Ricky Bible opened Rising Star One Stop service station Monday. It is the former Conoco station on E. College.

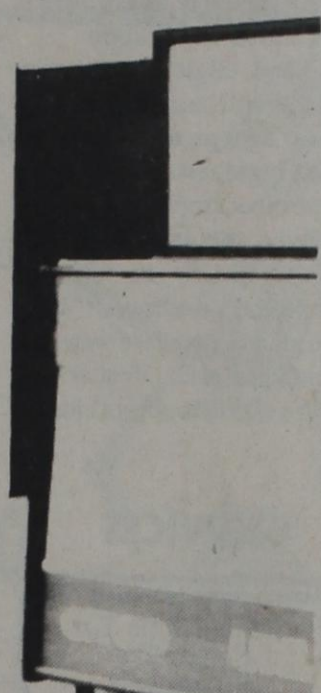

## Special Election: Watson Favored by Eastland County, Turner Led District

Richard Watson of Gorman took an overwhelming lead in Eastland County in the Feb. 2 Special Election for State Representative, 65th District.

With a total of 806 votes out of 1764 cast, Watson came out far ahead of Ben Doyle Sudderth (226), Martha Parker (201), Robert R (Bob) Turner (179), and H.A. Jefferies (163).

Others in this eleven-candidate race drew a scattering vote across the county, with a write-in candidate getting one vote in Pct. 3 (Ranger).

Watson carried every county Precinct box except Rising Star. He chalked up an even stronger lead in the absentee votes. Out of an official tabulation of 198 early votes he drew 108. Martha Parker drew 21 on absentee.

## RC&D Project County Job Fair Planned

The Eastland County Committee of the Leon-Bosque Resource Conservation and Development Area (RC&D) has targeted a problem for possible solutions. A countywide job fair has been scheduled for Feb. 21, 1991 at Siebert Elementary School in Eastland. Persons interested are free to come by at any time between the hours of 2:30 and 5:30 p.m.

Ron Bailey, Soil Conservation Service, said, "the purpose of the upcoming meeting will be to provide information on educational opportunities for school drop-outs, single parents, and others that are unemployed that would like to improve their lot in life. We have two Jr. Colleges and five high schools in Eastland County and there is an excellent opportunity for the jobless to continue their education to improve their skills in order to get a job or to get a better job."

Bailey continued, "when this meeting is held, representatives will be present to talk one on one with the unemployed to show them how to continue their education, improve their job skills, and to make productive citizens."

## Public Notice City to Contract for Solid Waste Disposal

At their meeting on Tuesday, February 5, 1991 the Rising Star City Council voted to accept the contract

for solid waste collection and disposal with Browning-Ferris Industries (BFI) pending approval of the contract by the City Attorney Bill Wright

and with the insertion of a "Breach of Service Clause" in the contract.

The Council believes that BFI can and will be a good, reliable service provider and in the long run be a lot more cost effective, meaning cheaper, for our residents and

4% Franchise Tax coming back to the City.

While the City's rapidly aging sanitation and landfill equipment have become a major financial concern, the primary reason for going to a private provider of solid waste collection and disposal are the upcoming Environmental Protection Agency and Texas Health Department regulations that make owning and operating a landfill totally cost prohibitive for a small community.

The City was losing money hauling to the Eastland Landfill after closing our own landfill.

Details of the contract will be published in the paper next week.

The members of the Chamber will cast votes for the candidates and Miss Rising Star will be announced at the banquet in March.

## County Commissioners:

## Election Canvassed, Depositories Chosen

Eastland County Commissioners Monday canvassed the Feb. 2 election for State Representative, Dist. 65. County Clerk Joann Johnson told the Court that the election cost approximately \$3,000, and 1764 ballots were cast.

This was a light turnout, she said, considering that more than 10,000 voters are registered in the county.

Richard Watson was the winner in Eastland County, but reportedly placed fourth in the total of the six-county district.

On another matter, the Commissioners selected three banking institutions as depositories for county funds. First National Bank of Cisco was approved as depository for county funds. AmWest Savings of Eastland was selected to receive the County Clerk's trust funds, and Eastland National Bank will be depository for the District Clerk's trust fund.

