School Faculty For Next Term Is Told

Three places on the faculty of the Rising Star Public Schools remained to be filled following the regular meeting of the board of trustees Monday evening.

Most of the faculty was named at a previous meeting, and Monday night the board employed Mrs. Bobby Fortune to teach the fourth grade of the elementary school in the place of Mrs. John Vermillion who has retired.

Positions to be filled are: High school science teacher and athletic coach; high school math teacher and girls coach, and science teacher in the grade school. The grade school science post, held by Jack White, who also resigned, is a one-half day job, Supt. Victor Childers said.

The position of band director was abolished as an economy measure, the superintendent said. The schools have been paying 2½ teacher salaries out of local funds and the strain on the budget has become so great that the board determined it necessary to eliminate some of this cost. "It felt the schools could better dispense with a band department than a teacher for the first or second grades," he said.

The Rising Star schools, like most other schools, small and large, have been seriously affected by inflation, the superintendent said. "While costs of operating the schools are steadily increasing, the school income from taxes does not benefit from inflation. The only way that we can increase this income is to increase the tax rate, which is not practicable. The only alternative is to cut expenses, he said.

The positions of science teacher and high school coach and math teacher and girls coach are now held by Frank Gray and L. C. Hounsel.

The faculty as announced Tuesday consists of: Elementary School - Weldon Hill, principal, sixth grade math and high school business teacher; Jeannine Childers, first grade; Mrs. Joyce Geye, second grade; Mrs. Edith Bibb, third grade; Mrs. Bobby Fortune, fourth grade; Bobby Fortune, social studies and grad school coach; Mrs. Elsie Ezzell, English and language

Requests Must Be Submitted By June 1

AUSTIN -- Parents who wish to transfer children from their home school to a nearby district for the 1972-73 academic year must submit their requests to the receiving school district by June 1, 1972, according to an announcement from the Texas Education Agency.

Once approved by the receiving school board of trustees, the request must then be cleared by the Texas Education Agency. This state approval is a requirement of the order issued by the U.S. District Court in Tyler.

The order, related to the desegregation of schools in Texas, states in part that the Texas Education Agency "shall not permit, make arrangements for or give support of any kind to student transfers, between school districts, when the cumulative

effect in either the sending or receiving school or school districts will be to reduce or impede desegregation, or to reinforce, renew, or encourage the continuation of acts and practices resulting in discriminatory treatment of students on the grounds of race, color, or national origin."

Only hardship cases will be considered for transfer approval after June 1, according to Leon R. Graham, Texas Education Agency assistant commissioner for administration. Any late application must state specifically the exact nature of the hardship and why the application was not filed with the receiving school by the June 1 deadline.

"We expect to approve few late transfer requests and those must definitely be hardship cases," Graham added.

Rising Star Girls Take District Meet

The Rising Star High School girls captured the district 10-B track and field meet at DeLeon Friday of last week, scoring 120 points compared with 97 for Gordon, their nearest competitor.

The Rising Star girls captured three first places and a string of second, third and lower places to compile their winning total.

Rising Star took both the sprint and the mile relays and second in the 880 relay along with second places in the 440 dash and the 80 yard hurdles in the running events to amass much of their impressive total.

In the track events they captured first place in the shot put and second in the discus and long jump.

Ag Producers Praised

Agricultural producers should be praised -- not blamed -- in the current national controversy over food prices, Sam Kimmell of Cisco, president of the Eastland County Farm Bureau, said.

"Productivity in Agriculture has been increasing about twice as fast as in industry," the local farm leader said. "This amazing efficiency is basic to our high standard of living."

Kimmell said that if consumers paid the same proportion of their take home pay for food today as was the case 20 years ago, the food bill for American consumers would be about \$50 billion more per year than is actually the case.

"The farmers and ranchers are proud of the fact that, partly as a result of their record performance, the American consumer today has to spend only about 16 percent of his after-tax dollars for food -- the smallest proportion of income ever achieved here or anywhere in the world," the local Farm Bureau president said.

Kimmell said that cattle prices are now about what they were 20 years ago, and that farm prices in general have risen only about seven percent in that period. He pointed out that money paid to wage earners has increased 340 percent and that business and professional income is up 200 percent over that same period.

