

Dairyman's Short Course to Be Held At A&M College

COLLEGE STATION. - The long - established Dairyman's Short Course, held annually at Texas A&M College, is schedued for December 1 and 2. Headquarters for the Short Course will be in the Memorial Student Center on the A&M campus.

Arch Meekma, extension dairy specialist, said this year's speakers would discuss subjects of vital interest to every dairyman. The program has been designed to give not only dairymen, but milk plant fieldmen, commercial feed company fieldmen and others directly or indirectly associated with the Texas dairy industry informattion they can use in their work.

Meekma said such problems as dairy cattle feeding, breeding and management and subjects relating to milk and milk marketing would be discussed. The production and utilization of forage, especially hay, will get major attention, Meekma added. Two out-of-state speakers, Joe S. Taylor, extension dairy specialist in Pennsylvania and Richard E. (Dick) Burleson, a former extension dairy husbandman in Texas but now dairymen for the Federal Extension Service, Washington, D. C., will

An expected program highlight will be a panel discussion by five outstanding dairymen from different areas of Texas on "How We Use Dairy Records." Joel M. Hillin, extension area dairying, will also be a panel participant and Jimmy Davis. extension dairy specialist, will serve as moderator. Other speakers, Meekma said, would be Texas A&M College staff mem-

The extension dairy specialist suggests that room reservations be made at an early date, and added that local county agents can supply additional information on the meeting. R. E. 

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF RISING STAR, THAT:

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
