

More Than Half Of Texas Land In Co-Operation

More than half the agricultural land of Texas is now under cooperative agreement with soil conservation districts, says H. N. Smith, State Conservationist, Soil Conservation Service of Temple. More than 150,000 farm and ranch operators have completed conservation plans for more than 80,000,000 acres. An additional 47,000 operators are in plan on another 26,000,000 acres according to reports from soil conservation districts over the

During 1962, 14,000 operators completed their plans for more In addition, more than 8,100 farmers and ranchers revised their conservation plans during the year to bring them up to date to include changes in land use and treatments.

A conservation plan is like a blueprint for a house to be built. Where these are needed; and re-It charts a sound and practical course of action for the operator and the agencies assisting the landowner to apply a conservation program on his lanu.

The objectives of farmers and land are well expressed in a main a strong and leading nabasic policy adopted by the Nation of the world, we must con- adequate nutrition, experts a-Smith cited the policy in part:

"There is a need for a complete conservation plan for every farm and ranch in the nation to sources of each operating unit. As a matter of good business, a farmer or rancher can do a better job of farming or ranching with a conservation plan than vithout one. Piecemeal and uncoordinated efforts cannot be fully effective. When each acre is protected according to its individual needs, in cost of production is reduced and per acre yields are normally increased."

Landowners and operators in the Rising Star Work Unit area are assisted in developing complete conservation plans for their units with technical assistance from the Soil Conservation Service provided through the Upper Leon and Brown-Mills Soil Conservation Districts. There are now 182 such dsitricts in Texas, which include 98.. per cent of the land area of Texas, as reported by Arthur Leesch, Chairman of the State Soil Con-

When a farmer or rancher requests assistance from the district, a technician of the Soil Conservation Service goes over the unit wit! the operator. The soil, water, and plant resources are studied in detail, and the conservation problems and needs are analyzed. Alternative treatments are developed that would result in getting the needed protection and desired production on the land.

Information from all sources is considered in developing the alternatives. Research data of the Texas Experiment Stations and research foundations, and the experiences of the operator and his neighbors are ued in developing possible solutions. Financial assistance available from various sources, such as the cost-sharing of the Agricultural Conservation Program and loans from the Farmers Home Administration are considered in the ways and means of applying the plan. Crop allotments are important in developing possible cropping systems.

Some of the soil conservation districts have equipment, seed, and other materials that may be made available for the conservation job. In the Great Plains area of 95 counties in the northwestern part of the State, costsharing assistance may be available for certain permanent-type practices through a contract arrangement with the Soil Conservation Service, said Smith.

From the alternatives or possible solutions, the cooperators select those treatments that best fit their individual needs and resources. Decisions made by the operator are recorded into a conservation plan, which is the blueprint for doing the job. The cooperator signs an agreement with the local soil conservation district, which indicates his willingness to apply the plan with assistance from the district.

A Conservation plan encomasses many things. It considers increasing agricultural income and efficiency through proper land use and treatment; protecting land against all forms of soil deterioration; rebuilding eroded and depleted soils, building up soil fertility; stabilizing critical run-off, sediment - producing areas; improving grasslands, woodlands, or wildlife lands; developing recreational areas; conserving water; proper agricultural drainage and irrigation

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


"Sideburns"

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
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