County Judge Scott Bailey referred to a letter from People's Bank of Clyde, Rising Star Division, in which appreciation was expressed

for being notified of the bidding as a depository. People's Bank declined to bid this year, but indicated that bids might be placed in the future.

The Commissioners ratified and confirmed a contract with Rangers Ambulance Services, which now operates out of the fire station. Fire Chief Darrell Fox told the Commissioners that when Ranger General Hospital closed and the ambulance was transferred from there to the station, they saw that all the emergency equipment had been stripped from it.

Because the equipment was being held, \$5,000 had to be paid to reclaim it, Fox said.

The County is subsidizing emergency medical services in each of the county's four precincts.

Also authorized was a Grant Application to fund a clerk's salary for the District Attorney's office. This followed action taken Jan. 28, when Commissioners declared an emergency and appropriated funds not to exceed \$25,000 in a trial basis for a Criminal Investigator for the District Attorney.

Sudderth 20, and each of the others less.

The Eastland County native did not fare as well in other counties making up the District. Unofficial returns put Bob Turner in the lead, with Ben Doyle Sudderth second. Watson is reported to be fourth. The Governor is expected to canvass the Election next Friday, and may announce the date of the run-off Election at that time.

A run-off is necessary, since there was no clear majority by any candidate.

Voting was considered very light in Eastland County. With more than 10,000 registered voters, the 1764 total was a small one. This was an important election, and the run-off will be crucial for good representation in Austin.

USDA Announces ARP/CRP Signups and CRP Program Provisions for 1991

Secretary of Agriculture Clayton Yeutter announced the 1991 Acreage Reduction Program signup will be March 4 through April 26, and the 10th Conservation Reserve Program signup will be March 4 through March 15.

"Under new CRP program provisions, bids on eligible land will be accepted based on environmental benefits obtained per dollar of cost to USDA's Commodity Credit Corporation," Yeutter said.

Yeutter cautioned producers that they should not rely on bid amounts which have been accepted in previous years when making their bids. "In past signups, there was a high expectation that a producer could rely on no change occurring with respect to the bid amounts which would be accepted" he said. "Producers who wish to enroll in the CRP should be aware there is increased competition."

Land eligibility requirements will be expanded from past signups to include not only highly erodible land, but also other cropland acres that reduce the impairment of water quality or improve wellhead protection. "Well-heads are sources of water for municipalities," Yeutter said. "We expect to accept bids for

protection of these wellheads as well as areas designated by states as '319 areas', which have been determined to be a source of water quality problems." To increase water quality benefits under CRP, producers offering areas such as filterstrips, sod waterways, shelterbelts and contour grass strips will receive additional consideration during the bid evaluation process.

Yeutter said bids for enrolling wetlands will not be accepted during this signup. "The Food, Agriculture, Conservation and Trade Act of 1990 establishes a Wetland Reserve Program and we will announce details of this program in the near future," he said.

CRP bids will be accepted only for contracts beginning in 1991 and bid acceptance determinations will be made after a nationwide review and evaluation. Selection will be based on the environmental benefits received from placing the land in the CRP when compared to dollars of cost.

Yeutter said producers will be permitted to enter the same acreage simultaneously into the annual commodity programs and the CRP, and to withdraw from the commodity programs, without penalty, if their CRP bid is accepted.

USDA needs 30 days to evaluate and accept a bid but acceptance is not binding on either the producer or USDA until the contract is signed, he said.

Fifty percent cost-share assistance will continue to be available to establish needed permanent vegetative cover,

including trees, on the accepted acres. Annual rental payments for 10 years also will be paid to CRP participants, based upon their bid, except in some limited cases, such as hardwood tree planting, where a longer period may apply.

Further details will be made available to producers in the near future through their County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service offices.

ARP program provisions were announced December 31.

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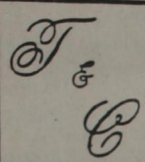

The State Board of Education has chosen Lionel R. Meno, deputy commissioner for elementary and secondary education at the New York State Education Department, as its nominee for the state's next commissioner of education.

