Employers Urged To Check Wage Reports

who will soon be preparing their annual wage reports to carefully check submitting them.

At the close of the calendar year, employers are responsible for submitting Form W-2 (Wage and Tax Statement) to SSA, and giving a copy to each employee. The W-2 information must be reported in a timely fashion and with the employee's correct name and Social Security number. Because all Social Security benefits are based on those earnings, this will ensure that workers and their families will one day receive the benefits they are due. Employers should

It's the time of year for check wage reports careus to remind employers fully to be sure the name and Social Security number are correct for each employee. If there is an them for accuracy before error, the employer should furnish the correct information to SSA by completing For W-2c, (Statement of Corrected Income and Tax Amounts).

Employees are also urged to check their copy of the W2 to make sure the correct name and Social Security number is shown and they should save their W-2s (for future reference in the event wage records need to be corrected.)

San Jacinto, Tarrant, Travis, Trinity, Walker, Wharton and Williamson counties were approved for federal disaster assistance in December.



RANDOM GERMAN Notes: Carts supermarkets, terminals, are returned where they're secured BECAUSE users put a Mark coin in a mechanism to release them AND retrieve their coin when they return the cart. Ingenious, huh?...And at the markets, bring you own bag; none furnished; receipts are given and you take your purchases out, in your bag or your hands.

Weight restrictions must be severe on the autobahn, because you don't see the giant, long, multiaxled truck trailers we see here. You see many short versions, mostly Mercedes. And all cargo is either enclosed or tarped securely...While we were there, new laws went into effect lowering the speed limits during fog and drizzle.

TIME DIFFERENCE is 7 hours ahead; when it's 10 p.m. there, it's 3 here; and we had to remember that constantly as we kept in touch with our folks here and the office. AT&T over is good; other systems within Europe complicated, expensive are unpredictable.

BONUS FIND: at the end of another major tour that wound through Austrian countryside and ski-havens, stopped at Wieskirche, the Church of the Meadow, and it's a beauty. It is so unbelievably ornate, you wonder how worshipers keep their minds on the business at hand. But on the bright afternoon we were there, it was full of the faithful and tourists. It stands in an alpine near Steingaden, yellow and white walls and roof in vivid contrast to the dark backdrop of the nearby mountains. Architect Zimmerman was commissioned in 1745 to build the church on this where, six years earlier, a woman claimed to have seen tears running down the face of a picture of Christ. Although the church was dedicated as the Pilgrimage Church the Scourged Christ, it is now as the Wieskirche. It is Bavarian Rococo at its outstanding best. The simple exterior gives no hint of the lavish interior. The

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tour buses unloaded in the meadow parking lot and the tourists walked up a lane flanked by barns, farm animals and plows, to approach the church. Entering, one is astonished by the complex oval plan animated by a series of brilliantly colored stuccos, statues and gilt. A luminous ceiling fresco sparks the decoration. The detailed choir and organ loft are wonders of gilt and color. It is an active church, and the priest parishioners and their recognize the importance of the building and gladly share it with the thousands of tourists who visit. Their treasury obviously benefits from the donations which are given and from the sale of post cards and other souvenirs as well as a snack booth on the grounds. Our tour guide insisted that the priest and the worshipers considered the visitors welcome quests to their beloved church. Story is that the architect who did this church and another elaborate Romanesque church nearby is buried in a plain dour, side chapel not far away.

We were struck by the number natives who were visiting the church on that bright afternoon. A number of whole families were dressed in traditional German/Austrian costume, and we were told that it was their normal Sunday dress-up rather than for any other special event or celebration. Short, leather britches would take some getting used to, don't you think?

Later we trained from Garmisch, through beautiful alpine Mittenwald, Munich, Nuremburg to Bayreauth where



HSU Announces New Scholarship Program

Abilene - Hardin-Simmons University's new and revised scholarship program for the 1992-93 academic year includes strong academic scholarships for undergraduate students who qualify.

Rene' Maciel, director of admission, and Jimmy Trammell, director of financial aid, announced the revised program effective June 1. "We are excited about

New freshmen who score 22-24 on the ACT or 910-1020 on the SAT are eligible for \$1,000 per semester toward their HSU tuition. A 3.0 gpa is required for them to continue receiving the scholarship.

Transfer students with 30 more transferable semester hours who have a cumulative transfer gpa of 3.5 are eligible for \$1,000 a semester. They must maintain the 3.5 average to continue receiving the scholarship.

Valedictorians may receive \$500 per semester for their first year while salutatorians receive \$250 per semester. Both scholarships are for the first year and for tuition only.

An academic scholarship of particular interest to Abilene is available for new freshmen who have been recognized "Top 50+" graduates of one of the Abilene high schools (Abilene, Abilene Christian, Cooper, or Wylie). This \$800 per semester tuition only scholarship requires a full-time enrollment and maintenance of 3.50 cumulative HSU grade point average for continuation.

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


