USDA planned such legislative changes were picked up by growers attending House Agriculture Committee Hearings in Washington on March 18. He said meetings by growers with Under Secretary Seeley Lodwick on March 19 confirmed that the Department was considering elimination of the allotment provision. Further, he said a meeting on the same day between Georgia Congressman Charles Hatcher and Agriculture Secretary Block confirmed the intent of USDA to proceed with such a plan.

Growers are shocked by the administration plan for drastic program changes since Secretary Block had assured growers in a meeting in Washington on February 6 that the administration would not do anything to destroy the present peanut program. Further, growers feel that they had a commitment from Reagan

gram.

Campaign leaders prior to the November 4, 1980 presidential election. National peanut Growers Group officials say that a dismantling of the peanut acreage allotment system together with further substantial cuts in farm poundage quotas would mean the end of the peanut program in any meaningful form. By 1985 former allotment holders and non allotment holders would produce and market peanuts on the same basis. Therefore, peanut production would probably shift from many sections traditionally planted to peanuts to sections with greater production potential. However, due to high risks involved in peanut production and high production costs it is believed that peanut supplies would be erratic resulting in increased prices to consumers. In contrast, the traditional peanut program with production controls and price stability has provided an abundant supply of

peanuts at reasonable prices to consumers. Peanut Growers are urged by the National Peanut Growers Group and all state and regional peanut grower associations to contact their elected representatives in Washington to express their interest in maintaining acreage allotments and quotas with a reasonable level of quota price support. Under the present allotment system the Comanche County peanut crop returned over \$18 million to farmers in 1979. The 1979 Texas peanut crop sold for some \$116 million at the farm level. The monetary return to producers is multiplied several times as it revolves throughout the county and community economic system. The abolishment of the peanut allotment system would be a disaster to the farm and agribusiness segments and would result in massive curtailment of the local economy in communities throughout the peanut belt.

## Wilson Has Announced CF Bike-A-Thon

Doris Wilson, chairperson of the CF Bike-a-Thon, has announced that the event will take place April 4 at 9 a.m. at City Park.

Cystic Fibrosis is inherited lung and digestive disease which is presently incurable. In fact, it is the nation's leading genetic killer of children.

Geneticists estimate that one in every 20 Americans is an unknowing and symptomless carrier of the CF gene. If a child receives a CF gene from each of two unsuspecting gene carriers, the child will be born with cystic fibrosis.

Parents are often astounded and confused when their child is diagnosed as having CF. Many people incorrectly assume that since CF is hereditary, they or other members of their family must have had the disease for their child to inherit it. But a CF gene can be passed through many generations before it is paired with another CF gene.

Currently there is not a reliable test for determining if an individual is a carrier of the CF gene. Through its various activities the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation is funding research to devise an effective carrier test


and to find a cure or permanent control for cystic fibrosis. The Foundation also supports CF Centers around the country.

## 1st Class Stamps—18¢

Postmaster Don Boyett announced that effective March 22, the cost of mailing a first class letter increased from 15 cents to 18 cents. He also stated that similar increases will be observed in second, third, fourth and other services provided by the Post Office including certified, registered, money orders and box rents.

Nondenominated "B" postage stamps, temporary stamps worth 18 cents went on sale last week. These are available in 100 stamp sheets, coils and books. Three cent stamps are also available for per-

sons still having 15 cent stamps in their possession.

The "B" stamps are for use only in the United States and are prohibited on international mail.

The supply of "B" stamps will eventually be phased out and replaced by a regular 18 cent stamp. Except for the background color, the design on the "B" stamp is identical to the "A" stamp used under similar conditions in 1978. The 1981 stamp is purple and white, while the 1978 stamp was orange and white.



## News Release of Bob Bullock

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Thursday said newspaper reporters who have become self-appointed critics of optional equipment purchases on state-owned vehicles should have been riding in a Comptroller's Suburban which crashed and killed an employee last summer.

"Can these cub reporters put a dollar value on the loss of Carolyn Boyd's life?" Bullock asked.

"Sure, it costs us \$40,000 in death benefits, but what about the cost of human tragedy?"