The Board voted to nominate Meno for commissioner of education at a special meeting Saturday, Feb. 2. The nomination will be submitted to Governor Ann Richards, who, under state law, appoints the commissioner of education. The appointment also must be confirmed by the Senate. If appointed and confirmed, Meno will succeed W. N. Kirby, who retired after more than six years as commissioner Jan. 31.

Meno has been New York's deputy commissioner for elementary and secondary education since August 1988. The position is equivalent to the commissioner of education's job in Texas in that Meno oversees New York's public school system.

Prior to joining the New York State Education Department, Meno was superintendent of the Syracuse City Schools from 1979 to 1988. He was named to the post after serving nearly three years as deputy superintendent for the district, where he also worked as a curriculum resource specialist and team leader and teacher at the school system's Occupational Learning Center. He also served as coordinator of alternate learning programs for the Rensselaer-Columbia Board of Cooperative Educational Services in Castleton, New York, and was an adjunct professor of educational administration at Syracuse University and State University College in Oswego.

Meno holds a bachelor of arts in geography from Colgate University, a master of science in education and a certificate of advanced study

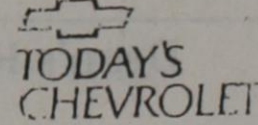
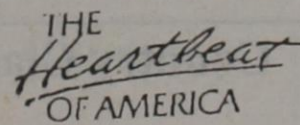

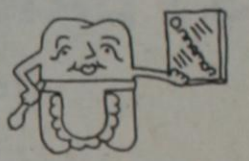

**Concerned About Cinnamon**

Q. What are cinnamon sores?  
A. Once thought to be an "old wives' tale", cinnamon sores are sparking new interest in dental researchers. The sores appear as white patches in the mouth, and cause a burning sensation. The culprit is cinnamon flavoring in candy, gum and dental rinses and pastes. This dental link especially concerns researchers, who fear people may increase their use of such rinses in attempts to relieve the sores, never realizing the rinse is causing the problem. If you think you might be suffering from cinnamon sores, stay away from cinnamon flavoring for a week - symptoms will usually abate. If they continue, or if you're still concerned, consult your dentist.

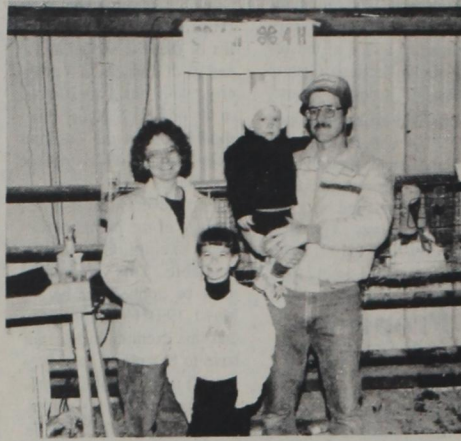

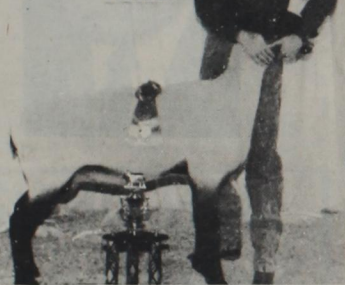

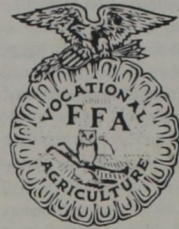

# Stenholm Honored For Efforts

The National Rural Health Association (NRHA) selected Congressman Charles Stenholm (D-TX) as its "Man of the Year" for his contributions toward improving health care services for rural Americans.

Stenholm, who is the Co-Chairman of the House Rural Health Care Coalition, was instrumental in the passage of the State Offices of Rural Health Grant Program last year during the 101st Congress. These grants are designed to encourage states to provide communities with the support and technical assistance they need to improve rural health care delivery. The

congressman was also instrumental in getting the Department of Agriculture and Health and Human Services to coordinate their efforts in regard to food safety and health education programs.

"It is my belief that rural health care will be one of the main issues of the 102nd Congress," said Stenholm. "I am honored to have been recognized by the National Rural Health Association because I firmly believe every individual in America has a right to good quality health care within a reasonable distance from where he or she may live."