"The American farmer has been the best hedge against inflation the American consumer has," the farm leader asserted. He pointed out that only by increasing both his investment and his efficiency has the farmer been able to stay in business.

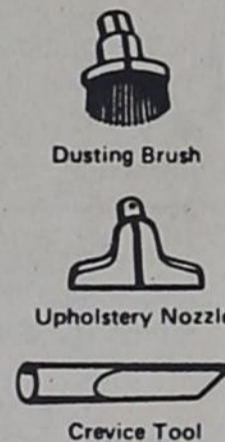

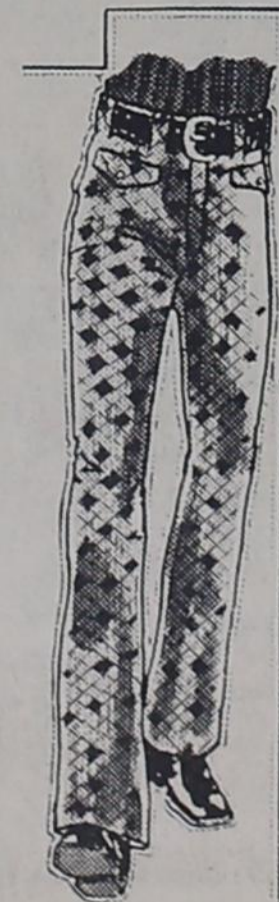

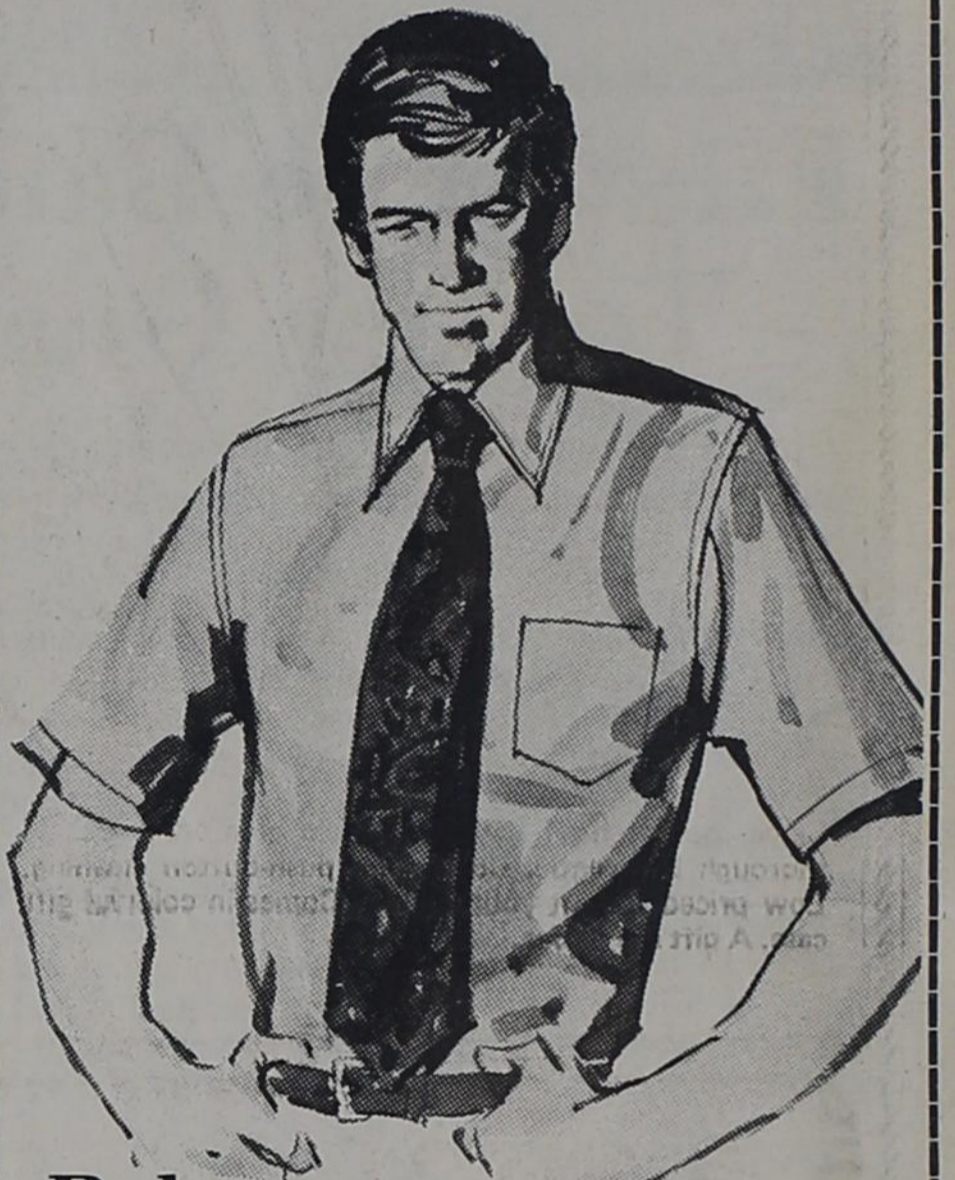

REA Approves Loan