Ms. Boyd was killed on June 7, 1980, just south of Dallas when the 1979 Chevrolet Suburban she was driving went out of control and plunged down an embankment.

"If I could go back and buy one more piece of optional equipment to prevent that accident I would buy it," Bullock said.

"Here's a 90-pound woman driving a ton and a half truck—but these are things that reporters don't think or care about."

Bullock blamed the recent rash of stories about his vehicle purchases on Waco Herald-Tribune reporter Laylan Copelin "being in unholy cahoots with C.C. Jones of Mart, the Chevrolet dealer who recently sold the Comptroller's Department

a 1981 Suburban.

"Jones is mad because he won the bid and lost money on it," Bullock said. "But the newspapers haven't seen fit to publish that side of the story."

Bullock said Jones bid on the Suburban with certain options like radial tires which were not on the vehicle when it arrived.

"We wouldn't take it. We made him live up to his bid and he's mad about it," Bullock said.

"Jones isn't mad because we spent \$11,000 on the truck—he's mad because we wouldn't spend another \$500 to cover his mistake," Bullock said.

"The people of Texas can rest assured that we've spent our last dollar with this fellow in Mart," Bullock said. "It's obvious that the lowest bid isn't always the best."

"The newspapers know this but they won't print it."

## SSI Eligibility Reviewed

Eligibility for Supplemental Security Income (SSI) payments is reviewed regularly. Glyn Hammons of the Abilene Social Security Office said today that the 1981 SSI annual eligibility reviews are underway in this area, and will continue throughout the year.

Individuals and couples who receive SSI checks are required to report changes in income, resources, and living arrangements as they occur. The annual review insures that changes which could affect payments are not overlooked. "The intent of the annual review," Hammons says, "is to assure that each eligible person gets the amount of money he, or she, is entitled to—not more, and not less."

In the 11 counties served by the Abilene office, 4700 people receive monthly SSI payments, which are based on need and are paid to disabled individuals, including children, and to people age 65 and over who are living on very low incomes. The SSI program is a federal assistance program, and the funds come

from general revenues. SSI payments are sometimes confused with Social Security benefit payments, Hammons commented. Social Security benefit payments are an earned right, based on work under the Social Security program. However, both programs are handled by the Social Security Administration.

As a part of the eligibility review, many SSI recipients will receive a short questionnaire in the mail. The questionnaire should be completed and mailed back to Social Security within five days. Some people will be asked to telephone an office. Others will be asked to appear at a Social Security office for a more detailed review.

Hammons urges those who have questions about the SSI program, or the annual eligibility review, to telephone 695-1240. Representatives are available between 9 am and 4:30 pm to help with SSI matters. If you live outside Abilene, you can call toll free 1-800-392-1603



## Taxing Farms on Use

COLLEGE STATION—Taxing farms and ranches according to their agricultural use rather than their fair market value can mean substantial savings to farm families on the death of the landowner.

Savings in estate taxes can be as much as 50 percent for those that qualify, said Dr. Lorence L. Bravenec

at an Estate Planning Seminar held recently at Texas A&M University. The seminar was sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service of the Texas A&M University System.

The opportunity for farm and ranch families to reduce their estate taxes came about with Internal Revenue Code Sec-

tion 2032 A enacted in 1976. The law set forth provisions for special use valuation for farms and ranches. Purpose of the provision was to help family farms and ranches. Purpose of the provision was to help family farms survive financially and not be taxed out of existence, noted Bravenec, a Texas A&M professor of accounting.

For an estate to qualify, numerous requirements must be met:

1. The property must be used actively for farming or ranching.
2. The owner or a close relative must be actively involved in working the property.
3. The owner must have some "risk" involved or have an "economic interest" in the operation.
4. The property must pass from the descendant to a close relative.
5. It must be owned and used for agricultural purposes at least five years before the descendant's death.
6. The owner or a close relative must be paying self-employment tax and must work the land full-time or do all the necessary work if less than full-time. In addition to these requirements, there are numerous other factors involved in establishing a farm or ranch estate for special use valuation, noted Bravenec. A landowner that is interested in this special IRS treatment of agricultural land should contact his tax lawyer or accountant for further details.