The NRHA is a multidisci-

plinary organization addressing all aspects of the delivery of health care in rural areas. Its membership includes administrators, educators, physicians, private practice health professionals, hospi-

itals, community and migrant health centers and educational institutions in all 50 states.

## Cisco Writers Club Members To Have Book Published

After 30 years of research and writing, Elsa Turner of Albany is ready to publish her book, *A Charge To Keep*, a history of the First United Methodist Church of Albany.

Turner told fellow members of the Cisco Writers Club Tuesday night that Eakin Press of Austin will publish the book this spring. Students in the Albany High School typing class are preparing Turner's manuscript for the final decision to include the bad as well as the good about the church's history and its members— "whether to whitewash it or tell it like it is."

She continued, "Some of the most lovable people have the worst habits." For example, she told about a church member, now deceased, who was very well liked and a useful citizen, but also an alcoholic. She added that during her research, she had learned to "try to understand people instead of judging them."

At a previous meeting of the Cisco Writers Club, Turner read the book's first

chapter about the church's founder, John C. Lynch, Shackelford County judge, in whose large limestone house the services were held in the 1970's by Methodist circuit preachers.

Another segment of the books tells the colorful story about Dorothy Bell Albany, a doll sent from the church's Sunday school to a Methodist mission in Japan in 1929. The pastor's wife had bought the prettiest doll she could find at a local store. She was outfitted in a wardrobe made by the late Lizzie Dodge of Albany.

Turner said the Albany newspaper received a letter in 1978 from a Japanese man who had discovered the doll in a rural primary school. He sent pictures of the brown-haired, blue-eyed doll, who was still wearing her Lizzie Dodge creation, Turner said. Apparently, Dorothy Bell Albany had survived World War II by hiding in a closet.

## VA Headstones And Markers Still Available At No Cost

"The Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) is still providing government headstones and markers to identify the graves of veterans at no cost to them or their survivors," said Al Poteet, director of the Waco VA Regional Office. "Congress, through the recent federal budget agreement, directed changes in some monetary reimbursement benefits available to veterans," Poteet said. "However, there was no change in the program that authorizes us to provide headstones and markers to veterans at no cost."

Jo Ann K. Webb, director of VA's National Cemetery System (NCS), said, "We provide headstones and markers at no cost to the veteran whether he or she is buried in a national, state veterans or private cemetery. Eligibility for burial in any one of our 113 national cemeteries is an honor awarded to more than 27 million of our nation's veterans, and the government headstone or grave marker is an integral part of that honor."

According to Patric Gartland, director of NCS's Monument Service, the program is extremely well accepted. "Last fiscal year, we ordered 292,103 headstones and markers. Approximately 465,000 veterans died between October 1, 1989, and September 30, 1990, and we estimate that

families chose VA headstones or markers for at least half of them."

VA headstones and markers are made of high-quality marble, bronze and granite and they are available in the traditional upright style and the modern flat style. They are provided automatically for the graves of veterans in national cemeteries and state veterans cemeteries. Upon application, they are also provided for veterans graves in other cemeteries, including private cemeteries.

The headstone or marker is always free. When a veteran or eligible family member is buried in a national cemetery or state veterans cemetery, placement of the headstone or marker is free. If interment occurs in a private cemetery, the VA does not pay for the cost of placement. VA always provides for the cost of transportation.

Most veterans, their spouses and dependent children are eligible for burial in a national cemetery. Information on VA burial benefits, including headstones and markers, can be obtained from the nearest VA National Cemetery or VA Regional Office listed in your local telephone directory.

# "Breakfast With Charlie" Well Attended

The hour was early and light rain was falling - but a large crowd turned out for the Chamber of Commerce 'Breakfast With Charlie' at The Crossin' in Eastland Tuesday.

Chamber members, other townspeople, farmers, ranchers and others greeting Charlie Stenholm and his wife, Cindy. This was one of 28 appearances the Stenholms planned to make during a week-long swing around the 17th Congressional District. In Eastland they were houseguests of Judge Austin McCloud and his wife, Mary Anne.

Gary Montgomery, president of the Eastland Chamber of Commerce, introduced

Stenholm to the crowd. Charles Walker, president of the Eastland County Farm Bureau, gave the invocation.

