IT'S THE LAW IN TEXAS

HUFFING AND PUFFING

You see much of human nature shining through our laws. "Puffing" is a case in point. Your salesman may get carried away and claim too much for his product. Sometimes you can force him to make good on his claims, or give your money back.

But not if he was merely "puffing." Puffing is not true warranty.

Suppose a salesman claims that if you buy his car—whammy: The girls will come running for dates.

That is puffing. An opinion at best. Anyone should know better than to believe it. Anyhow, no court is likely to force the salesman to make good his claim.

But suppose the salesman claims his car is new or that nobody else in town could get it. And suppose you found it was used and you could buy others like it anywhere.

That's not puffing but a "warranty." And you can get your money back. But you couldn't make him deliver the dates with the girls.

Warranties are either express (written or spoken) or implied in the way you act.

Suppose as a seller you claim that an article—say a television

set or a car—is in good working order when it isn't. Then you must make good or take the item back and return your customer's money.

You do not put implied warranties into words; by the way you act, you make someone think and rely upon certain things as facts when they are not so.

For instance: If a man offers to sell you a diamond ring, you have a right to think that he owns and has a right to sell the ring. So you buy it, but the jewelry store comes and takes it away from you. The man didn't own the ring after all. Then, you can sue the man.

Since you may have a hard time deciding whether a salesman is puffing or warranting an article, just ask him to write down his claims. He'll most likely stall if he's puffing.

695 Temporary Licenses Issued for Texas Hospitals Under New Licensure Law

Since the hospital licensure program of the Texas State Department of Health became effective last January, 692 temporary licenses have been issued to hospitals in Texas, pending surveys for minimum requirements. Over 34,000 beds are dispersed among the nearly 700 hospitals licensed to date—approximately one hospital bed for every 257 persons in Texas. The national average of hospitals accredited by the American Hospital Association is 9.1 beds per 1,000 population, or about one bed for 110 persons. The Texas figures do not include state or federally operated hospitals or institutions, which automatically excludes veterans hospitals. However, it does include special clinics for maternity cases; eye, ear, nose and throat, cancer and other specific diseases or conditions. Harris County leads the parade in keeping with its large population with 49 hospitals and 5,021 beds. Dallas County is second with 38 hospitals and 3,897 beds.

At the other end of the scale, 22 counties have no hospitals

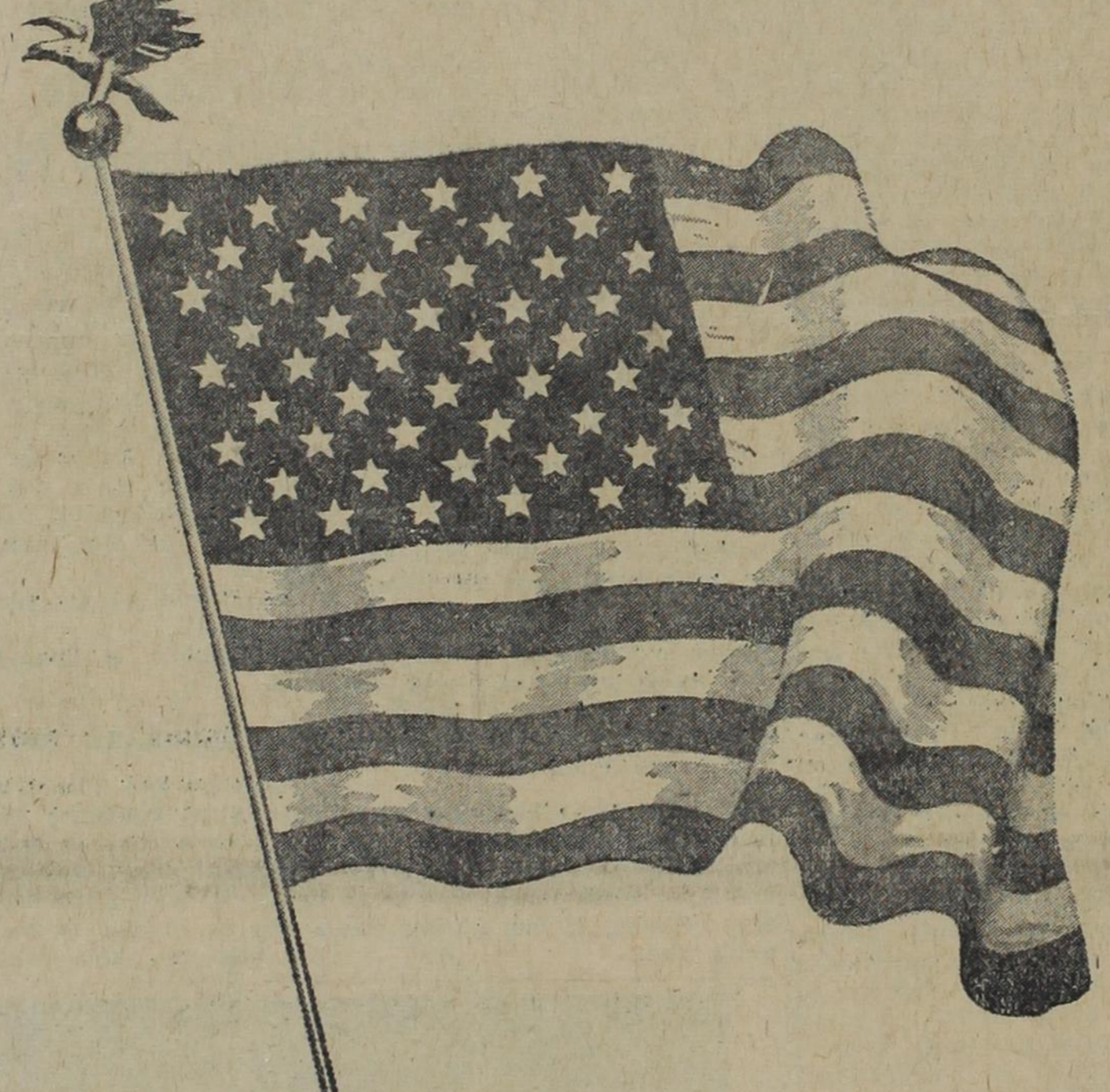
servicing the population within the county and four cities have hospitals (or clinics) with only one bed. Probably the oldest established hospital still in operation today, not including a couple of institutional clinics—is the St. Mary's Infirmary in Galveston, established in 1866. The largest hospital in the State is the Baylor University Medical Center in Dallas with 934 beds and an accompanying budget in excess of \$7 million. The average admissions in hospitals according to the American Hospital Association is 122 per 1,000 population for short-term hospitals. Voluntary short-term hospitals—the average hospital not including state or federal have an average total expense of \$31.16 per patient day. This amount includes equipment and salaries. To operate the average hospital it takes about 112 people—nurses, doctors, orderlies, cooks, custodians and administration—to service 100 patients. (A weekly feature from Public Health Education Division, Texas State Department of Health.)