"When you look at this as a percentage change in taxable income," Stenholm said, "the lower the income level, the greater the tax relief to that individual. The elderly, generally in a low tax bracket, and those whose interest income comprises approximately one quarter of all income they receive in any given taxable year, would be particularly affected by this bill."

Stenholm said his bill would serve as companion legislation to the Small Savers Provision, introduced earlier in the Senate by Texan Lloyd Bentsen.

"This type of tax relief would take a serious step toward reducing the penalty forced on those who try diligently to save, only to see any advantage eaten up by inflation," Stenholm said. "And by putting more money into savings we can make that capital available for investments in industry and housing needed to increase our productivity and thereby curbing inflation."

"Japanese citizens save 20 percent of their disposable income," he said, "and West Germans save 13 percent, while Americans only manage to save 5 percent of their disposable income. Even the Britons, whose country has become synonymous with high inflation and low productivity, manage to set aside 11 percent of their disposable income."

Stenholm said the measure would not only encourage increased savings, but would help reduce interest rates, control inflation and encourage vitally needed capitol formation.

Stenholm cited a report by the National Association of Realtors that showed that more than 80 percent of all tax returns on which

WASHINGTON, D.C.--Congressman Charles W. Stenholm introduced legislation this week that he would provide one of the most important inflation-free tax cuts to effect lower and middle income Americans this year.

The bill, H.R. 2240, would increase the amount of the exemption of certain interest and dividend income from taxation, raising the amount of tax-free interest from \$200 to \$1,000 for a single person and from \$400 to \$2,000 for a married couple filing a joint return.

"This will encourage many people to save," Stenholm said, pointing out that U.S. savings performance ranks the lowest of the major industrial countries.



#### CONSUMERS HAVE BIG STAKE IN FOOD, FIBER PRODUCTION

While many American consumers get no closer to agriculture than the

supermarket, they still have a real stake in keeping the U.S. a leader in agriculture, contends a Texas Agricultural Extension Service economist in marketing.

Dr. Carl Anderson says farm and urban people depend on each other for products and services that are essential to modern business and living.

"One group can't live without the other. Together they make the best food and fiber team in the world," Anderson, who is based at Texas A&M University adds.

Anderson believes that a basic ingredient for the economic, political and social success of a country is a highly productive agricultural base, which gives a nation the capacity to feed its own people and also to export for economic gain as well as humanitarian purposes.

"Food in this country is still an incredible bargain, with Americans spending 19% of after-tax income for food and beverages. It costs 35% of disposable income to feed a family in Italy, 45% in Poland and the Soviet Union, and a staggering 60% in India," Anderson says.

Agriculture is this nation's leading employer, exporter, and the No. 1 industry in the U.S. "Today, one U.S. worker now produces enough food for

about 48 people at home and another 22 overseas. At the turn of the century, one American farm worker could feed only 7 people," Anderson emphasizes.

In Texas, one out of every 25 persons is a farmer or rancher, yet about 30% of the state's retail trade business is directly associated with agricultural production and selling of food and fiber products. Additionally, thousands of businesses are active in food and fiber production, transportation, processing, packaging, storing, advertising, distribution and other activities associated with feeding, clothing, and to some extent, housing people.

"Agriculture makes a large contribution to the wealth and well-being of our state. Because quality food is available at affordable prices, a larger part of our income is available to buy other things," the economist emphasizes.

The outlook for continued growth in Texas agriculture is bright, and the demand for food and fiber from countries overseas is growing. With good export facilities, the state's agricultural industry is ready to expand its share of the export market—which in turn will translate into more jobs and income for both rural and urban citizens.

# Two By Two - still unique individuals

Although twins are enjoying a new focus of attention, it's important to remember that each is a unique individual with rights and needs, says Dorothy Taylor, a family life education specialist.

## TWINS IN SPOTLIGHT

If you think you're seeing or hearing more about twins these days, there may be several reasons.

Twins have always intrigued family researchers, parents and people-watchers, Ms. Taylor says.

As more adults, adopted as

children, search for their natural families, the interest in phenomenal similarities of separated twins has reached an all-time high, she adds.

Ms. Taylor is on the home economics staff of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

Why are twins so special in the human species? Mankind naturally has paid special attention to its offspring. When the offspring come two by two, mankind

as a whole does a "doubletake" in terms of attention given, the specialist explains.