Montgomery expressed appreciation to Congressman Stenholm for coming to Eastland. But when Stenholm began his talk he said that statement should be turned around.

"This county has been very nice to me during the 12 years I have been in office," the Congressman said.

He referred to the bronze bust the county presented him as a gift in 1990, and other evidence of support over the years.

Stenholm said he knew all present were concerned with the Desert Storm situation.

"The vote I made a month ago to support United Nations action in the Mid-East was the toughest vote I ever took," he said. "I knew we were voting to go to war, if the President thought it necessary. But I feel that I did the right thing - we did what we had to do."

The Congressman said one reason we were fighting in the Mid-East was because on August 2 Saddam Hussain decided to expand his power base. To be able to control energy is to control the economy of the world, Stenholm said. This was an extremely dangerous situation.

Stenholm said he was willing to depend on our nation's military leaders to decide whether a ground war is needed to put Iraq forces out of Kuwait.

If ground war is needed, I hope and pray it will be done quickly, with minimal casualties," he said.

Stenholm said that in this war "for the first time I remember, the United Nations is performing as it should perform."

Turning to domestic matters and agriculture, Cong. Stenholm stated that "America is the best fed at the lowest cost of any nation on earth." He said that the 1990 Farm Bill contained cuts on dairy farming, cotton and feed, but not particularly on peanuts.

He spoke of a G A T, or general trade agreement with European countries, as being something of vital importance. He said that Japan was opening up to imports of American beef, which was a good sign for the rancher.

Farm credit was a challenge for agriculture, Stenholm said. But on the whole agriculture was in better shape than many other industries, he reported. On Health Care, Stenholm said that Eastland County had been fighting some battles along that line — had won a few and lost a few.

"Health Care is a number one problem," he added. "We have the best care in the world - but at the highest price. How do you provide the best at a price people can afford?"

Stenholm then opened the floor for questions. The first was: "When will new landfill regulations be released?"

"We should have them by the end of the month," Stenholm replied.

But then he said that his advice to all was not to spend any unnecessary money until the EPA or Congress passes Legislation giving more authority back to the states.

"Hopefully an Amendment on reauthorization will pass this year," he added.

A number of other questions were discussed, and then various people told how much they appreciate Stenholm's work. There was special comment on his leadership in the Prayer Breakfast in Washington.

Stenholm told how important the breakfasts were to him also, and said that a Higher Power than heads of government ruled over the affairs of men.

The breakfast ended with informal visiting.

## Tax Deferral for Over 65

Section 33.06 of the State Property Tax Code requires the following information concerning the Deferral of Certain Property Taxes to be publicized.

Property taxes on the residence homestead property of those persons sixty-five (65) years of age or older may be deferred or abated if they satisfy the requirements of the State Property Tax Code.

The property owner must occupy the residence homestead on which the tax is being levied or on which a suit has been filed for collection of delinquent taxes.

To obtain a deferral, the individual must file with the Chief Appraiser for the Appraisal District in which the property is located, and affidavit stating that he or she is sixty-five (65) years of age or older and that he or she does own and reside in the residence that the tax is being

levied on.

If a suit has already been filed by a tax unit, the individual must file with the court in which the suit was filed the

By filing the affidavit with the proper authority, the payment of taxes or forced collections through suit is postponed until the person filing the affidavit no longer owns and occupies the property as a residence homestead.

Although the tax is deferred; it is not cancelled. A tax lien remains on the property and penalties and/or interest may continue to accrue during the period that the collection of taxes is deferred.

For information concerning the tax deferral or abatement, contact the Eastland County Appraisal District. The office is located on the second floor of the Eastland County Courthouse and the telephone number is 629-8597 in Eastland.

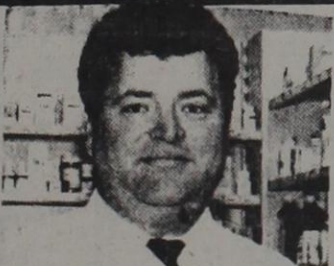

## Pharmacy Topics

By Bob Mueller

Did you have measles as a child? If not, and if you were born before 1957, consider vaccination. Doctors at the San Bernardino County Medical Center in California found many adults not immune.

