> The second and final week of registration for the national Beef Referendum begins Monday, June 13, and ends Friday. June 17.

Eastland County producers can register at the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) Office in Eastland, then return the first two weeks of July to cast their votes. At stake is the Beef Research and Information Plan -- a pro-

ducers' self-help plan to strengthen beef markets here and abroad, increase research to solve beef industry problems and improve communications throughout the cattle business.

The Plan would be funded by a 30c per \$100 deduction on all cattle sales, but any producer who does not want to participate can get a prompt refund.

The visitor center is located seven miles west of Highway 62- 180 at the end of State Route 7. 27 miles southwest of Carlsbad, N.M. and 150 miles east of El Paso, Tex.

The park is a Designated Fee Area and the visitor center is the place to pay the daily entrance fee of \$3 for private non- commercial vehicles or \$1 per person for those arriving by commercial carrier. Golden Eagle and Golden Age passports are honored.