LEGAL NOTICE

AN ORDINANCE REGULATING THE PARKING OF VEHICLES WITHIN THE LIMITS OF TEXAS STATE HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT FEDERAL AID PROJECT F. 575 (5) ON THAT PORTION OF WEST COLLEGE STREET FROM THE WEST CITY LIMITS OF RISING STAR, TEXAS, TO THE JUNCTION OF U.S. 183, THE ROUTE OF STATE HIGHWAY 36 THRU THE WEST SECTION OF RISING STAR, PRESCRIBING A PENALTY FOR VIOLATING THEREOF, REPEALING ALL ORDINANCES IN CONFLICT HERewith AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

SECTION 1. All automobiles, trucks, and other vehicles of any kind or character that may be parked on that portion of West College Street, as above defined, within the City Limits of Rising Star, Texas, as the same is now defined or may hereafter be defined, shall be restricted to the following:

(a). Parallel parking will be allowed on the north side only between Miller Street and Mayben Street. No parking will be allowed on the south side.

(b). On both sides parallel parking only will be allowed between the West City Limits and Miller Street.

It shall be unlawful for any person to stop, park, or leave standing any automobile, truck, or other motor vehicle upon that section of West College Street as above defined, in such manner as to interfere with traffic on said street.

EMERGENCY CLAUSE. The fact that the parking of vehicles on the highways of the City greatly interferes with the flow of traffic and public safety, creates an emergency and imperative public necessity, requiring that this ordinance take effect at once, and it is accordingly ordained that the rules requiring ordinances to be read on three several days be suspended, and that this ordinance take effect from and after the passage, approval, and publication.