Fetal alcohol syndrome may be caused by the father's alcohol abuse, a Chicago researcher has found. The study was done on mice; results included smaller litter size and fetal mortality.

Diet low in saturated fats seems to slow multiple sclerosis. The British journal Lancet reported on a 34-year study.

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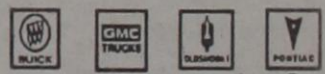
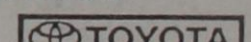

The Science I Textbook Committee, which consists of 15 members selected from public schools and higher education institutions across the state, met in November. This committee was charged with the responsibility of revamping the Life Science curriculum. They also produced an original curriculum for a Thematic/Coordinated Seventh Grade Science I course that will give textbook publishers guidelines for the 1994 textbooks. Beginning in 1994, schools will have a choice of traditional Seventh Grade Life Science course or Thematic/Coordinated Science I course.

In January, Mrs. Geye also participated as a member of the Science Curriculum Writing Committee. She is a unique member of this committee, since she is the only member on both committees. The Science Curriculum

Writing Committee must develop a curriculum for the eighth, ninth, and tenth grade science courses. These courses will be offered as Science II, Science III and Science IV. The recommendation of this committee will go back to the Textbook Proclamation Committee for their approval and then to the State Board of Education.

Mrs. Geye considers herself very fortunate to be involved in the pioneering of an innovative approach to presenting science to our junior high and high school students in Texas. Texas is the first state to begin implementing this approach to learning science. It is anticipated that other states will soon follow.

Everyone in May ISD is proud of Mrs. Geye and her participation in developing our state's science curriculum. She will be honored at the February May ISD Board of Trustees meeting.

### Special Agriculture Valuation Available

The following information is provided in compliance with the requirements of the State Property Tax Code.

If you are the owner of land that is being used for some type of agricultural use; you may qualify for a special valuation of your land for ad valorem tax purposes.

"Qualified Open-Space Land" means land that is currently devoted principally to agricultural use to the degree of intensity that is generally accepted in this area and that has been devoted principally to agricultural use for five (5) of the preceding seven (7) years.

The application must be submitted on a form provided by the appraisal district and that is prescribed by the State Property Tax Board. The completed application must contain the information necessary to determine the validity of the application.

To apply for the "Open-Space Land" valuation or for any other special valuation for which you may be eligible, application should be made to the Eastland County Appraisal District by May 1, 1991.

Applications are available at the Eastland County Appraisal District office which is located on the second floor of the Eastland County Courthouse. For additional information or to request that an application form be mailed to you, please call 629-8597 in Eastland.

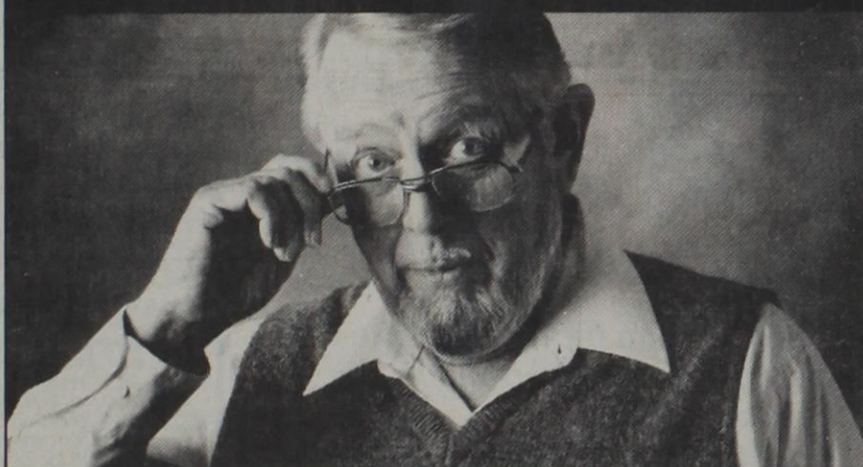

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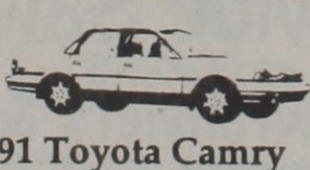
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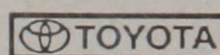
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