In addition, there are more twins these days than in the past, Ms. Taylor says.

When fertility drugs were introduced in the early 1960's, there was sudden increase in multiple births.

## TWIN STATISTICS

Birth rates of twins are different in various parts of the world, among different aged mothers and among different races.

Twinning rates for whites average about one of every 90 births. For blacks the average is about one of every 73 births.

Scandinavian rates are one of every 62 births, and Yoruba tribe in Nigeria has the highest rate: one of every 25 births. Orientals tend to have the lowest living-twin rate.

Experts are not quite sure why, but older women are more likely to produce two or more eggs at a time.

Women between ages 35-39 are three times as likely to have twins as women under age 20.

Furthermore, because of medical advancements and improved health care, more twins survive today.

## TWINS OF OLD

Our fascination with twins will probably remain so for years to come, just as it has historically.

Twins have played an important role in Biblical history, mythology and literature. Shakespeare featured twins in several of his comedies, probably because he was the father of fraternal twins himself.

## FRATERNAL OR IDENTICAL?

What is a twin?

There are two different kinds, fraternal and identical.

Identical twins begin as a single fertilized egg which divides and becomes two identical fetuses.

Fraternal twins - the vast majority - result when two mature eggs are released by the mother and fertilized at approximately the same time.

Fraternal twins can be different in numerous ways - sex, looks and size.

## TWINS 'TEACH' SPECIES

While we are fascinated by twins, we can also learn about the human being from twins, Ms. Taylor points out.

Over the years genetic and behavioral studies have used twins for comparative research.

## EACH TWIN UNIQUE

While twins receive attention from the world, their parents are facing a twofold challenge - that of childrearing and that of rearing twins as two separate, individual children.

Providing an environment for individualism, uniqueness and independence for each twin is difficult when two children are in the same physical environment, share similar family experiences, are the same age, are in the same stage of growth and development and share special bonds that

other brothers and sisters may not understand, Ms. Taylor says.

Parents can promote uniqueness and individuality among twins by treating them as individual children, dressing them different, doing things with each one, encouraging separate classrooms and evaluating each for his own accomplishment - not comparing, the specialist advises.

Twin means two - two separate people, Ms. Taylor emphasizes.

(ED. NOTE: It has been reported that Kentucky has the highest number of twins born among the 50 states.)

#### COMMENTARY

Sheba, and Dedan, and the Merchants of Tarshish, with all the young lions thereof, shall say unto thee, art thou come to take a spoil? Hast thou gathered thy company to take a prey? to carry away silver and gold, and take away cattle and goods, to take a great spoil? (Ezekiel 38:13). Sheba and Dedan represent a small number of Arabs

who will not participate in the attack of Israel. The merchants of Tarshish are Western powers who by this time will be under the control of the antichrist, soon to be revealed for who he is and to become the final world dictator.. There are four time factors that allow us to arrive at the approximate time of the war between Russia and Israel.—The war takes place in the "Latter years" Ezek. 38:8, or the "latter days" Ez. 38:16).—The war can only take place when the Jews are in their land. This prophecy could not be fulfilled before 1948. Any invasion of the Middle East by Russia previous to statehood for Israel would have been meaningless in regard to this prophecy. The enactment of this scene in the last days also guarantees the survival of Israel until the war with Russia. Were the Arabs to succeed in destroying the Jews, it would be impossible to fulfill Ezekiel's prophecy.—At the time of the invasion of Israel, Russia must be a major military power a fact that guarantees the survival of Russia until the war with Israel. The increase of Russian military might is well known, but that immense and fearsome buildup would have no prophetic significance if the Jews were not in their homeland. Conversely, the gigantic Russian arms effort in view of the present Middle East situation must be seen as preliminary to an attack on Israel as prophesied by Ezekiel.—This war between Russia and Israel must take place when the Jews are dwelling securely in their land. The threat of Arab invasion will therefore have been removed to the point

that the Jews feel safe: "And thou shalt say, I will go up to the land of unwalled villages; I will go to them that are at rest, that dwell safely, all of them dwelling without walls, and having neither bars nor gates" Ez.38:11