Mr. Bill Parks, manager for the REA with offices in Comanche, received notice this week of the approval of a loan in the amount of \$413,000. Mr. Parks stated that the normal

The conference will begin at 7:00 p.m. in Bethany Baptist Church, Breckenridge, Texas.

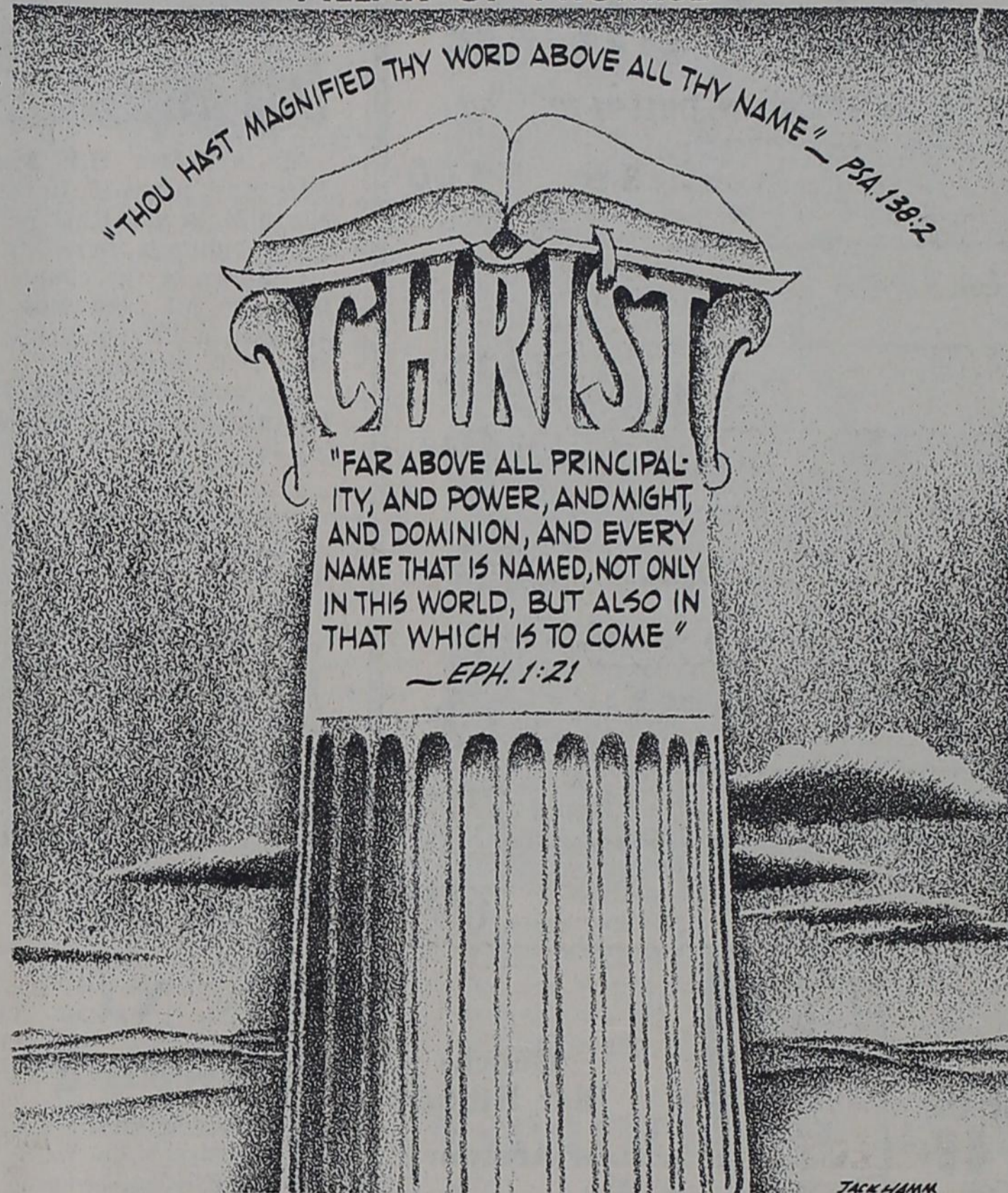
The meeting will include a session to acquaint church leadership with the challenge of Biblical stewardship and the resources available for designing a program of Stewardship Development.

