Mayor Walter Smith said that every facility of the city that can be employed will be used to enforce the ordinance and protect the health of the people in this vicinity.

October Rains Bring Year's Total To 31 ln.

The first fall rains of any consequence in years continued Tuesday to soak the Rising Star area, bringing to 3.2 inches at noon Tuesday the amount of moisture recorded here in October and to 31.43 inches the total annual rainfall so far recorded.

The peanut crop, which fortunately for the present at least, is late this year, was not suffering serious damage as yet, except for the portion already dug and still in the fields, farmers said. But continued rain could have a serious effect on the crop.

Young grain and pastures, however, were in wonderful condition, and the prospects for next year's crop were being brightened with every shower as more and more moisture was being stored in the soil for the growing season.

The rains falling in the Rising Star area came in the most beneficial fashion with little or no damage to soil or conservation and drainage structures from washing. In the Leon river area north of Rising Star and Turkey creek area near Cross Plains, the Soil Conservation Service reported serious damage with hevay washing and destruction of a great many structures. 


