It's the Law in Texas

Because the stakes are high, a person's life, his good name, his liberty, or his property, courtrooms are sometimes supercharged with drama and and anger.

Despite the excitement, the judge has to be impartial and open-minded as to issues, evidence, parties, witnesses, and lawyers. To fail in this may cause a case to be tried again or reversed on appeal.

This makes a judge's job a hard one. For he must first keep order so that the facts go to the jury in a way to lead to sound, unprejudiced verdicts. The judge must also instruct the jury on the law, and decide what teltimoliy goes into evidence.

Meantime lawyers on both sides are duty bound to work with skill and vigor to protect their clients and to advance their cause.

In this tense atmosphere some people break over the line and do things which may be termed "foul play" or show disrespect for the court.

When this happens, the judge has "inherent" powerpower that grows out of his hard job-to crack down and punish violators for "contempt of court". Within wide limits he can levy fines and give jail sentences on the spot when the offense takes place before him. He can sometimes lo the same for things that ake place out of the courtlike the disobedience of a court order. But such inlirect contempt of court calls or hearings to prove that an

offense has been committed. Judges may fine or give jail sentences to protect the due administration of justice: A juror or a lawyer for being tardy, for impugning the the judge's honesty, for a witness to refuse to testify, for improper attempts to influence the jury or the court, for deceiving or taking advantage of the court, making personal attacks on the character and motives of the other side or its lawyer, for appealing to prejudices, and referring to facts in court not admissable in evidence.

As It Looks From Here

WASHINGTON, D. C .-DISCUSSED IN THIS COL-UMN LAST WEEK WAS the "Public Accomodations" theory as embodied in the President's proposal on Civil Rights.

HISTORY HAS STRANGE WAYS of repeating itself Historical researchers now show that this issue has been around since 1865. In this year the Commonwealth of Massachusetts passed the first State Law abridging the right of businessmen to discriminate against cutomers for whatever reasons they saw fit.

IN 1875 THE CONGRESS PASSED a strong Equal Accomodations Law that applied to "inns, public conveyances on land or water, theaters and other places of public amusement". Violators were subject to fines up to \$1,000, a year in prison or both.

THE MEASURE WAS DE-CLARED UNCONSTITU-TIONAL by the Supreme Court in 1883.

FOLLOWING THIS AC-TION, IN 1884 the States of Connectuit, Iowa, New Jersey and Ohio passed their own Laws on Equal Access to public places. The following year the States of Colorado, Illinois, Indiana. Michigan, Mnnesota, Nebraska and Rhode Island passed similar laws. In 1897 Pennsylvania, Washington, Wisconsin and California went along. Several other States adopted similar laws even prior to the 1875 Federal Act that was later overturned by the Supreme Court.

THUS, OVER THE YEARS, 30 States and numerous cities have enacted Laws against discrimination in places of public accomodation. In a negative sort of way, the action of the Supreme Court in holding such laws unconstitutional spirited these States into taking action in guaranteeing access to public facilities, including businesses of a private nature.

AS THE SPIRIT OF RE-CONSTRUCTION FOLLOW-ING THE CIVIL WAR gradually ebbed, State Laws in most places became dead letters. By the very nature they seemingly were either forgotten or ignored as being impractiful of enforcement.

ALMOST THREE-QUAR-TERS OF A CENTURY has passed before another resurgence of this theory emerges with the force of the present Administration behind it. No 'oubt, of course, the Supreme Court's 1954 School decision lent impetus to this new inic accommodations."

BUT JUST A YEAR PRIOR TO THE 1954 Supreme Court Decision, the State of Oregon passed such a law, followed by Montana, New Mexico, Vermont, Maire, Idaho, Alaska, New Hampshire, North Dakota, Maryland, Wyoming. state to the list. are now 31 States, including the District of Columbia, with such Statutes in force.

SOME STATES HAVE MORE SWEEPING INTENT of the Law than others. The Law of California, for instance says that "All persons within the jurisdiction of this State are free and equal no matter what entitled to the full and equal accommodations, advantages, facilities, privileges or service in all establishments of every kind whatsoever." Connecticut revised its old Law in 1953, which now says "Every place of public accommodation, resort of amusement . . . "

THE PROPOSAL BEFORE THE CONGRESS enumerates a broad range of public accommodation to include virtually all classes of business at the national, state or local level which serves the public.

EIGHT STATES AND SOME CITY ORDINANCES specifically require segragation by law. The remainder evidently have no requirements

one way or the other. IT WILL ALWAYS BE DIF-FICULT TO subvert human nature and the impractical by the cold word of the law. There is urgent need to recognize that for every "right" there is a corresponding responsibility; for every privilege there is an obligation.







If you do not have a mailing tube for this, we have plenty and will furnish you one if you will let us know."