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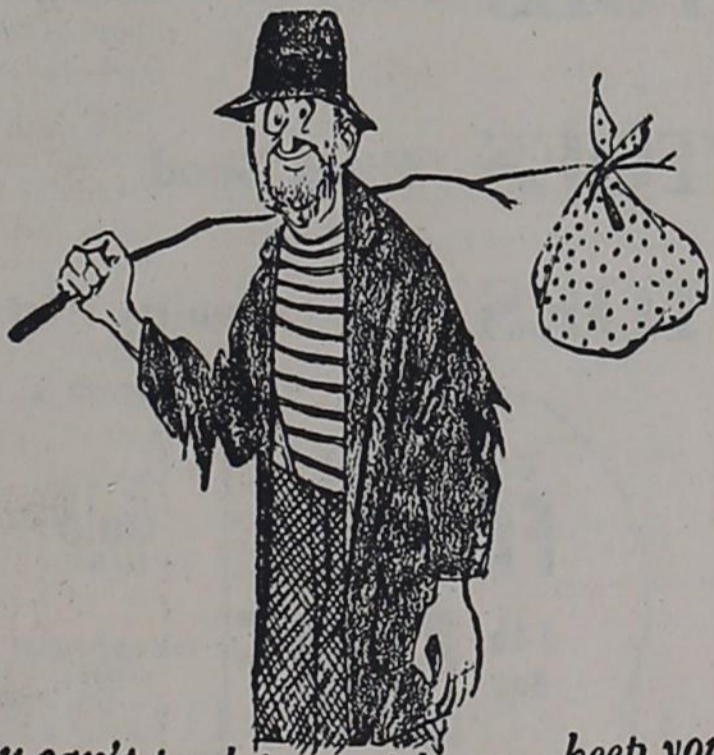

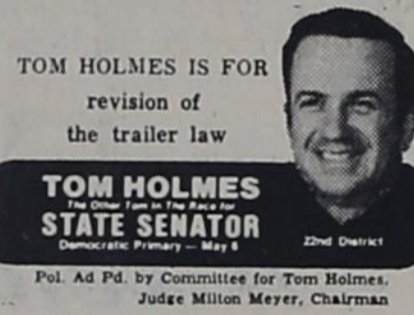

Pecan Grafting School

The 19th Annual Eastland County Pecan Budding and Grafting School will be held at Cisco, April 21st according to an announcement today by DeMarquis Gordon, Eastland County Agricultural Agent.

The school will be co-sponsored by the Eastland County Pecan Growers Association and the Cisco Chamber of Commerce. The morning session of the school will begin at 9:30 a.m. in the auditorium at Cisco Junior College. This session will be devoted to discussions, pictures and demonstrations on budding and grafting.

The Eastland County Pecan Growers Assn., said the

association will have bud wood, graft wood, as well as budding and grafting supplies for sale. This will include budding and grafting wood of most of the USDA varieties.

Childress invites everyone to attend. He said over 1,700 men and women from central and west Texas have attended the school during the last 18 years and learned to propagate pecans.