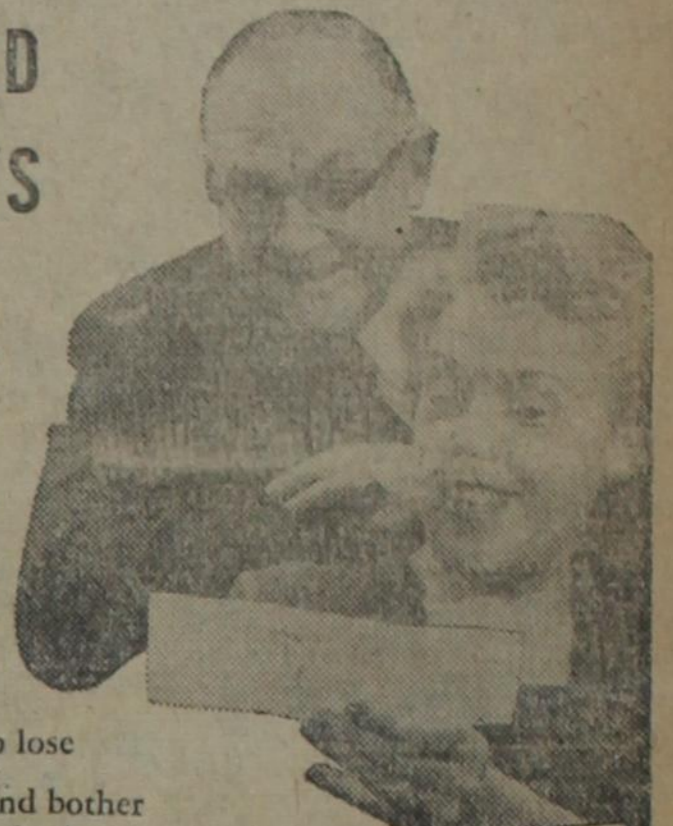

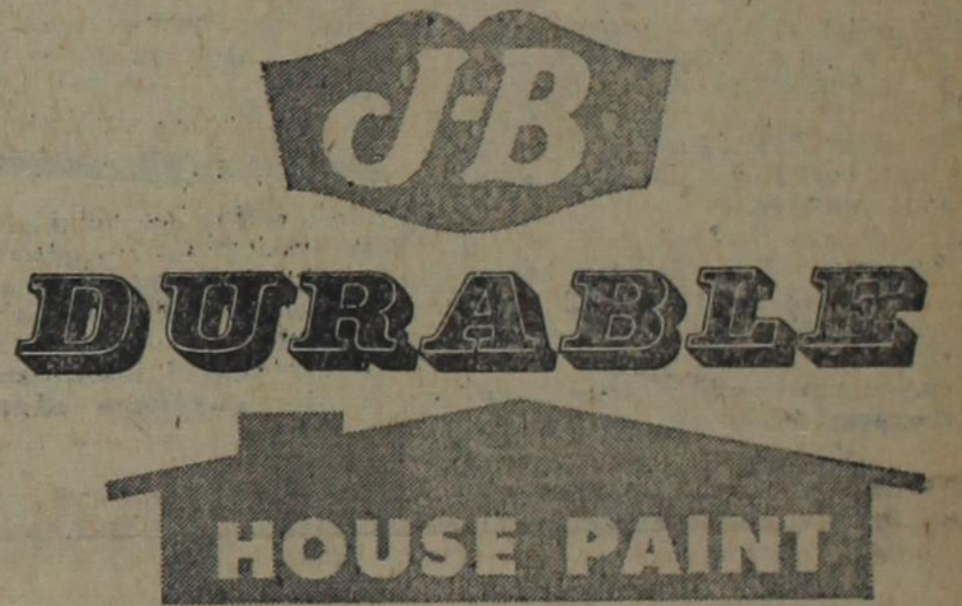

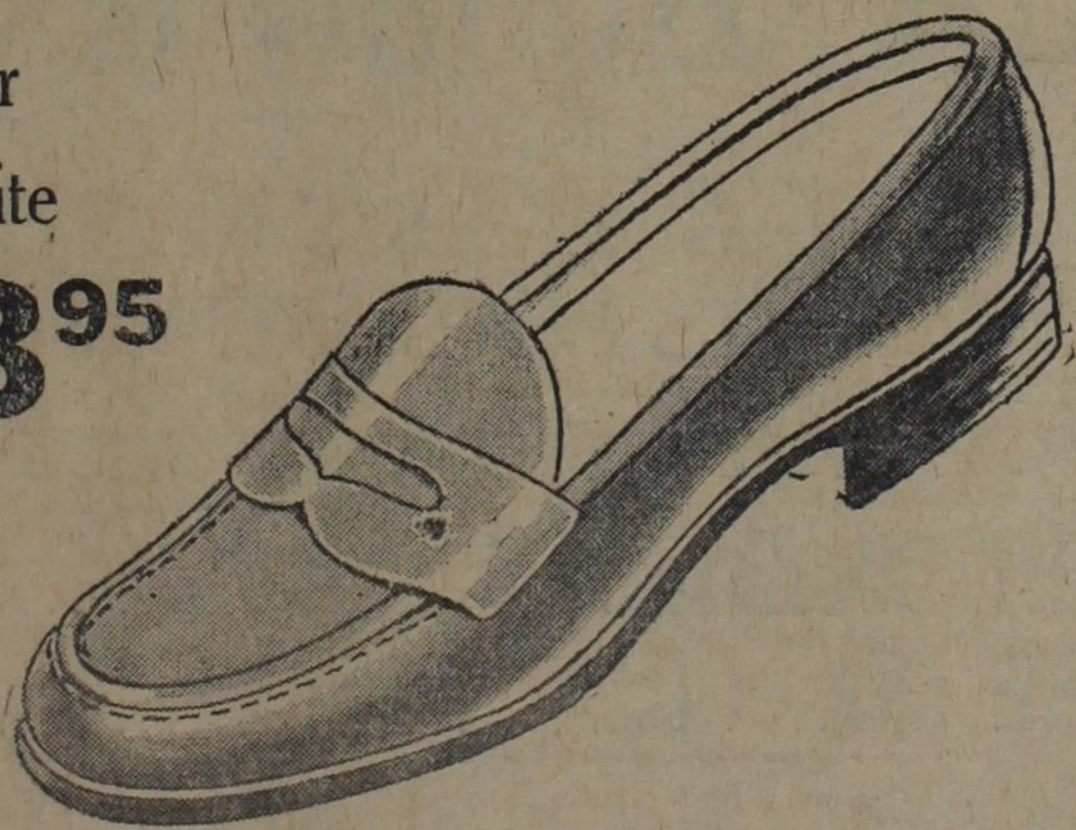