After lunch the afternoon session will be held at Dr. Bill Cardwell's orchard near Cisco. Field demonstrations will be given and everyone will have an opportunity to practice the patch budding and inlay grafting techniques.

Dr. J.W. Worthington, Texas A&M Extension Service Horticulturist, will be the instructor. Pecan producers and county agents will assist with the demonstrations.

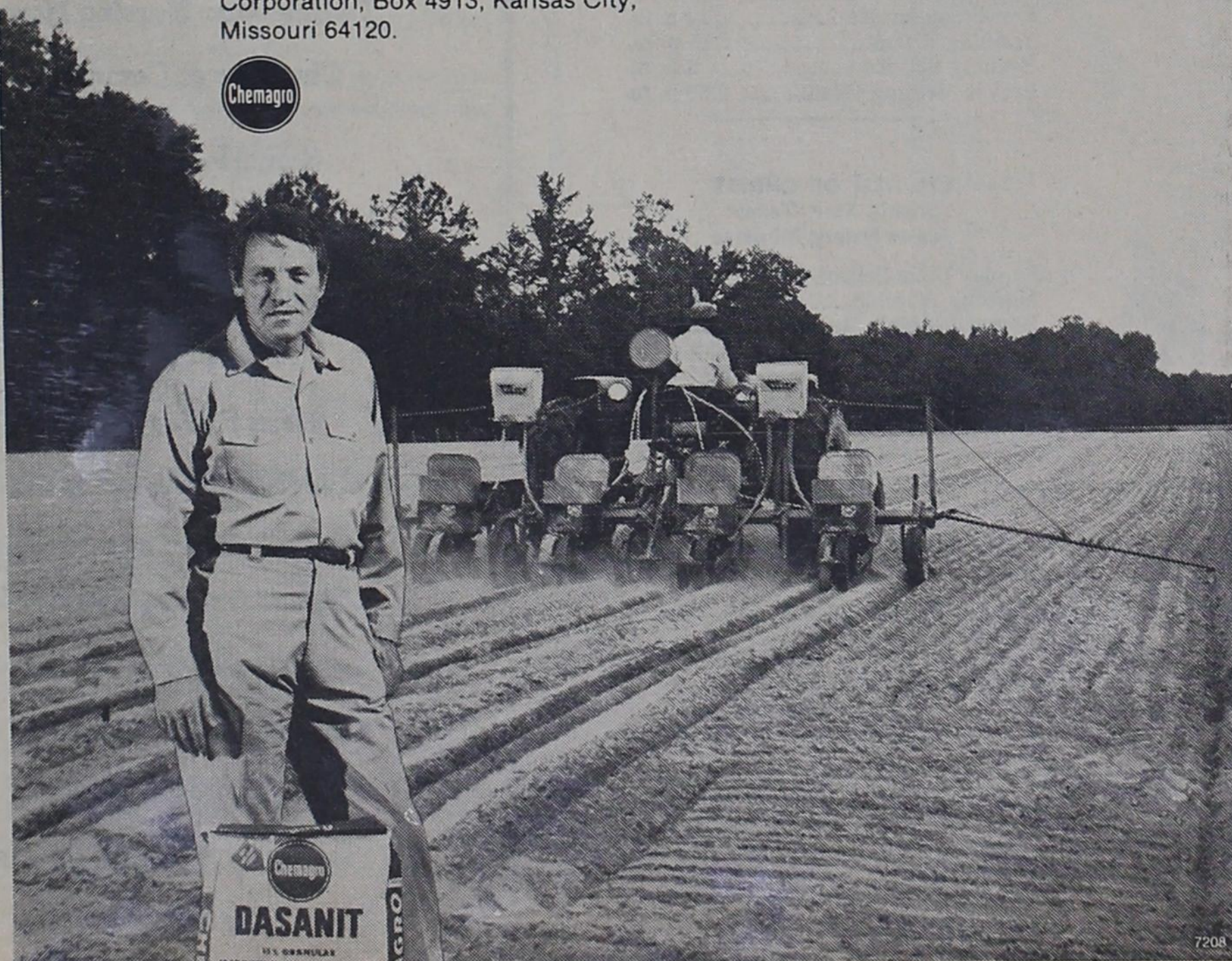
